NASA Renamed For Johnson

The Official dedication ceremonies for the Lyndon B. Johnson Space Center were held on August 27, Monday, at the NASA site southeast of Houston.

The former Manned Spacecraft Center was renamed in honor of the late President on February 17 of this year. Dedication ceremonies were scheduled to coincide with the 65th anniversary of Johnson's birth.

Many local, state and national dignitaries attended the dedication, which began at 3 p. m. in the main auditorium at the Visitors' Center.

Following the main ceremonies, a special "Johnson Room" was opened to the public in the Visitors' Center. The room contains memorabilia collected from Johnson's years in Washington.

The Johnson Space Center is at the present time the center of operations and control for the Skylab Space Station. The second Skylab crew, launched July 28, surpassed the 28-day record flight of the first crew just two days before the Monday dedication ceremony in Houston.

7 Accidents Recorded In July In County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Haskell County during the month of July, according to Sergeant Frank Jir-

cik. Highway patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and four persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1973 shows a total of 52 accidents resulting in one person killed and 31 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for July, 1973, shows a total of 658 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 366 persons injured as compared to July, 1972 with 713 accidents resulting in 34 persons killed and 388 persons injured. This was 55 less accidents, 13 less fatalities, and 22 less injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 21 traffic deaths for the month of July, 1973 occurred in the following counties: Lubbock, Sherman, Wilbarger, 3 each; Palo Pinto, Parmer, 2 each; Hockley, Jack, Lamb Parker, Wise, Hutchinson, Potter, and Oldham one each.

The two practices that were approved for Haskell County are EC-2, Grading, Shaping, Re-leveling or Similar Practices, and RE-4, Restoring Structures, and Other Installations. Both practices are for the purpose of correcting new conservation problems on farmland caused by natural disaster, and prevent or reduce the pollution of water, land, or air.

Technical Responsibility has been assigned to the Soil Conservation Service for seeing that practices are performed in accordance with detailed plans meeting the appropriate practice specifications as set forth in the local Soil Conservation District and SCS Field Office Technical Guide. Rural Banks
Need Right
Legislation

The banking business is covered by more Federal laws and regulations than any other aspect of American business life. This is probably justified because no other type of business is so important to the well-being of its customers in that it is trusted with the funds of its community and is responsible for providing the credit necessary to assure the future of individual businesses and the town as a whole.

Each year in the Congress numerous proposals for changing the banking laws are put forward. Usually these bills are offered to give some group increased power to participate in the financial life of our nation.

This year bankers and others centered in the major cities—with the help of internationalists in the Treasury—plan to offer a measure that would in their words "reform" the financial system. What it really would do would assure that all important credit decisions would be made in New York, Chicago or San Francisco—or other big cities—rather than at the local level.

This so-called reform bill results from a study that originally was put forward to protect the biggest bank holding companies from possible restrictive legislation at a time when the Congress was angered over the high interest rates set by New York banks.

Although it is supposed to deal with the future credit needs of our country, this report failed even to mention agriculture and rural America in any of its long lists of areas requiring change.

Those of us in Haskell know

of the growing credit problems of farmers and of the vast needs for funds in areas such as ours. Yet this planned overhaul of the credit mechanism would ignore us completely. There are proposals to strengthen and expand corporate lending—making sure that the big companies in the major cities have enough credit—and proposals to allow a variety of new financing devices to divert funds into the stock market and other areas.

If the interests of our rural areas are to be met, then new techniques for financing farmers must be found. One simple method proposed by the Independent Bankers Association of America, a group which represents the small town banks of our nation and to which Haskell National Bank belongs, would solve many of the problems now faced by rural areas.

The IBAA suggestion would simply set up a program of Federal loan guarantees in rural areas. The section would allow

the banks to market their insured loans, thus creating permanent, constant pools of funds to meet the credit needs of the nation's farmers, rural citizens and small businessmen. In addition this proposal would allow banks in communities like Haskell to deal with local community programs rather than forcing local government to seek high-cost financing in New York or other major cities.

Those of us at Haskell National Bank think the Congress would be better off making sure the legislation it passed last year will be effective rather than going off into some overhaul of the financial system that does not include any provision for the future of small town America. (Pd. Adv.)

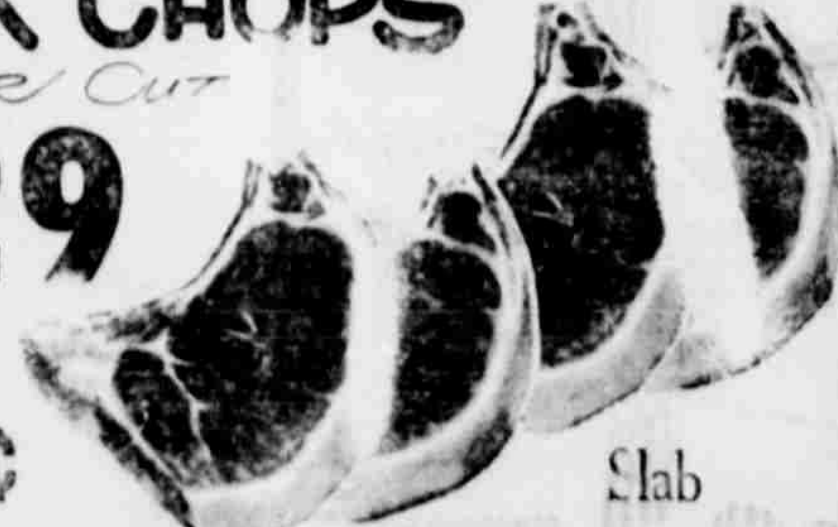

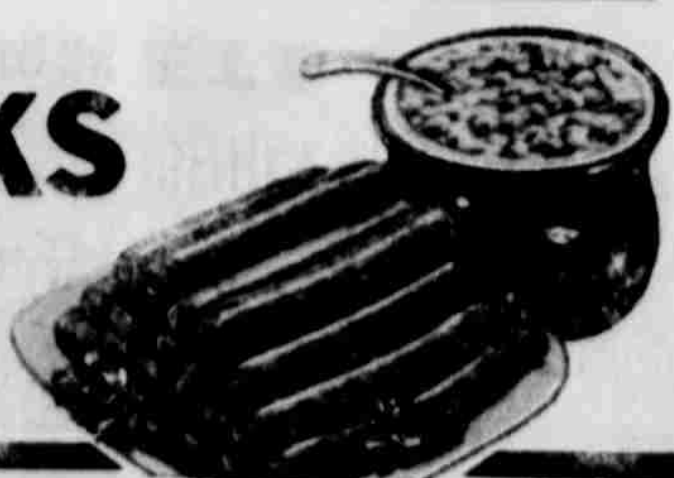

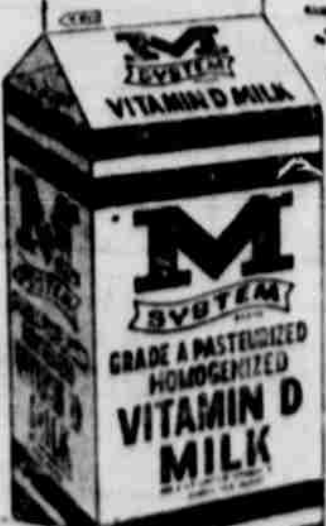
