The Honey Grove Warriors are next on the Rebels list as Rivercrest travels there on Friday for games beginning at 4 p.m.





school children is often a frustrating experience-they do not think like an adult and so do not talk like an adult. For a long time children do not

have enough words at their command to express feelings adequately, even if they could express them as you would. So they use actions to replace words. Two-three or four year olds may deliberately do something forbidden, not so much because they want to be bad but because they want to see if you still mean what you said yesterday (or an hour ago). To react with "How many times must I tell you-" is to ask a self-defeating question. It is better to assure children that you do stil mean it, for this is reassurance to them that the limits are still there to protect them.

The three to five year olds can begin to learn to talk about their feelings instead of acting them out. You can help by talking about your own So you might say: "I am very angry

The Middle Years From the time children enter school until the onset of adolescence, their lives are much more relaxed than during the preschool or teen years. It is easy then for parents to sit back and enjoy the relative calm between two storms. But this is really the last opportunity to build a close personal relationship with your children before they start breaking away to adulthood and it

During this time children learn both independence and dependence. At the same time that they acquire the ability to do more things for themselves they are also learning when they can count on security and guidance from their parents.

Receiving praise for their accomplishments helps children to see themselves as worthy individuals. LThey will begin to form an opinion of themselves that reflects the opinion yoadvantage of an adult perspective on the situation. The rapid physical changes-both internal and externaltaking place in teenagers cause them to react emotionally to everything that happens. They be jubilant one minute and deeply depressed the next. The problems may seem insignificant to you, but they are very real to teenagers.



The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guide-

lines, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diptheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diptheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/ diptheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.




