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Talco-Bogata CISD Board Tends To Numerous Matters

The Board of Trustees for the Talco-Bogata CISD met in regular session at their monthly meeting on February 6. The board approved the minutes of previous meetings, elected to pay the bills as presented and granted three budget changes. The tax report was presented as well as adjustments to the current tax roll in the amount of minus \$250.00.

The Board elected to participate in the TASB Assistance Fund. A conflict with the school calendar and the district U.I.L. Spring Meet for Elementary and Junior High was discussed. If the meet is scheduled for April 9-10 the board gave approval to move the scheduled bad weather day on April 10 to Monday, May 4.

The Board discussed the failure of the Red River Appraisal Board to place a member on the Review Board representing the Titus County portion of the Talco-Bogata CISD and approved a letter from the Board of the School District to be sent to the Appraisal Board stating the school boards disapproval of this oversight.

The Board approved the use of the Rivercrest gym for a fund raising donkey basketball game sponsored by D-Fy-It.

The Superintendent updated the Board on the search for a new head coach and the time line and procedure for filling the position. Tentative completion was set for the second week in March.

The Superintendent presented an organizational plan for administering the athletic program. The plan would make the High School Principal the Athletic Director and allow the principal to select an athletic coordinator to assist him in administering the program. In the plan each head coach would be responsible for their program and staff during season. A report on the status of the baseball field was presented.

The Superintendent made public the number of board training hours for the current board. The law requires each board member to gain twenty hours of training during the first year of service and six hours training each year thereafter.

High School Principal Ray Miller gave a report on information collected from members of the previous year graduates at a reception for them on January 10.

In personnel action, the Board elected not to extend the superintendent's contract and instead will act on it in its final year. High School Principal Ray Miller's contract was in its final year, and he was rehired with a two year contract and a \$1,200 per year raise. The Board chose to postpone action in extending the contracts of Ben Tyler and Jimmy Lee, elementary school principals, until their contracts are in their final year. They were granted salary increases in the amount of \$1,100.

The Board accepted the resignation of Marilyn Garretson for the remainder of the 1991-92 year.

The next regular scheduled board meeting is March 5 at 7 p.m. at Rivercrest High School.

Rivercrest Debate Team Advances To State UIL Meet

Rivercrest High School's debate team, Russell Dodd and Mary Childres, placed second in the 17AA District Meet held Wednesday, Feb. 5, at PJC. This is the first debate team Rivercrest has had in 20 years.

In a grueling four hour marathon of debating, the Rivercrest team easily defeated Chisum and Leonard in the two preliminary rounds. In the semi-final round, Dodd and Childres took a unanimous three judge decision over one of two Cooper teams. In the final round, Rivercrest narrowly lost in a split decision to Cooper's other team. Despite their loss in the final round, Dodd and Childres outscored Cooper's winning team in speaker points 97 to 91.

Dodd and Childres will represent Rivercrest High School at the State UIL Debate Contest in Austin on March 16 and 17. Debate coach, Don Stockton, stated that "We feel confident going into the State Meet. This is the first year for either of these students to participate in debate. They have come a long way in a short period of time. It usually takes a good debate team 3 to 4 years to accomplish what they've done in one year." Stockton contributes this success to Russell's and Mary's natural speaking abilities combined with their hard

work and determination to win. He stated that "he felt very privileged to have the opportunity to work with students as dedicated and talented as Russell and Mary."

The UIL was originally started in 1910 as a debate league. Through the years, the UIL has continued to expand to include numerous academic and athletic events. The Texas UIL debate program is considered one of the better programs in the U.S.

According to Dr. Baily Marshall, UIL director, "Numerous successful professionals across the State of Texas attribute much of their success to the higher level of critical thinking skills and poise developed during their participation in UIL debate. We know virtually all of these participants will be successful in school and in the professions they choose."

Participating at the State Meet, students qualify for the Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. During 1991-92, the TILF will award more than \$660,000 in scholarship grants to 543 college students who compete at the UIL State Academic Meet. The TILF funds are made possible through grants from foundations, individuals and families. The TILF has over \$2,000,000 in endowed funds.

Phase II Of Thomas Park Nearing Goal

Phase II of the Thomas Park Fund Raising Project is now near completion and puts the project at approximately 40 % complete.

The project was kicked off last October with the Fund Raising Committee given the challenge of raising \$45,000 (\$10,000 in cash and \$35,000 in donated labor). When this has been done the state will add

\$45,000 to finish the \$90,000 project.

After five months of diligent work and campaigning \$8,870.56 has been raised in cash and numerous hours of donated labor have been put into the project.

Phase III will be put into motion soon and will consist of concrete areas being completed, bathrooms built, a

tennis court, fences and more. A pavillion has been bought and is scheduled to arrive around April first. Volunteers will assemble the structure.

After the project is completed (last of September or first of October, it is hoped) plans are to have Lady Bird Johnson as part of the dedication ceremony, as well as other dignitaries.

The Bogata Lions Club met in regular session Thursday, February 6 at 7 p.m. with President Terry Bell calling the meeting to order with 20 members and one guest present.

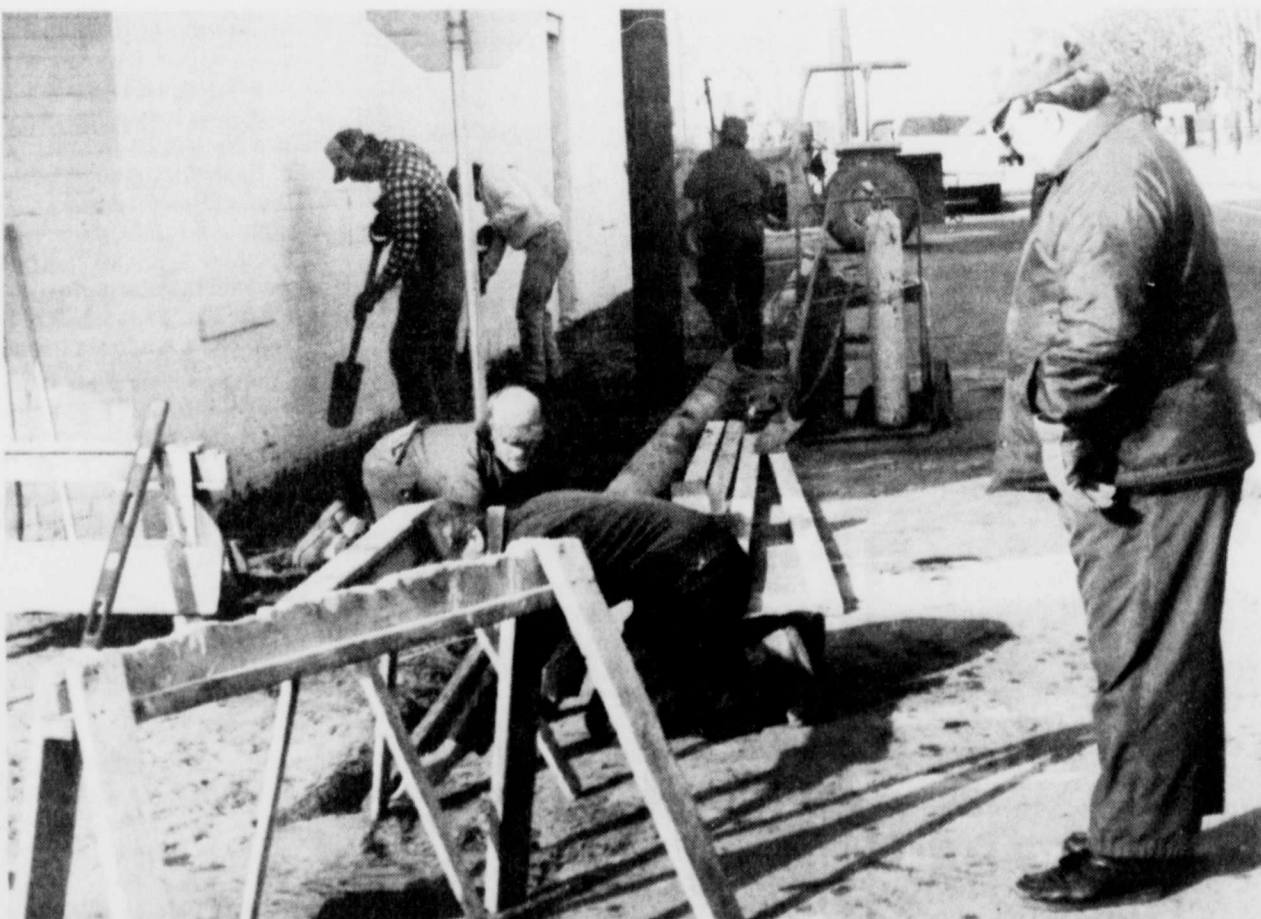

Cheesy Charlies

1 pkg. hamburger buns
2 cans tuna (6 or 7 oz.)
1/4 cup pickle relish
1 cup grated cheese
2 T chopped onions
1/2 cup Miracle Whip whole olives
Drain and flake tuna, add relish, 1/2 cheese, onion and Miracle Whip. Spread on hamburger buns and place on cookie sheet tuna side up. Place olives on top and top with rest of grated cheese. Broil until brown, serve warm.

Blueberry Muffins

1 egg
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup oil or melted shortening
1 1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup sugar
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1 can blueberries
Beat egg with fork. Stir in milk and oil. Blend dry ingredients. Stir in til flour is just moistened. Add blueberries. Batter should be lumpy. Do not over-mix. Fill muffin cups 2/3 full. Cups need to be greased or use paper liners. Bake at 400 for 20-25 minutes or until golden brown. Serve warm. Makes 12 medium muffins.

Beef Casserole

1 lb. ground meat, browned & drained
1 can spanish rish
1 can ranch style beans, drained
1/2 cup grated cheese
Brown meat and drain, add rice, beans and cheese. Put in casserole dish, top with grated cheese and bake at 350 until cheese melts.

Pineapple Cake

Yellow cake mix, baked as directed on box. Bake in 9x13 pan.
Reserve one cup uncooked cake batter, set aside.
Mix:
1 1/2 cup sugar
1 stick oleo
1 15 oz. can crushed pineapple
1 tsp. vanilla
Bring to a boil, then add the cup of uncooked batter. Cook until thick. Spread over warm cake.

Mama's Banana Pudding

3 cups evaporated milk
1 1/2 cup sugar
3 eggs
5 T flour, in sugar
1 or 2 T butter
vanilla
Cook until thick, then layer vanilla wafers and bananas with pudding in casserole dish.

Salsa

2 chopped fresh tomatoes
1 chopped onion
1 small can chopped green chilies
1 small can chopped ripe olives
3 T oil
1 1/2 tsp. vinegar
1 tsp. garlic salt
Mix and set in refrigerator for about 2 hours before serving. Good with Mexican food.

Barbecue Country Style Ribs or Pork Chops

5 or 6 country style ribs or 5 or 6 pork chops
1 sliced onion
about 5 peeled and sliced potatoes
Put in 9x13 pan. Cook about 20 minutes at 350. Drain meat and add potatoes and onion, pour barbecue sauce over meat and potatoes. Cover with foil and bake until meat is tender and potatoes are done.

Squash Dressing

2 cups yellow squash, boiled
1 small onion, in squash
1 can cream of mushroom soup
dash sage
1 pkg. cornbread mix, baked
grated cheese, approx. 1/2 cup
Crumble cornbread in casserole dish, add squash, soup and sage, stir well. Sprinkle cheese on top. Bake at 350 until brown.

Cabbage Stir Fry

1 1/2 lbs. ground meat
1 small chopped onion
1 small head cabbage, chopped
1 can Rotel tomatoes
1 small can chopped green chilies
1 pkg. brown ground meat and drain. Add cabbage to meat, along with onion. Cook until tender. Add rotel tomatoes and green chilies. Heat thoroughly, then serve.

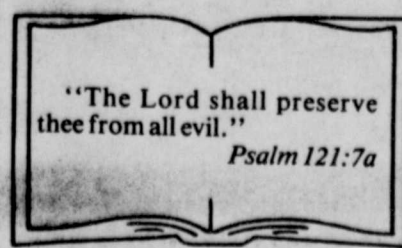
Bob Crawford Dies February 10

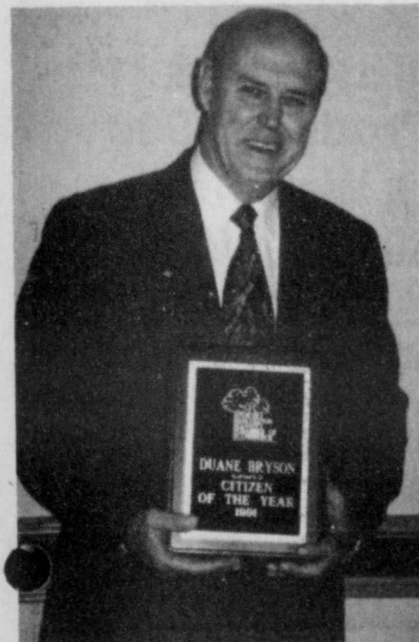

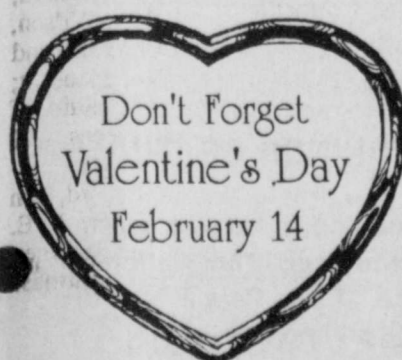

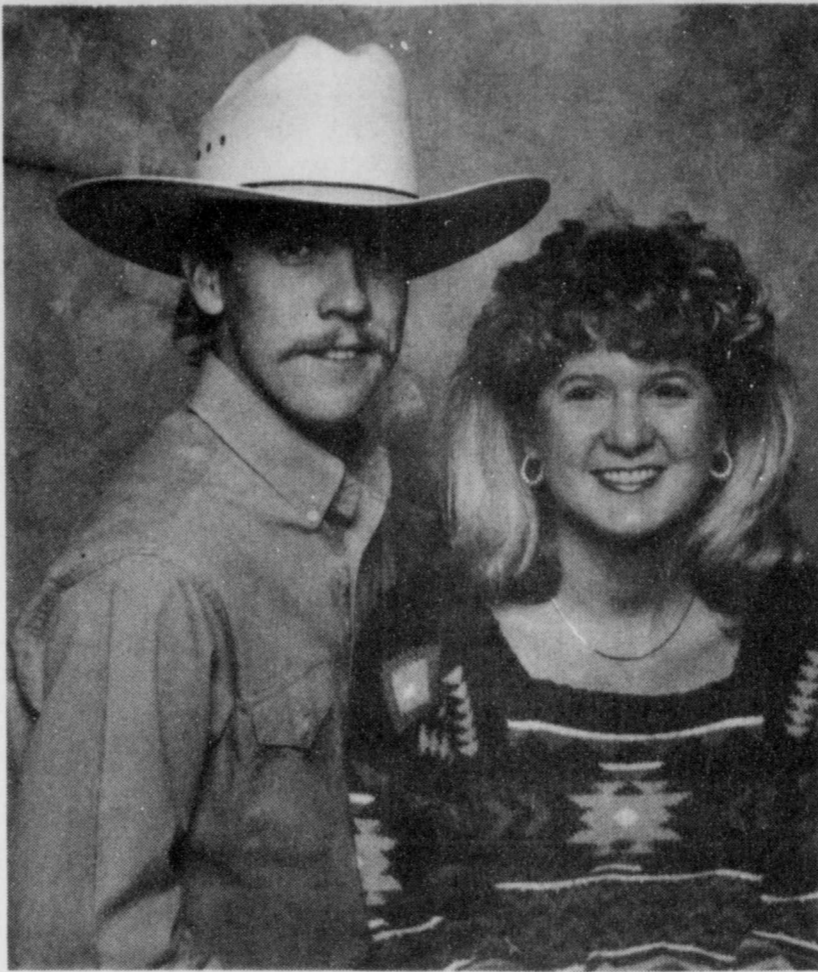

D-Fy-It Meeting Held At RHS

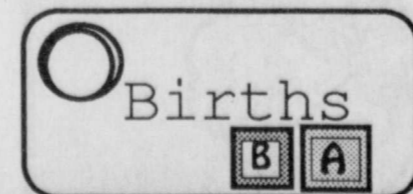

Three point shots and rebounding

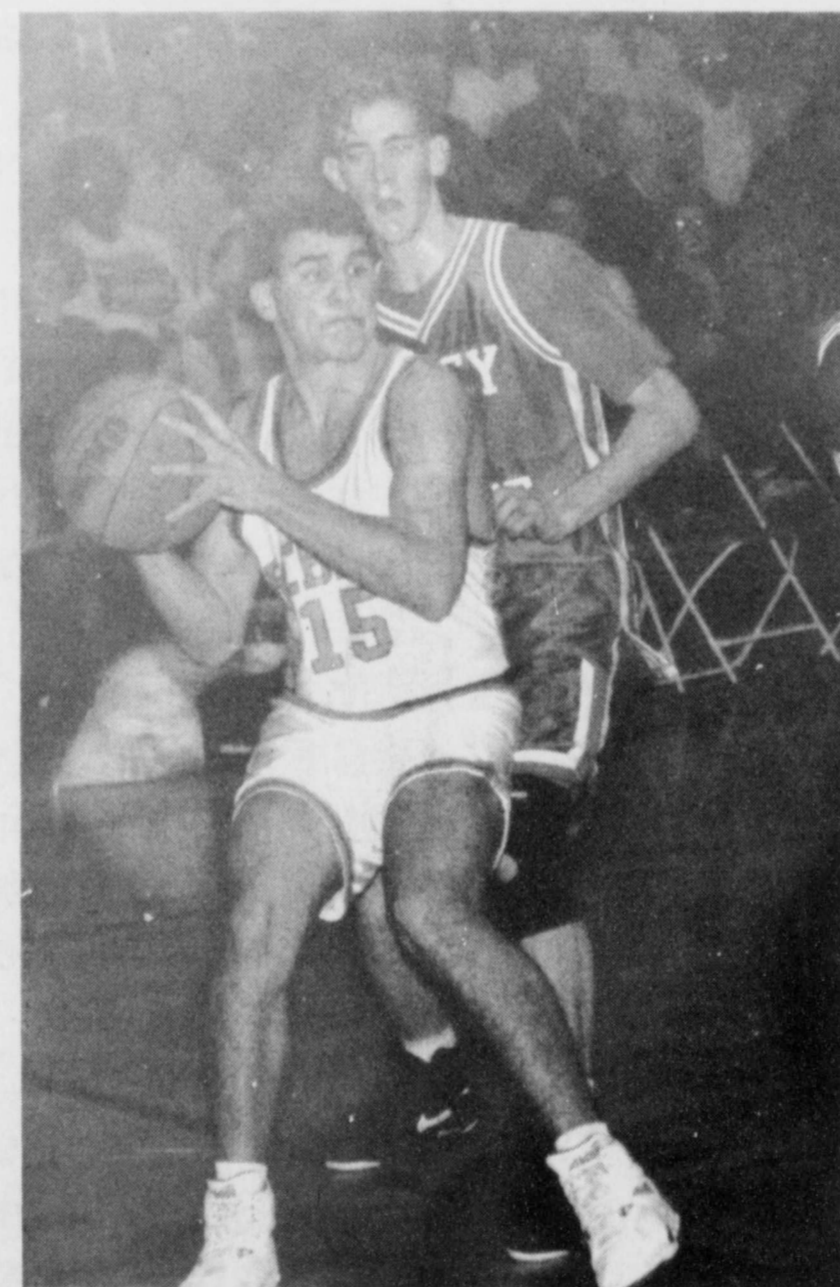
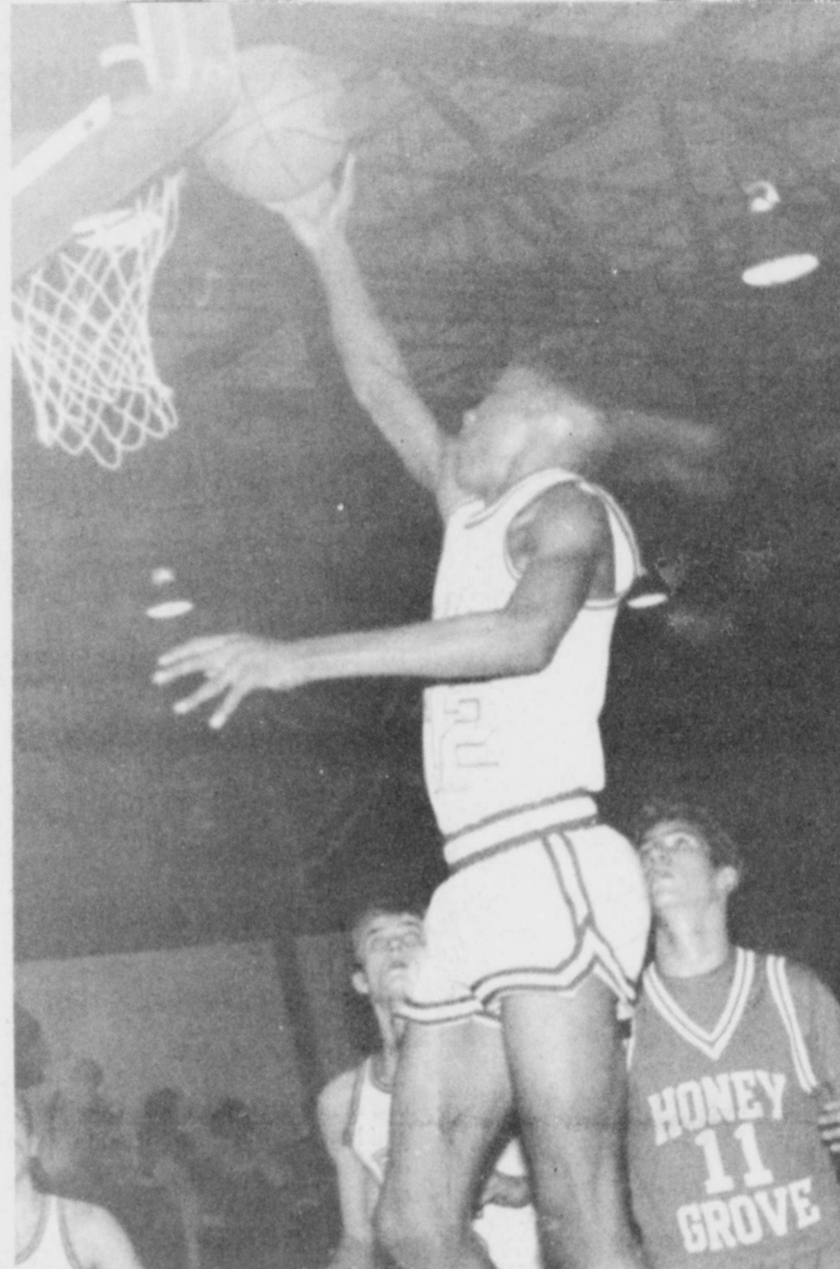

TAX TIPS

NEW ESTIMATED TAX RULES FOR

On November 15, 1991, President Bush signed a law extending unemployment benefits.

The extension of benefits will be paid for by accelerating the estimated tax payments of certain upper-income taxpayers. The new rules apply for 1992 estimated tax payments.

In the past, taxpayers could avoid penalties for underpaying estimated taxes as long as they made current year payments at least equal to their prior year's tax liability. The new law limits the use of this safe harbor. Starting this year, prepaying 100% of last year's tax liability will no longer be adequate if:

*your 1992 adjusted gross income is more than \$75,000 (\$37,500 if married, filing separately), and

*your adjusted gross income for 1992 exceeds your 1991 income by more than \$40,000 (\$20,000 if married, filing separately) and

*you made estimated tax payments in any of the three prior years or were assessed a penalty for failing to pay estimated taxes.

If you fall into this category, your 1992 estimated tax payments must equal at least 90% of your 1992 tax liability. You are allowed to base your first quarterly estimated tax payment for 1992 (due April 15, 1992) on one-fourth of your 1991 tax liability. However, you'll have to make up any shortfall with your June 15 payment.

There are some exceptions to the new rules. If the increase in your adjusted gross income is from a home sale, an involuntary conversion, or a minor ownership interest in an S corporation or a limited partnership, the new rule can be avoided.

The bottom line is that if the new rules apply to you, you may have to do more calculating to determine the amount of each quarter's estimate. Failure to do so can subject you to significant penalties.

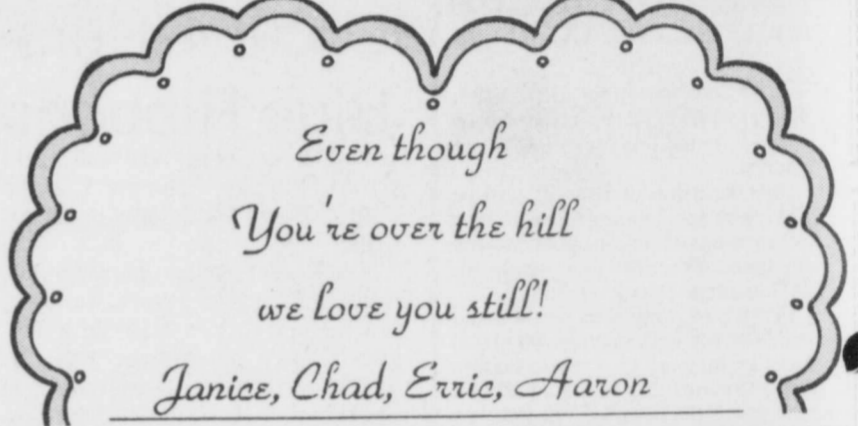

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

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
