Brooks is a graduate of Rivercrest High School and has attended seminars and related schools to further her banking career.

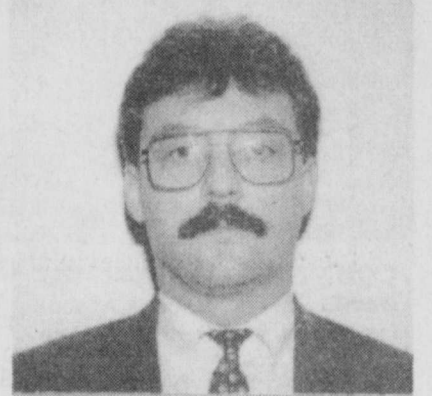
She and her husband, John, have two children, Kristy Jane and Marla Renee. The Brooks attend the Methodist Church in Cuthan d.

Bogata Methodist Bazaar Will Be Held November 13

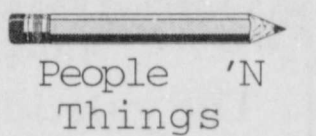

Chewy Peanut Brownie Bars

Crust:
1 (21.5 -oz.) pkg. Pillsbury Fudge Brownie Mix
1/2 cup margarine
1 egg
Filling:
1 cup corn syrup
3/4 cup peanut butter
1 cup peanuts
1 tablespoon margarine
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Glaze:
1 Tablespoon Margarine
1 ounce unsweetened chocolate
7 1/2 teaspoons water
1 cup powdered sugar
1/2 teasp. vanilla

Heat oven to 350 degrees. In large bowl, combine all crust ingredients; mix well. Press evenly in bottom of ungreased 15X10X1 inch baking pan.

In a small bowl, beat corn syrup and peanut butter at low speed until well blended. Stir in remaining filling ingredients. Spread filling evenly over crust to within 1/2 inch of edges.

Bake at 350 for 18-20 minutes or until edges are firm and center is just firm to the touch. Cool Completely.

In a small saucepan over low heat, heat 1 tablespoon margarine, chocolate and water, stirring constantly until mixture is smooth. Remove from heat. Stir in powdered sugar and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla; blend until smooth. Drizzle glaze over cooled brownies. Let stand until set. Cut into bars. Makes 50 bars.

Quick As An Elf Key Lime Pie

1 (6 oz) Keebler Graham Cracker Pie Crust
3 eggs separated

1 can (14 oz.) Eagle Brand Milk
1 tsp. grated lime peel
1/3 cup lime juice
whipped topping
A few drops of green food coloring (optional)

In a large bowl, beat egg whites until stiff peaks form; set aside. In a small bowl, beat egg yolks. Mix in sweetened condensed milk. Gradually add lime peel and juice. Stir to combine well. 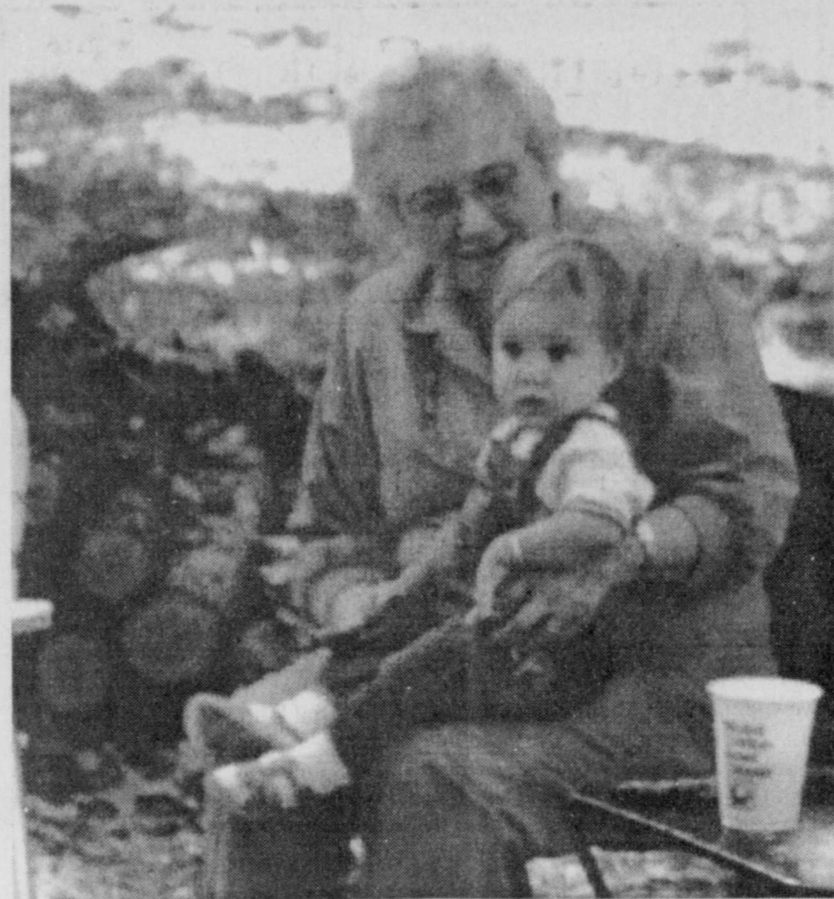

"POSITION OF THE WEEK"

Our Rebel position of the week is the quarterback and the linebacker.

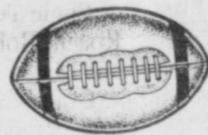
The quarterback is the nucleus of a football team. He must understand plays sent in by coaches and see to it that the team understands which play is being run. He is responsible for the snap count and execution of hand offs and passes of the ball. The quarterback needs to know every position on the field in order to run the offense. 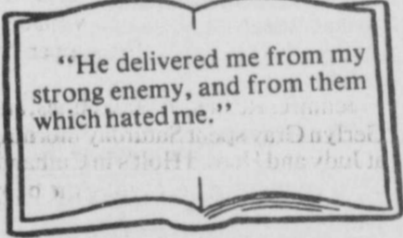
