Bloodmobile To Be In Haskell Aug. 9

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Haskell, Thurs., Aug. 9, at the new Community Room of Haskell National Bank, according to Charles Thornhill, chairman. Donor hours will be from 1:30 to 6 p. m.

Haskell County's quota is 70 pints, as it has been in the past. When the Bloodmobile van was here March 1, the county reached the set quota of 70 pints for the first time since the program was initiated here.

The blood bank makes blood available to all residents of Haskell at any time without looking for a donor when the need arises.

A new feature of the blood bank is that any individual who donates blood enables his family to receive blood anywhere within 12 months.

Individuals may donate blood every six weeks, but not more than five times a year. The do-

nation is painless and takes only a few minutes.

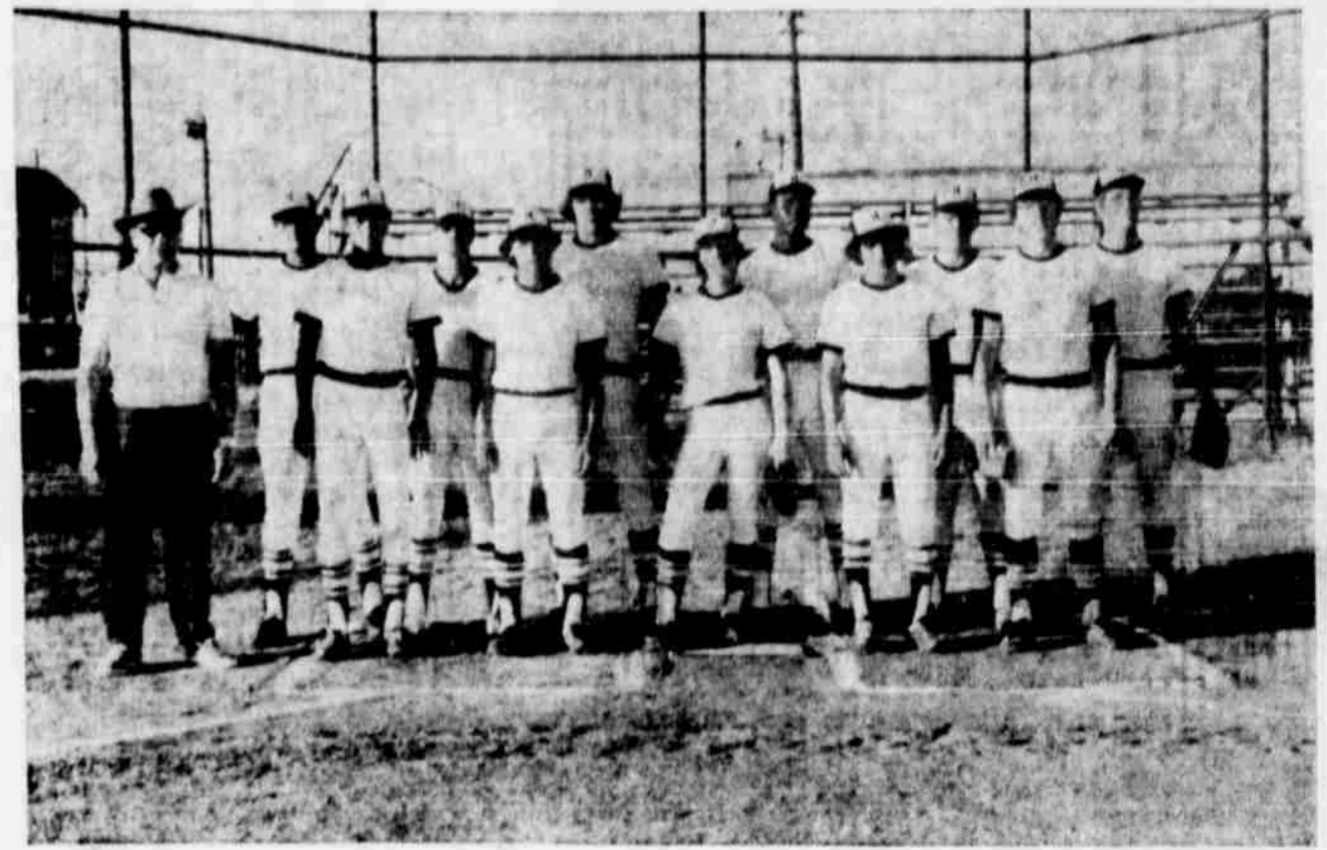

Haskell Indians Off To State

The Haskell Indian Teenage Baseball team downed Clyde's team twice in regional play-offs to earn their right to go into State Championship play Tuesday night, August 7 at 6 p. m. in Newman Park in Sweetwater.

The team, managed by Frank Jireik, with James Davis as assistant manager, will meet a Houston team in Sweetwater in their try for the State Championship.

The Indians played made in Clyde Saturday night, with Ricky Acosta pitching the entire game, and only allowing one hit to Clyde. They downed Clyde by a 7-0 score Saturday night.

Jackie Fleming, Clyde's pitcher Monday night, allowed only two hits in the game, but the Indians batted around on him, as he allowed four walks and his team made four errors in the same inning. Haskell scored three runs in the first and two runs in the second and fifth innings, to win the game 7-5, and get the best two of three games in the competition.

Bub Allen pitched for the Haskell team Monday night, and was relieved by Acosta in the 5th inning. Allen was credited with the win.

The Indians go into the State competition with 7 other teams at Sweetwater. They include Victoria, Odessa, Houston, Waco, Dallas, Fort Worth and Sweetwater. Winner will be the State Champion of the Senior Division of Texas Teenage Baseball League.

CONSERVATION VIEW POINTS

District Conservationist

Acting State ASCS Executive Director, Robert Sprean, State ASCS Committeemen Charlie Calhoun of Fabians and Don Crook of Childress; State ASCS Agricultural Program Specialist, Darrell Davis; and District ASCS Director David Robinett of Vernon were conducted on an air tour of Haskell County last Thursday to observe the damage done to your farms and ranches during the storms of June 1 and 2. These men will report their findings to the State ASCS Committee at its next regular meeting in regards to our application for emergency conservation funds.

The tour was planned and conducted by our local County Executive Director, Lloyd Foemster, and the County ASCS committee.

Following the air tour, the visiting officials met with the County Committee and ASCS Community Committeemen, and other interested farmers and ranchers at the Haskell National Bank Community Room.

Mr. Sprean led in a discussion concerning Haskell County's application for Federal funds with which to implement emergency conservation measures for repairing and replacing damaged or destroyed dur-

ing the June floods. It was pointed out that should the funds be approved for Haskell County, producers wishing to secure assistance to replace or repair conservation measures damaged or destroyed during these floods, should first, and I repeat, should first make application for these cost-sharing funds at the local ASCS office in Haskell. Technical assistance will be furnished by the Haskell Field Office of the Soil Conservation Service. It is absolutely necessary that an SCS Technician review the damage and determine needs and feasibility prior to starting construction. If this needs and feasibility determination is not made first, it will be impossible for SCS to certify that damage or destruction was prevalent, and cost-share assistance will have to be disapproved.

It was also pointed out by Mr. Sprean that each producer is eligible to receive up to \$5,000 in cost-share assistance rather than the usual \$2,500 that has been the limit per producer in the past under the old ACP program or the REA Program.

The group of visiting officials did not commit themselves, but felt reasonably sure that Haskell County stood a very good chance of being approved for

funding under the emergency program. Therefore, let me urge you not, repeat NOT, start work on repairing the damage that your land received as a result of the June floods until you have contacted your local ASCS office, or your local SCS Technician first. Make sure that you have been certified to receive funds first, then be sure that the SCS Technicians have an opportunity to check out your request prior to starting work. We will at that time be in a position to determine what kind of and how much assistance you will be entitled to receive.

Both ASCS and SCS will be busy and working under a tight schedule, but every effort will be made to service your requests in a timely manner.

Long-range land use planning the subject of a day-long conference to be held in Abilene August 7.

City planners, state and local officials, conservationists, and others interested in sound land use are being urged to attend. J. C. Yearly, Jim Boykin, and R. V. Earles, local conservation officials from Haskell are scheduled to attend this conference.

The conference is co-sponsored by the Texas Council of the Soil Conservation Society of America and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The meeting will be held in the McGlothlin Student Center on the campus of Abilene Christian College from 9:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m.

Speakers will include Congressman Omar Bureson; Land

Commissioner Bob Armstrong; Emil Rasmann, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce; A. B. Linford, president of the Soil Conservation Society of America; Doyle Hutcheson, president of the Texas Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts; and other officials.

Paul Larson of Abilene, president of the Texas Council of the Soil Conservation Society of America, will preside over the morning session. Bob Scott of Fort Worth, chairman of the Water Conservation Task Force, West Texas Chamber of Commerce, will preside in the afternoon.

Massive urban and industrial growth, coupled with shrinking land resources, is causing many concerned citizens to debate the feasibility of controlling the use of land at some time in the future. ers, livestock producers, county and city government officials—are scheduled to discuss the advantages and disadvantages of land use planning from their viewpoints.

SS Statistics For Haskell Co.

Social Security benefits were being paid to residents of Haskell County at a rate of \$207,000 a month at the close of 1972, R. R. Tuley Jr., social security manager in Abilene said today.

Of the social security beneficiaries living in Haskell County, 1,233 are retired workers and their dependents. Another 394 are receiving benefits as the survivors of workers who have died, and 147 are getting benefits as disabled workers or their dependents.

Tuley pointed out that although most social security beneficiaries in the Abilene district are older people, about two out of every 11 are under age 60. In Haskell County, 262 people under age 60 are collecting social security payments each month. Nearly 132 are under age 18, receiving payments because a working father or mother has died or is getting social security disability or retirement benefits. Most of the thirty beneficiaries in Haskell

County between 18 and 24 years of age, are receiving benefits under the social security program. The continuing benefits beyond the child and up to age 18.

Also in this district, Tuley said, are types of beneficiaries that the broad-based social security program provides for. Some are children who became disabled, or some who became disabled after they reached age 18, probably never to work and become dependent on the state. The monthly benefits payable to the disabled are paid in the mother's name. Tuley said that a small group of youthful beneficiaries are receiving benefits as disabled workers.
