Bogata Rodeo, Frontier Day Success

The annual Bogata Rodeo, sponsored by the Bogata Rodeo Association was another success story as well, with standing room only crowds on Saturday evening. Two hundred seventy-nine horses entered the gates for the grand entry on the final night of the rodeo and the crowd saw spectacular rodeo action for approximately two hours.

The bareback riding was won by Wes Ward of McKinney, TX who rode a former Bareback Horse of the Year, #115, Whiz Bang for 78 points. Wes picked up his check for \$354.85 for first place in that event.

In the saddle bronc riding, Dennis Crawford of Manvel, TX, was thrown right at the whistle, hung a stirrup and was kicked in the head, but came up off the ground to win it all with an 80 point ride, good for \$282.60. Scott Fletcher of Winnsboro, LA won second in the saddle bronc riding and Darrell Windham of Monticello, AR won third.

In the calf roping, speedy rookie calf roper Rafe LeFlore of Vian, OK overtook 45 fellow competitors with an 8.45 second run to collect \$564.00 for first place. Wade Matheson of Gillham, AR won second with an 8.79 second run while Rusty Young of Gilmer, TX won third with an 8.82 second run. The next three placings were won with nine second runs and were turned in by Jack Foreman of Bixby, OK, Kyle Smith of Paris and Larry Campbell of Slick, OK.

In the steer wrestling event, young Tommy Duvall of Checotah, OK, son of veteran steer wrestler Bill Duvall, won it all with a 4.57 second run. Duvall was the first steer wrestler to compete in the first performance of the Bogata rodeo and his time held throughout 38 other steer wrestling efforts. James Finley of Clarksville won second with a 4.63 second run. The steer wrestling paid \$490.30 to win it.

In the team roping, an event added just this year at the Bogata rodeo, champion Paul Lee Foreman of Barnsdall, OK and Donnie Vitt of Springdale, AR took home top honors with a speedy 6.09 second run. Each collected \$508.34 for their efforts. Vitt also placed fifth in competition with Randy Robinson of Bartlesville, OK. Vitt's total take home was \$651.33. Winning second and splitting the prestigious All Around honors at the Bogata Rodeo were Leroy Williams of Malvern, AR and Wayne Smith of Pine Bluff, AR, who roped their steer in 6.29 seconds. Williams and Smith were among several who had entered in two or more events, but were the high money winners at the rodeo. The All Around buckle was sponsored by the Cattlemen's Club in Clarksville.

In the cowgirls barrel racing event, first and second place was split between Melinda Wedgeworth of Overton, TX and Carolyn McKinney of DeQueen, AR. Each turned in a 17.45

second run on the electric timer and each took home their check of \$322.42. Angie Meadors of Wetumka, OK won third and Misty Moore of Vivian, LA won fourth. Connie Cooper of Broken Arrow, OK won fifth and Donna Roper of Heavener, OK won sixth place.

In the favorite event of most of the fans at the rodeo, the bull riding was dominated by the bulls, only eight were ridden during the three performances of the rodeo. The bulls were rank, and the bull riders rode hard, but they just couldn't match the bovine power. First place honors were split in the bull riding when the final tally was made, between Gary Hiner of Broken Arrow, OK and Rusty Smith of Ft. Smith, AR, who each scored 77 points. Hiner qualified on Friday night and Smith qualified on Saturday night. Two bulls were ridden Thursday, four on Friday and two on Saturday. They each collected \$410.58 for their share of the prize monies.

Total payoff for the Bogata rodeo was \$10,344.70, an increase from last year.

The rodeo crowds were entertained by Floyd McGuire of Clarksville, TX who presented his "Yellow Rose of Texas" bucking car each evening, along with other specialty acts. Bullfighters were Donny Sparks of Texarkana, TX and Chuck Ausmus of Paris, TX.

The Bogata rodeo was sanctioned by the Cowboys Regional Rodeo

Association of Shawnee, OK and saw some 250 cowboys and cowgirls competing during the week. The rodeo was produced by the Wing Rodeo Company of Bogata.

All previous records of Frontier Days and Rodeo concessions were broken this year as Bogata residents and visitors gathered to enjoy the contests and events of the special day.

Thanks to Kenneth Jeffery and the Contel employees, approximately 400 people enjoyed a delicious pancake breakfast getting the day's events off to a good start. Frances Rozell proved to be the best jailer this side of the border again this year by jailing around 500 bad hombres with the help of the sheriff and deputies, Neil Rozell, Mike and Larry Garretson and a few more guys with white hats. Shelaphon Simmons and the Rivercrest cheerleaders did a fantastic job in handling the dunking booth and all volunteer participants managed to stay cool during their time in the booth. Music for the Frontier Days was provided again this year by the Texas band and all reports from the arts and crafts booths were very good.

Drought Assistance Approved

U.S. Rep. Jim Chapman, D-Sulphur Springs, announced today that the U.S. Department of Agriculture approved haying and grazing assistance, as part of the drought relief program for Lamar, Morris and Red River Counties.

Chapman, who personally urged Dept. of Agriculture Secretary Richard E. Lyng to take immediate action, has been instrumental in requesting authorization and implementation of the emergency feed program, the set-aside program and other drought assistance to East Texas.

"As of today, USDA started permitting haying and grazing on set-aside acres in 1,390 counties in 30 states," continued Chapman.

In Texas alone, 98 counties have been approved for emergency drought aid. Separately, 34 counties have

requested disaster relief through Gov. Bill Clements' office for application to Agriculture Dept. for emergency low-interest loans from the Federal Farmers Home Administration.

"I have personally lobbied both

Gov. Clements and Sec. Lyng on behalf of each of the drought stricken counties in the First Congressional District. And I can assure you I will continue to do all I can to assist the producers in East Texas," concluded Chapman.

Area Rainfall Is "Hit or Miss"

Thunderstorms sweeping through the area have provided much needed moisture for some, while others can only watch the rain fall tantalizingly close...but continue to be dry.

April and May, traditionally a time for moisture to be abundant, were recording setting in their lack of precious water.

As one farmer said, "sure, prices for our products will go up, but if the crops don't produce, it doesn't matter".

Hopes for unusually wet July and August are the only solution, and unlikely to occur.
