Golden is currently serving as county Extension agent for Delta County in Cooper and will assume his new duties effective October 1.

A native of Ft. Towson, Oklahoma, Golden graduated from Ft. Towson High School and earned his Bachelor's degree in Animal Science from Oklahom State University at Stillwater. He is working on his Master's degree in agriculture at East Texas State University at Commerce.

The worst was over, right? Wrong!


I found myself liberally smeared with this gooey mess, nd decorated with a few dead ilies too! Oh , Yuck!

Hunter Education Course Will Be September 14-15-16

A course in hunter education is scheduled for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights, September 14-15-16 from 6-10 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture building at Mt. Vernon High School. Bruce Hunnicutt, local Vo Ag teacher will be the instructor.

The course is open to adults and young people under the age of 18 and will include insruction in hunter responsibility; wildlife conservation and management; firearm, bow, muzzle loading, handgun safety; wildlife identification; game care; survival and first aid; water safety

- Dash salt
- tbsp. flour
- 11/4 cups water
- egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 11/2 tbsp. butter
- cup lemon juice and rind from a whole lemon
- 1/2 pint red raspberries

Brush crust with one egg yolk and place crust on a cookie sheet. Bake for 5 minutes at 400°F. Remove from oven and allow to cool.

Mix sugar, cornstarch, salt and flour and slowly add the water, stirring constantly. Cook until boiling, then reduce heat and cook for 2 more minutes. Remove from heat and stir a small amount of the custard into the remaining egg yolks. Blend the egg yolk mixture with custard and return to low heat for about a minute. Remove from heat and stir in butter, lemon juice and rind. Pour into shell and cool.

Top pie with raspberries immediately before serving. Use mint leaves for additional color. Keebler Company

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
