

The 30 students, two teachers and 10 parents had a wonderful day.



Hearing Concludes, Brooks Attorney Says OCC Allegations Untrue

The public hearing concerning Preston Brooks". Preston J. Brooks, former president of the First National Bank of Deport concluded Wednesday September 23 with Administrative Law Judge Arthur Shipe of Washington, D.C. taking under advisement information he heard during the two day hearing

The hearing was held relating to a proposed civil penalty and permanent removal from the banking business against Preston J. Brooks, forner president of the First National ank of Deport.

The final judgement on this issue may take months, however Dean Debuck of the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency said that the judge will render a recommended decision in the matter, and the Comptroller of the Currency will make the final judgement.

Brooks was dismissed by the board of directors of the First National Bank of Deport in Nov. 1990, where he served as chairman of the board in addition to holding the office of bank

He is accused of violating banking

lated bank-controlled accounts for the benefit of members of his family and that the bank's board or loan committee had not given prior approval to such activities.

He is also accused of causing the bank to pay an illegal dividend to the Marion, Red River, Titus and Upsher bank's holding company in 1989, of which he was the principal share-

He also is accused of concealing the actions from bank examiners and causing the bank to pay the expenses of his real estate agency.

A press release sent to this newspaper by Brooks' attorney Michael D. Mosher, denys these allegations.

Mosher's release states that "When the OCC made its press release it knew that the implication carried by its press release was completely false and deliberately intended to slander

Mosher contends that the testimony at that hearing demonstrated what OCC already knew, that on Nov. 8, 1989, Preston Brooks' brother, Edward Brooks, had \$4,000 in his checking account in the First National Bank of Deport.

Edward Brooks on that day directed the bank to wire \$300 from his account to his account in the bank in Austin, Texas, and also directed the bank to wire \$700 to his wife's account in Austin.

Mosher insists that "OCC knew, because it had all the documents and the deposition of Edward Brooks, that Edward Brooks made the wire transfer of his own money...".

Mosher's press release states that OCC knew the wire transfers to Brooks' sister-in-law and brother were their own money made from their own bank account to their own bank

The press release also says that the \$18,150.00 wire transfer made from the bank to Preston Brooks' mother, made October 31, 1989 represented a loan to Preston Brooks to repay money owed to his mother., and that again, OCC had the documents and knew this. Mosher says that "the minutes of the board of directors meeting show that the loan was unaminously approved on October 31, 1989, and that the bank had personal financial statements on Preston Brooks and the title to his property pledged as collateral, whose value exceeded by thousands of dollars the amount of the loan."

Mosher also says that OCC admitted that all of the facts stated above were true during cross-examination during the public hearing.

'Why the OCC chose to publish the false and defamatory account it cause the press in Paris and Deport to publish we have no idea. " Mosher's press release states.
