Mr. Hall has served as County Attorney since January 1, 1989 and states that he is very proud of his record since taking office. Although the State allows Red River County to send only 2 prisoners per month to the penitentiary, an average of 3.5 prisoners per month has been sent to the penitentiary since he has been in office. He has sent 130 criminals to the penitentiary, 33 of them for selling or possession illegal drugs. Ninety percent of those going to the penitentiary for selling drugs have received sentences of 10 years or more with a high of 40 years. Over \$159,000 in restitution has been ordered paid to victims of crime to compensate for their losses. Hot check collections for merchants and individuals has increased by 50% since he took office, he states.

Mr. Hall was born and raised in Lampasas, TX. He and his wife, Karen, a third grade teacher in the Clarksville school system, moved to Clarksville in 1977. "I was born and raised in a small town and I love small town life. You can have the rat race of big city life." Mr. Hall graduated from Tarleton State University in Stephenville, TX where he received a Bachelor of Arts degree. He went to law school at St. Mary's School of Law in San Antonio where he received a Doctor of Jurisprudence

She got the recipe from her daughter, Patty, and has used it for years. The Pumpkin Bread recipe has been a favorite for a number of years also. She got it when she was working at Sears. The Millionaire Pie is very good and rich, and will serve eight people instead of the original six. The Copper Pennies recipe is a dish that will keep several days and can take the place of salad. Helen got this recipe from her sister, Allene Chandler from Legate, about two years

Copper Pennies 2 lbs. carrots, sliced, cooked firm, drained 1 large onion, sliced

1 large Bell pepper, sliced Place onions and pepper over carrots in container.



GETTING A TAX DEDUCTION FOR BAD DEBTS

ough economic times and restrictive bank lending practices have made loans, between individuals, more common. If you are considering making a loan, these tips on documenting personal debts can help preserve a tax deduction in the event the loan can't be repaid.

First, you need to clearly identify whether the loan is for personal or business purposes. Generally, business bad debts arise directly from the lender's business activity and are deductible as a normal cost of doing business. Personal bad debts (also called nonbusiness bad debts) are deductible as short-term capital losses. The losses are first used to offset up to \$3,000 per year of salary and other

Next, you need to document that you intend to be repaid and are not making a gift (especially when making loans to family members). A written agreement between the parties should be made, showing how much is owed, that a market interest rate is being charged, and that a definite due date has been set. Caution: loan guarantees made as a favor for a friend or relative don't qualify for a bad debt deduction. You must be able to provide a profit intent.

Finally, document your collection efforts. Nonbusiness bad debts are deductible only in the year that the debt becomes completely worthless. You must show that there is no chance of the loan being repaid and that you made reasonable efforts to collect the debt. Keep copies of letters you send demanding payment, and log the results of telephone calls you make. If the loan amount is substantial, using an attorney or collection agency will help prove that you made "reasonable" collection efforts.

Publication 4, Student's Guide to Federal Income Tax, gives students an overview of the tax system, a brief background of taxation and an explanation of withholding of income tax, types of income and expenses, and filing requirements for students.

Other topics include estimated tax, types of information and tax returns and filling out Form W-4, "Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate." Also included are filled-in samples of Form W-4 and Form 1040EZ, "Income Tax Return for Single Filers with No Dependents.

Rules explained in Publication 4 apply to students who are U.S. citizens and unmarried (single). Foreign students studying in the United States should see Publication 519, U.S. Tax Guide for Aliens.

Social Security Number for Dependents Age 1 or Older. If you can claim any person age 1 or older as a dependent, show that person's social security number on your tax return. If your dependent does not have a number, see your tax forms package for instructions.

More Benefit with the Earned Income Credit (EIC)-Use New Schedule EIC. You may be able to take this credit for 1991 if you earned less than \$21,250 and a child lived with you. But you must file new Schedule EIC with Form 1040 or Form 1040A to do so. Read the instructions in the tax package to see if you can take this

Increased Deduction for Exemptions. The deduction for each exemption-for you, your spouse, and dependents-is \$2,150 for 1991. But your deduction may be limited if your adjusted gross income is more than \$75,000. See further information in your tax package.

Limit on Itemized Deductions. If your adjusted gross income is more than \$100,000 (\$50,000 if married filing separately), you may not be able to deduct all of your itemized deductions. Read the Schedule A instructions in your tax forms package. Also, personal interest (such as interest you paid on car loans and credit card balances) is no longer deductible.

Maximum Tax Rate of 28 percent on Capital Gains. If you have a net capital gain, your tax may be less if you can use the tax computation on Schedule D (Form 1040) to figure your tax. See Part IV of Schedule D to see if this applies to you.

Alternative Minimum Tax Increased. The tax rate for individuals has increased to 24 percent.

Standard Deduction Increased. Because of the increase, it may be to your benefit to take the standard deduction this year even though you itemized deductions in the past. Use the Standard Deduction Chart in your tax package to figure the correct
