beds. There were instructions about taking care of the puppy.

There had to be instructions about the wall plugs on the east side of the kitchen, and a half page of notes about keeping the chlorine level correct in the above-ground swimming pool we picked up at a garage sale last

In other words, there is absolutely nothing simple about our life. The possibility of simply locking up a door and going doesn't exist.

By the time we were through with giving all the notes and instructions we were exhausted, tense and more than a little startled to realised just how complicated things really are!

At intervals throughout my life I've had the desire to simplify things....and this is definitely one of those times.

I dream of having one dog, one at, nothing else to tie me down. dream of an easy maintenance yard and house, a 9 to 5 put your time in job.

I also know, deep, deep down in the bottom of my soul, that it won't ever be that way.

There won't come a time when strays aren't welcome, when pets aren't a part of our lives, when work doesn't require lots of extra

And basically, that is the way we both like it....but every now and then, when the zoo keeping, gardening and picture taking stack sup it's hard not to ponder lingeringly on the idea of a simple household...even if pondering is he only thing we'll ever do about

Question About 911 Posed

"How many people know right now exactly what number to dial for an ambulance, doctor, fire department or law enforcement official" that is one of the questions proponents of the 911 emergency number ask. They feel strongly that the one simple, easy number can save lives and make emergencies simpler to deal with. That, they believe, makes the fifty cent per month cost on phone bills money well spent.

Those against the number object to the cost, which would begin immediately, and it might take some time for the service to be initiated.

To address this question a form has been prepared asking if RedRiver County residents would be for or against the service, and it should be mailed back to Judge L.D. Williamson at the Red River County Court-

The technology that is being offered to county residents, whether urban or rural, would have a 50 cent monthly charge on telephone bills plus a minute (2/10 of one percent) state-required surcharge on intrastate long distance calls (approximatley 2 cents for each \$10 in long distance

For this amount residents could be secure in the knowledge that in case of emergency help could be dispatched accurately within second of the call due to the state of the art computerized equipment which would display not on ly the telephone number from which the call was being made, but also a location that emergency personnel could be directed to

in the vent that the caller could not the emergency personnel. speak or knows no directions, or as frequently happens, hangs up before a location can be obtained.

This service would help ambulances, fire fighters, police, or any combination of emergency services to be dispatched quickly.

According to Ms. Janell Browning, Manager of Special Programs for the Ark-Tex Council of Governments, almost the entire state has implemented this program. Only 12 counties have declined participation and locally all cities with the exception of Bogata have agreed to partiicpate. However, Bogata has agreed to review the question once more.


The system works by a telephone being answered in a central location and the correct emergency assistance

In a situation where seconds count the 911 program could very well save lives and property, and in places where it is in effect is working very well.

Ms. Browning explained that the system would be fully implemented by 1994, and the 50 cent charge would begin in January of 1990.

We must have the funds available to pay for the system when the telephone companies are ready to switch over" she said. "So we must begin to collect now. However, we feel that in about 2 years we will have the equiment and necessary items paid

The number, proponents say, is especially beneficial to households with young children, enabling them to have one number to easily rememis dispatched to the caller.
This saves time for both the caller and emergency situation.







Getting A New Perspective On Old Places..Or "How I Spent My Summer Vacation"

Our vacation acounts have become an annual thing in the papers, although I still haven't figured out why. Some people aren't interested, I'm sure, but a lot of people have asked for it, so here

The state of our pocketbook decreed that no exotic places would be on the agenda this year for our yearly,10 day holiday. What to do when Iceland is out, when New Zealand is zapped? Well, we decided to revisit an old favorite place, but take a look at it from a different perspec-

We headed out for Colorado, a state we have paid visits to six or seven times previously, but this time, instead of merely taking a few hiking trails, driving around through the roads and staying in motels we decided to start at the bottom (literally) and work upward (literally)

During the course of our visit we went whitewater rafting, ascended in a hot air balloon, and took one of the most harrowing full-day jeep trips imaginable. We also met a number of interesting people and one very nice

With the car packed (what a luxury, no flight schedules to meet and anything we could cram in the trunk we could take) we headed out through the west Texas countryside. I confess, I don't care for that portion of our state, no trees, no rivers. We spent the night with relatives in Amarillo and headed out for worse country...the barren desert-like area of New Mexico. Finally though we made it into the pleasant mountains around Taos.

At Taos we wandered around the historic old plaza, looing at some really lovely art work, but not even considering buying... Taos prices are just too high.

We explored the ancient Taos Pueblo, the oldest continutally inhabitated dwellings in the Northern Americas. About two hundred Tiwa Indians live within the adobe structures, which are four to five stories

They have no running water, although there is a lovely, clear stream chuckling through the center of the village. They have no electricity, although it is available, they just don't want it. The pueblos are virtually unchanged from 900 years ago when they were built. They do, however, have doors now. In the old days, they had holes in the roof. That way, when enemies approached, they just climbed up their ladders, skinnied down into the homes, and pulled the ladders in after them! A beautiful Indian girl took us around, telling us the history of the structures, pointing out the curious mixture of Catholic religion (brought by the Spanish) and traditional Indian beliefs that they

We admired the beautiful beadwork, stone carving, wood carving and pottery the people had for sale, and enjoyed the scent of hot fry bread cooking in oil. The cultural achievements and skills of these so-called 'primitive" people were impressive.

Then we proceeded to load up and head on towards the tiny town of Natrop, Colorado.

At Natrop that evening we were intrigued with the Mt. Princeton Hot Springs. Two huge pools contain the hot mineral waters, which don't even smell bad the way most mineral waters

If man made pools weren't appealing, there was always the river itself. There folks would build little rock ponds channelling icy cold water into the hot spring water until they managed to regulate the temperature to suit their personal taste. Then they would stretch out, relaxing under the influence to warm water and muscle soothing minerals.

We stashed our bags with a Texasborn hotel managerat the hotel, then went to check in for our raft trip at Four Comer's Expeditions, just down the road. That was where the real fun

We had scheduled a two day trip down the Arkansas River right through the Royal Gorge.

The first hint that everything was really going to be a blast was when this 5 foot high bright red headed little gal came bouncing up, hair escaping from a baseball cap and in one long breath exclaimed "Hi, I'm Esther..we're going on the raft trip with you, I know I look about 14, but I'm a senior in high school and we're going to have fun!" She was right, we

Our guide, Mike Brady, turned out to be a personable young man attending Colorado State and working his third summer on the river. His contributions to the fun proved consider-

Esther's parents, Dr. and Mrs. John Wright (John and Gynell) proved to be assets also. John teaches English at a Christian College in Illinois. After raising four daughters, Gynell has recently gone back to college and is going to teach high school Spanish

Never having rafted before, they were excited and a little apprehensive too. On the Brown's Canyon portion of our trip wet suits aren't needed, and we simply stripped down to the bare essentials. No, we didn't skinny dip, but jewelry, makeup, excess clothing, billfolds and baggage just don't have a place on the river. That is one of the fabulous things about rafting, the world narrows down to the water and it's channel and you...nothing else. Anyone who could talk business or fail to appreciate the simplicity of it would have to be one devoted workaholic!

A short bus ride, a simple explanation by Mike "look folks, the river's down there and we're up here, who's gonna help tote the boat" and we were in the water. Of course, poor "Mom" (Gyneil swiftly came to be called Mom) was a little paler after hearing the safety talk of "wraps '

"flips" "swims" and waves. But we were on the water, drifting along happily, and learning about

one another quickly. For now, that's all the room I have to recite, so, to those who are interested, tune in for the REAL excitement next week..there's waves coming up!


Obesity is the most important nutritional disorder in the United States today. Children as well as adults are afflicted, and the percentage of obese individuals ranges from 10-30 percent.

According to the Academy's nutrition handbook, the tendency for childhood obesity to persist into the adult years is well-known. Recent evidence also suggests that overweight infants are more likely to become fat adults. Thus, it is possible to identify children at risk early on: those born to obese parents, those who gain weight rapidly during infancy and those whose mothers use food to control behavior

Reasonable, though as yet unproven, preventive measures include: ·breastfeeding;

- delay in introduction of solid foods and counseling of mothers to give foods only in response to hunger, not as a pacifier;
- · a reorientation of family life toward low calorie foods and the ritualization of total mealtime behavior; · promotion of physical exercise.

Heart Failure Claims Patient After 'Last Chance' Transplant no heart damage, Fay said. Moody

Taken From The Dallas Times Herald, Friday, July 7.

Herman "Sonny" Moody, a leukemia patient whose June 21 bone marrow transplant was called "one last chance", died Wednesday of apparent heart failure. He was 47.

Moody's doctors had been searching worldwide for a donor when they discovered the rare match in a 27year old Belgian, Eric Smekens. Smekens, whose 15-year old cousin had died of leukemia, agreed to come to Dallas to donate marrow to Moody, whom he had never met.

"The marrow transplant went well," said Dr. Joseph Fay, who performed the operation at Baylor University Medical Center. "He went into complete remission. We surmise that hi previous chemotherapy on top of getting additional chemotherapy just injured his heart and he essentially died of congestive heart failure."

The exact cause of death will be known after an autopsy, Fay said. Tests before the operation revealed




