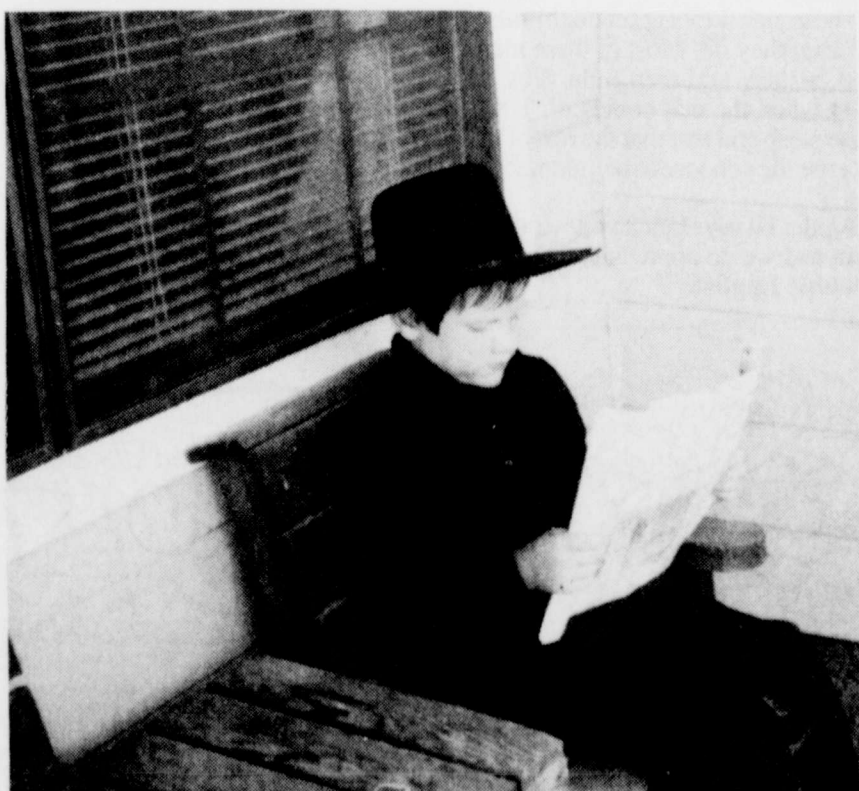

Rebels Fumble To James Bowie, 28-8

The two-point conversion from quarterback Simmons called on another one of his backs, Shane Beers, for another successful plunge into enemy endzone, which extended their score to eight points.

The Pirates went on to post one more touchdown on the legs of Jeff Smith and the point after was good. The score was 28-8 in favor of the visitors.

The Rebels were unable to post any more points in the contest, but they denied the Pirates from crossing into their endzone again.

Coach Green remarked "They are still building character and it is still hard on the seniors, but we will get there."

Highway Department Says "No" To Political Signs On Right-Of-Way

Politician campaign signs may be beautiful to candidates and their supporters, but they're litter to the highway department. The highway beautification act prohibits most campaign signs within sight of the main lanes of any federally funded highway in Texas. Safety rules ban the signs from all highway rights-of-way in the state.

Campaign signs, like any advertisement, can be posted on private property if they are licensed and permitted under current billboard guidelines. However, most campaign signs don't qualify.

Signs are allowed on private property along farm to market roads and other state-funded roadways as long as they can't be seen from federally funded roads and don't violate local laws against such signs.

"We have two very legitimate concerns regarding these campaign signs," said highway department Engineer-Director Arnold Oliver. "Safety concerns and litter control laws dictate that we keep the rights-of-way free of clutter, whether it's for political candidates, real estate companies or anyone displaying advertising on the highways."

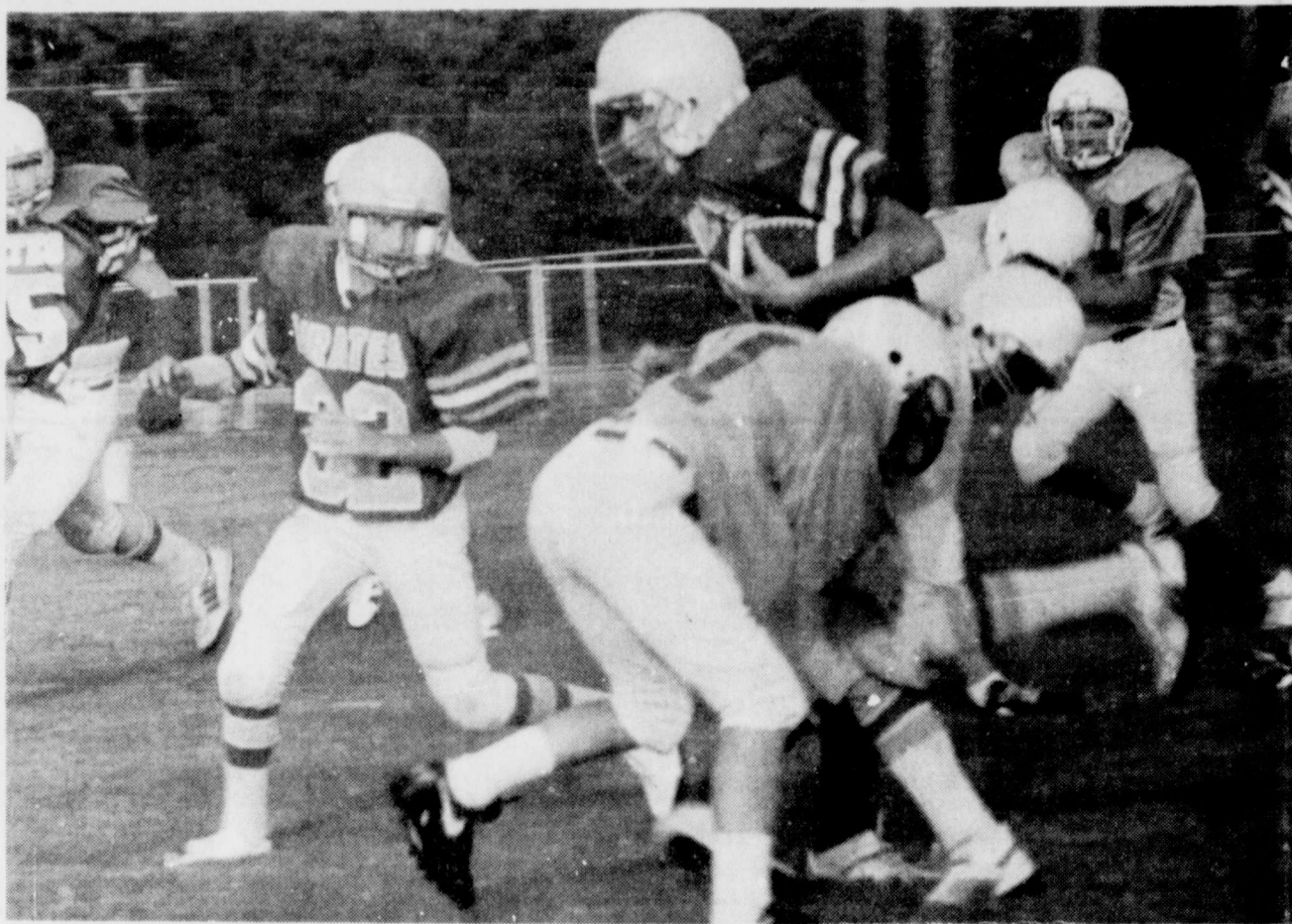

The kids are bored, the grass needs mowing, the barbecue hasn't been cleaned in weeks, and it's 90 degrees in the shade. Brace yourself for warm weather stress.

All year long we look toward warm weather for fun and relaxation, only to find that our jobs and families are just as demanding as during the rest of the year. And more and more, with dual-income families becoming more prevalent, it's difficult for families to arrange the traditional two-week vacation.

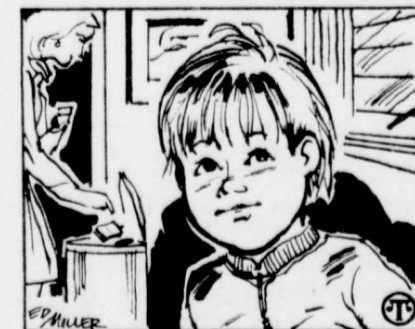

Your children are less likely to start smoking if you stop smoking.

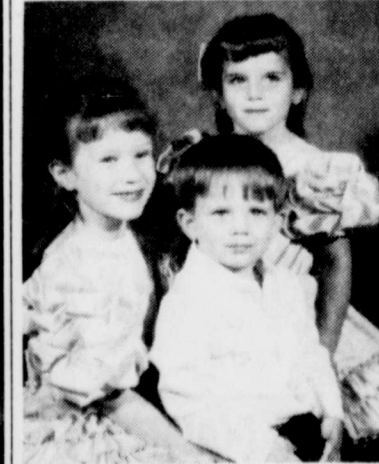
The answer is, you can't. What you should do is to set an example by setting a date to quit. Tell your children the date, perhaps making it a special day such as your birthday or your anniversary. Sure, quitting isn't easy, but it's not impossible either. Over three million Americans quit every year. Just make sure you know what to expect and understand that withdrawal symptoms are temporary. They usually last only one to two weeks.

As part of your program, your doctor may prescribe a medication that's been shown effective in helping people quit smoking. The medication, in gum form, is available by doctor's prescription only. It releases small amounts of nicotine into the mouth to help you overcome nicotine withdrawal symptoms.

Finally, realize that most successful ex-smokers quit for good only after several attempts. You may be one of those who can quit on your first try. If you're not, don't give up. Try again.
