\$200 Million Drop Expected In E Texas

How difficult the world must be for the illiterate! Think about it. Think about how severely communications are limited without the ability to read or write.

Statistics tell us that there are millions of Americans who are "functionally illiterate". This means that although they may be able to puzzle out a few things, they lack the ability to sit down and comfortably, easily read this column...or anything else.

How tragic, and how frustrating this must be. Adults in particular spend good portions of their life "faking", trying to get by without having to admit to their lack.

Most of us take reading and writing skills for granted.

The process of learning begins so early, and progresses so gradually, that we never pause to consider what a miracle the printed word, and our ability to comprehend it, is.

Yet what a bewildering maze that learning process has to be for an adult faced with attempting to learn.

Ever seen a foreign newspaper or book? Suddenly the letters we are so familiar with become strangers.

They combine in new ways, to produce words we cannot understand. The story is there, right before us.

For the illiterate, EVERY paper, book or label is like that!

The world must be so confusing. How does one travel without being able to read maps and road signs?

How to pass tests for jobs without reading and writing?

Menus in restaurants, even fast food places, can be a source of embarrassment.

How frightening it must be to sign contracts or loans without being able to comprehend the fine print!

Instructions for assembling newly bought products, labels on food, are beyond grasp.

The slow and steady path to literacy has been easy for most of us. If you are reading this, you've walked down that path.

But for many, the path has a gate across it. The gate may have been poverty, lack of desire, lack of ability, or simply circumstances.

Whatever that gate may have been, the barrier it erects is difficult to tear down.

Too often the general public, including employers, equate illiteracy with stupidity.

Statistics still say that our schools are turning out functionally illiterate graduates.

This is a tragedy that MUST be remedied.

That statement, once made, has to be backed up with a sound solution.

And in an age of budget cutbacks, and problems that loom much more frightening than a lack of communications skills, that solution is pretty hard to find.

Still, next time you see someone studying slowly and painfully over writing a check or reading a notice, consider how lucky you are. Too much of the world spends its days as if every written word around them were in a foreign language.

Income for farmers and ranchers in East and Northeast Texas could be \$200 million less than expected for 1988 due to the drought, according to mid-July estimates compiled by Dr. Greg Clary.

Clary, economist-management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Overton, said over 80% of the anticipated losses in income have occurred in the 19 northeastern counties of Texas. Additionally, many farmers and ranchers with livestock are spending considerable amounts over what they normally spend for

hay and grain.

Crops hardest hit by the drought and expected to bring less than half the projected income for 1988 are corn, cowpeas, cloverseed, silage and hay, watermelons and other melons, vegetables and sorghum. Other crops

expected to realize from 50 to 75% of expected income for 1988 include cotton and cottonseed, peanuts, pecans and soybeans.

Income from cull cow and calf sales is expected to increase slightly

from levels projected for the year due to early sales of animals to relieve dried-up pastures. Prices generally have been higher during this liquidation period. However, the impact of the drought on the cow-calf industry in East and Northeast Texas likely will be more pronounced over the next couple of years. Several herd liquidations have occurred in areas with more prolonged drought conditions. No one is sure at this point how many of these producers intend to re-

enter the cow-calf business in the future.

The impact of drought on the timber industry is most noticeable in newly planted areas, Clary said. Estimates of seedling losses in these areas range from 15 to 30%. This translates into losses of over \$2 million based on costs to replant these stands. However, losses could climb higher at a rapid pace should the drought continue, as July and August are criti-

cal months for seedling survival. County Extension agents and specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, along with the Texas Forest Service, continue to monitor the drought and provide estimates of its impact. Several materials concerning drought management strategies are available from County Extension agents and other representatives of the Extension Service.

Four-Year-Old Has Passion For Percussion

He loves county and western music, and he loves playing the drums. He sticks a horse like a burr, brands calves, and is about as handsome a cowboy as can be found.

When he walks into a room his jeans break across the tops of his boots just right, and his cowboy hat is tilted at a confident angle.

His eyes are blue and full of mischief, and he's never met a stranger in his life. His name is John William Stoney Musgrove, and he's seen a lot of the country from the cab of an eighteen wheeler.

Home to Stoney is a brown house on the Musgrove Ranch in Cunningham, Texas.

He lives there with his dad, Stacy, and mom, Linda.

What makes any of these things unusual is that Stoney is only four years old!

Stoney's most amazing talent is his drumming. It comes to him as naturally as climbing trees comes to baby squirrels.

When Stoney was barely walking and talking he would ride in the big semi rig that Stacy hauls cattle or hay with, along with his mother.

They say that the toddler would be sound asleep as they drove down the highway on some long haul, and the radio would be playing. The younger awoke beating time with both little fists to the rhythm of whatever song was on the radio.

There is a tremendous amount of musical talent on both sides of Stoney's family, and it isn't surprising that he has a natural knack for music-making.

His mother is an accomplished pianist with a clear, true voice that was a feature on the Prairiland FFA Talent team in state competition when she was in high school. His dad plays drums and guitar, sings and is a natural clown. They join with family and friends to "make music" whenever the opportunity arises.

Stacy's younger sister Zarinska sings with them, as do Linda's sister Treda and brother-in-law Scotty Norwood. The Norwood's daughter Amber is learning to sing with the group. Jarvis Watson, Allen Dale Huddleston, and whoever else may be on hand when the band starts up join in. There isn't a name for the band, it simply forms. In Cunningham music is a major factor in almost

everyone's life. The church holds frequent "singings", the homecoming draws back hundreds of people every year, and wouldn't be complete without some "homemade" music.

Linda's family has Gospel singers who have produced albums, and her younger brother Tony is an excellent vocalist.

Linda says with a shy smile that even her granddad and great-granddad had bands.

When asked if they are ever awakened by the sound of Stoney on his drum set they grimace a little ruefully.

"Yeah, sometimes he wakes his mama up wanting breakfast He'll eat and watch cartoons for about five minutes...then he heads for the drum set and begins banging away" Stacy grins.

Young Stoney's passion for percussion has resulted in his parents having to set up some rules. When the phone rings he has to stop. Watching him, it is obvious that it takes every bit of self-control he has, and he watches whoever is talking impatiently so that he can resume.

The drum set won't fit in the bedroom, but resides in the living room, which means that for the sake of adult

nerves his playing has to be limited occasionally. It isn't that his playing is unpleasant, it's just a little loud.

Stoney makes up rhythms of his own, or can listen to a song for just a moment or two and pick up the beat.

His big drum set is at Life Tabernacle Church, it's too large for the house! He has to share occasionally, which he does with surprising grace for such a little guy!

Like his father, Stoney enjoys rodeos, music and working cattle. He tags along to the fields when combining season is on, helps move vehicles around. He rides his horse, Trixie, and has been helping round up cattle for some time. He has ridden in rodeo grand entries, and gone on many a trucking trip. The four-year-old has been in California, Colorado, Mississippi, Alabama, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Kansas and most of his native state of Texas, to name a few places.

He talks a local teenager, Jarvis Watson, into taking him fishing at every opportunity, and likes nothing better than to be right in the middle of whatever is going on.

When asked what they hope Stoney will be his mother replies softly that she just "hopes he doesn't want to rodeo".

His dad, always a clown, grins the same grin his son does and says "why I want him to go to Nashville and make millions and millions of dollars and take care of his folks!"

Then Stacy goes on to say that what he would really like would be for himself to go to Nashville and become a star.

"Then Stoney could do just what he wants". Stacy talks about his desire to become a star wistfully. It's a dream that has been around since he was a child himself, and one that is far from abandoned.

Stoney's paternal grandparents are Johnie and Nelta Musgrove, who live near by and have owned and operated the only store in Cunningham for nearly 30 years.

His maternal grandparents are Laura Davidson Duncan, and the late Virgil Duncan of Blossom.

None of the family can really remember the exact day that Stoney began playing drums, or riding, or helping with branding, it just happened the way the seasons change, gradually, naturally.

He will display his two sets of tiny spurs, his cattle whips, his drums, his trucks and toys as eagerly as any other youngster shows off his prized possessions.

He is a well-behaved little boy, in spite of the attention that comes his way whenever an audience is left wide-eyed at his ability.

In April of this year the loose-knit band was asked to perform at the Denver Pyle benefit dinner in Deport.

The gym was crowded, and stars from the cast of the *Dukes of Hazzard* TV show and others, including *Knots Landing* actor Mafe Nutter, were on hand. Nutter leaped up on stage with the performers. Drumming at that time was Brandon Oates, another Cunningham musician. Nutter was happily singing and playing guitar when Stacy whispered to him to "Look at your drummer". Behind the man's back they had handed over the drum sticks to little Stoney. Nutter apparently didn't understand why he should look at his drummer, and launched into another number. Stoney just launched into it too!

When Nutter finally did look around his jaw dropped. The look of amazement was quickly replaced with delight, however, as he challenged his drummer to do "Wipe Out", and the drummer complied!

Drought Has Not Been Broken

Although most parts of the county received at least two inches of rain last week, the drought has not been broken. And if the drought had been broken, many producers could not recover from the corn crop disaster, milo and soybean crop yield reductions and short hay crop.

The rains were general yet variable over the county. Joe Wishard at the First Bank in Roston reports rainfall from three to six inches in that section. Upat Direct, Ruth Townsend reports around two inches while folks around Cunningham received four to 4 1/2 inches, according to Pete McKnight. Pete's wife termed it a "miraculous rain" and we would have to concur with her description. Corky White, who lives near Glory reports eight inches of rain. The eastern parts of the county generally received heavier rainfall amounts than the western part.

Grazing conditions in the area have improved significantly. Bermuda grass has grown more the last week than in the previous two months. However, additional rain must be received if hay is to be cut in significant amounts to overcome the drought. On the positive side, adequate grass should now be available

in most pastures to support the grazing needs without having to feed the winters hay supply.

The Texas Forage and Grasslands Council has asked the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to take the lead in identifying sources of hay available in the state. This list will be maintained in the County Agent's office in each county in the state and will be brought up to date each Friday. The list will be circulated statewide so this should be of help to hay producers wanting to sell hay and to livestock producers needing to locate sources of hay.

For hay producers with hay for sale, they should contact their County

Agricultural Agent with the following information; kind of hay, type of bale, approximate tons, percentage crude protein, age of forage when cut and method of storage.

It is important that hay producers update this information weekly. Our office should be notified immediately if the hay is sold so we will not continue to refer buyers to you.

Forms are available in our office for listing hay for sale. Also, this information may be phoned in by dialing 785-4513.

Livestock producers are encouraged to drop by the ASC Office to sign up for the emergency feed programs if they have not already done so. There are two programs, EFP and EFAP. The feeding program begins the day one signs up for the program(s), so if you qualify you are losing benefits each day you delay in signing up.

Combinations of low water levels in farm ponds and high temperatures have caused numerous problems with oxygen depletion. Additionally, nitrite poisoning has been a common occurrence in small ponds intensively managed for catfish. Nitrite poisoning is caused by an organic buildup in the pond from wasted feed and metabolic accumulations. Stock salt, added at the rate of 200 pounds per surface acre should help prevent nitrite poisoning.

If fish are seen swimming sluggishly on the pond surface during the morning, an oxygen depletion is probably occurring. A pump set in shallow water or an outboard motor can be used to circulate water and increase oxygen. Another suggestion in ponds with 1,000 pounds or more of catfish per acre is to reduce the fish inventory.
