## Local Sales Taxes On The Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Tuesday that payments to cities that collect local sales tax continued to show an increase this month, with July payments up 14.3 percent over those sent in July last year.

"The gaining strength in our state economy is being reflected on a local level, and local governments can continue to expect a steady increase in their share of sales tax collections," Bullock said.

Statewide, year-to-date payments are 10.8 percent higher than the same period last year, according to Bul-

lock. Houston's payment of \$10 million was up 17.5 percent over last year's allocation, Bullock said, and Dallas' payment showed a 10.1 percent increase.

Bullock said that 915 checks totaling \$61.3 million in local sales taxes were sent Tuesday to cities that collect the local option sales tax at either

one or one and one-half percent rates. Allocations to the state's six metropolitan transit authorities also

showed an increase of 17.5 percent, with their checks totaling \$28.9 million. El Paso's city transit department, the only CTD in Texas, received a payment of \$794,658.

Checks totaling \$5.8 million were also mailed Tuesday to 81 counties that collect the one-half percent county tax, Bullock said.

July's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in May and reported to the Comptroller's Office by June 20, according to Bullock.

Locally, Blossom received \$1,147.28 for this period, compared to \$862.13 for the prior year, for a

1.48% decrease over total payments to date.

Deport received no payment for this period, as compared to \$512.97 for the previous year, for an 0.29% increase over total payments to date for the year.

Paris received \$137,147.93 for a 7.41% increase over payments to date. Bogata received \$1,019.66 for its

payment for this period, compared to \$2,268.27 for last year, for a 4.80% decrease in total payments to date.

Clarksville received \$12,446.21 for this period, for a 6.09% increase over the payment for the same period last

year of \$12,014.23.

Detroit received no payment this period, but experienced a 66.07% change from the same period last year.

Mt. Pleasant received \$73,484.56 for an 8.25% increase over last year's payment.

Talco received \$1,752.16 for this period, compared to \$1,167.49 for the same period last year, marking a 4.22% increase in total payments to date.

## Computer Helps County Tax Collection

Red River County's computer system is helping county officials in a vigorous effort to collect delinquent taxes, the officials say.

Asked to come up with the names of major delinquents, the computer does so in an instant, without fear or favoritism. Twelve firms and individuals listed as "worst cases" by the computer are being given special attention, although the procedures are the same in all cases, large and small.

Last year the computer's data base spotlighted a delinquent taxpayer owing several years' taxes. The Commissioners' Court urged its collection agency to take all legal steps to collect the thousands of dollars due. If not successful in earlier stages, these steps can culminate in foreclosure on the delinquent's real property. A sale on the courthouse steps, with the proceeds used to pay the tax debt, is the result. As in other Texas counties, such sales have been rare in Clarksville, but they do happen.

"When we lowered the boom on a major industrial employer last year, some were afraid they might be forced out of business, taking badly needed jobs out of the county," says County Judge L.D. Williamson. "They paid up, however, and other major delinquents followed suit. If we had put a major employer out of business, our name would have been mud, but that hasn't happened. I don't think we'd ever foreclose on anyone, large or small, who was making a good-faith effort to pay up."

First Precinct Commissioner Drue Pirtle, who has pressed for hard-nosed

action against tax delinquents, is pleased by results so far.

"None of us enjoys paying taxes, but it is even more painful if we know that others are not paying their fair

share," he says. "Last year's special effort sent the message to all delinquents that we mean business."

"We may be doing the firms a favor by keeping them from getting so far behind that paying up is real shock," says Pirtle. "Some delinquents tried to bargain with us last year, tried to make deals. Under the law we couldn't have done that, even if we had wanted to. You and I can't dicker for special reductions, and neither can the large accounts."

According to Tax Assessor-Collector Juanita Benningfield, the computer has become a useful tool in the tax collection effort.

"The computer was confusing to our staff at first, but now we are taking full advantage of it," she says.

When the computer identifies taxpayers whose accounts are no longer current, their names and addresses are sent to the firm of Calame, Linebarger and Graham, a law firm that specializes in tax collections, according to Mrs. Benningfield. The firm adds 15% to the tax figure to cover its expenses and provide a margin of profit, but the full amount of taxes collected comes to the county.

"We don't pay Calame, Linebarger and Graham, the delinquent taxpayer has to foot the bill," says Mrs. Benningfield.

## Frank Stubblefield Chosen For Program

Frank Stubblefield, principal at Bogata Elementary School in the Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District, is among 250 Texas elementary school principals chosen by the Texas Education Agency to participate in the Texas School Improvement Initiative.

Established by Commissioner of Education W.N. Kirby, the Texas School Improvement Initiative is a statewide program to promote high performance standards of educational quality at the campus level.

To prepare the principals to accompany Texas Education Agency accreditation teams for on-site visits during the 1988-89 school year, a summer training program is being carried out during the month of July in Austin.

"The focus of the training is on characteristics and implementation strategies of effective schools," Dr. Ruben D. Olivarez, assistant commissioner for accreditation at the

Agency, said. "The principals will also receive training on the accreditation process."

The five Correlates of Effective Schools Research emphasize instructional leadership, instructional focus, school climate, measurement and teacher behavior/high expectations. The Agency adopted the correlates as part of performance-based accreditation in August, 1986.

The 250 principals were selected from a pool of 800 applicants statewide. Criteria of selection included recommendations by their superintendents, responses to questions related to instructional programs in their schools, and their philosophy on educational improvement.

In addition to the summer training, the principals will also become members of the Academy for Instructional Leadership. This membership will provide them with additional opportunities for future training in the Effective Schools concept, Olivarez concludes.

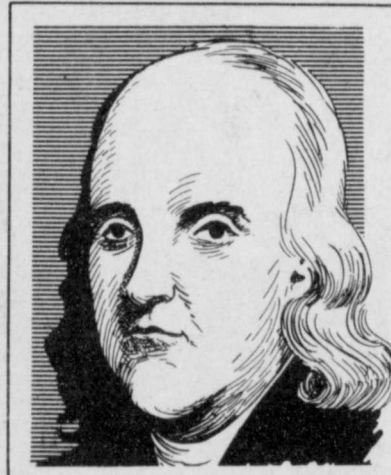
### Georgia Anderson Dies In Cooper July 13

## Tree Care Pointers For Dry Weather

A large number of trees are stressed in the Red River Valley area as the drought of 1988 continues. We are seeing valuable shade trees succumb to a variety of problems. However, the lack of moisture leads to death of trees that are stressed from these other problems.

One of the major problems that we have observed leading to tree deaths is man-made. Large trees are not able to compensate for a loss of their roots. Post Oak trees will not form new roots to compensate for the loss of roots according to Dr. Jerral Johnson, Extension Plant Pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This theory explains why so many Post Oak trees have died.

It has been my observation that oak trees in particular will not survive where a new home, shopping center and other buildings are built. No matter how careful one is in the construction process the oak tree will eventually die. I call your attention to many of the housing additions in Paris. The addition west of Crocket School was built among stately oak trees. One by one they died. Today most of the trees that are there were either small at the time of construction or have since been planted.

Most tree roots are in the top 18 inches of the soil. However, most of the feeder roots that feed the tree are in the top eight inches. Therefore, it is so important that one not remove that top soil in the root area of the tree or stress will be placed on the tree.

Another point to remember in caring for trees is that theroots will extend outward two or three times the height of the tree. For example, the roots of a 50 foot tree will go out between 100 and 150 feet. If the roots extend that far outward and if oak trees do not form new roots to replace those roots that have been destroyed, then is it any wonder that those trees die?

So, the next time you place a concrete slab, asphalt driveway, or several inches of top soil over the root area of an important shade tree, stop and consider the consequences. If you must do that, then you should get another younger tree started to take its place.

Another no-no is applying water at the base of the tree. Remember the location of a majority of the feeder roots. They are not at the trunk. Keeping the base of the tree wet will only encourage wood rot disease development and no fungicide will take care of those diseases.

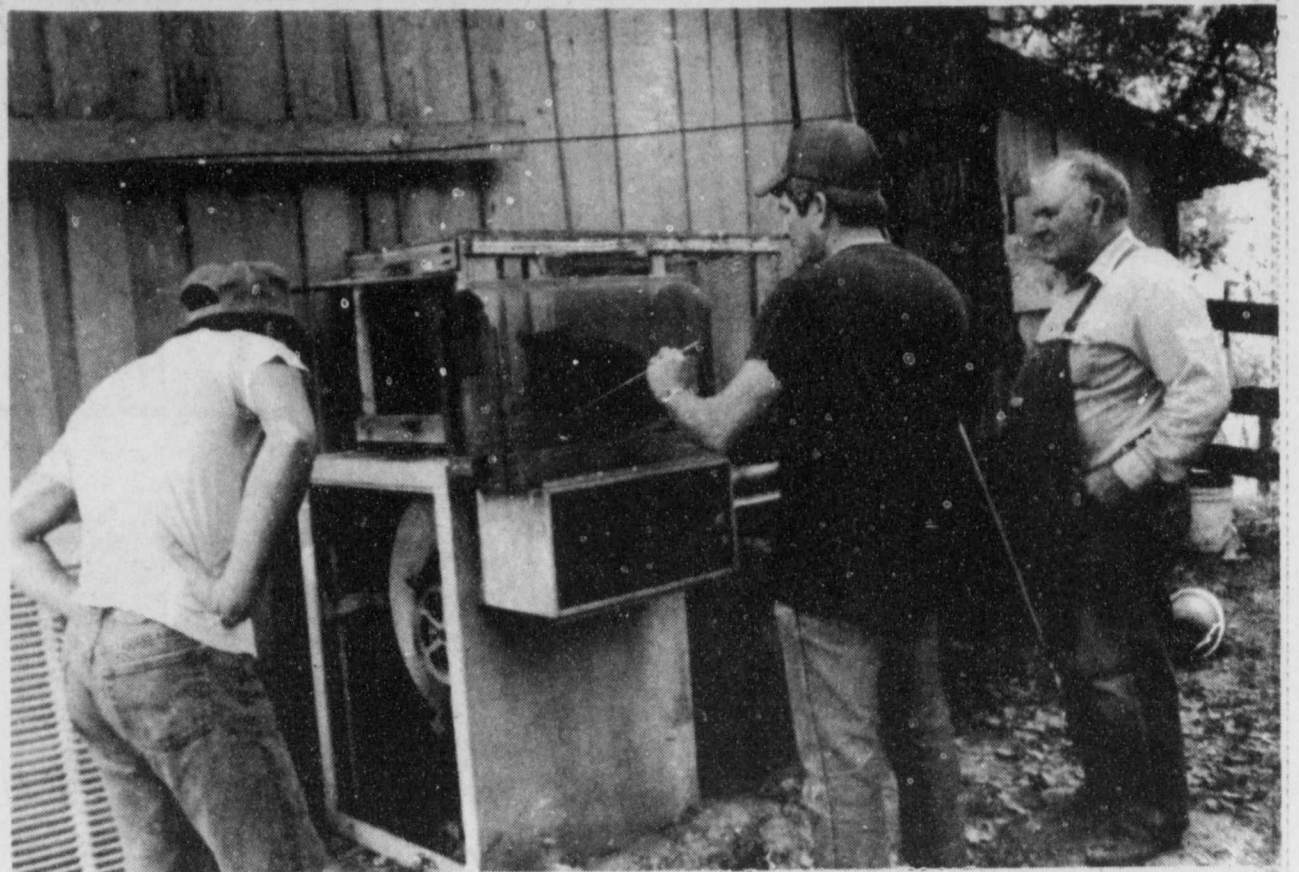

## Red River Haven Has 25th Anniversary

July 1, 1988 marked the 25th anniversary of Red River Haven Nursing Home in Bogata. The home began with 41 beds and has grown to accommodate 154 beds and 100 plus employees.

Red River Haven originated from an idea of E.E. Kirkland of Deport. Mr. Kirkland presented the plan to several professional and businessmen in Bogata. The men liked the plan and each put up money for the project. After much paper work and planning, construction on the first wing of Red River Haven began from plans drawn by Mr. Kirkland. Included in the building, along with rooms for residents, were a laundry and dining room and a kitchen.

Grand opening for the home was held July 1, 1963. Mr. Kirkland was employed as administrator and served in that capacity until his death in 1974. Bertha McCall was employed as director of nurses and some of the other employees included Doris Arnold, Ann Walker, Gladys Hobbs, and Mertie Wilkerson. The original Board of Directors included Vera Wilson, James Castleman, E.E.

Kirkland, Pleas Turner, Dr. E.E. Brooks, Aubrey Buckman, Joe Ford and Dr. Jack Trout.

Within two years, expansion was greatly needed for the home. Mr. Kirkland drew plans for an additional wing and that construction was completed in 1965. Other additions were constructed in 1968, 1969, 1974 and 1980. A chapel was also added to the facility in 1978.

Following Mr. Kirkland's death, Bobbie Cawley was employed as administrator. Mrs. Cawley had served as payroll clerk and office assistant for the home since 1968. During this time, she received training and acquired her nursing home administrator's license in 1971. Prior to 1970, an administrator's license was not required by the state. Mrs. Cawley and Mr. Kirkland were among the first nursing home administrators to obtain a license.

In 1983 the home was purchased by Beverly Enterprises from the local owners. Beverly Enterprises is the nation's largest provider of long term care for the elderly. Texas Division of Beverly Enterprises is headquartered in Austin.

Red River Haven is an intermediate care facility which offers 24-hour nursing care. There are both private and semi-private, fully air conditioned rooms. Services of the home include a wide range of social activities, barber and beauty services, laundry services, therapeutic diets, rehabilitative and restorative nursing care.

Red River Haven has proven to be a great asset to the community and the surrounding areas these past 25 years. Worthy of its name, the home has truly provided a "haven" for those in need of a home where they can receive loving care, friendship and meaningful activities.

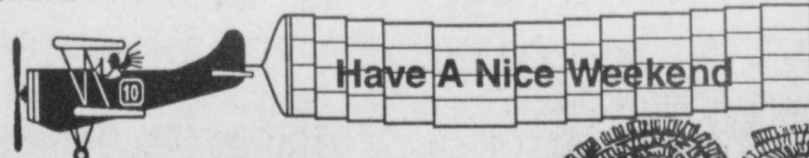

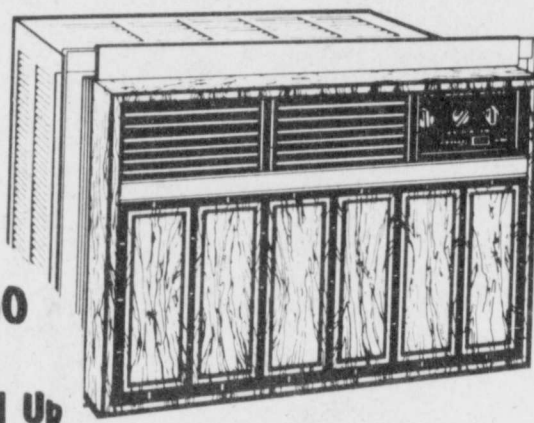

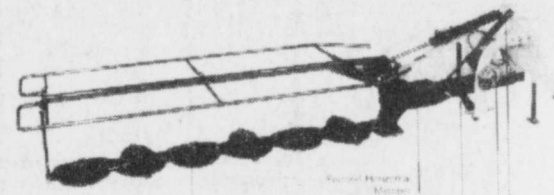
