

Have you ever sold Girl Scout rectly this was the same daughter who wondered wy people could not have just had one foot so that she wouldn't have to find two matching


Then we went through the stage where everyone would say things like, "If anyone delivers Girl Scout coolkies, pay for them. I ordered a few

mini chocolate chips Preheat oven to 350. Place cream cheese, sugar, flour adn salt in large mixing bowl or food processor. Beat at medium speed until smooth, scraping bowl as needed. Add sour cream, two egg yolks, one whole egg, vanilla

In separate bowl, beat egg whites and cream of tartar at high speed until soft peaks form; fold into cheese mixture. Pour almost to rim of 2" foil cups that have been put in cupcake tins. This will help keep the foil shape circular. Bake in oven for about 35-45 minutes. The tops of the miniature cheescakes should be firm. Remove from oven and let set and cool for at least on ehour. Put the foil cheesecakes in freezer overnight, or for approximatley 8 hours, until frozen. Lay Caramel deLite cookies out on a tray. Take the cheesecakes out of the freezer and carefully peel off the foil wrap. Put one mini-cheesecake on each cookie. Then take some mini-morsel chocolate chips (not regular size) and put nine chocolate chips on top of the cheesecake in rows of 3 across. Take 5 pecans and push them into the sides of the cheesecake to imitate th turtle's head and four legs.







Morning Session: Begin at 8 a.m. and end at noon after the students had eaten lunch at school

Afternoon Session: Begin at noon with the students having the opportunity to eat lunch at school and continue until the end of the regular school day.


