Monday, the week kicked off with a balloon lift-off. Each balloon contained a note stating that May 13-19 was National Nursing Home Week and to please write if found.

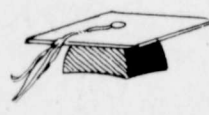
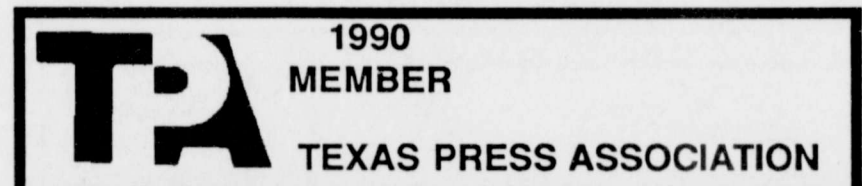
Wednesday, the staff enjoyed hot dogs with trimmings in the break room.

School musically entertained residents and the afternoon was enjoyed with snowcones out in front of the home and games of horseshoes.

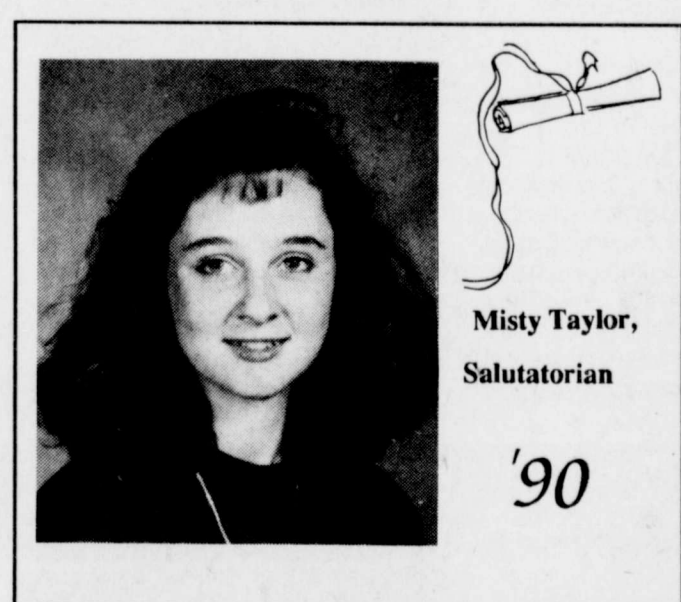
All these were extra activities outside the normal daily activities that are conducted for the residents with the help of the volunteers.

Bogata Tradition Of Dedicated Schoolteachers Is Longstanding

Believe it or not, Bogata was once an education center that attracted boarding students from all over Red River County, and even beyond its borders.

A future Vice-president of the United States studied history, mathematics and literature here for at least one term. John Nance Garner, born near Detroit, was sent to Bogata at age 14 to attend classes taught by Captain William L. Rice.

Garner, Vice-president from 1933 to 1941, would probably have been elected President had not Franklin D. Roosevelt decided to run for an unprecedented third term.

His school was a forty by sixty foot frame building on the site of today's Community Center. The building was used for church services and other community activities, as well as for classes.

Young Garner was a high-spirited boy, intelligent but unruly. He gave lasting offense to the family of William P. Clatterback, donor of the schoolground, by "disrespectful" remarks to Clatterback's daughter. (Garner was later characterized by his political enemies as a "poker-playing, whiskey-drinking, evil old man," and by his admirers as a man of political principle and absolute integrity. Perhaps both were right.)

Several local families offered room and board to students from out of town. "Jack" Garner is believed to

have boarded with the schoolmaster, Captain Rice, whose house was at the corner of Third and N. Howison Streets, on the site of the John Ward residence.

Several factors contributed to Bogata's development as an education center during the last decades of the nineteenth century. One essential was the attitude of local community leaders, who strongly believed in the importance of education. Not all of the town's early settlers had much schooling themselves, but their beliefs led to the establishment of a school taught by Jesse Cheek in the 1840's and another staffed by local residents during the Civil War period. The decline and eventual demise of the famous Mackenzie College south of Clarksville left room for a number of schools in the area.

Two other factors made Bogata attractive to families without schools in their home communities. One was the fact that the Bogata precinct promptly took advantage of the "local option" provisions of the Texas Constitution of 1876 to outlaw alcoholic beverages. Bogatans bragged that their community was free of the "big town" temptations of the county seat.

Another important "plus" may be surprising or difficult to understand in the modern era of paved roads, streets and sidewalks. In an advertisement distributed in the 1890's,

Bogata boasted that its sandy soil meant that students could play out-of-doors immediately after--and even during!--rain showers without getting muddy. Other substantial communities in the county--and many isolated farms--were built on heavy black land that allowed no such claim.

Above all, credit must be given to the talented and highly respected teachers of early-day Bogata schools. The first recorded teacher at the school begun in the late 70's was J.E. Horner, who became our postmaster and Justice of the Peace and is responsible for giving the name "Bogata" to the former "Maple Springs" in 1881. Horner was a strong-minded man who set strict rules for his students; the Miss Clatterback offended by the young Garner withdrew from his school and boarded in Clarksville rather than accept Horner's rule against dancing.

Virginia-born Captain Rice's name has become a legend, although history does not tell us what became of him after his years in Bogata. He was succeeded by a Mr. St. Cyr, who has left us only a name, and by Eugene "Sog" Scales, who remained for several years and was apparently even more widely known than Captain Rice had been. Some historians believe that Scales was already on hand when the future Vice-president came to school at Bogata.

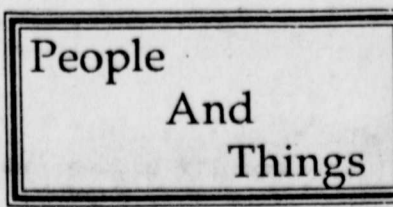

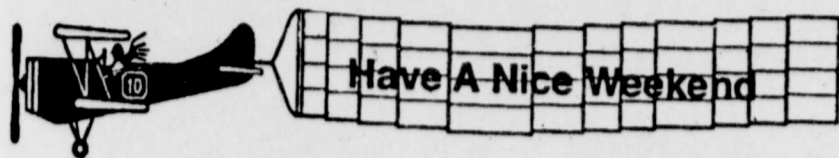
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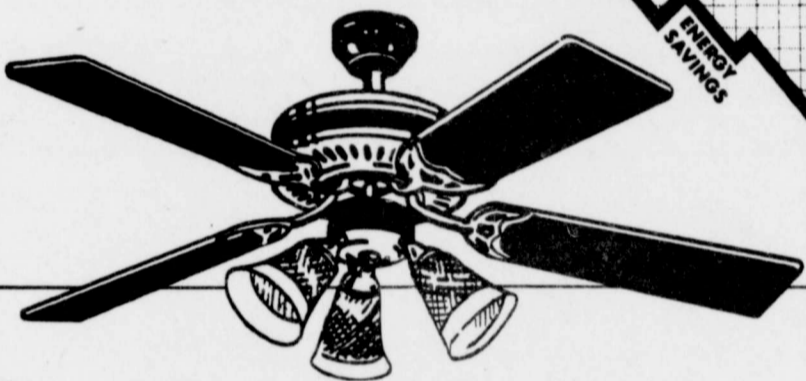

Immunization Clinic Scheduled For June 6

The Texas Department of Health, Public Region 7 office announced plans for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at 210 S. Johnson in Mt. Pleasant on June 6 from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. and from 1 to 3 p.m. the first and third Wednesday of each month.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines,

beginning at two months of age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 18 months and 60 months. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults.

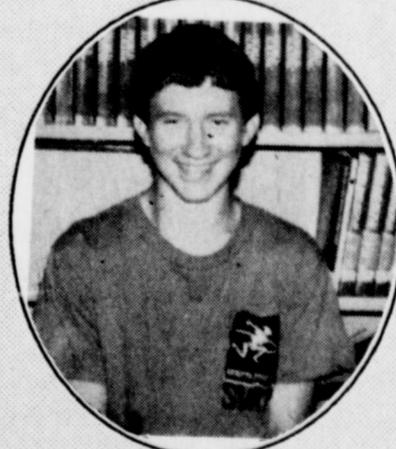

Amsterdam Proves A Study In Contrast-Cultures

As we continue our trip tales we appreciate those who have expressed their pleasure in the stories we have run.

Amsterdam...the new and the old, the conservative and liberal, a city of astonishing beauty, and amazing tolerance.

As we pulled into the city of Amsterdam there was no way we could understand about this old, canal-laced city.

Our guide, Anne Marie, Said "Amsterdam is an amazing city...you can do absolutely anything here...people do what they want as long as it doesn't interfere with others". It took an evening to figure out what she meant!

But first we were introduced to the city by the best of all means...and canal cruise.

Pristine white, sleek boats ply the ancient canals of this seaport city, loaded with tourists from all over the world. And it is by far the best way to see it, for the city was designed for most of it's commerce to take place by boat.

The buildings that face the canals are narrow fronted...because they used to be taxed by their width.

Elaborate facades of marble and granite top these buildings, often showing what 17th century profession the owner was engaged in. Medical symbols, tobacco symbols, sea captains and Greek statues gave the brick buildings grandeur and scope.

From the top of almost every building would protrude a simple or elaborate beam.

This, we learned, was the hoist beam used to bring everything into

the building. During Holland's "Golden Age" of empire, in the 17th century, it was common for families to have their offices on the first floor, homes on the second, and warehouses on the third floor.

Thus, furniture was transported by boat to the house, lifted by hoist to the floor, and goods were warehoused in the top floors, also installed by use of the hoist.

The stair ways had to be narrow because of the narrow fronts (remember the taxation), and today when people in Amsterdam move they still use those same, three hundred year old hoist beams!

We passed hundreds upon hundreds of broad beamed boats, tied up to the canal banks. These are permanent living quarters for thousands. Some are elaborate, and complete. Others are shabby, and lit with kerosene lanterns. That's because they aren't legal, paying no rent for the space, and can't have electric hook-ups without being detected.

We sailed by the "pussy cat boat" which houses 30 to 50 of the city's stray cats, cared for by an elderly woman and supported by donations. Everywhere we looked in Amsterdam there were cats sunning themselves in windows or on ledges.

Because it was a rare sunny day, the citizens themselves were out and about, lying in the sun, painting, airing clothing, generally getting into that liquid golden light that shows in so many famous Dutch paintings.

The canals were very, very clean, with almost no litter floating on them.

We passed the Lord Mayor's house, and toured the busy harbor. Then, it was time to go and view one

of the reasons for Amsterdam's wealth...diamonds. The world's diamonds almost all pass through Amsterdam. We visited a factory, where we saw the sparkling gems laid out for our inspection by the hundreds. A few of us even purchased the brilliant, fiery stones, but Thomas and I weren't among them!

As our bus worked it's way through the traffic of a European city (bicycles, trams, buses and cars) we noticed that one thing different in the city was the graffiti. Everywhere there was the ugly evidence of spray cans, and one didn't have to read Dutch to know that it was very much the same here as in a big American city.

Our hotel was located on Rembrandt Square, right in the heart of town.

A statue of the famous artist stood, surrounded by tulips and trees...and

casinos, peep shows, cafes and various other things!

For that is the thing about Amsterdam. They have few laws governing pornography, drugs, alcohol, or any other of the "past times" that we generally label as vices!

For country kids, it was indeed a revelation! This city of such grace such beauty, is also a city that spots a lot of neon advertising pursuits, better left unmentioned here!

We quickly came to realize that the Dutch don't necessarily approve of this...they just believe in tolerating it.

This tolerance goes back for hundreds of years, and includes religious tolerance too, but it was still difficult for those of us unaccustomed to such things to comprehend!

That evening, after exploring our massive, charming old hotel, about six of us got up our "nerve" and decided to go out exploring.

Soon we found ourselves paying very little attention to the garish neon signs or loud music coming from windowless buildings. Instead we were enchanted with the arched bridges and houseboats lined with clear lights, shimmering on the canals.

We walked past gardens and apartments, over ornate bridges lined with light, we walked past cafes where people sampled cuisines from around the world, and snacked on a speciality of the city, "Frites". Frites are fried potatoes, served in a rolled paper cone, hot, delicious and served with curried mayonnaise. Inexpensively sold from sidewalk stands, they were a taste treat.

Finally we began to realize that as raunchy as some things in the city were, no one was going to bother us. Like any big city we had been told to keep a close grip on purses and billfolds, but there was no feeling of threat or danger, as there would be in some urban areas.

The biggest danger we discovered, was from cyclists, who come zooming around curves soundlessly, and make little effort to avoid gawking tourists!

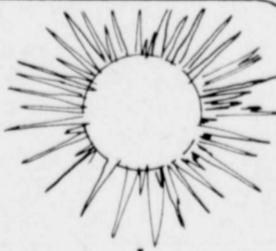
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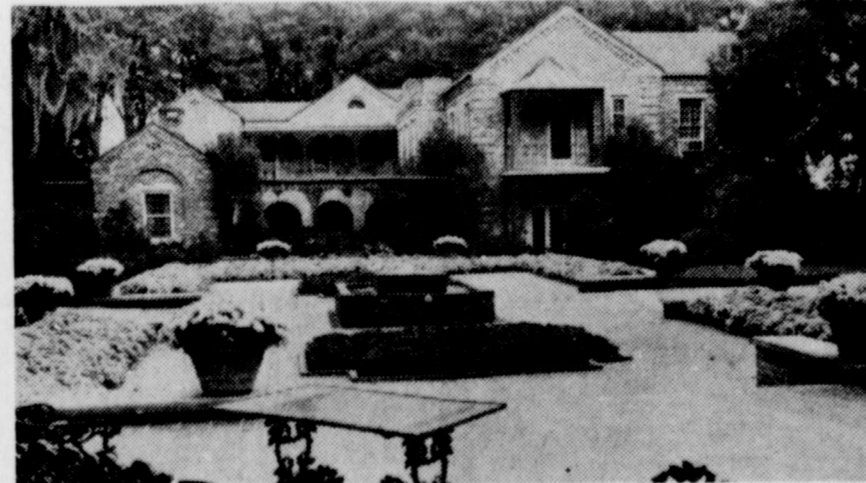


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Minimum Standards Revised By TDHS

The Texas Department of Human Services announced recently the implementation of revised Minimum Standards for Registered Family Homes effective July 1, 1990. The changes will impact persons providing child care for three or more children, other than their own.

According to TDHS Commissioner Ron Lindsey, "The standards are the result of considerable input from parents, the State Advisory Committee on Child Care Facilities and the Ad Hoc Committee on Family Day Care. The proposed standards were published in the Texas Register and were sent to all registered caregivers for a 60-day public review and comment period. During August and September of 1989, the department held 18 statewide public hearings and received comments from over 1,500 people."

The major changes to the current standards, developed in 1982, involve caregiver qualifications and child health and safety. The 1982 standards required that a caregiver be at least 18 years old and there was no minimum education requirement. A 1988 registered family home provider survey undertaken by the Li-

censing Division shows that only 37% of registered caregivers are younger than 21 years old and 18% have less than a high school diploma. The new standards establish 21 as the minimum age, but provides alternatives to establish the competency of an 18 to 20 year old. Effective July 1, all persons who request to register must have a high school diploma, GED or similar credential. The education requirement does not apply to caregivers registered prior to July 1, 1990.

The new standards add requirements for pre-registration and post-registration training for caregivers. They will be required to maintain current certification in CPS and First Aid. Smoking in the registered family home will now be prohibited during hours of operation.

Current and potential RFH caregivers will be offered training to familiarize themselves with the new standards. All currently registered caregivers will receive letters notifying them of dates and times. Anyone desiring further information may contact Ms. Bobbie Lancaster at 785-7541.

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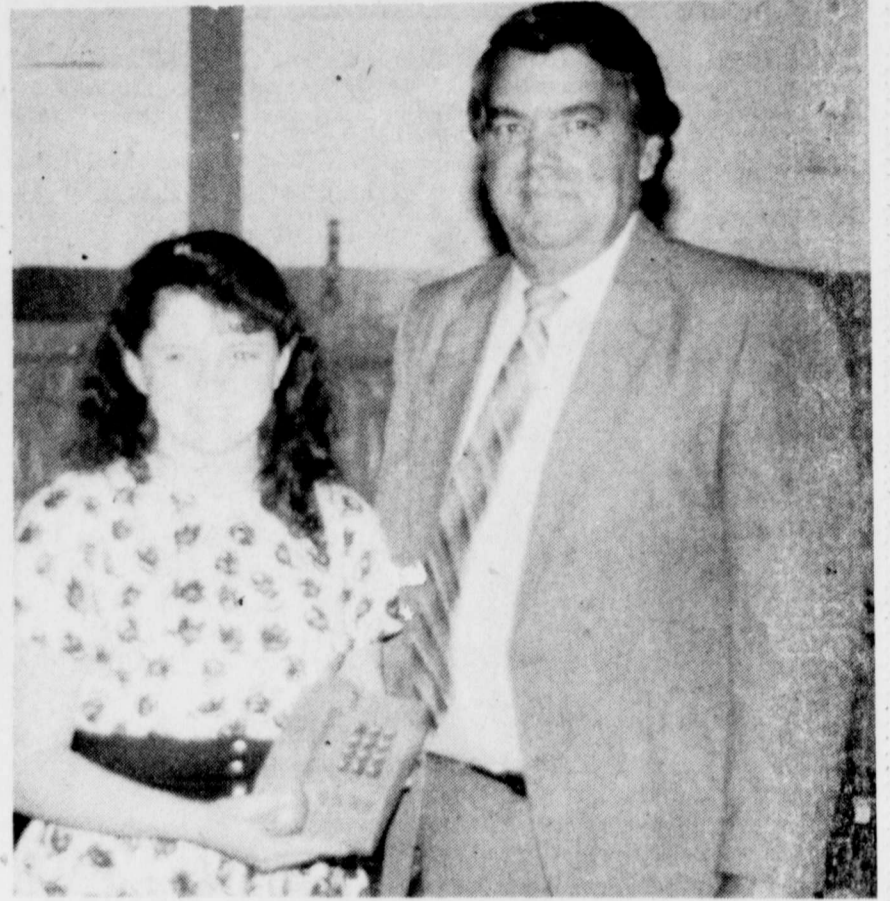
