## Miller Creek Dam Gets OK

The final examination was completed and construction on Contract I was fully complete. Mr. J. H. Strain, contractor for the dam, said that it had taken 350 working days to complete the dam with 40 men constantly employed on the job. He also said that during the first seven months of work only about one month normal production had been achieved due to bad weather. The structure, from zero point to the toe of the dam is 9,640 feet, and from zero point to the drop in the main dam is 4,260 feet, and required the moving of 1,450,000 cubic yards of dirt for the main structure and 15,600 cubic yards for the blanket, and 48,000 cubic yards for rip-rap.

## Bragg Is Speaker

Present for the final inspection were Mr. J. H. Strain, contractor; Joe O'Rark, HUD representative; Frank Whitehead, Freese and Nichols, engineers; Aaron Edgar, Munday Courier; Marion Waggoner, Munday Courier; Herman Lloyd, Strain and Sons Construction Co.; David Jones, Texas Water Development Board; Ruben Sanchez, Texas Water Development Board; Fred Geiser, Texas Water Development Board; R. The only part of the project not complete is contract II, which is the water treatment plant. Engineer Whitehead said about 2 1/2 weeks more is needed for checking instrumentation control of the plant and that October 1 is the date set to receive filter media for use in the water treatment. After this, another couple of weeks will be needed to complete tests and set the plant in full operation. Contract II was set for completion last September, but a number of times, including shortages of materials, has delayed completion. Bid on Contract II was \$488,000, but due to changes has been raised to \$505,000.

Mr. Beecher, who has been on the job for 15 years, said all contracts have run approximately 1.8 per cent above original plans due to changes and other unforeseen circumstances. The question was asked Mr. Beecher how long it would take to pay for the project and he answered the project was set up to pay out in 49 years, but he hastened to add that with other towns interested in buying water from the reservoir that, hopefully, this time would be cut considerably. Rochester and O'Brien have indicated an interest in securing water from Miller Creek.

The watershed for Miller Creek is 224 sq miles and begins just north of Haskell, with five tributaries to the south flowing into the reservoir. About 5 to 7 inches of hard rain will

Don Smith, ACC head track coach, signed Kittley in his office on the ACC campus. Kittley is the seventh new athlete signed and added to the 1974-75 ACC track roster.

Kittley won district, regional and state half-mile titles in the half-mile as a senior for coach Jasper Wilson. His top time was 1:58.9 at the state meet in Austin. He also ran a quarter on Rule's mile relay team (50.4) which won state in a record breaking time.

Kittley has other times of 39.2 in the 100-yard dash and 49.9 on a mile relay quarter.

Kittley, a 1974 Rule High graduate, plans to study agriculture at Abilene Christian, was a four-year letterman in football for coach Dennis Briles. His team had a 29-6-1 record in four years. As a senior he rushed for 952 yards (6.8 per carry).

In football he was a three-time all-district pick and all-area on offense and defense as a senior.

In track he was fourth in the state 880 as a sophomore and second as a junior. He also won district and regional 880 titles as a sophomore and junior. As a freshman in the 440 he won district and placed fifth in regional.

Frank Jirek, also of Haskell, said the motorcycle was traveling east on FM 2225 eight-tenths of a mile west of O'Brien when it was in collision with a westbound pickup driven by Mrs. Alta Peters, 65, of Rochester.

Gilbreath said the two vehicles met on a curve and the motorcycle apparently drifted into the path of the pickup.

The Magana boy was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Emmitt Cross of Rochester. The Rocha boy was pronounced dead on arrival at Knox City Memorial Hospital in Knox City. Mrs. Peters was not injured in the accident.
