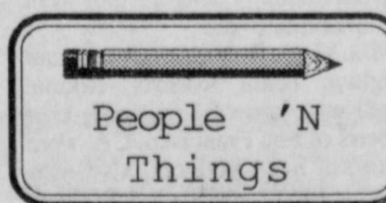
## Local Students Have Opportunity To Win A Trip To U.S. Capital

"Students win more than awards and scholarships when they participate in the VFW Voice of Democracy Scholarship Program" said Commander John English of VFW Post 8187 in discussing the broadcast scriptwriting program conducted annually by the Veterans of Foreign Wars and its Ladies Auxilliary.

Some of the fringe benefits, according to Commander English are increased self-confidence and poise, experience in communicating with others and valuable training in self expression. For the state winners, there is also the broadening experience of a five-day tour of Washington, D.C. and the opportunity to make lasting friendships with the other state winners.

In the 46 years that the VFW and its Ladies Auxilliary have been involved with the Voice of Democracy Program, more than 6,000,000 high school students have participated. Participants write and then tape-record a three-to-five minute broadcast script expressing their views on "My Voice In America's Future". From among the state winners, national winners are chosen to receive a total of over \$78,500 in scholarships.

"One of the greatest benefits to young people who take part in the program is that by thinking, writing and speaking up for their country, they gain a better appreciation of their obligation and freedom in America" says Commander John English.

## Red River County Gets New Extension Agent/Agriculture

Lynn Golden has been appointed County Extension Agent-Agriculture (Program Leader) in Red River County, according to a joint announcement by County Judge L.D. Williamson and Tony H. Douglas, District Extension Director for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The appointment was confirmed by the Red River County Commissioners Court in Clarksville on August 31, 1992. Golden is currently serving as county Extension agent for Delta County in Cooper and will assume his new duties effective October 1.

A native of Ft. Towson, Oklahoma, Golden graduated from Ft. Towson High School and earned his Bachelor's degree in Animal Science from

Oklahoma State University at Stillwater. He is working on his Master's degree in agriculture at East Texas State University at Commerce.

Golden began his work in 1984 as County Extension Agent/Agriculture (Assistant) in Red River County. Upon his return, he will work in all areas of agriculture, 4-H & youth, and community development; working closely with Extension staff members and committees, individuals and other groups in order to implement effective Extension programs.

## Hunter Education Course Will Be September 14-15-16

A course in hunter education is scheduled for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights, September 14-15-16 from 6-10 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture building at Mt. Vernon High School. Bruce Hunnicutt, local Vo Ag teacher will be the instructor.

The course is open to adults and young people under the age of 18 and will include instruction in hunter responsibility; wildlife conservation and management; firearm, bow, muzzle loading, handgun safety; wildlife identification; game care; survival and first aid; water safety

and hypothermia; and other special concerns in hunter safety.

Everyone over 12 that passes the examination with a minimum score of 70 at the conclusion of the course will receive a lifetime hunter education certificate that is recognized by Texas and other states. Those under 12 years of age must take the course over again for proper certification.

### Steak Bake

1 round steak (tenderized)  
1 can tomato sauce  
1 can water  
1/2 tsp. garlic powder  
1 tsp. oregano or Italian Herb seasoning  
flour  
cooking oil  
salt and pepper to taste

Cut and trim steak into serving portions; dip in flour and brown slightly in skillet in hot oil. Put in baking dish and set aside. In oil, add tomato sauce and water. Add garlic, salt, pepper and Italian seasoning. Bring to a boil; pour over meat in baking dish. Bake at 350 for one hour.

### Hamburger Pie

1-8 oz. can crescent rolls  
1 egg, beaten  
2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese  
1 lb. ground beef  
1-8 oz. can tomato sauce  
1/4 or 1/2 tsp. garlic powder  
Line a 9" pie plate with crescent rolls. Combine egg and 1 cup cheese. Spread across bottom and sides of pie plate. Brown ground beef; drain. Combine beef, tomato sauce and garlic powder. Pour into pie plate. Top with 1 cup cheese. Bake at 375 for 20-25 minutes.

### Layered Cornbread

1 pound ground beef  
1 can cream style corn  
1 can chopped green chilis, drained  
1 1/2 cups grated cheese  
2 packages cornbread mix, mixed as directed

Brown ground beef, season to taste. In another skillet, layer 1/2 of prepared cornbread. Then add ground beef, creamed corn, chilis, then cheese. Add remaining cornbread mix. Bake at 350 for 30 minutes or until brown.

### Favorite Cookies

2 cups brown sugar  
2 cups white sugar  
2 cups butter  
4 eggs  
1 tsp. salt  
2 tsp. baking powder  
2 tsp. soda  
2 tsp. vanilla  
4 cups flour  
5 cups oatmeal (quick)  
1 1/2 cups nuts  
chocolate chips  
Cream together sugars and butter until well blended. Mix in beaten eggs with salt, baking powder, soda and vanilla. Stir in flour 1 cup at a time. Add oatmeal, nuts and chocolate chips. Mold into golfball size balls. Press balls slightly onto baking sheet. Bake at 375 for 6-8 minutes. May need to add slightly more flour.

**Classes Offered At PJC**

Investments, defensive driving and backpacking are among the Continuing Education classes that will be offered at Paris Junior College during the next two weeks.

Registration for these courses and others to be offered later in the year is available at the PJC Department of Continuing Education located in the Alford Center on campus.

A driver's education course will begin September 8 and is approved by the Texas Department of Public Safety and is open to students at least 15 years of age. A birth certificate and social security number must be provided. Fee for the three week course is \$165 and classes will be taught from 4 to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday.

A course in defensive driving will be taught on September 12. This eight hour course is offered in accordance with the standards established by the National Safety Council, Defensive Driving Course, Texas Safety Association, License number 605. Fee for the course is \$25 and the course will be conducted from 8 to 5.

Debbie Bookout will teach a 16/2 week course on medication administration. Beginning September 14, this course will teach the procedure

for preparing and administration of designated medication and responsibilities associated with such administration for non-licensed nursing personnel employed in health care agencies licensed by the Texas Department of Health. Classes will be conducted from 6-10 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays and the fee is \$245.

A course in backpacking will begin September 14 and be taught for three consecutive Mondays from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. Participants will learn medical preparedness, use of a map and compass, personal outfitting, food selection and preparation. A week-end campout will be arranged. Fee for the course is \$15.

Deer hunting and archery equipment will be the topic for a course to be taught on Monday, September 14 and Tuesday, September 15 and Thursday, September 17. The course will include deer hunting techniques in Northeast Texas and Southeast Oklahoma and the proper use of archery equipment.

A course in pottery making will begin September 15 and will meet from 6-9 each Tuesday and Thursday for six weeks. Students will become acquainted with clay by hand building bowls and other forms. They will also receive instruction on the potter's wheel, glazing and use of the kiln. Fee for the course is \$70 and a \$15 fee for supplies.

Harvard Graphics 2.3 is the title of the course that will begin September 15. The two week course will include preparation for detailed graphics: legends and titles, scaling, editing, printing, plotting, bar graphs, word graphs, printer-platter set-up, and alternate output devices. The class will meet from 6-9 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays and the fee is \$60.

A course on investing in the 90's will begin September 17 and continues for four weeks. This course is designed to give a beginning investor a background in various investment products and how they work. Rick Woolfolk will instruct the course. The fee is \$20.

Raspberry Lemon Pie

- 1 graham cracker ready-crust pie crust
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 tbsp. cornstarch
- Dash salt
- 2 tbsp. flour
- 1 1/4 cups water
- 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 1 1/2 tbsp. butter
- 1/4 cup lemon juice and rind from a whole lemon
- 1/2 pint red raspberries

Brush crust with one egg yolk and place crust on a cookie sheet. Bake for 5 minutes at 400°F. Remove from oven and allow to cool.

Mix sugar, cornstarch, salt and flour and slowly add the water, stirring constantly. Cook until boiling, then reduce heat and cook for 2 more minutes. Remove from heat and stir a small amount of the custard into the remaining egg yolks. Blend the egg yolk mixture with custard and return to low heat for about a minute. Remove from heat and stir in butter, lemon juice and rind. Pour into shell and cool.

Top pie with raspberries immediately before serving. Use mint leaves for additional color.

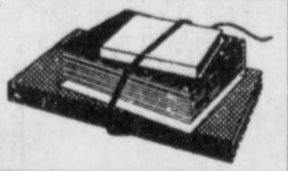

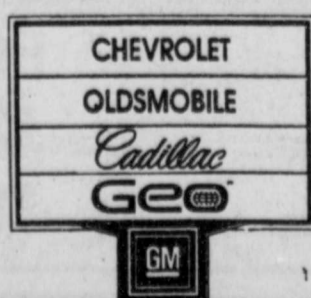
