## For Some Wild Creatures, A Second Chance

 He was magnificent. Huge wingsspread, powerful beak open, the injured Red Tailed Hawk faced contact with humans in the only way he
knew how.... with defiance and dig-
nity. The bird was brought in by a couple of Deport youngsters. I took it to phone call to Nancy Sater a quick phone call to Nancy Salzman, who
heads up "A Second Chance" an organization for wildlife rehabilitation which is State and Federally permitted.
At the clinic Dr. Cox removed the big bird of prey from it's box and a careful examination began.
The first injury discovered was a
broken wing...something that can broken wing...something that can
sometimes be fixed sometimes be fixed. the bird was thin, and had a split on it's breastbone where it had slammed into something. Still, hope remained that the gorgeous creature could be
nursed back to where it could return to the wild. fierce eyes that the bird's fate wa sealed. knocked completely loose, and the bird was blind in that eye. The eyes of a hawk are capable of
spotting a moving field mouse spotting a moving field mouse at a simply cannot hunt.
The bird may well have been hit by a car, but all too frequently their injuries result from gunshot. Hawks have a bad reputation, one manypeople every hawk is a "chicken hawk" and deserves to be blasted from the sky! To begin with, mos raptors eat rats, mice, snakes and
some varieties eat other birds. They never spent a lot of time eating baby chickens or pullets, but disliking them because of that particular habi long since starved to death if they depended on the chikens available now. Realistically, finding someone still raising chickens out in the open is almost impossible.

 Although this particular bird had never return to it's free, natural state, many animals under Salzman's care-
ful care can. they somedseday can bound back into their own world.
The shame of it is that so many are wounded or injured through cruelty ccident. For thos
help when they find a creature in distress Second Chance now offers them the chance to accomplish some victim, whether it be animal or bird ver into capable care. But many people are afraid to call
for fear they may be accused of keeping the animals, or that they migh
have to testify against someone they know who injured it.
Mrs. Salzman says "People don get in trouble for turning animals in
to us, they get in trouble for keeping hem". It is illegal to cage or confine any wild animal from an infant squir ral to deer, or owls and hawks. But keeping one overnight isn't going to
result ina fine. Mrs. Salzmanstresses over and over that calling Second help and care for whatever creture Trying to raise wild animals for Trying to raise wild animals for
pets is tricky business. They often require special diets and have specia needs in captivity that cannot be provided without expert knowledge Out here, where many peoplecome
in frequent contact with wild ani mals, we may have the opportunity to rescue one.
