The Texas Peanut Producers Board is conducting its 2014 biennial election pursuant to the Texas Commodity Referendum Law, Texas Agriculture Code, Title 3, Ch. 41, Subchapter C, Section 41. The TPPB elections will be conducted in all 254 Texas counties for the purpose of electing two TPPB board members, one member from Voting Region Three and one member At Large. There will be a total of ten TPPB voting board members

There is one seat open for election of an At Large TPPB board member. The At Large member may be from any of the 254 counties in Texas so long as they meet the requirements below.

Peanut producers eligible to vote in the election are persons, including the owner of a farm on which peanuts are produced or the owner's tenant or sharecropper, engaged in the business of producing peanuts or causing peanuts to be produced for commercial purposes. Any qualified producer may vote for an At Large nominee and the region in

Any eligible voter-producer may place his or her name in nomination to serve as a director on the TPPB. Nomination applications must be submitted to TPPB, signed by the applicant and ten additional eligible voters.

Nomination forms for the At Large seat will be available in all 254 Texas counties or can be obtained by writing TPPB, 4205 N. I-27, Lubbock, Texas 79403. Please state your county of residence if you request a nomination form in writing. Nomination forms will be available Nov. 23, 2013 and must be filed no later than Dec. 23, 2013.

The election will be held by mail ballot. Ballots containing the nominations of all persons who have validly filed petitions under Section 41.025 of the above stated code will be available Jan. 9, 2014. Ballots will be available at peanut buying points and county agent offices, or by writing TPPB at the address stated above. Voters may also vote for board members by "writing in" the name of any eligible persons. Ballots must be postmarked no later than Jan 23, 2014 to be counted.

TPPB is certified under Section 41.011 and Section 41.021 of the Texas Commodity Referendum Law to conduct this referendum and has obtained all approvals and determinations required by law from the Commissioner of Agriculture, Texas Department of Agriculture.

Budget impasse results in shutdown

AUSTIN-At midnight on Oct. 1, the federal government shut down for the first time in 17 years, when the U.S. House and U.S. Senate did not agree on an appropriations bill or continuing resolution to fund fiscal year 2014 at an estimated cost of \$3.8 trillion.

Before the shutdown, to prepare Texas, Gov. Rick Perry on Sept. 30 delivered a statement that included this sentence: "In anticipation of the federal government's looming shutdown, I directed state agencies that will be affected by the suspension of federal funding to develop contingency plans to prioritize essential functions and use existing budget transfer authority to allow these services to Texans to continue until Washington gridlock ends."

Now, "shutdown" suggests that whatever is federally funded would cease to function, but some federal agencies or personnel within certain agencies that are considered essential were ordered by the Obama administration to stay on the job Oct. 1, and in the days following, more were called back to work.

While the Republican Party-controlled House did pass an appropriations bill containing language to defund the Affordable Care Act, the Democratic Party-controlled Senate stripped the defunding measure from the House bill. Further negotiations proved unsuccessful.

Before Oct. 1, President Obama promised to veto legislation to defund the health care law and urged the Congress to pass a budget that funds the government "with no partisan strings attached."

The standoff could end this week or go on indefinitely. The next big deadline facing Congress is Oct. 17, the date when the federal government reaches its debt limit of \$16.8 the debt limit is reached by then, the United States will default on its loans and its credit rating may be downgraded, making it harder and costlier to borrow from other nations. Two nations holding U.S. debt to the tune of over \$1 trillion each are China and Japan. Some in Congress say raising the debt limit is a do-or-die issue, while others don't seem moved by the prospect of a default.

Davis announces candidacy

Worth on Oct. 3 publicly declared her candidacy to become the 48th governor of

Davis, 50, seeks the Texas Democratic Party's nomination and Attorney General Greg Abbott seeks the Republican

Party of Texas' nomination. Abbott, 55, faces competition in former state party chair and current Texas Workforce Commission Chairman Tom Pauken, 69. The election will be held in November 2014 and the new governor will take office in January 2015. Party primaries exes to attend the recent are on the calendar for March

Davis, from the campaign trail, said she would like to see a bi-partisan solution to the Congressional stalemate over the federal health care law. Abbott, last week, reportedly spoke out in support of efforts to prevent further funding of "Obamacare."

Guv stumps for water measure

Gov. Perry, in San Angelo on Oct. 2, encouraged Texans to vote yes on Proposition 6 on the Nov. 5 election ballot.

Prop. 6 would authorize a one-time \$2 billion transfer from the State of Texas' Economic Stimulus ("rainy day") Fund to create a State Water Implementation Fund that Perry said would "leverage funding up to \$30 billion in water projects over five decades."

The constitutional amendment, if passed, would require regional and statewide prioritization of water projects in the State Water Plan and enable local communities to access cost-effective interest rates to invest in water needs, he said.

Bonds get highest rating

State Comptroller Susan Combs on Sept. 30 announced that bond-rating agency Standard & Poor's raised its rating for Texas' general obligation bonds from AA+ to AAA, the highest rating.

Fitch Ratings and Moody's Investors Service already rate Texas bonds AAA, she said, adding, "This is the first time Texas has received the top general obligation bond ratings from all three ratings agencies.'

Strong bond ratings can trillion. If no deal to increase help lower borrowing costs, she said, and they reflect Wall Street's confidence in the Texas economy, the state's revenue growth, disciplined cash management and budgeting.

Fire Chief says "Stand by your pan submitted by **Mathew Cunningham Haskell Fire Chief**

How often has the doorbell rung or a child interrupted you while you were cooking, causing you to forget about the chicken you left sizzling on the stoveuntil smoke filled the house?

If this scenario or a similar one sounds familiar to you, you may want to think about it a little more because it's likely that you, a friend or family member has run the risk of having a dangerous fire. As chief of the Haskell Fire Department, I often talk to people about the ways they can stay safe in their homes. Too often, we have that talk after they've suffered a damaging fire.

It's my hope that people reading this article won't have to learn the hard way. If I could give just one fire warning, I'd say, "Keep an eye on what you fry!"

Why? Because cooking is the leading cause of home fires, according to the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). The latest statistics from NFPA say U.S. Fire Departments responded to an estimated annual average of 156,600 cooking-related fires between 2007-2011.

We're joining forces with NFPA and thousands of other fire departments across North America to commemorate Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 6-12,

leaving cooking unattended and other unsafe kitchen practices are a recipe for disaster.

Often when we're called to a cooking-related fire, the residents tell us they only left the kitchen for a few minutes. Sadly, that's all it takes for a dangerous fire to start. The bottom line is that there's really no safe period of time for the cook to step away from a hot stove. A few key points to remember:

•Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you must leave the room even for a short period of time, turn off the stove.

•When you are simmering,

•Keep cooking areas clean and clear of combustibles (e.g. potholders, towels, rags, drapes and food packaging).

•Keep children away from cooking areas by enforcing a "kid-free zone" of three feet around the stove.

•If you have a fire in your microwave, turn it off immediately and keep the door closed. Never open the door until the fire is completely out. If in doubt, get out of the home and call the fire department.

•Always keep an oven mitt and a lid nearby. If a small grease fire starts in a pan, smother the flames by carefully sliding the lid over baking, or roasting food, the pan (make sure you are dinner!

"Prevent Kitchen Fires." check it regularly, stay in wearing the oven mitt). Turn off the burner. Do not move the pan. To keep the fire from restarting, do not remove the lid until it is completely cool. Never pour water on a grease fire. If the fire does not go out, get out of the home and call the fire department.

> •If an oven fire starts, turn off the heat and keep the door closed. If the fire does not go out, get out of the home and call the fire department.

> A cooking fire can quickly turn deadly. I have seen too many homes destroyed and people killed or injured by fires that could have been easily avoided. Please heed these simple safety rules. We firefighters would like to be in your kitchen, but only when you invite us for

After all, as Texans who are governed by this constitution, what does or does not become a part of it, can't help but affect us.

tements will be mailed soon and I would like to inform you of the major deadlines for payments and what each month will bring. Tax statements are normally sent out on October 1st of each year, but because of our recent software conversion to a new system there will be a delay in the processing and mailing of the statements.

There are many ways to pay taxes of which the public may not be aware. Most taxpayers like to pay their taxes as soon as possible and in full. If you cannot pay your taxes in full, we allow partial payments until taxes are paid in full. This allows payments from October to January without penalty and interest. As of February 1st your property will begin to accrue penalty and interest. This does not keep your property safe from a law suit being filed.

If you have a homestead property and have not paid your taxes as of February 1st, you may request a monthly installment plan. An installment agreement allows your property to remain safe from a lawsuit being filed due to delinquency. Your total amount due will be divided into twelve payments that will include the penalty and interest for each month. When signing this agreement be aware that you will not be allowed to miss a payment. If a payment is missed, your installment agreement will be defaulted and you will not be allowed to set another agreement up for two years.

If you are 65 or older, disabled or a disabled veteran and have a homestead exemption on your property, you qualify to set your taxes up in quarterly payments. Your tax amount will be split into four payments due in February, April, June and August.

Payments for 2013 taxes made before February 1st will not include penalty and interest. On February 1st taxes that are not paid will accrue 7% penalty and interest which will be added to the base tax of each property. March accrues 9%, April accrues 11%, May accrues 13% and June accrues 15%. On July 1st, properties delinquent for this year will receive an additional 2% penalty and interest as well as a 20% collection fees added to the base tax amount. Beginning August 1st, a 1% penalty and interest will be added to every month until the taxes are paid off.





•If there is any sign of electrical trouble, shut off power to the circuit and have it checked by an electrician.


