The Bogata Rodeo Association and Wing Rodeo Company have teamed up to produce another action-packed three nights of rodeo performances on June 27-28-29. This year's rodeo is sanctioned by the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association and is co-sanctioned by the Central Rodeo Association.

The Bogata Rodeo Association officers for 1991 are Mike Williams, president; Eddy Denny, vice-president; and John Ragsdill, secretary-treasurer. The directors for 1991 are James Lawson, Ray Byers, C.R. Williams, Jim Branch, Todd Denny and Raymond Knight.

The Wing Rodeo Company, owned by Jerald and Joan Smith of Bogata, bring award-winning style that we are familiar with and appreciate. Wing

Rodeo Company wins many awards for their rodeos and rodeo stock. In 1990, they were voted the Stock Contractor of the Year in the C.R.R.A., as well as receiving the Bucking Bull of the Year and Saddle Bronc of the Year awards for their livestock.

Performing this year, other than the many cowboys and cowgirls, are bullfighter Rodney Hayes of Linden, TX and Brother and Vicki Taylor of Wimberly. Vicki is a trick rider and Brother has dog acts and horse and mule tricks. This duo has been performing together for 12 years.

To kick off the festivities, there will be a parade at 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, featuring Kennedy's Sausage Hitch and the local faces of the people we all know. Another parade will be Saturday at 5:00 p.m.

Each night the rodeo begins at 8:30 with a "Grand Entry" of cowboys, cowgirls, friends and family. Later in the program each night there will be

a calf scramble for the youngsters with a prize of \$10 nightly.

Thursday night is dedicated to Hub Whiteman and there will be a drawing for a \$100 savings bond given in memory of Hub by Mrs. Whiteman.

There is \$2,800.00 in added money to the seven championship events this year at the Bogata rodeo and a belt buckle will be given to the All Around Champion Cowboy.

Tickets to the rodeo are available at Huddleston's Grocery, Peoples National Bank, The Movie Shoppe and Buckman Drug Store in Bogata. Prices are \$3.50 advance for adults, \$4.00 at the gate. Children 6-12 tickets are \$3.00.

Next Saturday night will mean one more year until our local rodeo will be back in town. So everyone take out your hats and polish your boots and come on down to the Bogata Rodeo for a great time and to see those familiar faces you haven't seen since last year.

Talco-Bogata School Board Discusses Projects, Policies

When the Talco-Bogata CISD School Board of Trustees met in regular session on June 11, Supt. Freddy Wade announced that the tax report showed 93.88% of the 1990 taxes have been collected as compared to 92.76% of the 1989 taxes collected at this time last year.

The Board discussed the policy for administrators at school related functions as well as the policy on conduct of school personnel. No action was taken on these two policies at this meeting.

Several summer maintenance projects were discussed with the largest being the improvement of the deteriorating track at Rivercrest High School. Cracks have formed both lengthwise and crosswise from the base of soil. The cost for the repair of the track is roughly estimated in the \$70-75 thousand dollar range.

A motion to designate a smoking area for personnel was made. Each campus will issue a designated area for this purpose.

An important matter was discussed about the cost of grade restructuring and the appropriate action needed. At this time, Talco-Bogata CISD is in the planning phase concerning needs facility-wise for all campuses for the next five years. Four different plans or options will be presented to the taxpayers for a poll. Hopefully, the taxpayers will express their opinion through the poll and give the Board some idea of what they prefer. An important note is that a final plan will not be formulated until the poll is returned.

The State Legislature recently passed the County Education Bill or what is known as the "Robin Hood Bill". The bill attempts to equalize funding for school districts across the state. County Education Districts have been organized and the districts will be responsible for levying a county-wide tax of \$.72/\$100 evaluation. The County Board carries out the functions of levying taxes, collecting taxes and distributing the money to the school districts. Local boards will

still levy a local tax and the CED must meet the first of July. The projected figures show that Rivercrest will lose money due to the new bill. Mr. Wade assured the Rivercrest Board that this loss of money will not adversely affect the operation or the quality of the schools. Jerry Russell was appointed to the County Education Board.

Several proposals were discussed about salary increases for the non-certified personnel. The non-certified personnel include instructional aides, secretaries, tax collector, maintenance and cafeteria personnel, as well as bus drivers. The Board voted to grant salary increases to non-certified personnel.

The Board elected to participate in the National School Lunch and Breakfast Program of which Mr. Wade signed the agreement.

In personnel matters, the resignation of Lola House, elementary teacher at Bogata, was accepted. Two new teachers were hired, recommended by Mr. Wade, Deborah Kay Hudson and Cheri Diane Tubbs. Both teachers are subject to assignment of position at Bogata Elementary. Veda Kay Ross was hired as tax collector, filling the position vacated by Virginia Spencer.

The Board went into executive session from 11:20 p.m. to 12:10 a.m. and in open session accepted the resignation of Board member, Tommy Corbell, effective immediately. The Board went into executive session again, come back into open session at 1 a.m. with no action being taken. The meeting adjourned at 1:08 a.m.

Board members present were Jerry Stansell, Kip Stansell, Eddie Brown, Ricky Franks and Buford Hervey. Absent were Tommy Corbell and Mollie Williams.

The next regular meeting will be at Rivercrest High School at 7:30 p.m. on July 9. The public is cordially invited to attend and be acquainted with the operation of the school system.

Cabbage Slaw

1 large head cabbage, shredded
3 onions, cut in rings
3/4 cup sugar
1 1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. celery seed
1 tsp. dry mustard
1 cup white vinegar
1 cup oil
Mix sugar, salt, celery seed, mustard and vinegar. Bring to boil. Add oil and heat, but do not boil. Pour over the cabbage and onions. Cover airtight and let stand in refrigerator overnight. Toss and serve.

Pear Preserve Cake

2 1/2 cups sugar
1 cup Wesson oil
4 eggs, beaten
3 cups flour
1 tsp. baking powder
Mix well, then add:
1 cup pear preserves
1 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. coconut
1-3 oz. bottle Maraschino cherries, chopped
Mix with other ingredients. Bake in floured and greased bundt pan 2 1/2 hours at 275. Cool on wire rack 15 minutes.

Barbeque Sauce

3-8 oz. cans tomato sauce
1 small bottle Worcestershire
1/4 tsp. garlic powder
1/2 lb. butter
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 tsp. mustard
2 tsp. vinegar
2 tsp. lemon juice
1/4 tsp. red pepper
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. black pepper
Mix together and cook about 15 minutes. Let simmer about 10 minutes. Makes approximately 1 quart.

Heinz Sweet Pickles

Wash and slice about 3 gallons of cucumbers, pack in chum of large jar (not metal). Cover with cold water-1 pt. salt

to each gallon of water. Let stand 5 days. Pour water off and rinse cucumbers. Put back in the same container and cover with boiling water and two tbsps. alum to each gallon of water. Let stand 24 hours. Pour off solution, rinse cucumbers, put back in jar and cover with clear boiling water. Let stand another 24 hours. Pour water off and add the following solution boiling hot.

2 1/2 qts. vinegar
2 tsp. celery seed
2 tsp. cloves
2 tsp. cinnamon

Let stand 3 days. Pour solution in a pan and add 6 cups sugar. Heat and let stand 24 hours. Reheat the same solution adding 3 cups sugar. Let stand 24 hours. Put cucumbers in jars, cover with same solution boiling hot and seal.

Heavenly Salad

1 can cherry pie filling
1 can Eagle Brand milk
1-9 oz. carton Cool Whip
1 can crushed pineapple, drained
I added 1/4 cup sugar and nuts. This will make two pies in graham cracker crusts. This pie recipe can be frozen for several days until needed.

Sesame Lace Cookies

By Nell Wolfe
5 tbsps. margarine, melted and cooled
3 tbsps. sugar
2 tbsps. cornstarch
2 tbsps. sesame seeds
1 tbsps. + 1 1/2 tsp. plain dry bread crumbs
1 tsp. vanilla
Preheat oven to 375. In a bowl, stir ingredients together until smooth. Drop by teaspoons onto baking sheet, 4 inches apart. Bake for 7-8 minutes until lacy and golden. Let cool. These are very delicate, so handle carefully.
Yield: about 24 cookies
Serving size: 2 cookies
Cholesterol: 0 mg. per serving
Per serving: 68 calories, 6 gm. carbohydrates, trace protein, 5 gm. fat, and 44 mg. sodium.

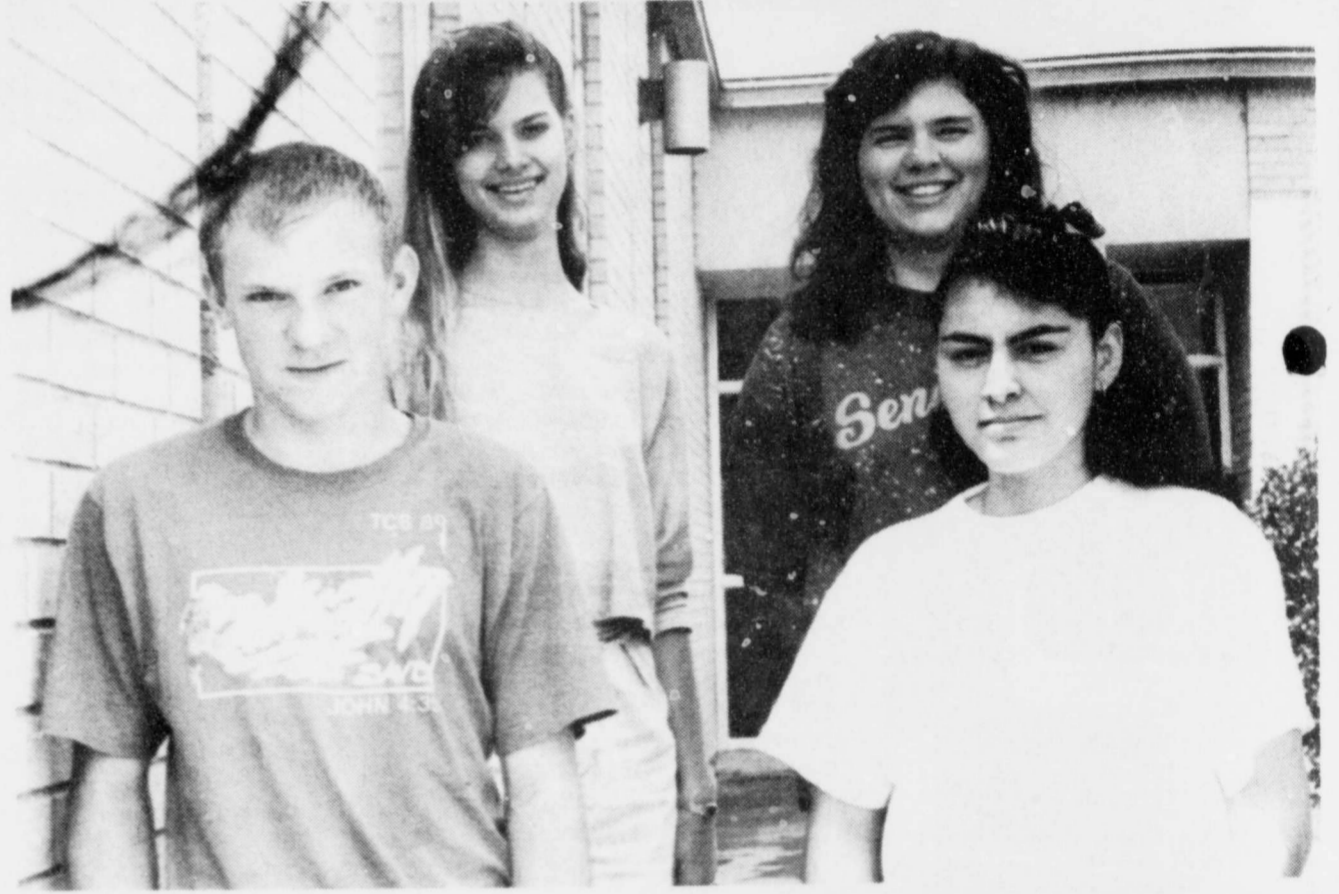

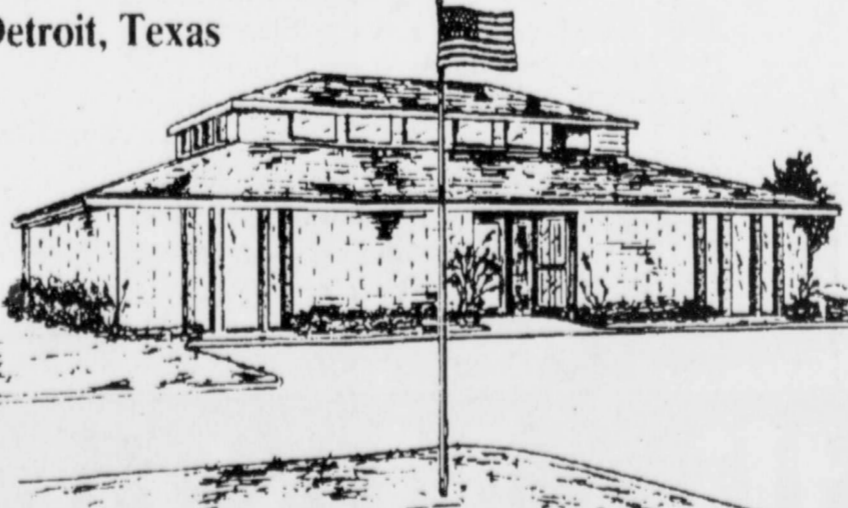

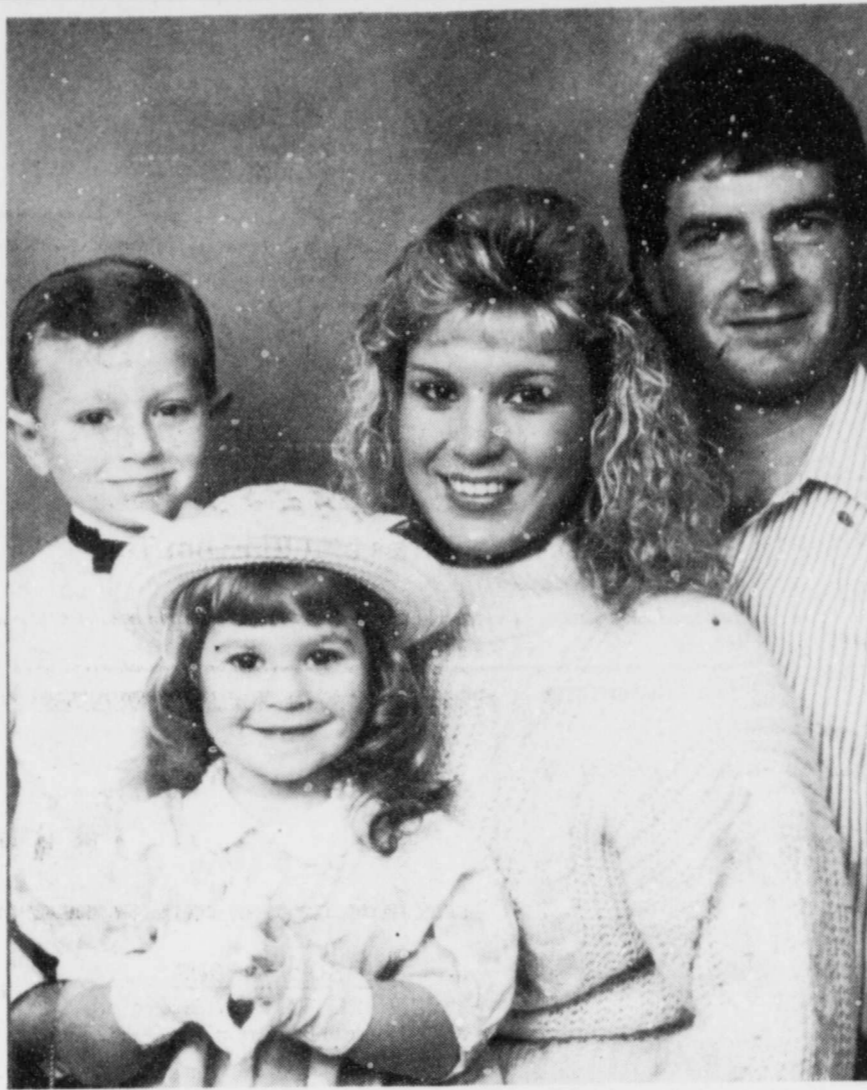

NOTICE OF RIGHT TO NOMINATE BY PETITION

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) is accepting nominations for County Committee elections for Red River County. This notice is issued to inform eligible voters of the right to nominate candidates by petition. Copies of the petition and instructions on its completion can be obtained from your local FmHA office.

Persons nominated should have an interest in a farm as an owner, tenant, or sharecropper within the county or area in which activities of the county or area committee are carried out. They must be citizens of the United States or aliens lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence, and be well qualified for committee work. Spouses of those persons who meet the eligibility criteria are also eligible for nomination for election to the county committee. Nominations must be received in the Red River County office no later than August 5th. BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION AUGUST 10, 1991

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."
