

Area Agriculture Hard Hit By "Crunch"

Farmers are busy "dry cleaning" their fields, planting, fertilizing and getting ready for a new growing season.

In what is traditionally a season for hope, renewed faith in the soil and its bounty, a dark cloud hangs over their heads.

Farmers, all over America, are going broke.

Latest reports show that Texas farmers are slightly better off than their mid-western counterparts. To

quote they are "not going broke quite as fast".

Even so, thousands of Texas farmers, including many in this area, are filing bankruptcy, quitting to take other jobs, or applying for a conveyance of land and equipment to their loan source.

Falling prices, extreme increases in the cost of equipment, chemicals and fertilizer have all contributed to the pattern of gradual loss of income in the farm and cattle business.

The most dramatic problem has

been the sharp drop in the price of farm land or pasture land. Where farmers did have a great deal of equity because prime land was selling for \$600 to \$1000 per acre, many cannot sell land for \$350 per acre.

This land devaluation has hurt their borrowing ability. Two droughts and several moderate crop years contributed to the piling up of back debts.

Last year, in this area, crops were good, but prices were so poor that a break even situation was "good". There was no way to reduce debt size

by any real margin.

Farm economist predictions are gloomy. They forecast more foreclosures and bankruptcies, and little hope for a rapid improvement in the situation.

Lamar and Red River Counties depend heavily on agriculture for revenue. Prairiland CISD's main source of tax money is from land owners and home owners, it has no heavy industry to contribute.

As if to further the problem, the disaster in the oil market has further

contributed to a poor economic outlook for the future year.

Unemployment is up in Lamar County.

Agriculture related businesses, equipment and parts dealers, feed and fertilizer suppliers, chemical companies, mills, all feel the farm crunch. Their employees spend less, as well as the farmer.

What will correct the situation is uncertain. Whether the family farm will become a thing of the past, except in isolated cases, is yet to be seen.

Many predict corporate farms will be the solution. Many hope that it won't come to that, that prices will have to go up sharply as fewer and fewer acres of land are in production.

Whatever the answer, this spring, farmers don't have the same contented, satisfied look of a job well done at the end of a planted field. Instead they look...worried.

Notice when someone is telling something difficult for them. The person who takes a moment to lay a hand on their arm is usually the recipient of a thankful, heartfelt look. Yet, for some reason, many of us are reticent to do it.

Let's all loosen up just a bit. Let's get involved in other's unhappiness or distress just a little. Let's bring back the hug!!



Listed below are some of the issues that will be coming before the Commissioner's Court in the very near future which will have an effect on all of us in Precinct 1:


1. Preparation of the annual budget for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 1986, and ending September 30, 1987. The current budget is in excess of \$2.6 million.

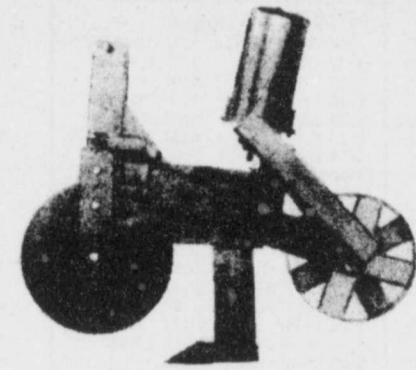
