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# Help sought to revive American Legion

As you drive south through Haskell on Hwy. 277, you may notice on the left near the city park, a red brick building that has stood strong for many years.

The American Legion building, built after World War II, has stood in support of our area veterans. Through the years they have supported activities such as Boys' State, scouting, family and youth events, to name just a few.

As active membership has declined, the effectiveness of the organization has also declined. In fact, the American Legion is on the verge of closing.

Judge David Davis, along with other members, are asking for help from the community. The building itself is in need of repair, and the group will hold fund-raisers in the future to secure

## FSA reports change in reporting dates

Haskell County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director CED Glenn Brzozowski, reminds producers that the common acreage reporting dates (ARDs) between FSA and the Risk Management Agency (RMA) are in effect for the 2013 crop year.

"Last year a review team consolidated 54 ARDs for RMA and 17 ARDs for FSA into 15 common ARDs," said Brzozowski. "The common reporting dates will reduce the burden on producers and help reduce USDA operating costs by sharing data with partner agencies," he said.

The following acreage reporting dates are for both FSA and RMA purposes:

Apiculture, all grasses intended for grazing or forage (hay), PRF, all barley, oats, rye, Triticale and wheat planted before Oct. 1, 2012 intended for grazing, all mixed forages that have grass and small grains in the mix (MSG, SSG, IGS, AGM, ASG, GMA, NSG) was Nov. 15, 2012.

Barley, rye, Triticale and wheat intended for grain, barley, rye, Triticale and wheat intended for forage (hay), all barley, oats, rye, Triticale and wheat planted on or after Oct. 2, 2012

intended for grazing, mixed forages that have small grains and legumes in the mix (LSG, LGG) was Dec. 15, 2012.

Barley, rye, Triticale and wheat intended for grain was Dec. 31, 2012.

Honey was Jan. 2, 2013.

Barley, oats, rye, Triticale and wheat intended for grain, barley, oats, rye, Triticale and wheat intended for forage (hay), mixed forages that have small grains and legumes in the mix (LSG, LGG), clover, citrus trees IV, grapefruit, grapes, oranges and peaches was Jan. 15, 2013.

Oats planted on or after Dec. 16, 2012 intended for grazing was March 15, 2013.

Oats intended for grain, oats intended for forage (hay) was May 15, 2013.

Producers who file accurate and timely reports for all crops and land uses, including failed acreage can prevent the potential loss of

FSA program benefits.

"Encourage all producers to visit the Haskell County FSA office to file an accurate crop certification report by the applicable deadline in order to comply with FSA program eligibility requirements," said Brzozowski.

Producers are also reminded to report crop

losses insured through Federal Crop Insurance and the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) within 15 days of the disaster or as soon as the loss is apparent.

### NOTICE OF ELECTIONS

#### TEXAS PEANUT PRODUCERS - BOARD AT LARGE

The Texas Peanut Producers Board is conducting its 2014 biennial election pursuant to the Texas Commodity Referendum Law, Texas Agriculture Code, Title 3, Ch. 41, Subchapter C, Section 41. The TPPB elections will be conducted in all 254 Texas counties for the purpose of electing two TPPB board members, one member from Voting Region Three and one member At Large. There will be a total of ten TPPB voting board members.

There is one seat open for election of an At Large TPPB board member. The At Large member may be from any of the 254 counties in Texas so long as they meet the requirements below.

Peanut producers eligible to vote in the election are persons, including the owner of a farm on which peanuts are produced or the owner's tenant or sharecropper, engaged in the business of producing peanuts or causing peanuts to be produced for commercial purposes. Any qualified producer may vote for an At Large nominee and the region in which you reside is not a factor.

Any eligible voter-producer may place his or her name in nomination to serve as a director on the TPPB. Nomination applications must be submitted to TPPB, signed by the applicant and ten additional eligible voters.

Nomination forms for the At Large seat will be available in all 254 Texas counties or can be obtained by writing TPPB, 4205 N. I-27, Lubbock, Texas 79403. Please state your county of residence if you request a nomination form in writing. Nomination forms will be available Nov. 23, 2013 and must be filed no later than Dec. 23, 2013.

The election will be held by mail ballot. Ballots containing the nominations of all persons who have validly filed petitions under Section 41.025 of the above stated code will be available Jan. 9, 2014. Ballots will be available at peanut buying points and county agent offices, or by writing TPPB at the address stated above. Voters may also vote for board members by "writing in" the name of any eligible persons. Ballots must be postmarked no later than Jan. 23, 2014 to be counted.

TPPB is certified under Section 41.011 and Section 41.021 of the Texas Commodity Referendum Law to conduct this referendum and has obtained all approvals and determinations required by law from the Commissioner of Agriculture, Texas Department of Agriculture.

# Food manager training course set in Abilene

Statistics indicate that foodborne illness continues to be a health issue in the United States. Each year, one in six Americans will become sick, 128,000 will become hospitalized, and 3,000 will die due to a foodborne illness.

If under the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) jurisdiction each food establishment is required to have one certified food manager on site.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in Taylor, Jones and Runnels counties, is offering a professional food manager certification training course. This program will be offered for \$125 on Oct. 21 and Oct. 28 at the Taylor County Extension Office in Abilene. Cost includes training, materials, and a national food manager certification examination. The food manager's certification will be valid for five years. The deadline for registration is

Oct. 14.

This program is designed to not only prepare foodservice managers to pass the certification examination, but also to provide valuable education regarding the safe handling of food. Almost 50 cents of every dollar Americans spend on food is spent on meals prepared away from home. Therefore, careful attention to food safety will help keep customers safe and satisfied.

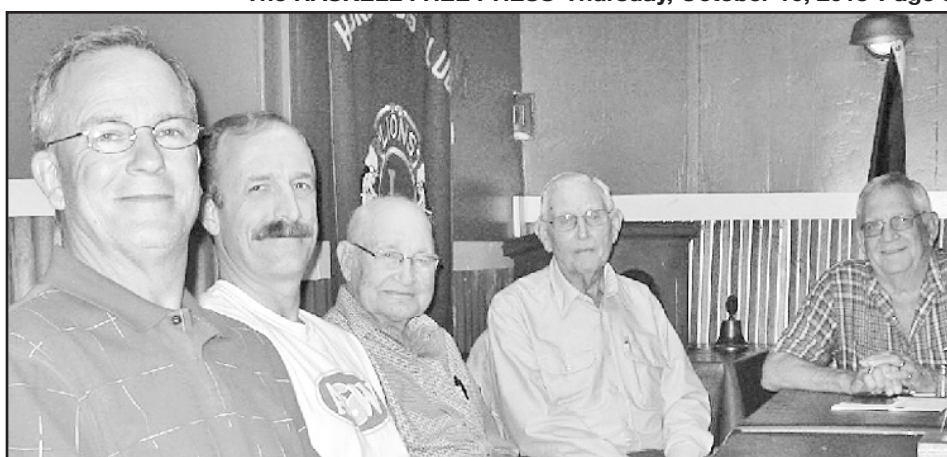
Foodborne illnesses are estimated to cost thousands of dollars in lost wages, insurance, and medical bills. With these statistics, knowledge of how to prevent foodborne illness is essential. The benefits of improved food safety include:

- Increased customer satisfaction
- Improved relationships with health officials
- Prevention of bad publicity and law suits due to foodborne illness

By attending the course, foodservice managers will learn about:

- identifying potentially hazardous foods and common errors in food handling
- preventing contamination and cross-contamination of food
- teaching and encouraging personal hygiene for employees
- complying with government regulations
- maintaining clean utensils, equipment and surroundings
- controlling pests

Foodborne illnesses can be prevented by following simple food safety practices. 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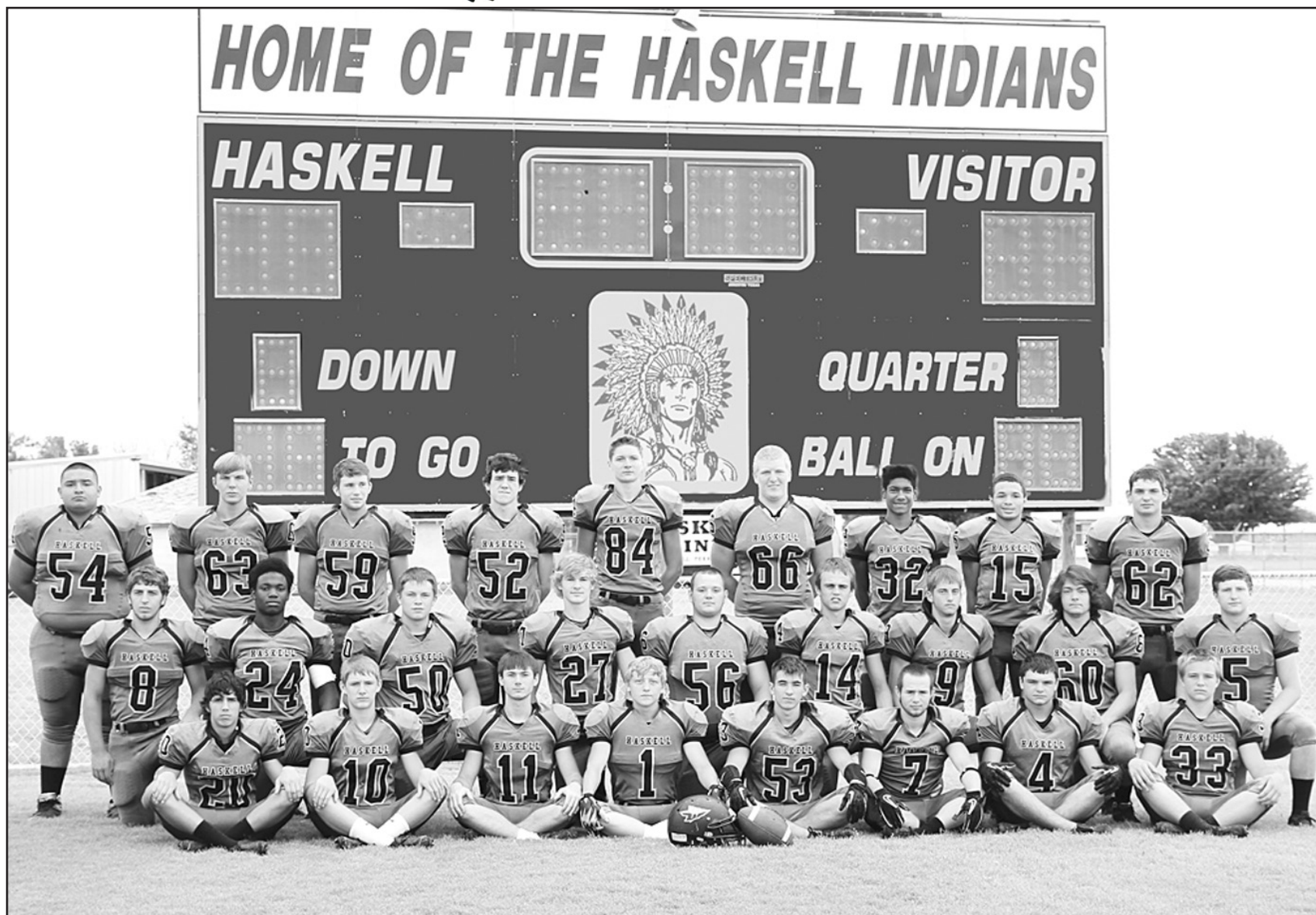
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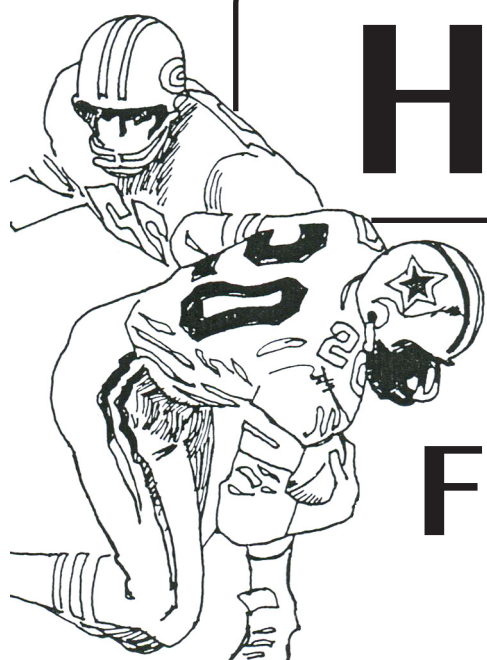

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# Fire prevention week is proclaimed October 6-12

Haskell Mayor John Gannaway has proclaimed October 6-12, as Fire Prevention Week throughout the city, and urges all people of Haskell to participate by checking their kitchens for fire hazards and by using safe

cooking practices. He further asks citizens to support the many public safety activities and efforts of Haskell's fire and emergency services.

Fire is a serious public safety concern both locally and nationally, and homes

are the locations where people are at greatest risk from fire. Statistics show that fires killed more than 2500 people in the U.S. in 2011, and according to the National Fire Protection Association, fire departments responded to 370,000 home fires.

Cooking is the leading cause of home fires in the

United States, with two of every five home fires starting in the kitchen. Unattended equipment was a factor in one-third of the reported cooking fires. 57% of the reported non-fatal home cooking fire injuries occurred when the victims tried to fight the fire themselves.

Residents should stay in

the kitchen when frying food on the stove top, keep a three-foot kid-free zone around cooking areas and keep anything that can catch fire away from stove tops.

There are steps we all can take to increase our personal safety from fire, especially in our homes. Households with a planned and practiced

home fire escape plan, as well as working smoke alarms, can cut the risk of dying in home fires significantly.

The 2013 Fire Prevention Week theme, "Prevent Kitchen Fires!" effectively serves to remind us to stay alert and use caution when cooking to reduce the risk of kitchen fires.

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## Fire Chief says "Stand by your pan"

How often has the doorbell rung or a child interrupted you while you were cooking, causing you to forget about the chicken you left sizzling on the stove—until smoke filled the house?

If this scenario or a similar one sounds familiar to you, you may want to think about it a little more because it's likely that you, a friend or family member has run the risk of having a dangerous fire. As chief of the Haskell Fire Department, I often talk to people about the ways they can stay safe in their homes. Too often, we have that talk after they've suffered a damaging fire.

It's my hope that people reading this article won't have to learn the hard way. If I could give just one fire warning, I'd say, "Keep an eye on what you fry!"

Why? Because cooking is the leading cause of home fires, according to the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). The latest statistics from NFPA say U.S. Fire Departments responded to an estimated annual average of 156,600 cooking-related fires between 2007-2011.

We're joining forces with NFPA and thousands of other fire departments across North America to commemorate Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 6-12,

"Prevent Kitchen Fires." The theme reminds us that leaving cooking unattended and other unsafe kitchen practices are a recipe for disaster.

Often when we're called to a cooking-related fire, the residents tell us they only left the kitchen for a few minutes. Sadly, that's all it takes for a dangerous fire to start. The bottom line is that there's really no safe period of time for the cook to step away from a hot stove. A few key points to remember:

- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you must leave the room even for a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- When you are simmering, baking, or roasting food,

check it regularly, stay in the home, and use a timer to remind you.

- Keep cooking areas clean and clear of combustibles (e.g. potholders, towels, rags, drapes and food packaging).

- Keep children away from cooking areas by enforcing a "kid-free zone" of three feet around the stove.

- If you have a fire in your microwave, turn it off immediately and keep the door closed. Never open the door until the fire is completely out. If in doubt, get out of the home and call the fire department.

- Always keep an oven mitt and a lid nearby. If a small grease fire starts in a pan, smother the flames by carefully sliding the lid over the pan (make sure you are

wearing the oven mitt). Turn off the burner. Do not move the pan. To keep the fire from restarting, do not remove the lid until it is completely cool. Never pour water on a grease fire. If the fire does not go out, get out of the home and call the fire department.

- If an oven fire starts, turn off the heat and keep the door closed. If the fire does not go out, get out of the home and call the fire department.

A cooking fire can quickly turn deadly. I have seen too many homes destroyed and people killed or injured by fires that could have been easily avoided. Please heed these simple safety rules. We firefighters would like to be in your kitchen, but only when you invite us for dinner!

## Early voting begins Oct. 21

On November 5, Texas voters will be deciding the fate of nine proposed constitutional amendments.

Because of the power reserved for the people of Texas in the 1876 constitution, which Texas still operates under, we have the opportunity to vote on constitutional amendments. Consequently voters should be informed before they vote. Information and an explanation of the proposed amendments can be found in previous issues of The Haskell Free Press, or by visiting the website of the Texas Secretary of State John Steen, at [www.sos.state.tx.us](http://www.sos.state.tx.us).

Connie Benton, Haskell County Tax Assessor/Collector reminds voters that this is the first statewide election with new photo ID requirements in effect for voting in person.

A voter will be required to show one of the following forms of photo identification at the polling location before they will be permitted to cast a vote: Texas driver license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety; Texas Election Identification

Certificate issued by DPS; Texas personal identification card issued by DPS; Texas concealed handgun license issued by DPS; United States military identification card containing the person's photograph; or United States passport.

This photo ID requirement is for voters casting a ballot in person, not by mail. Voters age 65 and older may vote by mail.

Benton encourages voters to update their voter registrations to reflect the names on their IDs. Voters may use an ID that does not exactly match the name on their voter certificate, if the name is substantially similar, but you will have to sign an affidavit stating you are the same person. Voters may look up their voter registration online at [votetexas.gov](http://votetexas.gov) to compare the two forms of identification. You can also find more information about photo ID requirements, including exemptions at the above website.

Benton also emphasized the importance of taking your voter certificate to the polls when you go to vote.

The last date to register to vote was Monday, Oct. 7. Early voting begins Monday, Oct. 21 and continues through Friday, Nov. 1. Early voting will take place at the Haskell County Courthouse, Friday, Oct. 25 is the last day to apply to vote by mail.

- Box 10: Sagerton Community Center, Garfield Ave., Sagerton.

At first glance, we may be tempted to think that many of the proposed amendments will not have a direct effect on us individually, however it is still important that we as citizens take seriously our responsibility to be informed and then vote. After all, as Texans who are governed by this constitution, what does or does not become a part of it, can't help but affect us.

### Property Owners,

Tax statements will be mailed soon and I would like to inform you of the major deadlines for payments and what each month will bring. Tax statements are normally sent out on October 1st of each year, but because of our recent software conversion to a new system there will be a delay in the processing and mailing of the statements.

There are many ways to pay taxes of which the public may not be aware. Most taxpayers like to pay their taxes as soon as possible and in full. If you cannot pay your taxes in full, we allow partial payments until taxes are paid in full. This allows payments from October to January without penalty and interest. As of February 1st your property will begin to accrue penalty and interest. This does not keep your property safe from a law suit being filed.

If you have a homestead property and have not paid your taxes as of February 1st, you may request a monthly installment plan. An installment agreement allows your property to remain safe from a lawsuit being filed due to delinquency. Your total amount due will be divided into twelve payments that will include the penalty and interest for each month. When signing this agreement be aware that you will not be allowed to miss a payment. If a payment is missed, your installment agreement will be defaulted and you will not be allowed to set another agreement up for two years.

If you are 65 or older, disabled or a disabled veteran and have a homestead exemption on your property, you qualify to set your taxes up in quarterly payments. Your tax amount will be split into four payments due in February, April, June and August.

Payments for 2013 taxes made before February 1st will not include penalty and interest. On February 1st taxes that are not paid will accrue 7% penalty and interest which will be added to the base tax of each property. March accrues 9%, April accrues 11%, May accrues 13% and June accrues 15%. On July 1st, properties delinquent for this year will receive an additional 2% penalty and interest as well as a 20% collection fees added to the base tax amount. Beginning August 1st, a 1% penalty and interest will be added to every month until the taxes are paid off.

**FIRE PREVENTION WEEK**  
October 6-12




Almost all fires can be prevented by taking certain precautions to make your home safe. Here are some fire prevention tips:

**Cooking**

- Stay close by and pay attention when cooking. Unattended cooking is one of the most common causes of fires.
- Keep combustibles—such as curtains or drapes, clothing, packaged foods and trash—away from stoves.
- Clean grease from the stove and flue.



**Heating**

- Have your furnace or heating system checked by a competent service company at least once a year.
- Take special care with fireplaces. Use a screen to prevent sparks from flying and be sure the chimney is unblocked and free of excessive creosote accumulation.

- Keep combustible items away from all heating units.

**Appliances**

- Don't overload dryers and be sure to remove lint regularly.
- Check your appliances at least once a year to see that they are clean and functioning properly and that insulation has not broken or cracked.
- Buy appliances having Underwriters Laboratories or other nationally recognized testing laboratory approval.

**Electrical Distribution**

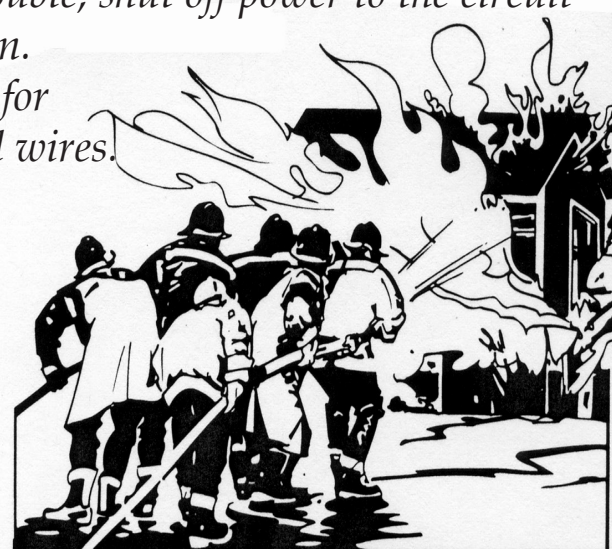
- If there is any sign of electrical trouble, shut off power to the circuit and have it checked by an electrician.
- Check cords and plugs frequently for signs of broken insulation or frayed wires.

**Safety**

- Keep matches and cigarette lighters away from children.

**Wildfire control**

- Control vegetation within 30 feet of your home.
- Keep trees and brush away from power lines.
- Space trees at least 25-30 feet apart.
- Install spark arrester on chimney.
- Keep roof and gutters clean.
- In rural areas, know where existing water sources can be found, such as ponds, that can be used as a source of water for fire trucks.
- Stack firewood away from home.

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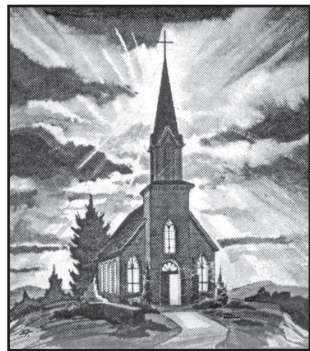

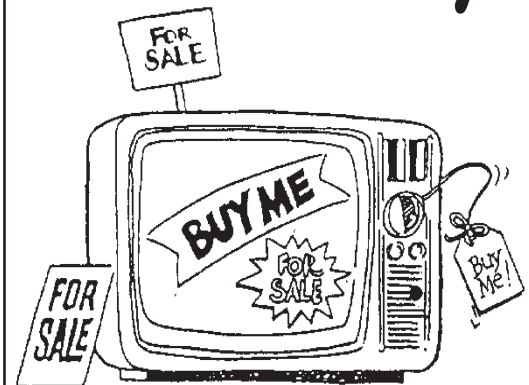

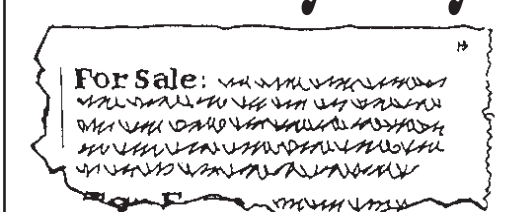
