

Low Turnout Marks City, School Elections

In Red River County, a tax proposal which would reduce Red River County's obligation for indigent health care by decreasing the general tax levy passed with 1,094 for the measure, 350 against.

Passage now allows the county to make road and bridge, lateral road

and flood control one tax item and use the balance for the general tax levy.

Gavin Watson, Jr., was elected Mayor of Clarksville 542-219.

In the Bogata City Council elections, William Harbison, who had been serving as mayor after John Worth Hood's resignation, was unopposed in his bid. Harbison received

161 votes.

Dr. Jack Troutt was re-elected for a two year term, and Jettie Bond was elected to the second post.

Mary Joplin and Tommie Williams were the losers in the race. Troutt received 126 votes and Bond 79. Williams received 72 votes and Joplin received 61.

The Talco-Bogata School Board saw a total of 442 voting to select trustees.

Tommie Corbell and Rev. Billy Daniels received places, as did incumbents Gene Smith and Eddie Denny.

Corbell garnered 308 votes winning

a three year at-large seat from Bogata. Smith captured a three year Talco term with 250 votes.

Rev. Daniels received 256 votes, a close race for the one-year term, which edged Brown's total of 237. Eddie Denny was unopposed in his

bid for the two year term and received 267 votes.

Voter turnout throughout was less than 50%, with a general lack of interest in the election seeming to be the most remarkable thing about it.

April 1, 1976

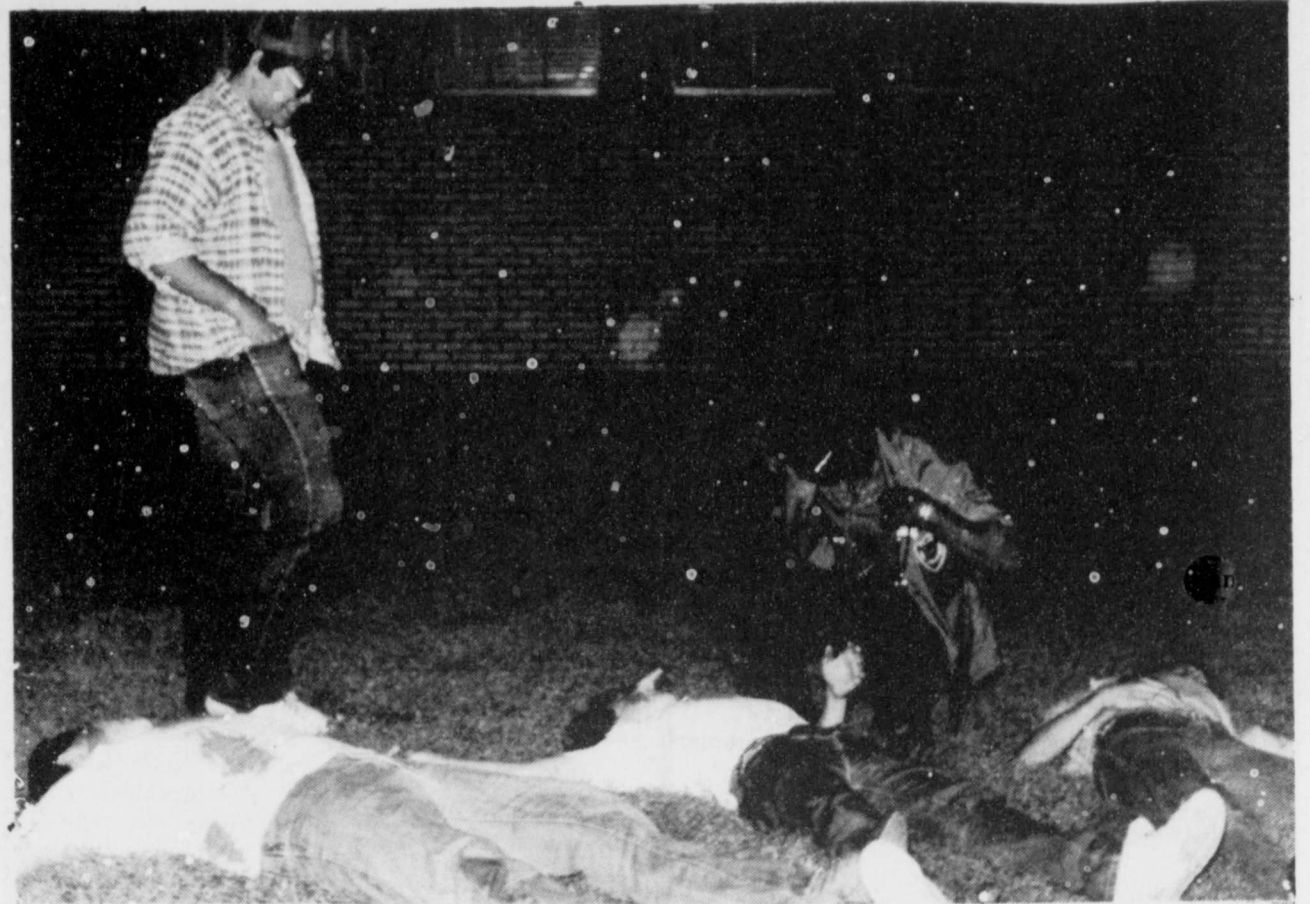

THE GAS PUMP

Vacuum Leaks

Surge and hesitation can be caused by many faults, however the combination of the two is usually caused by a vacuum leak. Check all the vacuum hoses for hardened or cracked hoses and check the tightness of carburetor base nuts and intake manifold bolts.
