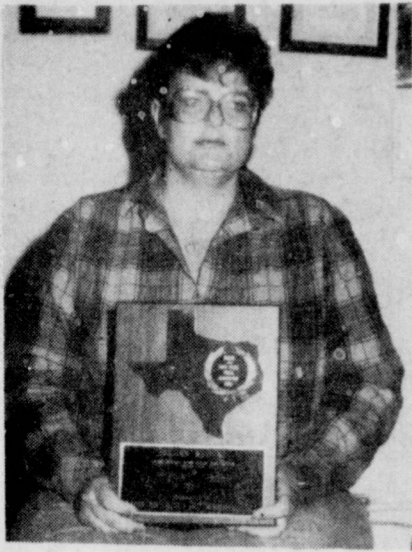

## Bogata Schools Win First Place In U.I.L. Meet

Bogata Elementary and Junior High school students won first place in the District 17AA University Interscholastic League Literary meet held Saturday, April 8 at Rivercrest High School.

Bogata received 10 points in Oral Reading, grades 4-5-6; 10 points in Oral Reading, grades 7-8; 26 points in Impromptu Speaking, grades 7-8; 35 points in Modern Oratory, grades 7-8; 20 points in Story Telling, grades 2-3; 30 points in Ready Writing, grades 3-4; 18 points in Ready Writing, grades 5-6; 26 points in Spelling, grades 3-4; 33 points in Spelling, grades 5-6; 37 points in Spelling, grades 7-8; 13 points in Picture Memory, grades 4-5; 22 points in Dictionary Skills, grades 5-6; 14 points in Dictionary Skills, grades 7-8; 8 points in Listening, grades 5-6; 17 points in Music Memory, grades 5-6; 22 points in Science, grade 7; 23 points in Science, grade 8; 8 points in Number Sense, grades 4-5-6; 21 points in Number Sense, grades 7-8; and four points in Calculator Applications, grades 6-7-8, for a total of 397 points for Bogata. James Wood was superb again this year in his role as Master of Ceremonies, keeping the crowd laughing with his puns and jokes.

"Music to Remember", was presented by Mr. and Mrs. Mark Welch of Paris, receiving a standing ovation for their presentation.

Those receiving special recognition were Mrs. Margaret Kidd of Bogata as the oldest woman attending, John Lee Bell of Bogata as the oldest man attending, Bobby Thornton of Artesia, CA and Wade Garrett of New York City for traveling the farthest distance to attend the homecoming, and Betty King and Mrs. Proctor for having the most living children.

The classes of 1939, 1954 and 1959

had reunions during the day and received special recognition during the ceremony.

A highlight of the program was the recognition of the 1947-48 football team and coach. The MC introduced each player and the coach in typical James Wood style, who consented to share his comments in making their introductions with our readers. They are:

"Ladies and gentlemen, tonight we honor the 1947 and 1948 Fighting Bulldog football team...a team that will live in infamy. This team was the epitome of what sheer character and mental and physical discipline mean. The University of Georgia Tech adopted their motto of "Let The Big Dog Eat" from films and press releases relating to this group.

First, let me give you a little history. In 1946, some of these Bulldogs received their football knowledge and intestinal fortitude from their then coach, T.M. (Tough Man) Dunn. Coach Dunn taught these fearless grid iron giants their basics. There were two games in the 1946 season that turned the entire football program

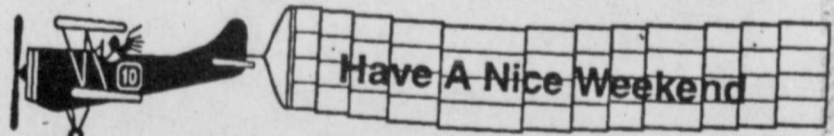

## NTCC Bond Issue Fails

Voters in the tri-county district that make up the Northeast Texas Community College district voted down the tax bonds for the construction of new classrooms.

Proposition 1, that would have changed the tax cap from the original 10¢ per \$100 valuation to an eight cent ad valorem cap, was soundly defeated by a two-to-one margin, 2,004 in favor to 4,232 against.

Proposition 2, \$3.5 million in classroom construction bonds failed 2,084 for and 4,320 against. Proposition 3 followed suit, as the \$1.25 million plan for specialized classroom construction fell 1,956 to 4,314 against.

Proposition 4, the most controversial of the four, the gymnasium and child care facility went down by an overwhelming 1,606 for and 4,647 against.

In Titus County, Precincts 3 & 9, voters at Talco City Hall, voted as follows:

Proposition 1, 24 for, 135 against; Proposition 2, 25 for, 132 against; Proposition 3, 31 for, 126 against; Proposition 4, 16 for, 140 against for a total vote of 629. A total of 25,154 votes were cast in the three counties in the bond election proceedings.

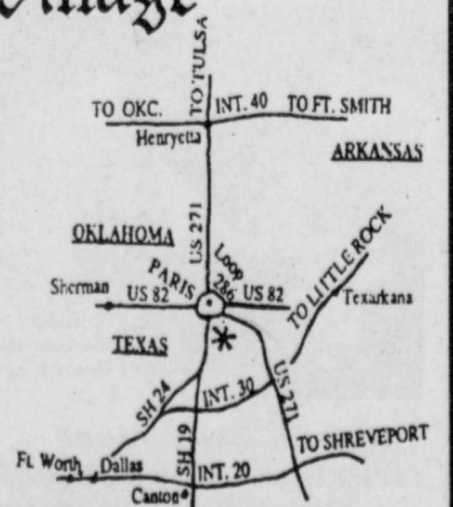

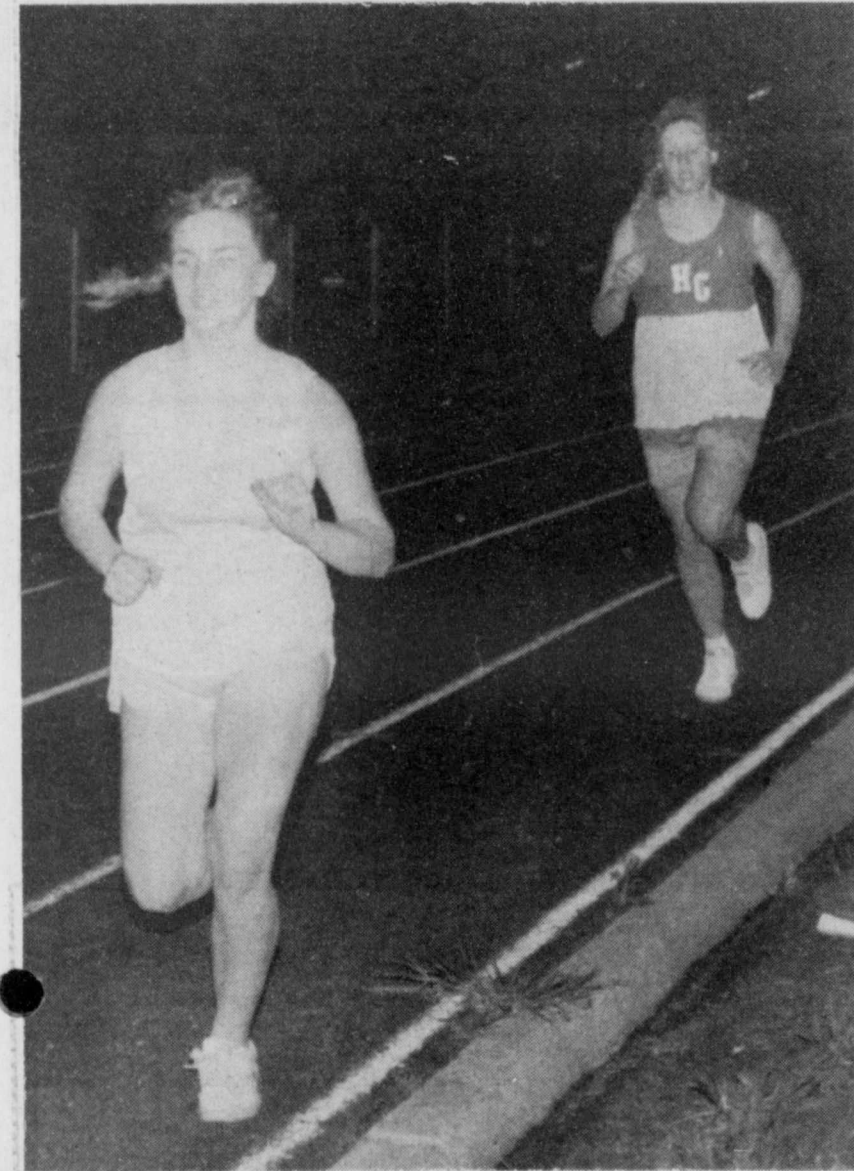

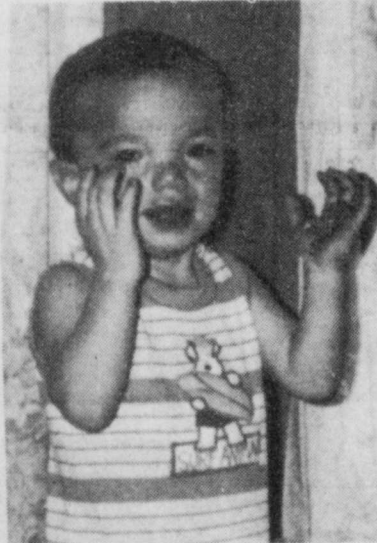

What kind of fair treatment has my son to take compared to the rest of them? I can't buy my son out of it. COULD YOU? Think about what you would have to face if you were in my place. The names of the offenders she refers to were not released with her son's name because the indictments were sealed. A sealed indictment is handed down when arrests are pending, and the courts do not wish a public announcement to be made which would alert an offender to impending arrest.

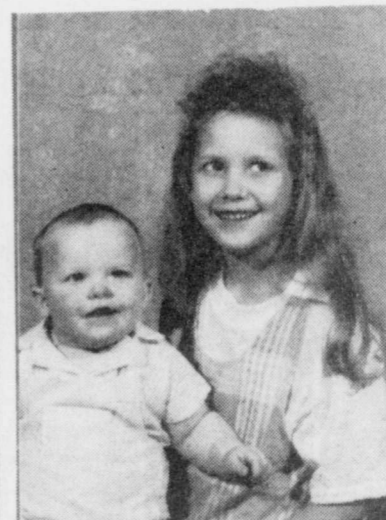

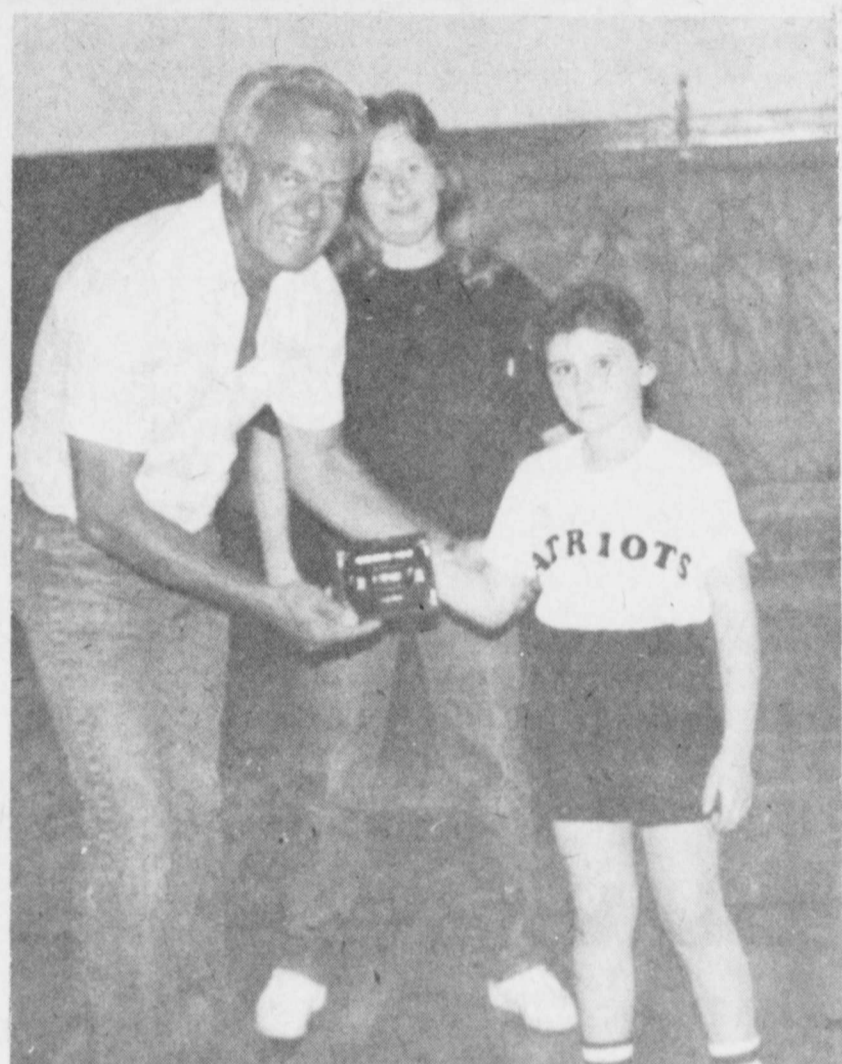

ground at Bogata as the Bulldogs, using the basic principals taught them by Coach Dunn, took on a scrappy bunch of Tigers at Mt. Vernon in 1946. Unknowledgeable of some of the new rules of high school football, our Bulldogs took it right to them down to the wire in a 56-0 Mt. Vernon win. It was in this game that Billy Joe Vickers and Tommie Corbell stood with their fingers up their noses and watched, not one, but two, live kickoff balls he received in their own endzone by Mt. Vernon. (That has been held against you men for 42 years, but tonight, Bogata folks are going to forgive you.) Now, undaunted by this and many, many more screw ups, the men under Coach Dunn's leadership, shook off that 56-0 humiliation and stormed into Mt. Pleasant where with the home field advantage and a set of biased officials, Mt. Pleasant ciched out a 107-0 upset win. I am told that the game was not as close as the score indicated, as midway through the fourth quarter, the Bulldogs just gave up. Apparently, they gave Mt. Pleasant all they wanted because that was the last time Mt. Pleasant ever matched a game with Bogata.

The 1946 season was history and so was Coach Dunn. The school board felt maybe some new blood was needed in the coaching ranks. There was a need for just any kind of blood

for the players as most of theirs had been left in Franklin and Titus Counties. On the scene came Coach Bob Mistele. Immediately upon arriving on campus, Bob met the team and reviewed the 1946 game films. Even though he tried his best to leave at that time, he found himself locked in a contract that was binding and he'd have to coach for at least one year. Through diligent prayer and sheer coaching genius, Bob helped this pitiful bunch of misfits compose a 5-4-1 season, one of the best ever at Bogata High. In defeating teams like Avinger, Simms and, yes, even Sulphur Springs, the Bulldogs had started a brief dynasty. The memorable game of 1948 was a non-nationally televised rival meeting on Turkey Day with the ever dangerous Deport team. Weldon (Turncoat) Slaton, who had played on the 1946 powerhouse at Bogata was traded to Deport for two extra jerseys and a pair of cleats. Weldon's leaving Bogata and joining Deport increased the playing capabilities of both team sat least 50%. Bogata defeated Deport 14-0 that day, and Deport, who

had held a dynasty of defeats over Bogata for years, never beat Bogata again.

Whatever happend to these semi-professional football players...the green and white with all the might? Well, some had dreams of professional football careers, some had dreams of wealth and fame, but most hoped they'd never see another foot-

ball in their life. We are indeed honored to have most of the 1947-48 Bulldogs in our very own midst tonight and we'd like to introduce them to you using their position and weights a slisted in the 1948 football program. Many of these men are used as stirring examples to high school coaches across the land as they have pictures of these men today to show their kids what can happen to the human body if it isn't taken care of.

First, the All Americans of the backfield: a 165 pound block of power and poke, Frank (Whiteshoes) Stubblefield, a 159 pound stack of slack, Bobby (Boo-Boo) Hinson, 135 pounds of grit and stomach of rock (a very large rock) Avret (Voo Doo) Vaughan, and a 125 pound gush of wind, Kenneth (Mighty Mite) Thornton. The two fullbacks, and we're talking full...backs...balanced the backfield, both on offense and defense. They were the ones, sometimes the only ones, who took that ball down the gut...and these two may have left it there...153 pounds, Wild Wayne Williams and 165 pounds, Johnny (Mr. T) Benham. Pulling the trigger, running the engine, heating the boiler, the quarterback had the controls. He is #44, weighs 131 pounds, Jerry (Da King) Devlin. The backfield is only as good as the lineman and believe me these linemen weren't better than their backfield. They were equal. The ones out on the end, closest to the water bottles and band aids, 135 pound

Morris (The Cat) Marcum and 130 pound David (Hit Man) Hudson. In the defensive secondary was a legend of linebackers, big 135 pound Bobby (Mr. Equalizer) Setzer. Getting into the real action, those wart hogs in the siew, those men on the line...where no pain, no gain got its name, 155 pound Billy (Mean Joe) Vickers, 163 pound Wendell (The Iron Claw) Hervey, 135 pounds of spit and grit, Dalton (Satchmo) McCruy and 141 1/2 pound Randall (Tooty) Eudy. The guards did just that; they guarded the water bucket, the fruit jar of gaterade and the lunch room. They opened more holes than Exxon and closed more gaps than Bunky Smith. They were totally awesome, both in sight and play. At 150 pounds, uniform and all, Tommie (Tommie Gun) Corbell, 145 pound Paul (Bunyan) Thornton, 115 pound Danny (The Spurt) Burt, 145 pound Gorgeous George Hobbs and 140 pound Dirty Doyle Solomon. The center was the nucleus of the offensive attack. He headed the cattle, maneuvered the mules. The 47-48 team had two great ones, 145 pound Oscar (Bib Bo) Bolen and Don (Juan) Isenburg, all 135 pounds of hunk. Probably the most overworked, underpaid and underfed crew in 47-48 were the team managers. It's ironic that one of them, through experiences with his team, saw a need for more people in the medical field. The sword and the switchblade, Cheech and Chong, if you will, Claude Earl Reynolds and Buford Hervey. Only a mother could

love a group like this and only a real gentleman filled to the brim with patience and understanding could attempt to coach a group like this. I present to you, Coach Bob Mistele.

The only trophy this group ever earned or received or got close to receiving legally was not in football. No, it seems Coach Bob, apparently in order to return frustration back to them entered several in the Paris Regional Golden Gloves Boxing Matches. Some of the winners were Whiteshoes Stubblefield as middleweight, Gorgeous George Hobbs as lightweight, and Tommie Gun Corbell as good sportsmanship. Probably all of this could be summed up when Corbell was walking down the street in front of Britt Lassiter's store showing off his boxing trophy that was inscribed with Good Sportsmanship when he came upon his dad, Chester Corbell. Mr. Corbell, Sr. looked at the trophy and said, "Evidently you guys went up there and let them whip your tails and make you like it."

Following recognition of the foot-

ball team, Tommie Corbell presented Coach Mistele with a football autographed by the team members.

Activities then became more serious as Talmadge Morgan presented a "Tribute to Teachers" and a special tribute to the memory of May Dan Bell. Several former students and co-workers of Mrs. Bell gave brief statements of appreciation for her work, loyalty and love in the teaching profession. Those speakers included Mrs. Eldon Chaloner, Tommie Corbell, Bobbie Cawley, Billie Lindsey, Joe Vickers and Neil Rozell. A letter from Lady Bird Johnson was read to the family of Mrs. Bell expressing her appreciation of Mrs. Bell and her regrets of being unable to attend the dedication ceremony in her honor. Joe Vickers presented a plaque to the Bell family, John Bell, Sonya Bell Barlow and husband, Richard Barlow and Kevin and Karen Bell.

New officers were elected for the 1990 homecoming. They are: president, Johnny Ragsdill; vice-president, Wanda Ragsdill; secretary-treasurer, Cornelia Stewart.
