Gunman Robs Peoples National Thursday

The quiet of a summer noon was shattered last Thursday, August 13, as Peoples National Bank in Bogata was the victim of a daylight robbery.

At 12:20 p.m. a lone gunman escaped with \$6,866, according to Red River County Sheriff Bob Storey.

The gunman, masked in a red ski mask, entered the bank during midday and instructed the two tellers working to put their money in a bag.

The tellers complied, and the gunman then drove away.

Chief Red River County Deputy Carl Motley stated that the man was

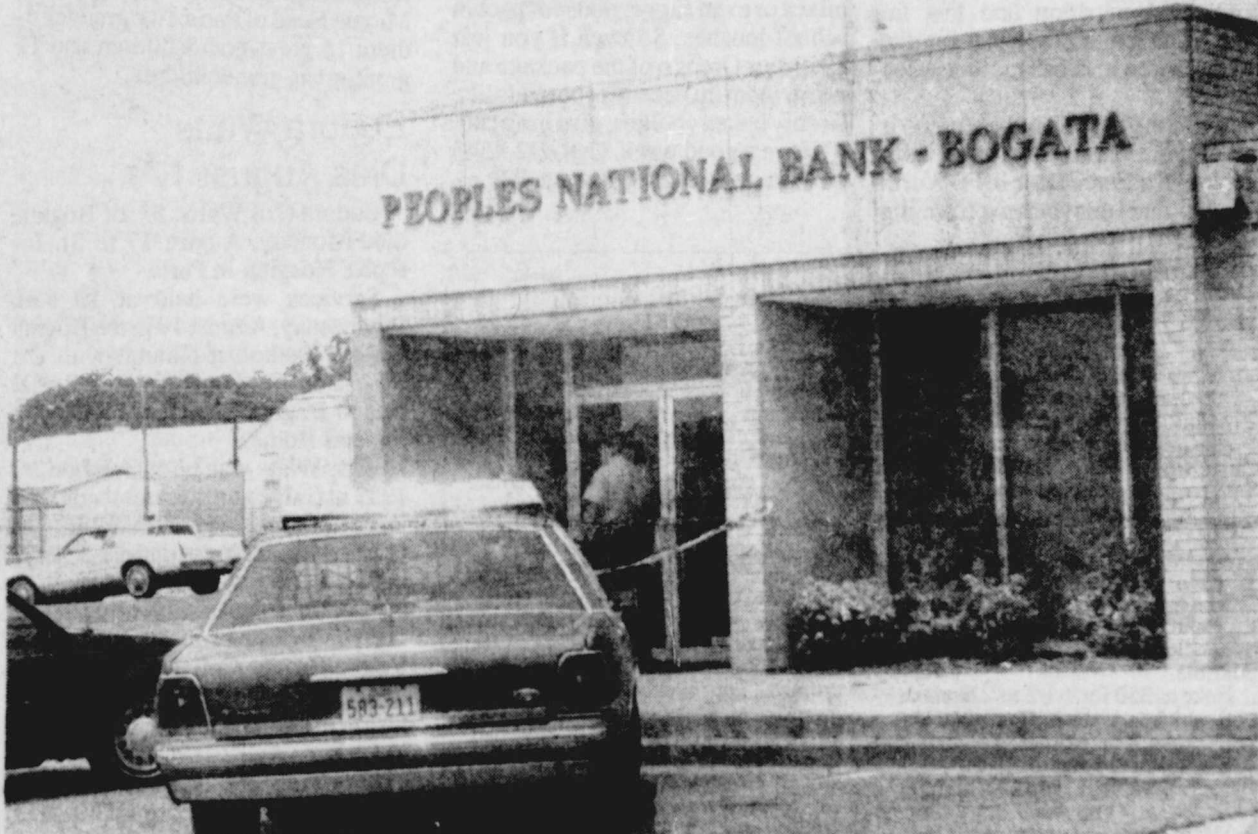
armed with a revolver, carried a white shopping bag and was described by the two tellers on duty as of stocky build and wearing gloves and keeping any portion of his body from being exposed. Tellers judged he is a white male from the sound of his voice, however.

Later that same afternoon a 1986 Mercury Cougar believed used in the robbery was discovered abandoned on a dirt road three miles east of Jowntown. Law enforcement officers from all over the area had been patrolling both major and back roads

since the robbery occurred.

The car was reported stolen from the Mt. Pleasant area about 4:00 p.m. that afternoon. It was towed away and impounded and scrutinized by county officials and the Texas Rangers.

According to Sheriff Storey his department is working with members of the Texas Rangers and the F.B.I. and they are following "some strong leads" and he predicts the guilty party, or parties involved in the robbery will be apprehended.

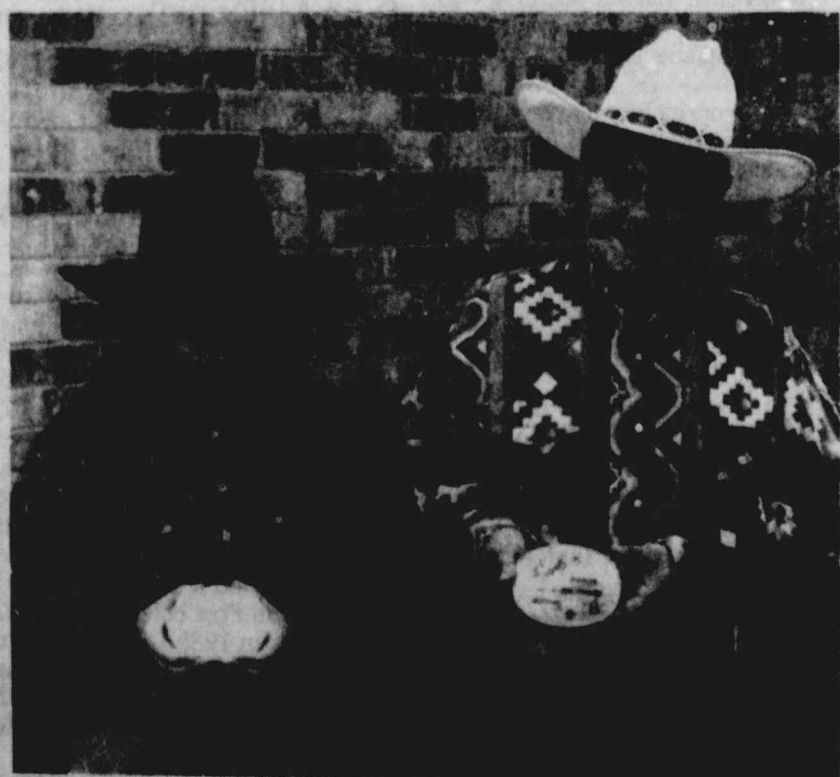
FIRST DAY-young Morgan Meredith seems well prepared for her first day of school at

It's rare for me to run across anyone who has anything I covet. As a rule if I feel any envy, it's for a talent or an ability someone has. I'm not very materialistic. This does not mean I dislike money, I'm just not that easy to impress. I visited with Sandy Moreno and I felt envy.

Sandy and Feliz Moreno have their permanent home in Bogata. Feliz retired from the military in 1990 after 30 years of service, including a tour of Viet Nam. Sandy sells Avon products and works at The House of Flowers during rush times. Feliz works for American Protective Services in Dallas and they have three children. Their daughter, Edie Tidwell, husband Clay and daughter Stephanie live in Detroit. Edie bakes and decorates cakes for the public and Clay works for Southwest Trucking. Ro-Tel Chicken
By Sandy Moreno

2 1/2 to 3 lb. fryer or 6 chicken breasts
1 can Cream of Mushroom soup
1 can Ro-Tel Tomatoes, chopped
Salt, pepper, garlic powder and Season-all to your taste

Cut fryer as you would for frying. Season with above seasonings. Place in a baking dish.

In a small bowl, mix Ro-Tel tomatoes and mushroom soup, then pour over chicken, spreading as evenly as possible.

Bake at 350 for 1 1/2 to 2 hours or until chicken is done. Baste chicken with sauce 2 or 3 times. Serve over rice or mashed potatoes.

Magic Cookie Bars

1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs
1-14 oz. can Eagle Brand Milk (not evaporated)
1-6 oz. pkg. Semi-Sweet Chocolate Chips
1 1/3 cups flaked coconut
1 cup chopped pecans

Preheat oven to 350. In a 9x13 baking pan, melt margarine in oven. Sprinkle crumbs over margarine, mix together and press into pan. Pour sweetened condensed milk evenly over crumbs. Top evenly with remaining ingredients, press down firmly. Bake 25-30 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool thoroughly before cutting. Store loosely covered at room temperature.

Dirty Rice

Fry in same pan and drain:
1 lb. hot sausage
1 lb. ground meat.

Other ingredients:
2 boxes Uncle Ben's Long Grain & Wild Rice
1 can Cream of Chicken Soup plus 1/3 can water
1 can French Onion soup
1 tablespoon cayenne pepper
1 tablespoon black pepper
1 tablespoon salt
1 chopped onion (if desired)

In large mixing bowl, mix rice together with soups and all spices, add onion. Let set for several minutes. Add cooked meat, mix well. Pour into a 9x13 baking dish (cover with foil). Bake at 350 until rice is tender. Take out and stir 2 or 3 times while baking.
(Note: Very hot. Can use less cayenne pepper.)

Chocolate Sheath Cake

2 cups flour
2 cups sugar
1 stick margarine
3 1/2 tablespoons cocoa
1 cup water
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup buttermilk
1 teaspoon soda

Mix flour and sugar in a large bowl. Put margarine, cocoa and water in a sauce pan and just bring to a boil.

Mix flour and sugar mixture and cocoa mixture together. Add remaining mixture and mix well. Pour into greased and floured sheet pan. Bake for 20 minutes at 400.

Frosting:
start 5 minutes before cake is done.
1 stick margarine
3 1/2 tablespoons cocoa
1/2 cup milk
1 box powdered sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup chopped pecans

Put margarine, cocoa and milk in double boiler. Bring to boil. Remove from heat, add remaining ingredients. Beat well. Pour over hot cake.

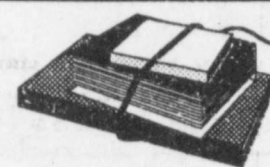

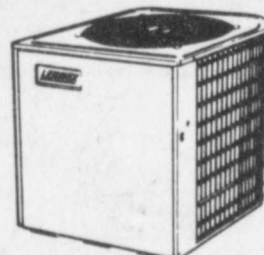

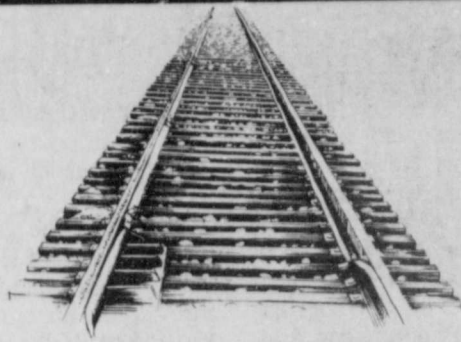

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Life In American Samoa

Editor's Note: We requested Bogata native Lori Robertson send us information on life in Samoa, since she, Johnny, Chay and Micah have been living there. Lori has happily sent the following information. They have just moved from Samoa to the Marshall Islands and perhaps later she will send us something on life there. Different lifestyles are always fascinating, and we really appreciate Lori taking the time to send the story, in addition to the Samoa newspapers, which are also very interesting.

Samoa lies about 2,300 miles SSW of Honolulu. The territory of American Samoa is comprised of seven tropical islands and is the only American soil below the equator. The capitol of American Samoa is Pago Pago, located in Tutuila, the main island of the group. Tutuila has a land area of 57 square miles. The total land area of all seven islands is just 77 square miles.

Exactly when the first Polynesian settled in what is now American Samoa will probably never be accurately determined, but most archeologists fix the date around 600 B.C. By 1900 the Samoan Islands were being claimed by both Germany and the United States. Germany annexed several islands which now comprise Western Samoa; the U.S. took Tutuila to use Pago Pago Bay as a coal station for naval ships.

By 1940, the Samoan Islands had become a training and staging area for the U.S. Marine Corps. It was this massive influx of Americans that, for better or worse, gave Samoans a sudden taste of the benefits of a modern western society.

Today, American Samoa is an unincorporated territory of the United States administered by the Department of the Interior. Its people are classified as American nationals. The executive branch of the government is headed by an elected governor and lieutenant governor. American Samoa's Fono, the legislature, is bicameral, with senators chosen by county councils according to Samoan custom and the representatives elected by popular vote. The judicial branch consists of the High Court, the District Court and Village Courts. The head of the judiciary, the Chief Justice, is appointed by the Secretary of the Interior.

American Samoa's climate is typically tropical, with temperatures seldom exceeding the mid-80's. Nights are balmy and cooling tradewinds blow almost constantly. As in most tropical areas, there are frequent heavy rains but, even during the so called rainy season (December-March), there are extended periods of bright sunshine on a daily basis. Generally speaking the weather is sunnier from June through September. Hurricanes are the tropical storms of Samoa with the most recent one hitting the island in December 1991.

More than half of the American Samoan population is under 16 years of age. The public education system consists of 23 elementary and seven public high schools. There are also seven private schools, two private high schools and five private elementary schools. In addition, American Samoa has a public, two-year community college that offers vocational, business, clerical and nursing curricula.

The American Samoa labor force totals approximately 10,000 workers and represents about 30% of the total population. The largest employer in American Samoa is the government. The next largest employers are the two tuna canneries: Van Camp Seafood Company and Star Kist Tuna Company-Samoa. Together they employ 20% of the work force.

In American Samoa, United States currency is legal tender. Also, U.S. postage rates and stamps are used. Health care is provided by the government at the LBJ Tropical Medical Center. There are no exotic tropical diseases or serious health problems involving infectious diseases.

Telephone communications are not as sophisticated or efficient as U.S. mainland systems. Long distance calls to Honolulu cost about \$2 per minute. Publications include the Samoa Journal and the Samoa News. There is a Samoan and English radio station and a public television station. Three channels of television viewing are available during evening hours until 12 midnight. Although, now there are just two channels because the third channel has not been repaired since Hurricane Val, December 1991.

In addition to U.S. national holidays, there are four other special celebration days in American Samoa.

Flag Day-April 17 is the day set aside to commemorate the first raising of the American flag over the Eastern (American) Samoan Islands in 1900. In addition to the singing and dancing that is always a part of Samoan celebrations, there are fautasi long-boat races and traditional competitions such as fire making, coconut husking, spear throwing and basket weaving.

White Sunday-the second Sunday in October, is a "Children's Day".

The Swarm of the Palolo-Each year in October and November, when the moon and the tide are just right, a sea annelid called the palolo emerges from the reef to begin its annual reproductive cycle. Samoans, who consider the palolo a great delicacy, turn out in force with nets and cheese cloth to scoop up the caviar of the Pacific, often eating the creatures raw, straight from the water.

Christmas Week-A Christmas program is celebrated in American Samoa the week before Christmas, with the festivities lasting the entire week.

Fa'a Samoa is an expression often heard in American Samoa. It means "the Samoan way" and has kept

Samoans strongly nationalistic and very cautious about changes that might threaten the traditional structures of their way of life.

Status: Within the family and within the village, plays an important part in an intricate Samoan social system. The interaction of these two factors results in a good deal of jockeying for positions in village politics.

There exists unwritten laws which bind the members of the Samoan family to house, feed, clothe, assist, give money to, or go to battle for members of their aiga (family) which is the basic ingredient of Samoan life. And since Samoans do not assign the same importance to individual material wealth that Westerners do, the notion of using (vs. ownership) is basic to the Samoan way of life.

Today, Fa'a Samoa is undergoing rapid change. As American Samoa's contact with Western ways accelerates with increased travel and education and brings with it a greater desire for American standards of living, Fa'a Samoa will be sorely tested.

Samoan customs are very different from what we are used to in the States. I will mention some of the customs so you can see the difference.

There are no cemeteries in Samoa. The people bury the dead in their yards, front or sides. Along with the deaths, the Samoans conduct a ritual called a Fa'lavilavi, which is where family and friends bring gifts of fine mats; food; roasted, whole pigs; money; etc. The fa'lavilavi are also conducted for weddings and when some in the village is being appointed to a high position. When entering a Samoan house it is custom that you remove your shoes at the door. Also once inside, you sit on the floor with legs crossed Indian style. It is considered bad manners to stretch your legs out in front of you while sitting. Another custom is early each evening the Samoans have a ten minute humn and prayer service in every village. This is called "Sa" in Samoan language. If you are passing through a village during this time, you do not stop because it makes them angry. The last one I will mention is they tell you if you run over someone's pig, dog or child, you do not stop because they will stone you.

Visitors can come to American Samoa with a passport. No Visa is required. Visitors may have a bit of cultural shock when first arriving to the island because of such things as mentioned in the article, but, also the island is just now getting started on recycling and there is trash laying around. (This is also caused by the dogs that get up in the trash cans looking for food and then turn the cans over.)

Visitors will find a warm and gentle climate, a fertile land and abundant seas. Plus genuinely warm and friendly people.

Talco-Bogata Schools In Lunch/Breakfast Program

The Talco-Bogata School District takes part in the National School Lunch Program School Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day. Students in grades K-8 may buy lunch for \$1.20 per day or \$6.00 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades 9-12 may buy lunch for \$1.40 per day or \$7.00 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades K-8 may buy breakfast for 55¢ and high school students may buy breakfast for 65¢. Meals are also available free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFCD for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts in the Income Chart, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

To get free or reduced price meals for your children, you must complete an application and return it to the school.

How to Apply: If you now get food stamps or AFCD for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food

stamp or AFCD case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's personal use income and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFCD case number for all the children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing: Freddy Wade, Box 130, Bogata, Texas 75417 or calling 632-5205.

Reporting Changes: If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because they get food stamps or AFCD, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFCD or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children get free or reduced price meals.

Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFCD for your children, complete an application then.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, DC 20250.

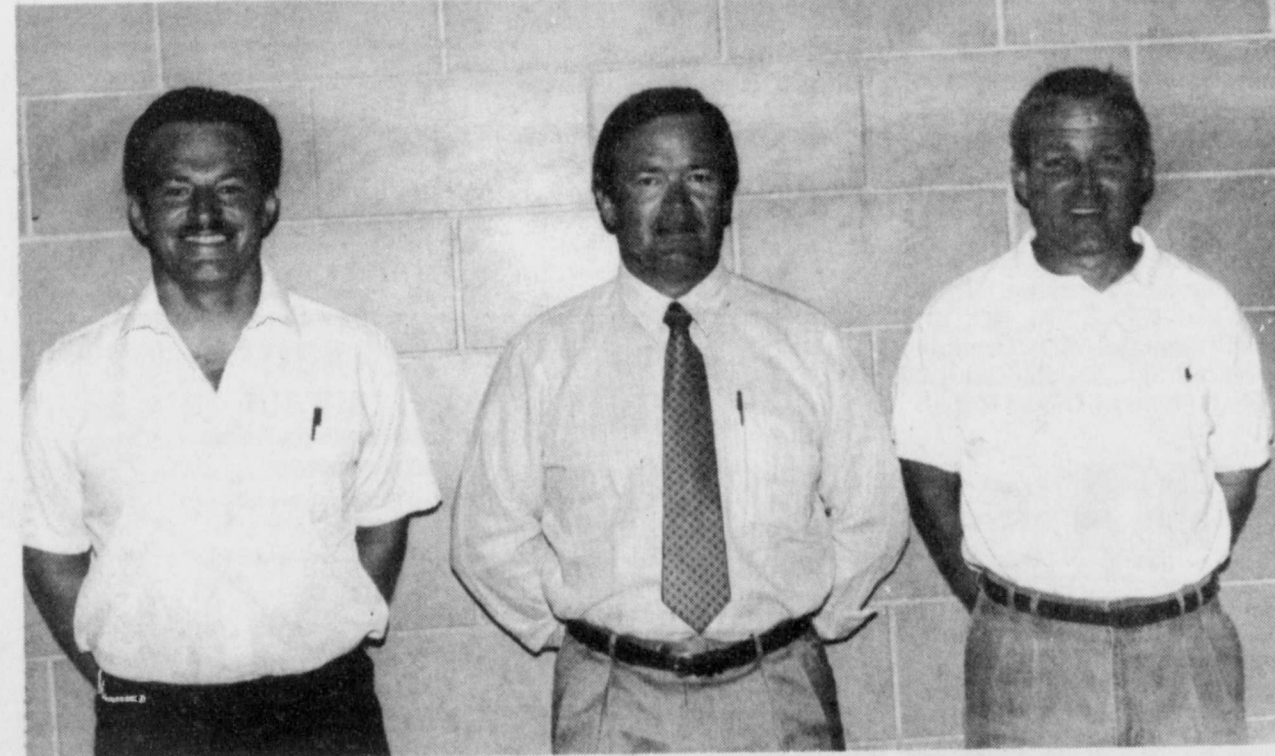

4-H is a growing educational program with 4-H clubs throughout the County. Any youngster who is interested in becoming a member, contact the County Extension office for more information.

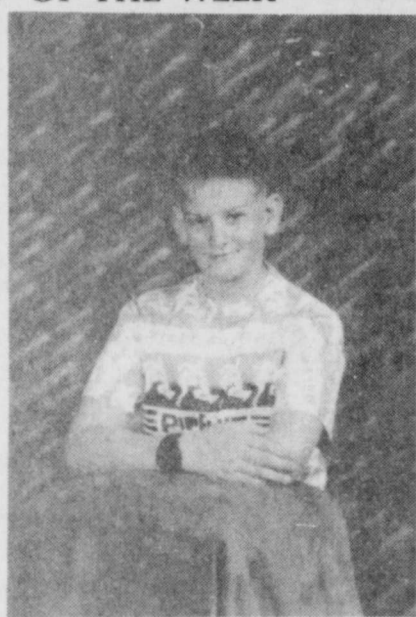
