Local Sales Tax Reports Show Ups, Downs

State Comptroller Bob Bullock on Monday sent a late Christmas present to Texas cities, counties and MTA's by way of checks totaling nearly \$225 million in local sales tax allocations.

"The cities alone got a 12% increase over last year's checks, and 8%, more than half, is due to higher sales during the holidays," Bullock said.

Bullock added that about \$670 million was deposited in the state's coffers because of the strong returns, and state lawmakers could put the unexpected extra \$150 million towards planning the 1990-91 budget.

"The growth in collections from the broadened tax base has evened out now. That means these increases are a direct result of a stronger economy and greater consumer confidence," Bullock said.

Checks totaling \$145.1 million were sent Monday to 1048 cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one-half percent.

The state's six metropolitan transit authorities and one city transit department also received \$66.9 million in rebates, a 12.3 percent increase over last year's payments.

According to Bullock, a total of \$12.7 million was allocated to 81 counties that collect the one-half percent county sales tax.

Blossom reported a 31.41% increase with a check for \$3,739.59, compared to \$3,978.21 for the same period, with a total to date of \$5,227.70.

Deport received \$2,873.25, compared to \$2,672.45 over last year for an 8.64% increase.

Paris received \$317,455.85 showing a 6% increase over the payment in 1988.

Bogata received \$4,080.67, for an 8.16% decrease over a \$4,644.86 payment in 1988.

Clarksville received \$33,811.37 for a 13.42% increase while Detroit received \$1,559.14 for an 11.33% increase over 1988 payments.

Talco received \$2,648.37, marking a 29.33% decrease over last year's payment of \$3,312.17 with a 1989 payment to date total of \$3,734.93, compared to \$5,285.31 for last year.

Mt. Pleasant received \$143,892.17 for a 5.44% increase over 1988.

Comptroller Bullock said Friday that March's city sales tax rebates, which reflect sales made in January, were up by an average of 27% statewide.

"Although consumers usually slow down their spending in January, this is a good sign that the state's economic engine is running strong and

steady," Bullock said.

Checks totaling \$61.7 million were sent Friday to 888 cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one-half percent. Bullock said that's an impressive gain over last year's March payments to cities, which was just \$48.6 million statewide.

Bullock added that 26 cities that began collecting an optional half-percent local sales tax in January received their first payments with this month's allocation.

Bogata received \$1,611.49 for a 20.37% increase, compared to no payment for the same period last year. Clarksville received \$12,979.88 for a 10.77% increase. Detroit received no payment for this period, and no payment for the period in 1988.

Blossom received \$983.23 for a 37.54% increase over last year's payment of \$537.48.

Deport received \$771.67 for a 32.58% increase over no payment last year while Paris received \$134,404.37 for a 10.28% increase. Mt. Pleasant received \$64,802.88 for a 5.26% increase.

Talco received \$763.59 for this period, for a 29.61% decrease over last year's payment of \$1,105.91.

Textbook Committee report and adopted selective titles as recommended.

The Board approved the cost of \$115 for Drivers Education.

It was decided by the Board to leave the decision of the boys baseball team participating as a varsity or junior varsity team up to the coaches.

City Council Approves Gas Hike

The Bogata City Council approved the request of Roy Sparks, Manager for Lone Star Gas, Paris District, of an annual revenue increase of 3.14%. Four council members voted for the increase, and one member voted against. The increase will go into effect with bills rendered 30 days from April 3.

In other business, Council approved the minutes, set March 22 as the date for the budget meeting, voted to re-engage McClanahan and Holmes to audit the books this year, and heard the City Secretary read the Water

Ordinance. The ordinance will be read again at the April meeting before it will be adopted.

Council voted to check with Layne-Texas about the cost of drilling a new water well.

Under new business, Council discussed Constable equipment and decided to contact county concerning the equipment.

Council also approved paying \$500 toward repairing the fire truck.

Clean-up day was set for April 14 and 15 and council voted to change the fiscal year to begin October 1.

Frances Rozell was approved to serve as election judge.

Council voted to decline in taking part in the 911 emergency phone number system.

The City Judge reported taking depositions from juvenile offenders.

The Water Superintendent reported the need of a sewer line replacement between Hudson and North Main.

The City Mayor reported that the City had received notice from Bob Bullock requiring the City to pay back the bank franchise.

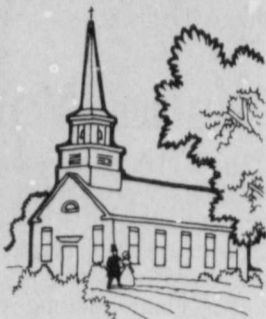

The Chuck Wagon Gang's close knit harmony and blending of melodies have become a part of Americana as apple pie. Current members are Roy Carter, his sister, Ruth Ellen Carter Yates, cousin Pat McKeenan, Harold Timmons and Debbie Trusty.

The original Chuck Wagon Gang was formed in the early 1930's by D.P. "Dad" Carter and consisted of himself, his son, Jim, and daughters Anna and Rose. For over 40 years,

the famous Chuck Wagon Gang recorded for Columbia Records, an unparalleled accomplishment in the gospel music industry, and at one time, they earned the distinction of being the second highest best selling American artist on the label. The group has sold over 30 million records.

They have appeared in Carnegie Hall, the Hollywood Bowl, the Grand Ole Opry and on thousands of concert stages across America. They have been included in the Smithsonian Institute's Classic America recordings. They were the first gospel group to record on a major label the now standard gospel song, "I'll Fly Away" and have made other gospel songs into standards through the years.

The group now records for Associated Artists, with Jack Eubanks producing their records.

Bill White Attends Marine Memorial Ceremony

Bill White, Marine Corps veteran of World War II, attended a memorial ceremony at the Marine Corps Memorial at Marine Military Academy on Thursday, March 16.

The World War II Marine Corps veterans solemnly dedicated a time capsule containing the names of 7,600 Marines who died on Iwo Jima from February 19 to March 16, 1945.

The ceremony marked the 44th anniversary of the capture of Iwo Jima by U.S. Forces.

Cemetery records prepared by the 3rd, 4th and 5th Marine Divisions, as well as by the U.S. Air Force, were used to make up what is believed to be a complete list of Marines who died on Iwo Jima.

The 4th Division Association organized and sponsored the program. A service with prayers for those who died on Iwo Jima was held in the MMA Chapel before a ceremony to place a special 4th Division wreath by the plaque that covers the capsule containing the list of names.

Members of the Inspector/Instructor staff of the Marine Corps Reserve Center in Harlingen provided a firing squad in conjunction with an echo bugle ceremony provided by MMA.

Mrs. Dewey Norman, whose husband had spearheaded the 4th Division Association effort to place the time capsule with the names of the Iwo Jima dead, placed the wreath.

A proclamation honoring the 44th anniversary of the capture of Iwo

Jima issued by Harlingen Mayor Bill Card, who had been a member of the 4th Division, was read.

Three World War II trainer aircraft from the Rio Grande Valley wing of the Confederate Air Force provided a flyover during the wreath-laying ceremony.

The MMA Corps of Cadets marched in a parade afterwards. The MMA band, color guard and drill team also performed.

The 4th Division was in combat only 63 days, but during that time it suffered 17,722 casualties, some wounded more than once. Of those, 3,298 were killed or died from wounds.

The 4th Division participated in four major battles: Roi-Namur, Kwajalein Atoll, Marshall Islands, February 1, 1944. The battle lasted 24 hours, 15 minutes with 190 killed and 547 wounded; Saipan, Marianos Islands, June 15 to July 9, 1944, 25 days, 1,076 killed, 4,905 wounded; Tinian, Marianos Islands, July 24 to August 1, 1944, nine days, 290 killed, 1,515 wounded; Iwo Jima, Volcano Islands, February 19 to March 16, 1945, 26 days, nine hours, 1,809 killed, 7,292 wounded.

The Marine Corps War Memorial at MMA is the original fiberglass mold of the Iwo Jima Monument, the statue at Arlington National Cemetery in Washington. The statue was donated in October, 1981, by Felix de Weldon, the sculptor.

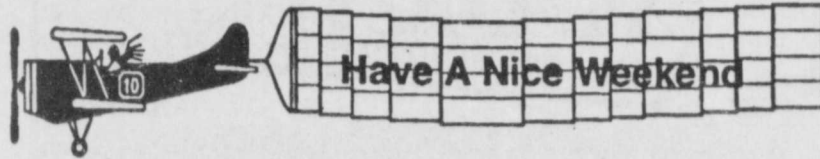
Guest speakers will provide a variety of information regarding families



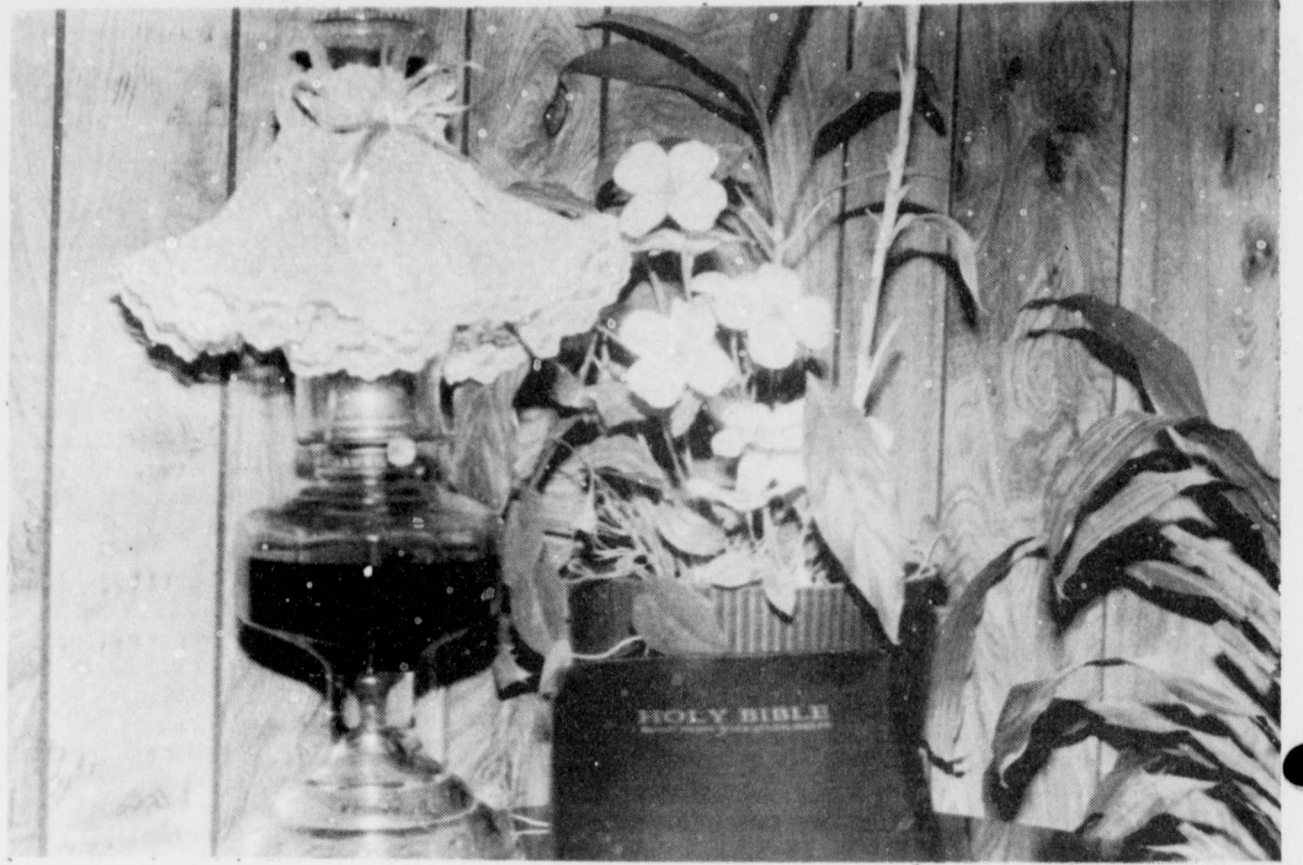
choosing to participate attended, but Rivercrest was well represented, taking second over-all in the meet.

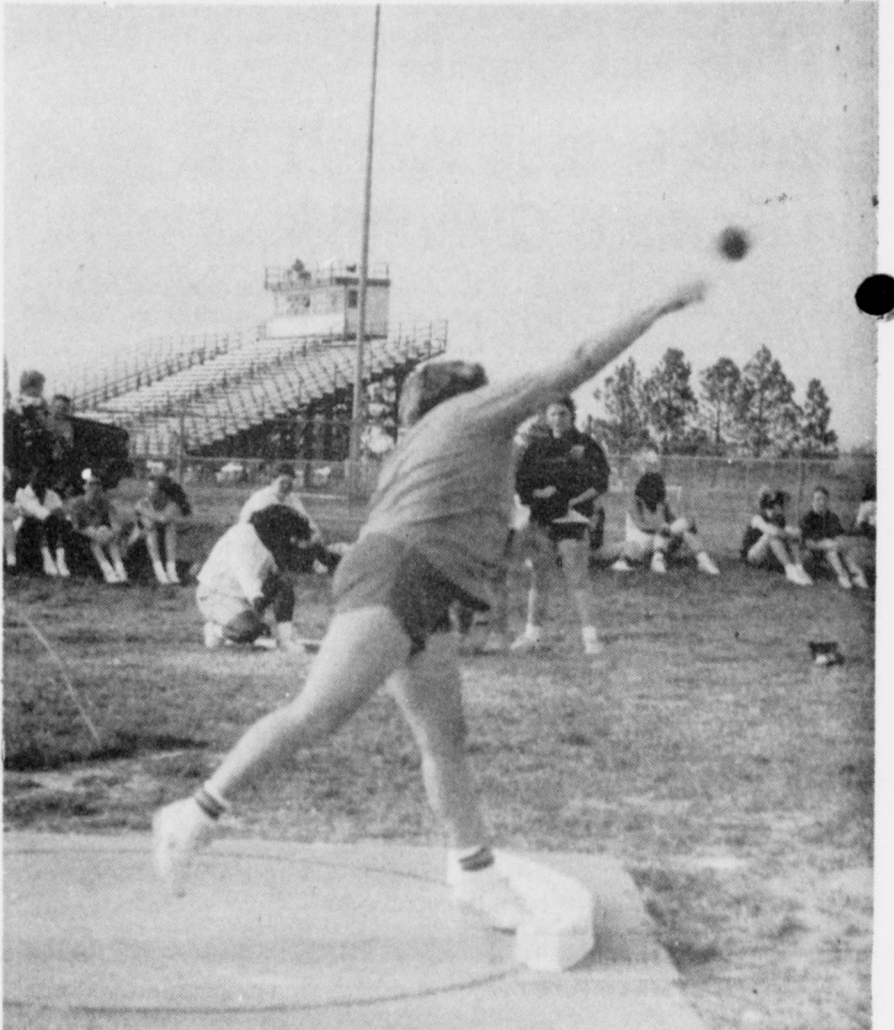

Red River County Junior Livestock Show Is Saturday

The annual Red River County Junior Livestock Show will be held Saturday, March 25 at the Legion Park Fairgrounds in Clarksville. 4-H and FFA members from Northeast Texas and surrounding areas will be exhibiting livestock and competing for awards.

Breeding beef, market steers, breeding sheep, market lambs and dairy animals will be checked in and begin showing at 10 a.m. The Red River County Market Lamb Show, which is restricted to Red River County 4-H and FFA members, will begin at 9 a.m. with a check-in time of 8 a.m. The top market lambs will

be sold by auction at 12 noon. Anyone desiring a top quality lamb for their freezer should be present at the auction.

Rabbit and poultry divisions will also be judged. Rabbit entries will be checked in at 10:30 a.m. and be judged at 12 noon. Poultry entries will be checked in at 9:30 a.m. and be judged at 10 a.m.

Entry numbers are expected to be up from last year and visitors should expect to see some of the best animals in the area exhibited. A concession stand will be on hand to provide drinks and food for everyone attending.

April Is Child Abuse Prevention Month

"It should not hurt to be a child," yet the Texas Department of Human Services annually confirms more than 50,000 cases of child abuse and ne-

glect. While families most at risk are those where parents are troubled by alcoholism, drug abuse, marital strife, low self-esteem and joblessness, child abuse crosses all socio-economic lines and ethnic groupings, according to Virginia Brock, County Extension agent in Red River County.

She said that skills for parenting are not inborn but require constant development by the parent during the childhood-adolescent period. Most parents genuinely love their children, but find themselves caught in situations beyond their control and do not know how to cope.

Because many Texas families tend to be mobile, they may not have family resources or stable friendships to provide external support. They also may lack basic child development information which helps them develop reasonable expectations of children's behavior at different ages and stages.

There are a growing number of community resources available to parents. Groups such as the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, local churches, school and medical centers offer parenting education classes and special programs.

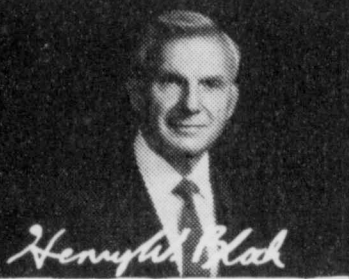
