Cotton, No Longer King, Still Royal!

Cotton hasn't been "King" throughout Red River and Lamar Counties for a lot of years. It never was King down in Talco, where Black Gold has been the undisputed economic ruler since the 1930's.

Cotton, indeed, fell from its spot as the south's major agriculture product, along about the time Baron Soy Bean and Duke Milo began taking some hefty chunks of land for their production.

Still, cotton is a royal crop, and provides a lot of economic income to the area.

Indeed, it is easy to forget, in an age of high tech work and big industrial plants, just how much income is provided from agriculture within this area.

Things have changed, of course.

Mechanization has taken over cotton production as it has every other facet of life.

The brilliantly colored hoardes of migrant workers, black, white and hispanic, no longer flood into the fields at the end of August to make their slow way down row after row "pulling bolls".

Airplanes or spray bombs put out chemicals to cause the cotton plants to drop their leaves.

Cotton harvesting, perhaps more than any other crop, is something of a family affair.

Then enormous strippers rumble down the rows, dumping or spitting their snowy cargo into trailers, or, even more recently, having them compressed into a module that contains ten bales of cotton.

Where Fulbright, Bogata, Rugby

and almost every other small community once boasted it's own gin, now there are two, in the eastern end of Lamar County, one at Deport (which used to have four) and one at Cunningham.

Both have all the business they can handle, working around the clock to keep up with the snowy flood of fiber coming in to be processed.

Moms load youngsters into pickups and spend their days trundling back and forth between the gin and the field, pulling the metal and mesh trailers to the gin, bringing the empties back to be filled once more.

Farmers keep a wary eye on the sky for heavy rain, hoping none will fall until the harvest is through. Boggy fields and hard driving rains can ruin a crop in short order.

At the gins, people weigh, tag,

sample and grade the fiber. The end product, no longer wrapped in the heavy, coarse burlap of the past,

awaits trucking out in its bright yellow woven plastic cover. The fluffy cotton is packed as hard as wood into the big bales.

Cotton harvest used to mean that every town kept every business open late on Saturday night, even (or especially) the banks.

Farmers came into town with their mule-drawn wagons and had cash money for perhaps the only time during the year.

It was a time for settling accounts, haggling over prices, buying the family little luxuries unavailable the rest of the year.

Now that is gone, of course, as business is conducted all year long, and most farmers have crop that need harvesting from early spring until late fall.

The cotton harvest is always the last. It closes out the year, it closes out the growing season.

Tax dollars are generated from it's ginning, it's production, from the land it is produced on. Farmers this year are getting a good crop. That means their buying power goes up. That hasn't changed in the least from the old days "when cotton was king".

It may not be King...nothing is in today's diversified world. But it is still an aristocrat in this area of the world!!

The capitol building, Austin, Texas. A magnificent building, handsome, typical Texas...a little bigger than it has to be...just the way we Texans like it!

On our way back from Canyon Lake over the Labor Day weekend recently we decided that it was time for our friend's kids, now that they were old enough, to tour the state's capitol.

As we wandered through the halls and stared upward at the rotunda I began to realize that there was something very familiar about the "atmosphere" in the place.

As we progressed further I kept trying to place it. Was it old granite? Was it old, polished wood? What was that elusive scent that pervaded the huge structure that was so familiar?

We trekked down to the basement in search of rest rooms. It was in the basement that the strangely familiar scent became strong enough for me to identify. Our state's capitol building smelled of Pine Oil Cleaner! I have no doubt that our nation's capitol smells the same way. This building smells exactly like very courthouse I've ever been in.

No, I haven't made a habit of appearing in court at the courthouse over the years. No unpaid parking tickets, no fines, no charges.

However we've stopped to wander through a lot of the historic and magnificent old structures throughout the nation.

Invariably, there are several scents that remain the same. That peculiar blend of pine oil cleanser, chalk dust (where does that come from?) dusty paper, old stone and carved wood.

It is very familiar. To the smell of school halls. Schools smell of chalk, pine cleaner and gym shoes. Even though many schools are new, brick and glass structures, they still have the same not-unpleasant aroma. Since chalk use is down, I'm not sure where that comes from.

But, I digress. My friend and I began to discuss this phenomenon as we left the stately building.

Where is it decreed that ALL court-houses and capitol buildings, and schools shall use only pine oil cleaners?

Is it some vast government contract extending from the smallest county in the smallest state all the way up to Washington D.C.'s buildings?

Or is simply coincidence that this particular scent of cleaner seems the most satisfactory for "institutional" use?

Or is it really cleaner? Perhaps

deep in the darkest, least accessible corner of the basement there is an enormous "air freshener", one of those waxy things that last for months in houses. This one would be magnified to gigantic proportions, in keeping with the size of the buildings?

Maybe when these buildings were built they took all the pine branches trimmed from the lumber and pitched them under the foundations?

Whatever the reason, it's almost a comfort to discover this pungent, if peculiar, form of continuity among our nations most formal state buildings!

No matter how magnificent, no matter how overwhelming they maybe, that subtle, common scent of pine trees is there. It reminds us that such buildings have to be cleaned and cared for.

I'd still like to know just who decreed it, though!

Kwik Korner And Assembly of God Church Burglarized

Burglaries are once again on the rise in Bogata, with the recent burglaries of the Kwik Korner and the Assembly of God Church.

The burglary of the Kwik Korner occurred sometime between closing time Tuesday night, September 6 at 11 p.m. and opening time Wednesday morning, September 7 at 5 a.m.

According to store manager, Mary Ann Littrell, someone apparently

unlocked the back door from the inside of the store during the time the store was open and later entered that door from the outside and took an undisclosed amount of cash.

A forced entry was made on the north side of the Assembly of God Church sometime Thursday night, August 19. According to the pastor of the church, Rev. Larry Allgood, several musical instruments and sound

equipment was stolen from the sound room. A \$500 reward is being offered for any information leading to the arrest and indictment of the person or persons connected with the burglary. Anyone having information is asked to contact Pat Hastings with the Red River County Sheriff's Office.

Both burglaries are under investigation by the Red River County Sheriff's Department.

Precinct One Receives Bridge Funds

Red River County's Precinct One (Bogata, Cuthand, Johntown and vicinity) was allotted 49% of the special funds allotted to bring county bridges up to federal standards. The Commissioners' Court voted September 12 to tap the Permanent Improvement Fund to meet the threat that further federal funds for county roads would be cut off unless 43 county

bridges were brought up to standards.

Twenty-one of the 43 bridges found sub-standard are in Precinct One, which has long suffered from the fact that it has more bridges and more miles of road than any of the other three precincts.

Regular road and bridge funds are divided equally among the four precincts. As Precincts Two, Three and

Four have less than 25% of the county's roads, commissioners representing them have been motivated to preserve the equal division pattern.

Of Red River County's 55 bridges, 33 (60%) are in Precinct One. Precincts Two, Three and Four, have nine, six and seven bridges, respectively.

Lions Club on Thursday, September 15 at 7:30 p.m. at their regular meeting at the Bogata Community Center.

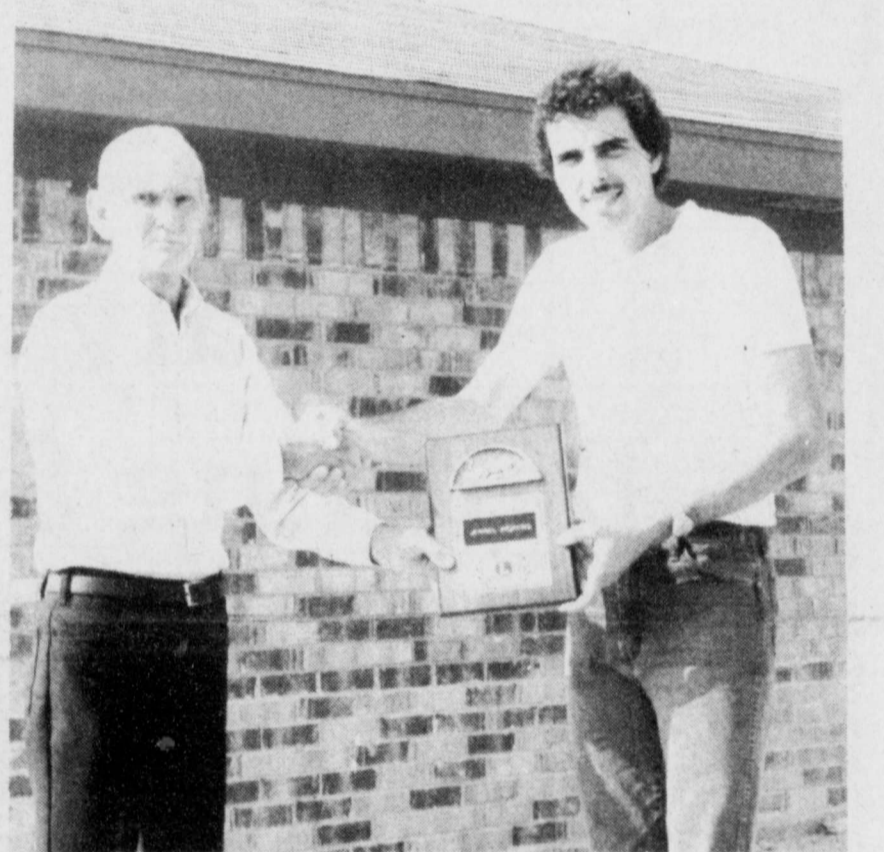

Appraisal Board Votes Pay Raises, Opposition Expressed

The September 13 meeting of the Red River Appraisal District Board of Directors drew an unusually large audience as it considered the district's 1989 budget. Pay raises for district employees were included in the budget only after lively discussion.

Several taxing entities, having recommended to the board that the pay raises be omitted, were represented at the meeting.

Spokespersons for Avery, Clarksville and Detroit ISD's, Red River County and the city of Detroit spoke against the raises.

Several of the taxing entities are considering as move to overrule the appraisal district board's budget to halt the raises. Under the law the entities have thirty days in which to take such action. In that event, the district board would be required to present a new budget.

Pay Scale, Repairs, Ordinance Are Topics At Council Meeting

The main topics covered when the Bogata City Council met in regular session Monday night, September 12, were the adopting of an ordinance prohibiting the raising or keeping of hogs inside city limits, approval of city equipment to repair the alley behind Belva's Beauty Boutique, approval by Council to replace the sewer line on Bryson St. with 6" section and discussion of the pay scale for new employees.

In other business, the definition of immediate family as stated in the Handbook was discussed and defined. The Council decided to include stepchildren that live in the same household as immediate family.

The City Judge reported one exhibition of acceleration; one prorated exhibition of acceleration; and one failure to show proof of liability insurance.

Stew supper was set for October 22, at which time a quilt will be given away. Windows for the center were discussed and a committee was appointed to buy new ones.

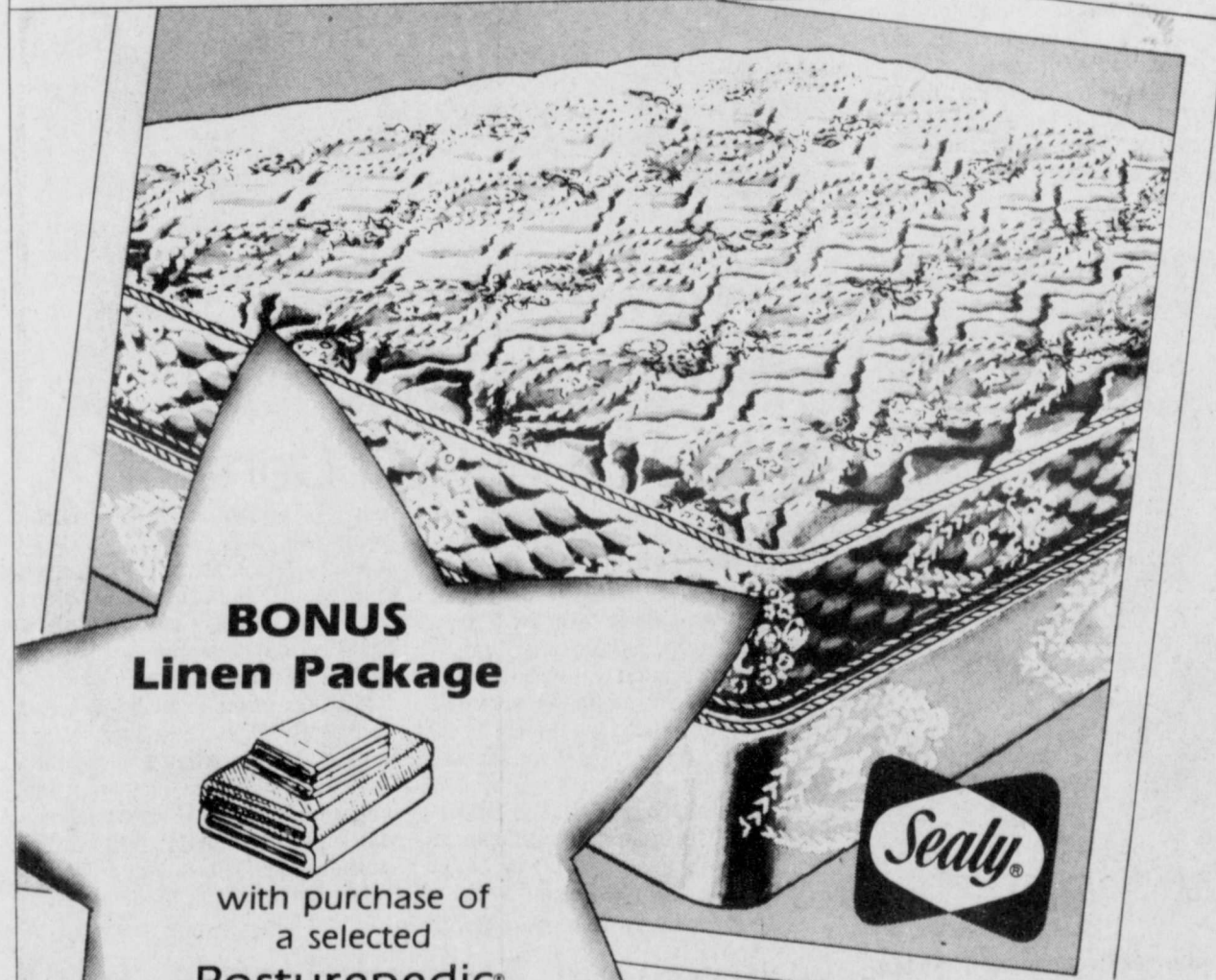

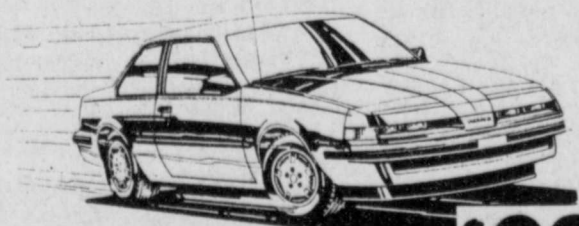

Rebels Suffer Defeat At New Diana

Every football game has a pivotal point, a key play upon which the outcome of the contest hangs. In the Rivercrest Rebel-New Diana Eagle encounter Friday night, the swing play was a perfectly executed "flea-flicker" by the young, speedy and highly talented Eagle squad with 12 seconds remaining in the first half. The 44-yard score gave the Eagles a 20-6 advantage, and bruised the spirit of the Rebels, who had just closed the margin to a lone touchdown a minute earlier with a 70-yard march.

The Eagles controlled the ball most of the second half, and went on to defeat the Rebels by a 35-6 score.

Save for that single drive midway through the second quarter, the Rebels offense was severely hampered due to the absence of senior tailback Scooter Brown, who was sidelined with a toe injury. Three of the Rebels' four first downs on the night came in that no-huddle drive, and sixty of their 111 yards rushing was accumulated then. The score, however, came on quarterback Bradley Wood's ten yard pass to wingback Jimmy Lewis with 1:27 left to play in the second

quarter. Senior David Stansell's first ever PAT attempt was just wide of the uprights. The running of fullback Marcus Savage and a 15-yard rumble by sophomore Shane Beers, set up the touchdown toss.

"We knew it was going to be a tough game," commented Rebel Coach Terry Giddens. "And that flea-flicker was a thing of beauty--and luck, because our defense had Crowe (Eagle receiver) upside down when he pitched to Jeffrey."

Giddens was not disappointed in the overall performance by the Rebels, and had high praise for the scrappy defense. An indication of just how tough the Rebel defenders made it on the Eagles is the fact that four of the Eagle scoring plays--three touchdowns and a field goal--came on fourth down situations.

Outstanding defensive play by the Rebels front line, especially Kevin Beene, and linebackers, particularly Craig Easley, both of whom were unofficially credited with seven tackles each, was offset by the length of time they were forced to play defense. Junior Jeremy Abshire, assuming the punt-kickoff return duties, had

excellent runbacks of 27 and 26 yards, in addition to his work at free safety, while senior Justin Roach also had an outstanding defensive game.

Asked about the injury to Brown, Giddens replied, "We are working with the trainer at ETSU to get him ready for this week. The toe will probably hurt him the rest of the season, but Scooter being a senior, really wants to play. We will just have to test it under game conditions; we will plan to use Brown when necessary."

The Rebels will travel to nearby Mt. Vernon Friday night to face the winless Purple Tigers, who were crushed by Hooks 41-0 last week. "The Tigers are more like Prairiland (the Rebels first game opponent) and we should match up better against them," Giddens stated in planning for the contest.

An interesting sidelight for the 8 p.m. contest will be the appearance of the Southern Methodist University 85-piece marching band. The group will perform on the square in Mt. Vernon at 6 p.m. at a "Tiger Tailgate Party", to which Rebel supporters are invited. The band will perform at half-time and will play in the stands after the game.

Tickets to the Mt. Vernon-Rebel game are on sale in the Rivercrest High School principal's office.

The Junior Rebels of Talco-Bogata will open their season at home Thursday night, coached by Shane Wilson and Ronnie Ross, at 5:45 p.m. The JV unity will do battle after completion of the junior high game.

The Rebel JV team won over the Honey Grove team last Thursday. The score was 24-6.

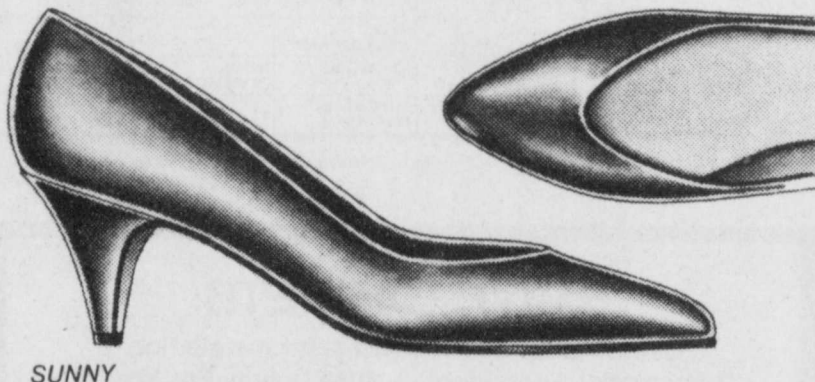

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 1988

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. 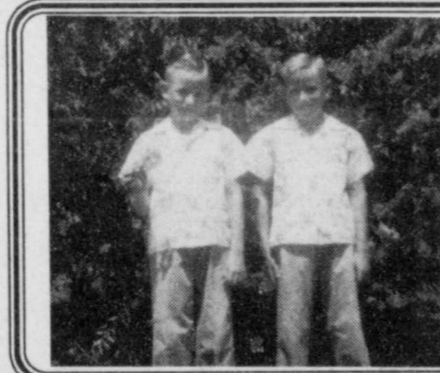
