Talco-Bogata CISD Meets

The Talco Bogata C.I.S.D. met in regular session Tuesday, January 9. The minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved and payment of bills and budget changes were approved.

The tax reports and adjustments were discussed, along with the conduct grade requirements for junior high cheerleaders. The board approved the changes in the 1989-90 school calendar, in which to change the Teacher Workday.

Election for School Board Trustees, Positions 3 and 6 was discussed, as to date, time, polling places, elec-

tion judges and clerks.

The Board approved a new policy establishing methods of regaining the loss of credit as a result of absences. The policy states when the loss of credit is a result of excessive absenteeism, students shall be allowed to regain credit by attending Saturday school at the rate of one hour of Saturday school per one hour of school missed.

Also discussed was the procedure to be used in selecting a Superintendent. A meeting was scheduled for January 29 to review the superintendent applications.

Dot Perry has always enjoyed working with her hands. She combines her talent for embroidery with quilting and has produced enough quilts to cover her backyard.

Mrs. Perry, who has been quilting for more than 10 years, said that quilting always has been a part of her life. "I grew up with quilting. My mother quilted out of necessity, and my great-grandmother had scrap pieces and was always working with quilts."

She had always been interested in embroidery and sewing, but not in quilting. Her interest was peaked when she saw a book on quilting.

"I read the book and was fascinated," she said. "It showed how to make wall hangings for different months. I only wanted to make four wall hangings for the months of January, February, April and August because those were months which my family had birthdays in. But I had so much fun that within three months, I

had made wall hangings for all the borders because they are mainly for show and display purposes," she said.

Her husband, Gerald, who often helps her find pieces of material for her quilts, said that people who design quilt patterns must know about mathematics.

"The designers of quilts have to know math, color and design to have the quilts turn out the way that they do," he said. Both husband and wife agree that details for a design have to

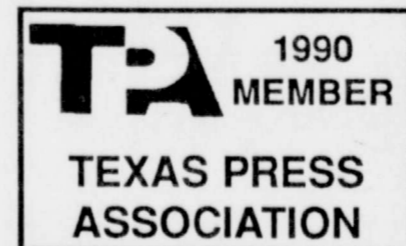
Girl Scout Cookie Sale Continues

The annual cookie sale is a major fund-raising source for the council as well as individual troops. Proceeds from the sale support troop activities and council services.

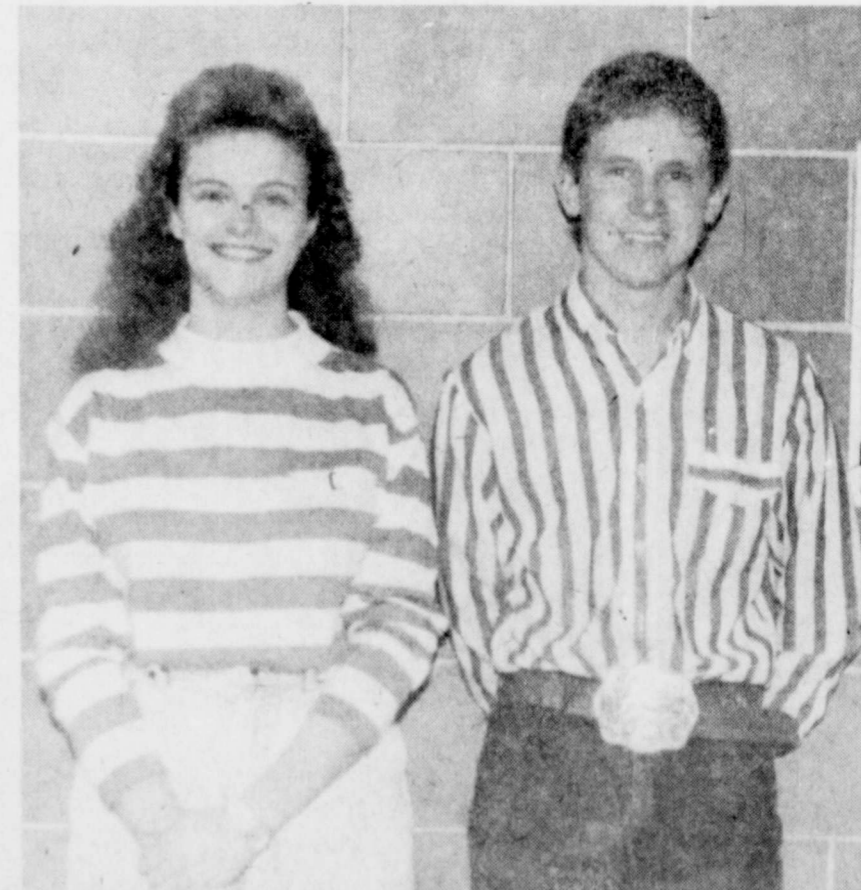

Rivercrest vs. Cooper & Wolfe City, Take Two Big Wins

BIG WINS. Every District 17AA victory for the Rebels and Rebelettes in the toughest Class 2A loop in Texas is a step toward the coveted winner or runner-up title and a play-off slot. Both the boys and girls hoopsters recorded two wins each in last week's play against Cooper at home and Wolfe City on the road.

The Rebelettes jumped to an overwhelming 26-4 first quarter lead against the Cooper Lady Bulldogs. Senior post Kristie Stansell was virtually unstoppable with her 8-foot jumper, scoring 12 first period markers, enroute to an 18 point performance. Amy Gladden connected for 20 points.

The Rebelette lead was so large that Stansell and Gladden, together with other starters, played only a half plus four minutes of the game. The Rebelette defense accounted for seven first half steals, resulting in many easy buckets.

Tonya Hawkins was credited with four thefts in the first eight minutes. The Rebelettes built an insurmountable 42-13 halftime margin, then coasted to a 73-27 victory.

Sophomore Tiffany Parish added 14 points to the win.

On Friday night, the Rebelettes improved their District mark to 4-1 and 16-4 overall, with a 53-36 defeat of Wolfe City. The Rebelettes ed the second quarter as their pivot to take a 28-12 halftime lead.

Amy Gladden had an outstanding night, both offensively and defensively, scoring 22 points and clearing nearly every board. Many of her points were tip-ins of missed Rebelette first efforts. The scoring was balanced by Kristie Stansell, who found herself in early foul trouble, but finished with eight points.

Tonya Hawkins canned seven points. The defensive play of D'Ann Stephenson and others chilled the Lady Wolves attack.

After dropping their opening District game to Leonard, the Rebels found themselves needing victories fast week against pre-season league

favorite Cooper and always tough, especially on their own court, Wolfe City. Circumstances and excellent play combined to give the Rebels both wins.

The Rebels were lifted emotionally against Cooper when it learned just before tip-off that their top player Byron "Bam" Morris had dropped off the team. Morris' absence was evident as a confused Cooper Bulldog team was pounced by the Rebels 76-53.

To be sure, it was the play of Rivercrest that insured the win. The Rebels were on top of their game in most aspects with junior Galen Logan starting the scoring barrage with a pair of three pointers. Jason Pogue made a substantial contribution to the win with his aggressive rebounding, four blocked shots and 18 point performance. The second half saw the Rebels execute the transition game well, often passing the length of the court to the open man. Senior forward Jeremy Abshier was the primary receiver of those passes, and as a result led the second half scoring, finishing with 16 points. Logan added 14 for his team, while teammate Donald Combs hit eight, and Ronald Simmons hit for 10 more. "The Rebels played a great game," commented Cooper Coach Claude Webb.

That great play continued on the road Friday night against a team the Rebels always have trouble with, Wolfe City. But the Rebels prevailed, due to an outstanding second half, by a score of 67-58.

Rivercrest vaulted to an early 19-11 first quarter lead, aided by Abshier's 30-foot aerial at the buzzer. The Wolves fought back and took their only lead, just before halftime, but Abshier again hit the final shot of the half to give the Rebels a 29-28 advantage. Abshier led all scorers with 18 points on the night.

Adjustments by Coach Wake Wood at halftime paid off for the Rebels in the third quarter. With Jason Pogue on the bench with three first half fouls, Kevin House moved to the

high post slot, and promptly netted three buckets, enroute to a 10 point second half. Crisp passing from the free throw line by House to the open player helped to increase the Rebel lead. The Rebels opened the game up in the final :40 seconds of the period, as Donald Combs made two steals, scoring away-up and an assist to Ronald Simmons to give the Rebs a 47-38 bulge after three quarters.

"The Rebels overall defensive intensity in the second half created the opportunity for victory," evaluated Wood.

Other Rebel double-figure scorers were Galen Logan, who had 14, and Jason Pogue with 11. Rebels District record after Friday's game was 2-1, they stand at 16-4 overall.

The Rebelette Junior Varsity squad manhandled the Cooper Pups by a score of 44-18 in their only action of the week. B.J. Thompson was merciless in scoring 21 points for the Rebelettes, while Lana Pirtle did more damage with 10 points.

The "B" girls, primarily freshmen, lost a heartbreaker to Prairiland on Saturday, by a single basket, 22-20. Down 17-11 after three quarters, the Rebelettes comeback fell just short, as they were plagued with fouls. Four girls accounted for the RHS scoring, Laurisha Belcher had 7, Ginger Hood had 6, Starla Howard had 4 and Chasity Hall had three.

Wolfe City came from behind in the fourth quarter to hand the JV Rebels a 51-47 loss, despite the 17 point outing by sophomore Corey Gable. Reggie Alford contributed 10 while guard David Stringer hit nine, and Tony Sanders and Chad Kuhl each had six.

The next morning, the Prairiland JV came to call on the Rebels, and were rude intruders, defeating the hosts by 52-30. Josh Abshier had 12 points. Although the JV unit is losing more games than earlier in the year, it should be noted that several of those who began the year playing JV are now suiting out for varsity games.

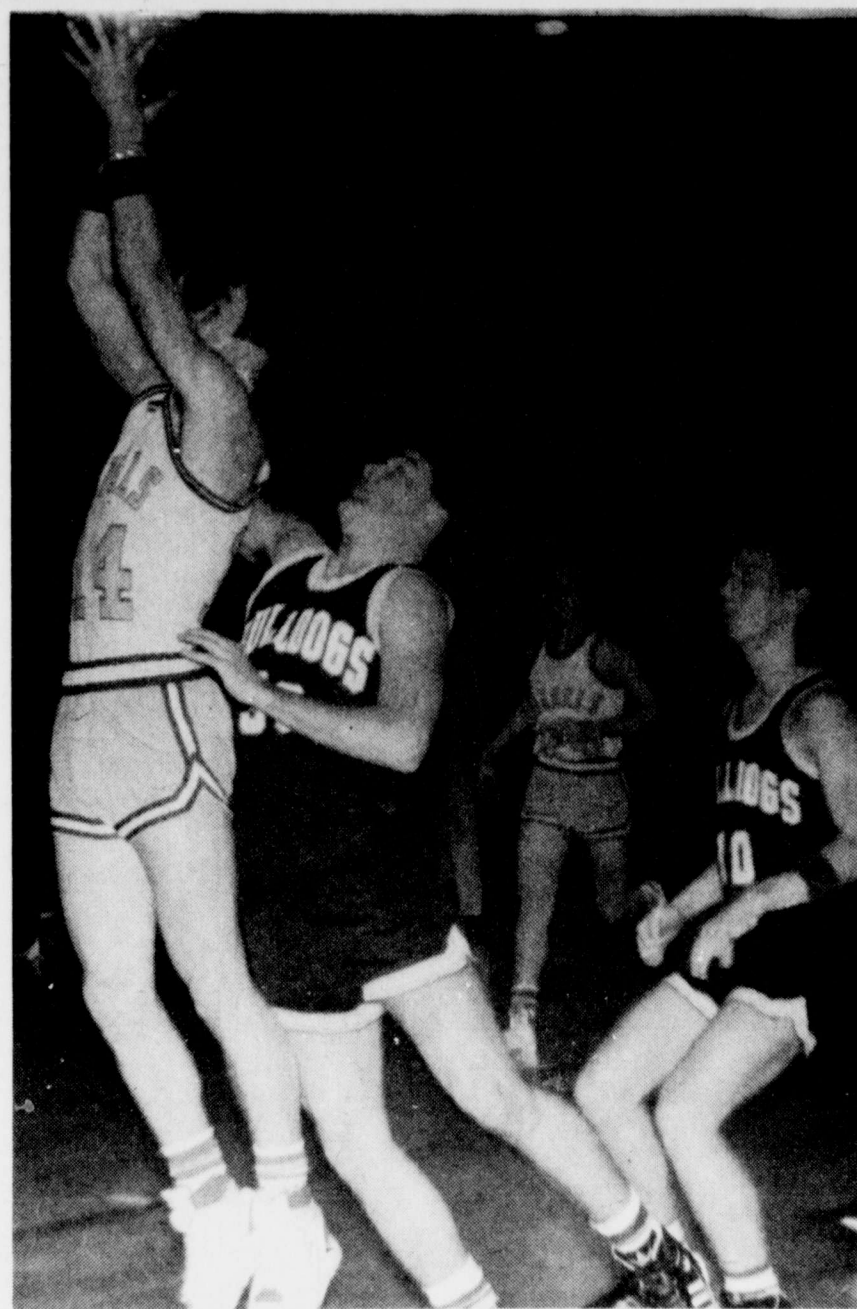

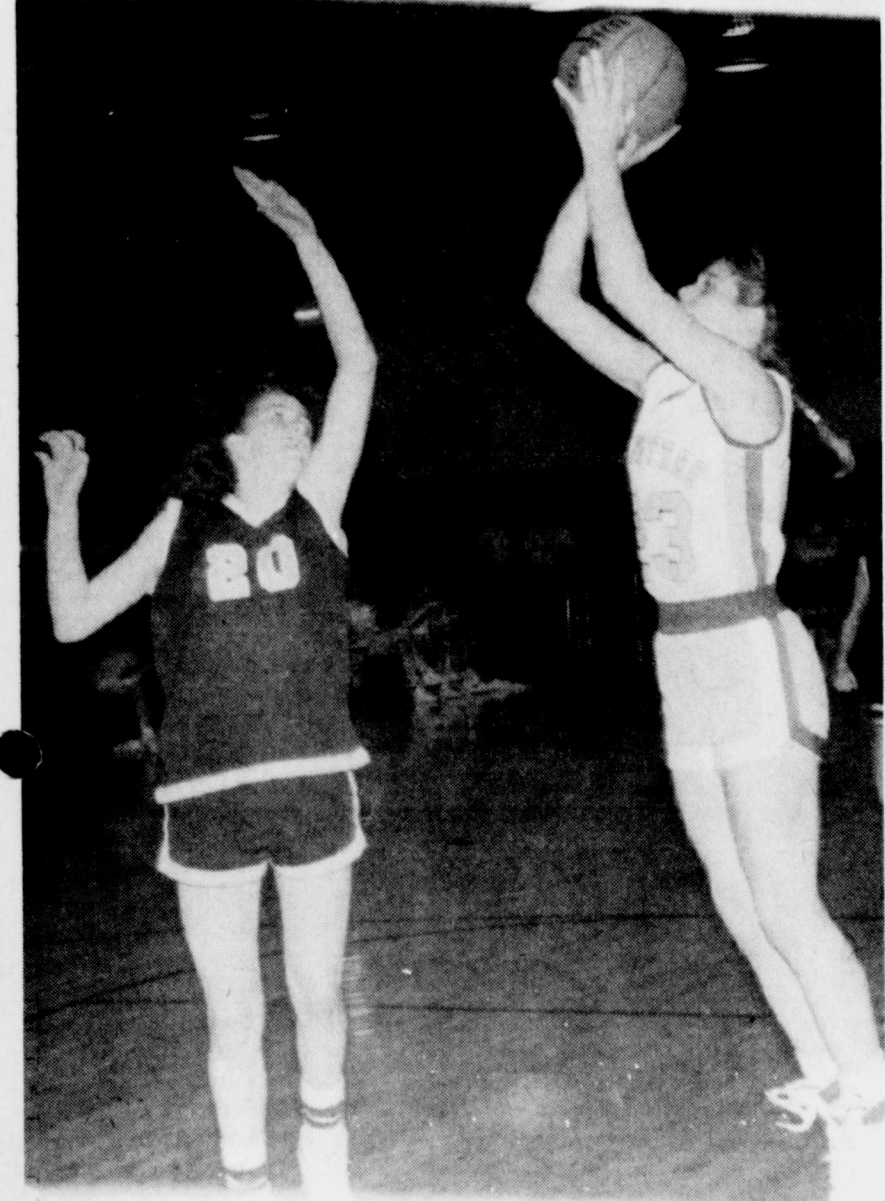

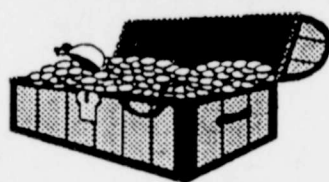
The hospice concept of care is a program that seeks to meet the needs of a terminally ill patient and family through an interdisciplinary, home-care team approach that provides

Recycling In Your Community

In cities and towns all over the U.S., government officials are considering recycling programs to help conserve our valuable natural resources, and reduce the amount of waste put in landfills.

As more and more landfills are being closed, the cost for effectively disposing of each truckload of trash is skyrocketing. Recycling aluminum, glass, paper and plastic can offer a real solution to today's garbage crisis by reducing the volume of products we throw away.

Residents of Akron, Ohio recently turned to recycling to help relieve their increasing costs for waste disposal. In April, 1989, more than 13,000 households began separating their newspaper, glass, metals, and plastic wastes for curbside pickup. About seven tons of recyclable wastes are being collected each day.

Akron's recycling program will also develop and demonstrate automated plastics sorting technology by the wTe Corporation of Bedford, MA, and The Dow Chemical Company of Midland, MI. This new technology could be used nationwide to increase the amount of plastics being recycled.

Akron residents hope to see some immediate benefits from their recycling program. When more waste is being recycled and less landfilled, each household's monthly disposal costs could drop. Lower disposal fees would be welcome relief to the city, which has seen its waste disposal costs triple in recent years.

Ohio is one of many states nationwide that is beginning to feel the



effects of the waste disposal crisis. It is estimated that within five years, the state's landfills will have reached their capacity. At least eight other states are in a similar situation already, and another 16 should join them by 1999.

The Environmental Protection Agency has estimated that only 6,500 landfills exist in the U.S. today, compared to 18,500 in 1979. Most of these landfills have closed because they are full or are considered environmentally unsafe. Landfills can present a host of problems including groundwater contamination, odors, and vermin.

Recycling programs, however, turn today's waste into tomorrow's products. The reuse of aluminum, plastic, glass, and paper preserves valuable raw materials such as metals, trees, and petroleum products.

You can help persuade officials in your town to begin or expand their own recycling program. Contact your local waste management authority and let them know that recycling of all materials is a responsible way to manage today's solid waste problem.

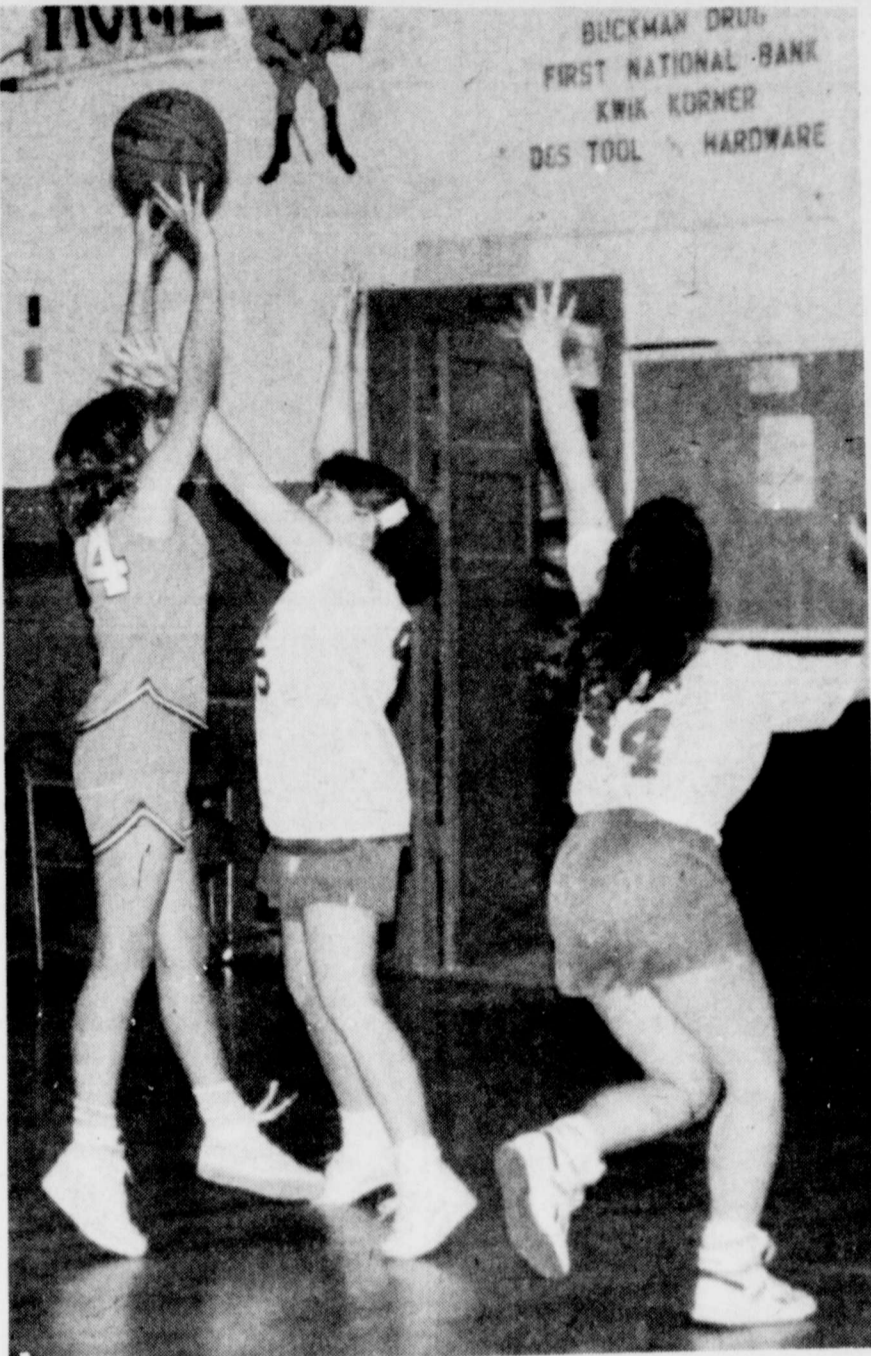

Roxton. The Rebelettes won the game, 20-18. (Staff Photo by Keye Lee)




JUNIOR HIGH Rebel Brad Langford goes for a lay-up against Roxton Monday, January 15 as Clay Pirtle looks on.
