The "Good Ole Days", there is a lot said about 'em. Some people think they'd like to go back to 'em. Not me!

Oh, I'm not talking about old fashioned values or things like that, I'm talking about the way we do things.

I don't know about you folks out there, but I like the way we're doing things now-a-days instead!

What brought this up? Hay hauling. Ten years ago Thomas and I spent every spare moment we had cutting, raking and baling hay into those nice little 60 lb. square bales. Then we hauled it. Good Lord, when we acquired a fifty dollar loader to carry the bales on the ground up to the bed of a truck it was like going to heaven!

But we switched to the big round bales, and Sunday I went out with Thomas to help haul them in to stack in the barn.

It was so easy I felt guilty! He would take the front end loader, pick a bale up, stack in on my trailer, and when the trailer was full he put one on the spike at the back of the tractor and another on the front, and we'd bounce along the road to the barn. Then he would unload and stack those big, round chunks of hay, and nobody, not either one of us, had to touch them. We were through we went home, still reasonably clean, and without an ache nor pain!

That made me think back to all those blistering days we spent handling each square bale one at a time, several times. We would leave at sunrise. With long sleeves, hay hooks and reinforced jeans we would work until midnight, stopping only for another long drink at the water jug. Then we stumbled home to try and sooth the scratches, itches, scrapes and aches left by those hay bales. After eating a hand full of aspirin we would try to sleep, only to discover that muscles, bones and back hurt too bad to sleep! Hey, it ain't no way to live!

In between times there were break downs of ancient hay trucks, sprains, broken bales, over-heavy bales, live snakes caught in the hay, and a variety of other joys. Everyone, male and female alike, should have to experience that at least once...it's excellent for developing an appreciation for the finer things in life! Anyone who has ever hauled hay on a regular basis can voice for that. I've stretched out in the meagre shadow cast by a truck tire many a blazing afternoon wondering why I liked outdoor work!

I'm not here to argue with anyone about the merits of feeding square bales or round bales...that's not the point. The pint is that hauling hay with a loader is sooooo much nicer than the old way. And I suspect that "old timers" who can remember when the hay had to be taken to the baler, and hauled with teams of mules or horses, could tell me just how much of an improvement the system of a few years ago was over THAT system.

No, hauling hay isn't what it used to be. Thank goodness!

For Some Wild Creatures, A Second Chance

He was magnificent. Huge wings spread, powerful beak open, the injured Red Tailed Hawk faced contact with humans in the only way he knew how...with defiance and dignity.

The bird was brought in by a couple of Deport youngsters. I took it to Cox's Veterinarian Clinic after a quick phone call to Nancy Salzman, who heads up "A Second Chance" an organization for wildlife rehabilitation which is State and Federally permitted.

At the clinic Dr. Cox removed the big bird of prey from its box and a careful examination began.

The first injury discovered was a broken wing...something that can sometimes be fixed.

Further examination revealed that the bird was thin, and had a split on its breastbone where it had slammed into something. Still, hope remained that the gorgeous creature could be nursed back to where it could return to the wild.

It was only after a look into those fierce eyes that the bird's fate was sealed.

The lens of one eye had been knocked completely loose, and the bird was blind in that eye.

The eyes of a hawk are capable of spotting a moving field mouse at a mile...and a bird without both eyes simply cannot hunt.

The bird may well have been hit by a car, but all too frequently their injuries result from gunshot.

Hawks have a bad reputation, one that is completely undeserved. To many people every hawk is a "chicken hawk" and deserves to be blasted from the sky! To begin with, most raptors eat rats, mice, snakes and some varieties eat other birds. They never spent a lot of time eating baby chickens or pullets, but disliking them because of that particular habit now is ludicrous! Hawks would have long since starved to death if they depended on the chickens available now. Realistically, finding someone still raising chickens out in the open is almost impossible!

Shooting the birds is not only illegal, it is tragic. Yearly they become more scarce.

Second chance is aimed at helping not only hawks, but every other type of wild animal receive just that, a "second chance" at life.

Although this particular bird had to be euthanized because it could never return to its free, natural state, many animals under Salzman's careful care can.

Wounds treated, strength built up, they someday can bound back into their own world.

The shame of it is that so many are wounded or injured through cruelty or deliberate injury instead of through accident.

For those who care enough to want to help when they find a creature in distress Second Chance now offers them the chance to accomplish something. They can call and hand the victim, whether it be animal or bird, over into capable care.

But many people are afraid to call for fear they may be accused of keeping the animals, or that they might have to testify against someone they know who injured it.

Mrs. Salzman says "People don't get in trouble for turning animals in to us, they get in trouble for keeping them". It is illegal to cage or confine any wild animal from an infant squirrel to deer, or owls and hawks. But keeping one overnight isn't going to result in a fine. Mrs. Salzman stresses over and over that calling Second Chance will only result in getting help and care for whatever creature needs it.

Trying to raise wild animals for pets is tricky business. They often require special diets and have special needs in captivity that cannot be provided without expert knowledge.

Out here, where many people come in frequent contact with wild animals, we may have the opportunity to rescue one.

The first step in that is to call Second Chance. Nancy Salzman can be reached at 784-1779. Two other numbers are: 785-8100 and 784-6774.

After watching the organization in action Saturday, I encourage you to do so. Help give our wildlife more of a chance at survival in a world that is increasingly difficult for them...due to our advances.

Rivercrest High School Is Burglarized

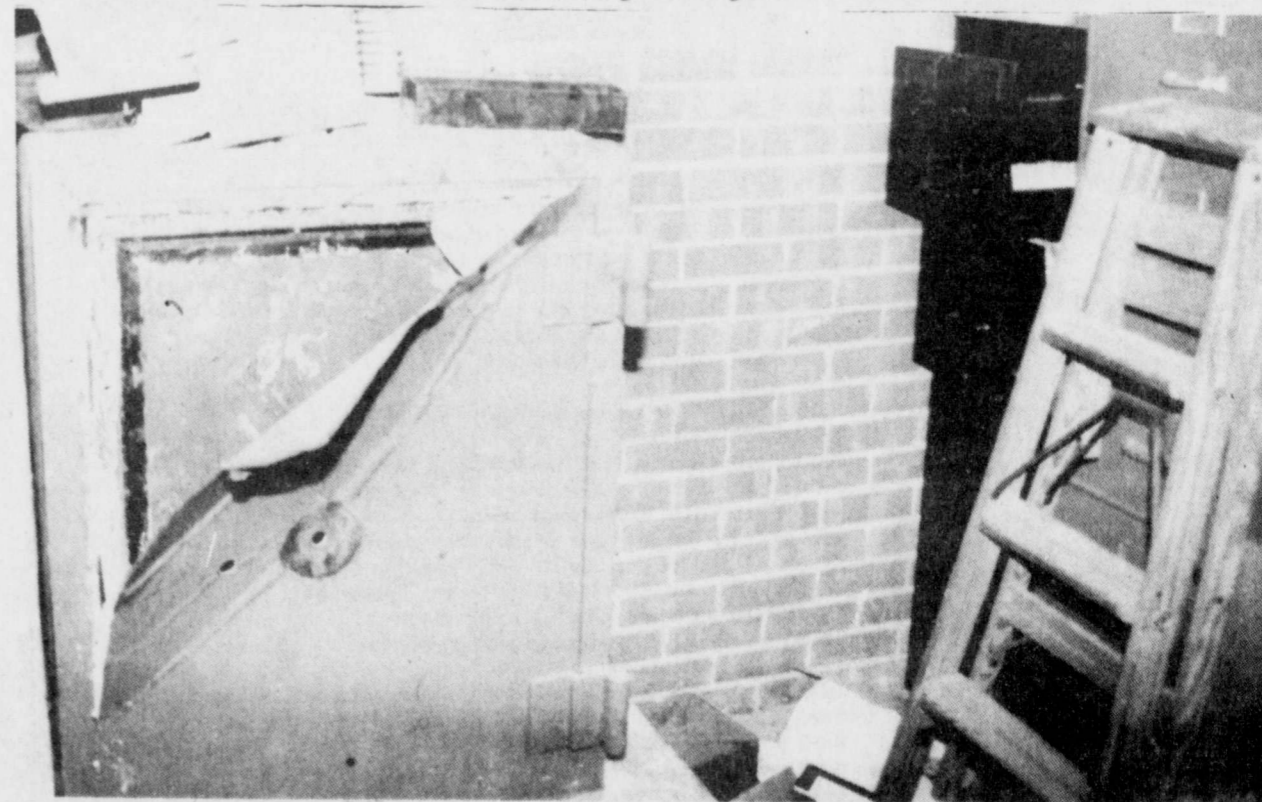
A burglary of Rivercrest High School sometime between Thursday night, October 13 and Friday morning, October 14, resulted in extreme damage and loss of an undisclosed amount of change from the safe.

A janitor arriving for work Friday morning discovered the metal gate which separates the cafeteria and auditorium from the instructional area

of the school had been cut with a cutting torch. It was later discovered the cutting torch and oxygen tanks had been taken from the Ag building. Upon further investigation by Superintendent Harold Cowley, it was discovered that the cutting torch had unsuccessfully been used on the vault door. Failing to gain entrance with the torch, the burglar or burglars then

used a sledge hammer to knock a sizeable hole in a vault room wall. Along with the stolen money, papers were dumped on the floor and ball-game tickets were destroyed.

A fingerprint expert from the Red River County Sheriff's Department lifted fingerprints and the robbery is still under investigation by the department.



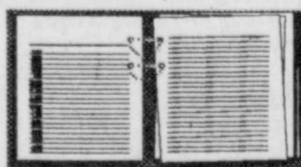

During regular session of the Talco-Bogata CISD Board of Trustees Tuesday, October 11, members approved the purchase of a new school bus.

In other business, the Board approved the audit report presented by Mr. Walker, approved minutes of the September 13 and September 20 meetings, approved payment of bills and budget changes, approved the tax reparand adjustments and adopted the 1988 Talco-Bogata CISD Tax Roll. The Board approved the certificate of Resolution concerning oil, gas and mineral lease with Mobil Producing Texas and New Mexico

Incorp., approved the 1988-89 policy committee appointments as presented, approved the administrative policy for use of State Compensatory Funds for the 1988-89 school year, and approved the Substitute Teacher's list.

Frank Martin presented references for the Drug Dog program and requested the program be approved after Supt. Cowley checks references.

The Board also heard Mary Joplin's address on the issue of K-8 school in the Bogata Community. The Board answered questions, but no action was taken. Further information is to be obtained.

Council Opposes Moving Of School Resolution

During regular session of the Bogata City Council Monday, October 10, council disapproved the making of a resolution opposing moving of the school. One member abstained from voting.

In other business, council voted for employees to pay for their own physicals, to not pay for the street light in the middle of the block on 200 Hudson Street, which is now being paid by private citizens, voted to mow Community Center alternately with Lions Club, and set pick-up day for clean-ups on November 18 with dumpsters to be available on November 19. The River Communications,

Inc. Cable Franchise was discussed, but no action taken.

City Judge Mildred Eudy reported one destruction of property and one prorated exhibition of acceleration.

Dianne Williams, Juvenile Probation Officer for Red River County, requested the use of the council room one day a month. Council is to act on the request next month.

City Mayor W.T. Harbison reported he had talked to KSA Engineering Firm and a member of that firm is to be at the next council meeting to discuss the possibility of the City getting a grant for sewer lift station on Highway 37 South.

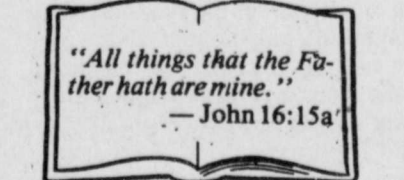
Agnes I. Bettis Dies October 17

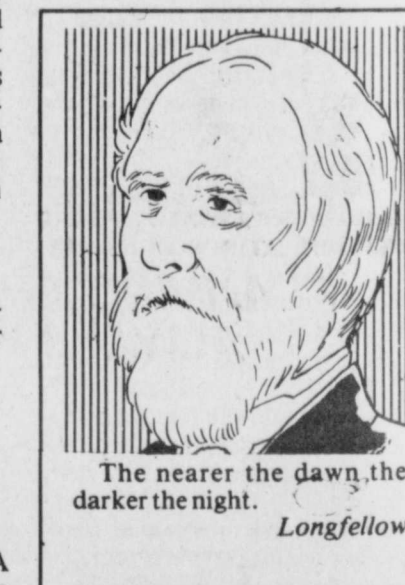
Ford Baughn Dies October 12

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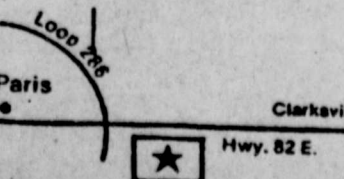

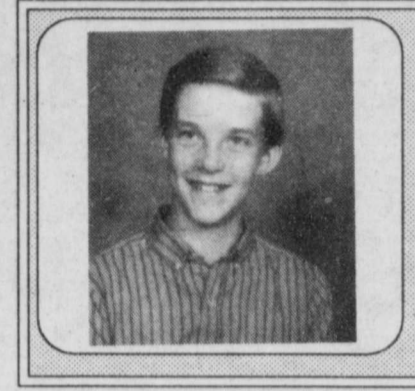

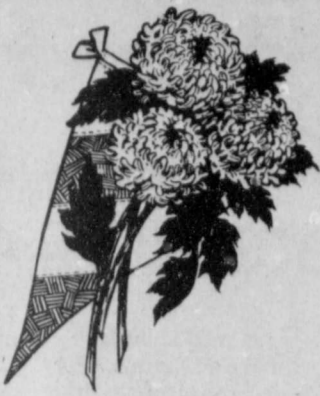

Rebels Win Over Warriors 20-14

A determined team effort by the Rivercrest Rebels, particularly in the final drive, provided an exciting and entertaining football game for spectators and participants alike last week, and resulted in a hard-earned 20-14 Rebel victory over the larger and favored Honey Grove Warriors.

The sweet win means that the resurgent Rebels sit atop the District 17AA rankings with Cooper as they prepare to go against cellar dweller Como-Pickton at Rebel Stadium on Friday night. Game time will be at 7:30 p.m.

The game showcased the qualities of total team play. The offense built an early 14-0 lead, then saw the defense valiantly fight to keep the Warriors from forging ahead. On the final drive, the offensive line provided the necessary protection for the completion of passes. It was indeed a total team victory. Even those players who saw little or no action during the game made an important contribution through their presence, their hard practice during the week, and their readiness to participate if called upon.

Thus it should be remembered that although individual players made outstanding plays, the entire Rebel team must be commended for their hard earned victory. The Rebels built a 14-0 advantage over the much larger Warrior unit in the first half. The Rebel defenders halted the initial Warrior drive on the Rebel 27-yard line. Unable to attain a first down, the Rebel's Bradley Woods punted a towering 57-yard punt which rolled dead on the Warrior eight. On the ensuing exchange of punts, the Warriors coaxed only a 26-yard boot, giving the Rebels field position at the Tribe 36-yard line. On fourth down and less than one, Woods, on a busted play, scampered for 26 yards and the

touchdown.

David Stansell then added his first of two extra points on the night to give the elated Rebs a 7-0 lead with 4:35 left in quarter one. The Rebels secondally occurred near the seven minute point of the second stanza, and capped a nine play, 40-yard drive. Faking his fullback into the teeth of defensive line, Woods deceptively handed off to wingback Jimmy Lewis who sauntered around left end for five years for the touchdown.

The Warriors quickly drove 80 yards, behind the passing of Homer Garner and the running of Bradley Brigham and Darren Patt, to score less than two minutes later, to make the halftime score 14-7. Had it not been for the exceptional defensive play of the rugged Rebels, the Warriors might well have put the game out of reach in the third quarter. Twice in the period, the Honey Grove squad drove to the Rebel 10-yard line, only to lose the ball on fumbles, due to the hard hitting of the Rebel tacklers. The first was recovered by the Rebel secondary, while Chad Parish recovered the second. The contest saw two other turnovers, by the Warriors, pass interceptions by Kevin Beene in the first quarter and Woods on the final play of the game for the Warrior offense.

Honey Grove knotted the contest with 7:54 left to play; neither team was able to seize the opportunity to take control, until with one tick less than four and one-half minutes to play, the Rebels were moved backwards by a sack and a procedure penalty to their own 25-yard line. The situation: fourth down, 18-yards to go, 2:03 left to play. Coach Terry Giddens called time out, and asked his charges, "Do we go for the win or settle for the tie? The choice is yours."

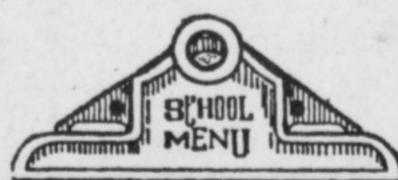
Since a tie means little in district play, with the advantage being given to the team with the most first downs, Honey Grove had fifteen at the juncture to the Rebels five. The decision of the fired up Rebel squad was unanimous.

the snap, Woods dropped back to pass, and spotted a fleet-footed Scooter Brown out of the backfield and ten yards into the Warrior secondary; the spiral hit Brown in the chest, and he further moved the ball for a 37-yard gain to the Warrior 38. Buoyed by his successful effort, Woods then called another aerial this one a 27-yard strike to Clint Tidwell. From the Honey Grove 11, Jeremy Abshier carried out his makeshift fullback assignment with a four yard gain to the seven. After using their final time out with 49 seconds left to play, the quarterback option pass was called from the Rebel bench. With the offensive line affording the needed cover, Woods took several steps to his right, then spotted an open Lewis in the right flank of the end zone. The ball was perfectly thrown, perfectly caught and capped a perfect night of enjoyable school-boy football.

Offensively, the Rebels presented their most balanced attack of the season. The ground game accounted for 129 yards, while 71 yards, all in the game winning thrust, came via the airways (three of six for 71 yards). The punting game also was effective, as Woods maintained his almost 42-yard per punt season average with six for 239 yards. The Rebels continue to reduce significantly their early season mistake committing no turnovers. On the positive side, the defense caused four Warrior muscues-two fumbles and two pass interceptions. The Rebs were flagged four times for 30 penalty yards.

For 1988-89, ACT has established this test date schedule: December 10, registration date is November 11, late registration November 29; test date February 11, registration date January 13, late registration January 31; test date April 15, 1989, registration March 17, late registration April 4; test date June 10, 1989, registration May 12, late registration May 30.

The assessment also includes a two-part questionnaire that students complete at home when they register. It focuses on interests, academic and nonacademic accomplishments, and vocational and educational plans and needs.
