**Wheat Harvest Underway**

first wheat to be combined Haskell was combined by Vernay Teague, on Saturday, May 26. On the five acre which was harvested, he averaged 35 bushels.

about 30 bushels per acre. After purchasing three combines and three trucks, Lowe became concerned with the fuel shortage. Upon checking, Lowe stated that it didn't look too bad. He had checked in Texas and further north and there seemed to be an adequate supply. He also noted

that what farmers he had checked with, seemed to have fuel in storage tanks to insure enough fuel for harvest.

The Haskell County wheat crop, normally between 60 and 70 thousand acres, has been held to an estimated 35 thousand and productive acres. The cut in the number of acres to be

harvested is attributed to the unusually wet weather the county has had since October. Close to 2,500 acres were lost as a result of the recent hail storm, between 100 and 150 cotton producers still have land in cotton. These cotton crops are normally harvested by Christmas.

Members of the trade indicate that the remainder of the wheat crops are in excellent condition. Crops should average between 35 and 40 bushels per acre and some reports indicate as high as 50 bushels per acre.

Wheat rust, which normally causes great loss during an extremely wet year, hasn't had any noticeable effect on the grain as of yet.

Although no market has been established, area grain experts expect the wheat to bring around \$2.00 and possibly \$2.10 per bushel. This does not include the government support price which should bring the price per bushel to \$3.10 for those with land under allotment.

The removal of subsidies and the likelihood that a new farm program will not be passed by Congress no doubt will have an adverse effect upon farmers.

**Red River Regional Bloodmobile Scheduled For Run On May 31st**

The Red River Regional Red Cross Bloodmobile, scheduled to be in Rule, Thursday, May 31, from 11:30 until 4:00, will be in need of 70 pints of blood to meet the quota set for Haskell County. Mr. A. D. May, Rule blood program chairman, urges the residents of Haskell County to participate in the blood program, which will be held in the basement of the First Baptist Church of Rule.

County blood chairman, Charles Thornhill, again reminds donors that the program has a donor "family coverage" policy which is: For the twelve months following a donation to the Red River Regional Red Cross Blood program, the following members of the donor's family will be covered: (Provided, of course, that the hospital in which the donor or donor's family is a patient will accept Red Cross replacement. Covered in the program would be the spouse, children, under 18 years of age, and children over 18 years of age who themselves cannot be blood donors, parents and parents-in-law, grandparents and grandparents-in-law.

Thornhill stressed the need to fill the 70 unit quota for the county.

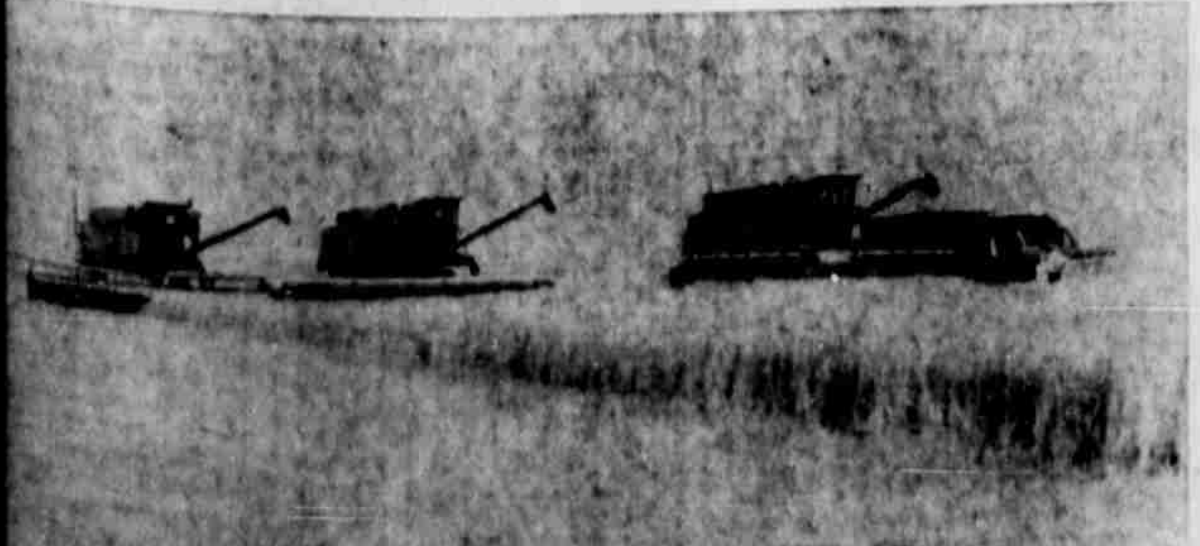
Registration for the First Baptist Church Vacation Bible School will follow their annual Vacation Bible School parade, to be held June 2, from 8:30 till 9:30.

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CONSERVATION POINTS



Conservation items from the data contained in the booklet. The retail food price in February, 1973 averaged 7.3 percent higher than one year ago. The average person spent 82 cents more per day for food in 1972 than in 1971. Why have food prices gone up? First, there is an extremely strong demand for food. More people are working, wages have gone up, the economy is booming. Disposable income during the first three months of 1973 is estimated to be 68 percent higher than the same period in 1972. Secondly, we are eating more meat than ever before, so we are building up the price with our demands. Thirdly, the Federal Government Food Stamp and Food Distribution Program is helping 15 million lower-income people eat better, so adding to the demand. Fourthly, we are eating more prepared, convenience foods with more of the kitchen work already completed and built into the food. This saves work in the home, but costs money. The cost of built-in service has gone up more than the cost of the food ingredients. And fifthly, we eat more meals out of the home where the cost of personal food service has risen more drastically than the price of the food. Actually, food prices have gone up much less than such things as health care and shelter. While the prices for all consumer items rose by 58 percent in the last twenty years, retail food went up 47 percent compared with a 64 percent increase in housing. During the same period of 1952 to 1972, the price of medical care increased 123 percent, and transportation climbed 55 percent. Wages have increased almost 2 1/2 times what they were in 1952. If food prices had gone up at the same rate as labor, a pound of round steak costing \$1.11 in 1952 would now cost \$2.67 instead of the \$1.68 it averaged in February this year. Despite the rises in prices, food still takes a smaller share of our average income. The food bill in 1952 took 23 percent of the disposable income while in 1972 it only took 15.7 percent. And it is expected to be even less in 1973, despite what seems to be higher food prices. The prices that the farmer receives for his products fluctuate widely. When his prices go up, they usually come down later. The price of most everything he has to buy to produce the food you eat tends to stay up. And, finally we are buying many items at the food store today that are not food or edible. The average housewife buys household cleaners, paper products, cosmetics, medicines, articles of clothing, and a host of other items that are not food. Somehow, these items always seem to get charged to the family food budget, and the housewife cries all the louder because she spends so much for food, never realizing that much of the food dollar goes for non-food items. So don't blame the farmer or rancher for high food prices. He is in the same boat that we are in, trying to keep his head above water.

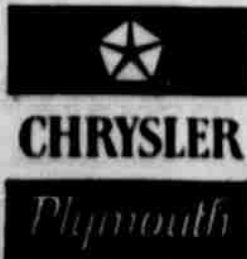

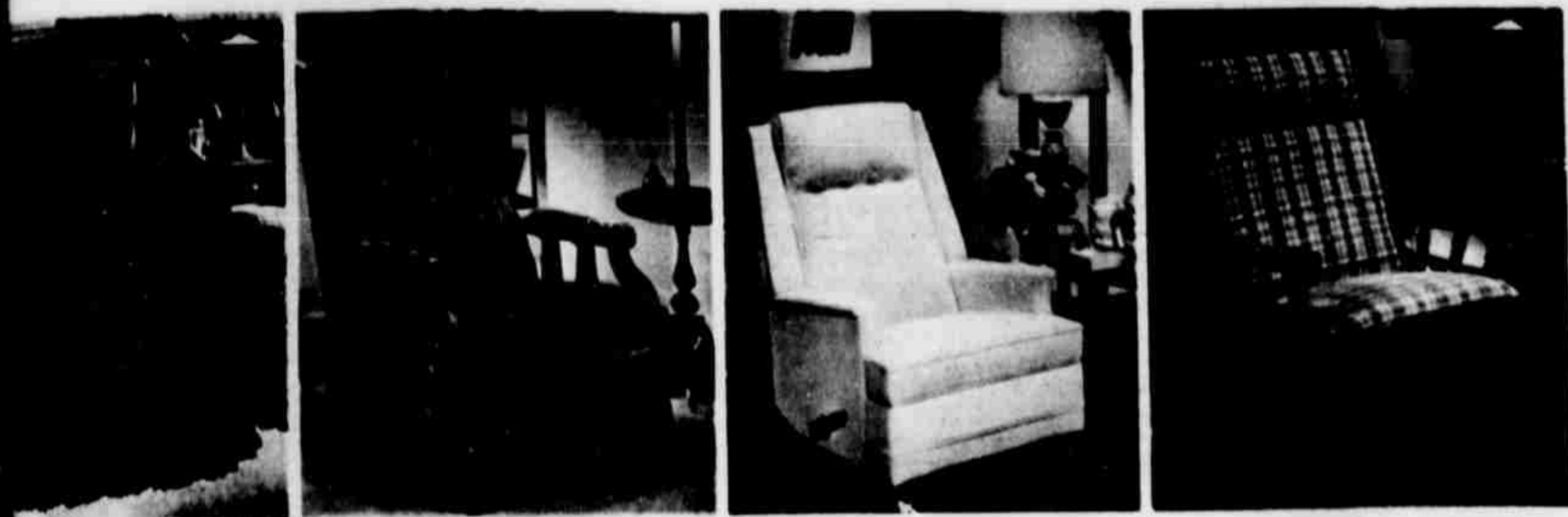
