Secretary Bryan's Position

Washington, July 15.—Secretary of State Bryan today gave his endorsement to the candidacy of Thomas H. Ball, saying that he regards Ball as "a progressive democrat and thinks that he would make a first-class Governor." It was pointed out by supporters of Mr. Ball here that his opponents have been quoting from the Commoner, which urged against the election of "men

under obligations to corporations," and have applied Mr. Bryan's editorials to the Texas campaign in view of the past connection of Mr. Ball with corporations in Texas. It is further asserted by Ball's friends here that the opposition in Texas has claimed that Mr. Bryan had "warned the people of Texas" against Ball. When asked about this Mr. Bryan said:

"By no means. On the contrary; I regard Ball as a progressive Democrat and think he would make a first-class Governor. Nothing I have said justifies anyone in quoting me as opposed to him. I remember distinctly his firm stand at the Baltimore convention with other Democrats from Texas on the support of the resolution against Morgan, Belmont and Ryan."

Ball's friends further declare that those espousing the candidacy of Ferguson have only partially quoted from the Commoner editorial. It is headed "Beware of the Special Interests" and names four of them. Sudan Grass

"Sudan grass goes a long way toward solving the forage problems."

"It has given exceptional yields of fine hay at all places where it has been tried and the yield of seed has been good also. Drouth seems to affect it but little and there is no danger of its being drowned by too much rain. It is thought to be wild, original form of cultivated sorghum. Under average conditions it reaches a height of five feet.

"The stems are somewhat more leafy than Johnson grass. It is readily cured into hay fully equal to feeding value to Johnson hay. It is very similar in appearance to Johnson grass, but is entirely distinct, being an annual and therefore dying out each year. It lacks the underground root stock that marks the Johnson and so produces a greater top growth than Johnson grass. It may be cut one or more times a year for hay, depending on the rainfall. At the Chillicothe station, a semi-arid region, four cuttings were made in one season averaging a ton per cutting. After the first cutting about thirty days are necessary, under favorable conditions, for the second crop. The yield is about ten bushels per acre, the seed weighing about thirtytwo pounds per bushel."

The grass cross very readily with cultivated varieties of sorghum and for that reason should not be planted close to that crop.

We are not going to have any

high standard of christian man-
hood and civic righteousness.
They are in the front of the fight,
and on many reception committees,
and some on the stump. Jona-
than Lane has turned states evi-
dence, and is terribly shocked at

throwing the first stone has no
restraining force with an awak-

ciples set forth by Mr. Williams in
his expose, but they quibble and
question the proprieties. With
the old world they prefer to fol-
low the method and ideals of the
dead past, while the new, world
loves liberty, justice and progress.

W. W. Searcy made a speech
before the Texas Bar Association,
belittling the people for wanting
a reform in the administration of
courts in this state. J. D. Wal-
thall, another lawyer proposed to
make the office of Judges appoint-
ive for life. Now we can say to
Mr. Searcy and Mr. Walthall, that
as long as such distinguished law-
yers as themselves are satisfied
with the prevailing system of
farce and denial of justice, as well
as expensive methods, the people
are not going to trust the lawyers
for reform. Napoleon gave
France reform, in his code. Napo-
leon was not a lawyer. If the
people ever get any reform in ad-
ministrative justice in this coun-
try, they will have to cease to be
satisfied with the lawyers, who
get so much out of the complica-
tions of the present system. It
seems to us that with the general
intelligence prevailing, the people
could reform the whole business,
and could be ever so bunglesome
and then we would not have a
greater mess of it than we have.
Another thing, the failure of our
system of impeachment, and the
tyranny, incompetence and malad-
ministration permitted, as is evi-
denced by the report of the sub
committee in the Speer case, is not
calculated to appeal to the
people's confidence as the writer
knows them, and the pre-ump-
tion of ignorance of the people en-
tertained by some of the lawyers and
judges, is not warranted by our
acquaintance and association with
the people. We must confess that
some of the speakers at the meet-
ing of the Texas Bar Association
were disappointing and discourag-
ing. The people have a right to

How to Feed a horse.

Four parts of oats, four of corn and one and a half of cotton seed meal makes fine feed for a work horse. For every 100 lbs of live weight, feed one to one and a half lbs. of the mixture, with one and a quarter lbs. of hay per day. Thus a thousand pound horse would require ten to twelve lbs of the mixture, and from ten to twelve lbs. of hay per day, when doing moderate or heavy service.

Mr. A. B. Mason purchased of J. S. Hays one day last week, for which he paid \$25.00, a buck lamb, lacking one day of being three months old, that weighed 126lbs. Mr. Hays thinks that when the lamb is fully developed, it will weigh 250 or 300 lbs.,

Mr. Hays came from Denton county to Haskell county three years ago, with two sheep of this breed, the Hampshire. He has sold three lambs for \$25.00 each and has 15 left. All of his ewes but one, brought two lambs, and she brought three. His flock sheared an average fleece of 13 lbs, that brought 16cts per pound. Messrs. Mason and D. B. English, are going to buy a small bunch of ewes, that will be kept in Mr. English's pasture, near town. A pasture carrying sheep has no weeds, as the sheep will eat the weeds as fast as they come up. 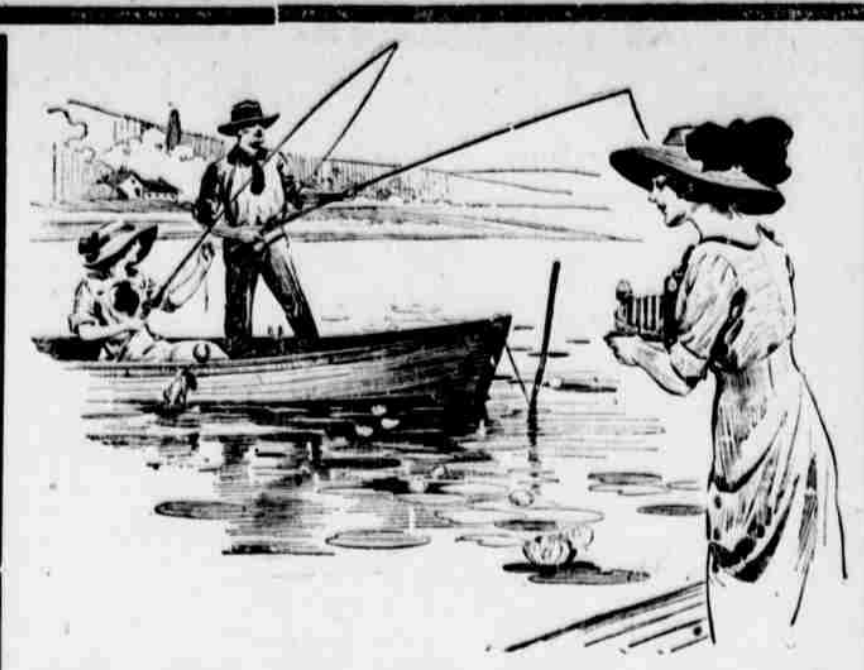

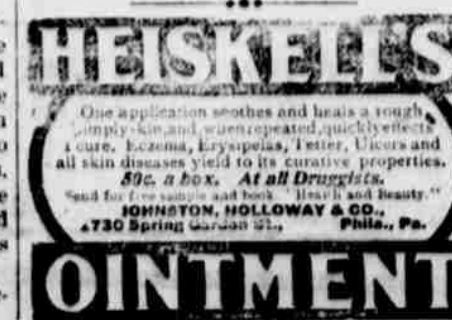
