City Council Approves Waste Management Contract

The Bogata City Council met in regular session Monday, February 8

The meeting was called to oder by Mayor Mildred Eudy. All members were present, Don O'Donnell, David Rozell, Buck Ramsey, Jettie Bond and Mary Colflesh.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The board began negotiations with North East Texas Waste Management, represented by Jim Carroll, for the removal of the City's trash.

Afer careful and deliberate consideration, negotations were completed and the board voted unanimously to accept Waste Management'sproposal.

Under the terms of the negotiated contract, residents of the city will have more benefits than have been previously available.

Each residence will be furnished with poly-carts for bagged trash. Three times a year there will be clean-up days and containers will be furnished for only the land-fill fee.

The housing project will be billed through the City as a residential ac-

No truck larger than 20 cubic yards will be used in the streets. The streets will not be damaged.

The trucks will not pick up batteries, tires or appliances that use freon., unless it has been professionally removed and tagged by the professional.

Bagged leaves will be picked up and small bundles of limbs and brush, if they are bound into no more than three to four feet lengths that can be easily handled by the hauler.

The council considered other options and found this proposal to have more benefits and the least expense to the residents of the community. The trash rates will increase to

\$7.50 monthly plus tax, the total increase being \$8.08 The council voted not to extend

Douglas Cablevision for another three years. Seven years remain on the existing contract.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:40
