The Eleventh Bi-Annual Haskell Homecoming General Assembly was called to order November 10 in the Community Room of Haskell National Bank by president R. C. Couch Jr., at 2:30 p. m.

Invocation was given by Royce Adkins, followed by the singing of 'God Bless America', by the Assembly group, led by the ex-Nine Teens.

Couch welcomed all the exes, visitors and guests of Homecoming and expressed appreciation to the decoration committee, composed of Sherman's The Personality Shoppe, and Lane-Felker; the food committee, the bank for the use of the community building, the HHS cheerleaders and majorettes, for all their help in distributing programs and ushering.

The two outstanding speakers, Dr. Gaines Post and Troy V. Post, were introduced by Abe Turner, president of Haskell National Bank, and Royce Adkins, Dist. Attorney of the 39th Judicial District.

Both men, in their own unique style, reminisced about their days in Haskell, their growing-up years, and the events and steps of their careers — Dr. Post in the field of education, and Troy Post in the insurance and business field. Both entertained their Homecoming audiences royally, and were much enjoyed.

All of the ex-Nine Teens, directed by Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Bell, were introduced by Couch. They began their program with their traditional 'Somewhere Over the Rainbow' and closed with 'When You Come to the End of a Perfect Day'. Ellen Walling accompanied the group at the piano.

In the Assembly business meeting, minutes were read and approved. The treasurer's report showed a balance of \$2,283.41; and the Scholarship Fund a balance of \$691.00 — the general fund.

Bob Herren, chairman of the nominating committee, gave the following report: president Abe Turner, vice president, Dr. Gaines Post; secretary-treasurer, Artie May Burkett; historian, Carolyn Williams Pippin, and director, R. C. Couch Jr.

A report of the Scholarship Fund was given with the naming of the recipients as follows: 1970, Riley Middleton; 1971, Linda Lane Watson; 1972, Karen Sherrill Pippin; and 1973, Danny Smith.

The General Assembly moved to increase the annual Homecoming Scholarship from \$100 a year to \$200 a year, because of the increased tuition and expenses in colleges and universities.

Recognition was given to the oldest student present, when two were recognized: Mrs. Ira Draper Lowery, class of 1907; and Mrs. Norma Cobb Baker, class of 1908; to the oldest

teacher, Mrs. Charlie Conner, 1914-1917; to the largest family, when three were recognized, with four children each: the John Crawford family, the Dr. L. F. Taylor family, and the I. D. Killingsworth family. Largest class recognized was the class of 1961 with 14 members present.

All ex-retired teachers were given special recognition. The longest distance traveled was R. T. Harrison of Richmond, Va., and Katherine Smith Barwicklow of Petersburg, W. Va.

A beautiful and moving Memorial Service was presented by Wallace Cox Jr., accompanied by the Nine Teens. When he completed the list of names of the expired exes, the Nine Teens sang, 'The Lord's Prayer.'

The benediction was given by the entire Assembly Group, joining hands and singing the Haskell High School song, led by the high school majorettes and pep squad.

The Assembly adjourned to meet again in 1975 here.

## Council Approved Purchase of New Water Tower For City In Tues. Meet

Haskell Mayor and City Councilmen faced a very lengthy business agenda Tuesday night at their regular meeting, and had several visitors at the meeting.

Attending were Mayor Belton Duncanson, Councilmen Buster Gholson, Lorraine Johnson, Guy Kennedy, Carl Anderson and Jimmy Browning; City Water Supt. Marvin Collins, City Secretary Desmond Dulaney, City Attorney Joe Williams, and attorney Ray Hallabaugh of Stamford, Bill Patton and Joe Ashbranner with Patton Equipment Company of Abilene, Don Smith of Burroughs of Wichita Falls, Roland Blair with NCR, Billy Jacob with Yeatts & Decker.

Buster Gholson opened the meeting with a prayer and minutes were read and approved. Patton Equipment Company personnel showed slides of an Elgin Pelican Street Sweeper, since the city is considering taking bids on a street sweeper soon.

Billy Jacob reported on a soil test run by Yeatts & Decker on soil at the proposed site of a new watertower, and tests proved it to be a good base foundation. He also presented specifications his company had drawn up for optional bids on either a single or a 5-leg elevated water storage tank to hold 250,000 gallons. He informed Council that it would be approximately a year after bids were let, before the tower could be functional. Council gave him the go-ahead on the bids and specs. Bids will be opened at the Dec. 11 Council meeting.

Don Smith with Burroughs and Roland Blair with NCR then spoke on the merits of their billing machines, but the Council took no action at this time.

They passed on buying some used office equipment they had looked into at Sweetwater, an addressograph and a grapho-

type machine. Due to the size of the bill from Council of Governments on the new COG radio, it was presented to Council for approval. It totaled \$2,646.62, for the city's share of one-half of 25% of the cost, which includes a radio in the city police cars and one in the fire station. Council approved payment.

Parks Chairman Buster Gholson reported that all 7 pieces of new playground equipment have been installed and are very much in use in the City Park, and recommended and got approval for 5 new Mercury lights to be installed in the park.

Wallace Cox Jr. was appointed to Haskell Housing Authority, to replace O. E. Oates whose term has expired; George Fouts was re-appointed to the Authority Board for two more years; and Darold Roberson was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Gene Long.

Council also amended an ordinance to approve allowing polyethylene gas lines to be used in the city, and discussed again the raising of water prices. No action was taken at this time, but they all felt it would have to be done by January 1.

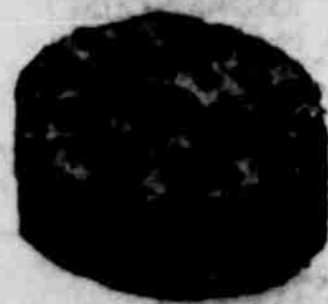

### New Japanese Textile Firm To Be Built In Texas In Near Future

AUSTIN—A favorable recommendation made by a committee which included State Rep. Charles Fennell of Holliday has resulted in the announcement that a major Japanese textile firm will build a plant in Texas.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe made public recently the word that Daiwa Company Ltd. of Osaka, Japan, would begin soon the first phase of construction on a \$15 million cotton spinning mill somewhere on the state's cotton rich South Plains.

Ultimately, Briscoe reported, the plant would be the most modern textile operation in the United States and Asia after an expansion to add weaving and finishing facilities.

Fennell was named to the interim committee to study natural fibers and textile development in 1971 when the 62nd Legislature created the special panel.

Among the topics assigned for study was the feasibility of textile manufacturing in Texas. The committee not only said textile manufacturing was feasible but also encouraged any

The Indians' final game of the 1973 season will be tomorrow night in Ballinger. Kickoff time is 7:30... see you there.

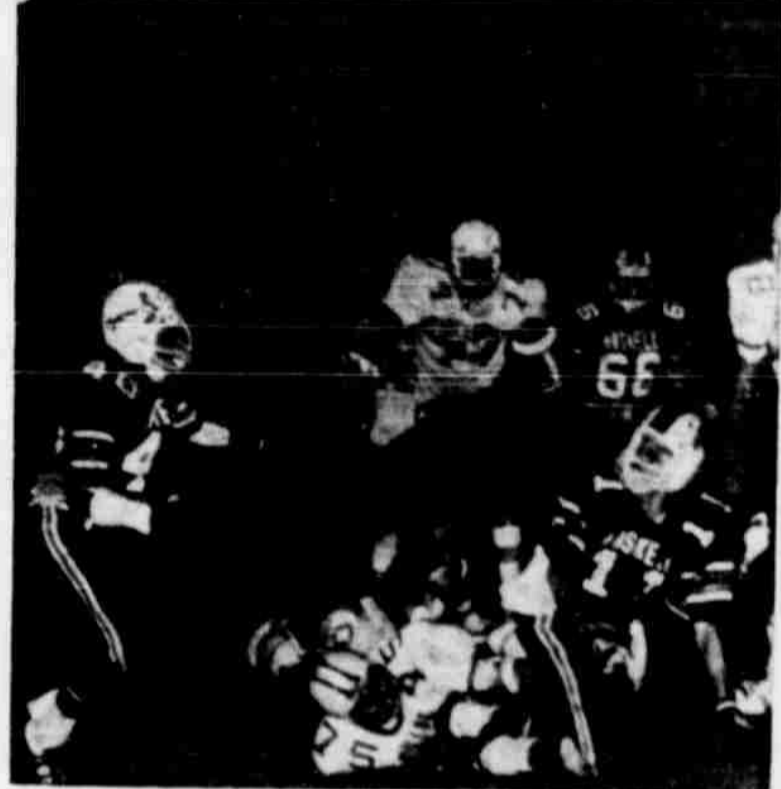

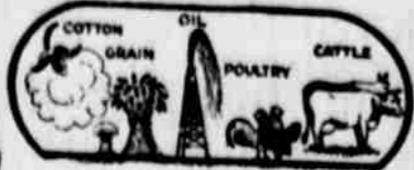

# Farmcast

Compiled From Sources Of The Texas Department of Agriculture

Down and Up . . . Changes in Regulations . . . Fuel Problems . . . Red Meat Production Declines.

A seven per cent drop in the all farm products index of prices for Texas farmers was noted by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The livestock and livestock products was down 9 percent and the all crops index was down 5% below a month ago.

Prices received by farmers for hogs, beef cattle and calves were down from a month ago. Corn and grain sorghum prices were also down from a month ago. Ten commodities were above parity. Wheat at \$4.23 per bu. was 73c per bu. above parity. Rice is almost \$5 above parity. Potatoes are 54c above the parity ratio of \$4.31 per hundred-weight.

In livestock categories, hogs at \$39.80 average are \$2.80 above parity. Calves averaged \$58.30 which is \$4.30 above parity. Sheep at \$17 are \$4.50 above parity. Beef cattle are \$2.60

under parity; lambs are \$12.00 under parity.

Grain sorghum at \$3.47 per hundred is 50 cents below parity. Cotton at 37.5 cents per lb. is almost 30 cents under parity.

Egg prices averaged 57.9 cents per dozen which is almost 6 cents below last month and 6 cents below parity. Mohair at \$2.40 per lb. is about 90 cents above parity; wool at 97 cents is about 25 cents under parity.

Regulations relating to cattle scabies and brucellosis are affecting some Texas counties.

Federal quarantines for cattle scabies were lifted from Parmer and Potter Counties. Castro and Deaf Smith are still under quarantine. Scabies are caused by tiny parasitic mites that puncture the skin of cattle and feed on the body fluids released through the wounds. Scabies does not affect the animal's meat, but can cause loss of weight and decreased feed efficiency.

Kenedy County regained its modified -certified brucellosis area status while Baylor, Bell, Cass, Henderson, Leon, Mitchell, Navarro, San Saba, Tom Green, and Uvalde counties lost their status for failing to meet certain minimum requirements of the eradication program.

Fuel problems continue to haunt Texas agricultural producers. Diesel at present appears to be causing the most concern. LP gas is in short supply in some areas. The general situation seems to be one of confusion, especially concerning the mandatory allocation of diesel.

Fertilizer shortages are also being reported as are occasional reports of lack of baling wire.

Red meat production in Texas is down 4 percent in September compared to a month previous and 7 percent under a year ago.

Cattle slaughtered in Texas totaled 268,000 head, which is 22,000 below a month ago and 32,000 less than a year ago.

Nationwide, commercial production of red meat is 13 percent less than a year ago. Beef production was 13 percent less than September of 1972.

Cotton Classing

MUNDAY

Grades improved slightly this week with 69 percent of the cotton classed being white compared to 57 percent last week, according to Sidney Terrell, in charge, Monday Classing Office.

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service Office classed 6,684 samples during the week ending Nov. 9, 1973, bringing the season's total to 10,300. At the same time last year, 13,100 samples had been classed.

Grade percentages are as follows: grade 31 was 11 percent; grade 41, 48 percent; grade 51, 8 percent; grade 32, 15 percent; and grade 12, 14 percent.

Staple lengths were as follows: staple 29 accounted for 4 percent; staple 30, 47 percent; staple 31, 37 percent; staple 32, 9 percent; and staple 33 and longer was 3 percent.

Mike readings continue good with 95 percent in the 3.5-4.9 range. Four percent miked 5.0 and above and one percent miked below 3.5. Fiber strength results showed 97 percent testing 80,000 lbs. per square inch or better.

Cotton prices went up slightly near the end of the week. Prices ranged from 30 to 34 cents above CCC loan prices. Grade 41, staple 31, sold for an average price of 50.47 cents per pound. Grade 42, staple 30, average price was 47.99 cents.

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## Sen. Jack Hightower To Be Honored At 2 Special Events Scheduled Soon

Two appreciation events honoring Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon are scheduled this month in Plainview and Wichita Falls. Mayor John Stoneham of Plainview announced today that Governor Dolph Briscoe will at-

tend a steak dinner for Hightower there on Thursday, Nov. 15.

U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen, Jr. will be a special guest, according to committee chairman Rhea Howard, at a reception for Hightower in Wichita Falls on Friday, Nov. 30.

Plainview's dinner will be in the Hale County Agriculture Center, starting at 7 p. m. The Wichita Falls reception will be at Midwestern University's Clark Center from 5:30 p. m. to 7:30 p. m.

The state's top Democrats are joining in the double-barreled tribute to a man who has served in the Texas Senate since 1965.

Hightower was elected President Pro Tem of the Senate in 1971 and served as Governor for a day in April that year. Representing 29 counties in District 30, he is one of five senators on the important Constitutional Convention Planning Committee and is also active in the interim as chairman of the West Texas Sub-Committee of the Citizens Advisory Committee on Water.

As chairman of the Senate's Administration Committee during the 63rd Legislature, Hightower helped to cut more than \$200,000 from expenses in the previous session. This was accomplished by staff reductions

and computerization of the bill filing and recording process.

Among his 24 bills passed, second highest in the Senate, was an air pollution control measure that will help clean up the Texas environment and attract industry at the same time.

On the energy front, Hightower introduced the only piece of legislation that would have provided more oil during the next five to 10 years.

Hightower served one term (1953-54) in the Texas House of Representatives before he was appointed and then re-elected twice as District Attorney of the 46th Judicial District.

He was president of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association and was named "Outstanding District Attorney of Texas" for 1959. Hightower was appointed by Gov. Price Daniel to the Texas Law Enforcement Commission in 1957 and has served as vice president of the Texas Junior

Bar Association.

He was vice chairman of the Board of Regents of Midwestern University and is currently serving as a member of the Board of Trustees of Baylor University.

A Navy veteran of World War II, Hightower earned his BA and LLB degrees from Baylor and received an honorary LL.D. degree from Howard Payne College.

Long active in church and fraternal and civic organizations, Hightower was a member of the board of directors of the Baptist Standard and the Human Welfare Commission of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. He served last year as Grand Master of Masons in Texas.

A native of Memphis where his mother still lives, Hightower is married to the former Colleen Ward of Tulsa. They have three daughters, Ann, Amy and Alison.

## November - A Special Time For Food And Fiber Appreciation

COLLEGE STATION — November — a month steeped in tradition, a time of harvesting, a time of thanksgiving! And what better time than to pay tribute to the great agricultural industry in Texas for the high quality food and fiber products that are available to consumers.

That's why November has been designated as "Food and Fiber Appreciation Month," points out Dr. William Vastine, economist in marketing and food distribution for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Farmers and ranchers and those engaged in processing and distributing food and fiber products deserve a great deal of credit for the everyday miracle of feeding and clothing the people of this state and nation,"

contends Vastine. "And, with Texas being a leading state in exporting agricultural products, we are now providing food and fiber for many other countries as well."

According to the Texas A&M University System Specialist, consumers in the United States spent more than \$125 billion for food in 1970, making food retailing the nation's largest retail industry. In Texas the amount totaled about \$4.4 billion.

Vastine attributes this continued growth in the food industry to increased per capita disposable income for a growing population and the increased demand for services associated with food. Unemployment is down and with more than 40% of all wives now working, eating out and convenience foods

are also adding to the food industry.

With present-day and expertise, agricultural producers now average about five per cent of the population, produce enough food for themselves and 50 other people," an economist.

"Yet, as more and more families are further removed from the rural life, producers are getting and their society and economy shadowed by other temporary events.

But they along with the business industry are providing what is needed for granted — food and fiber products.

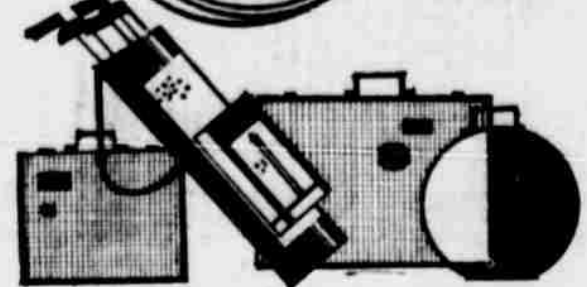

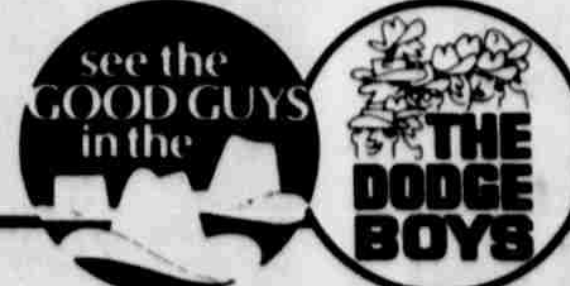

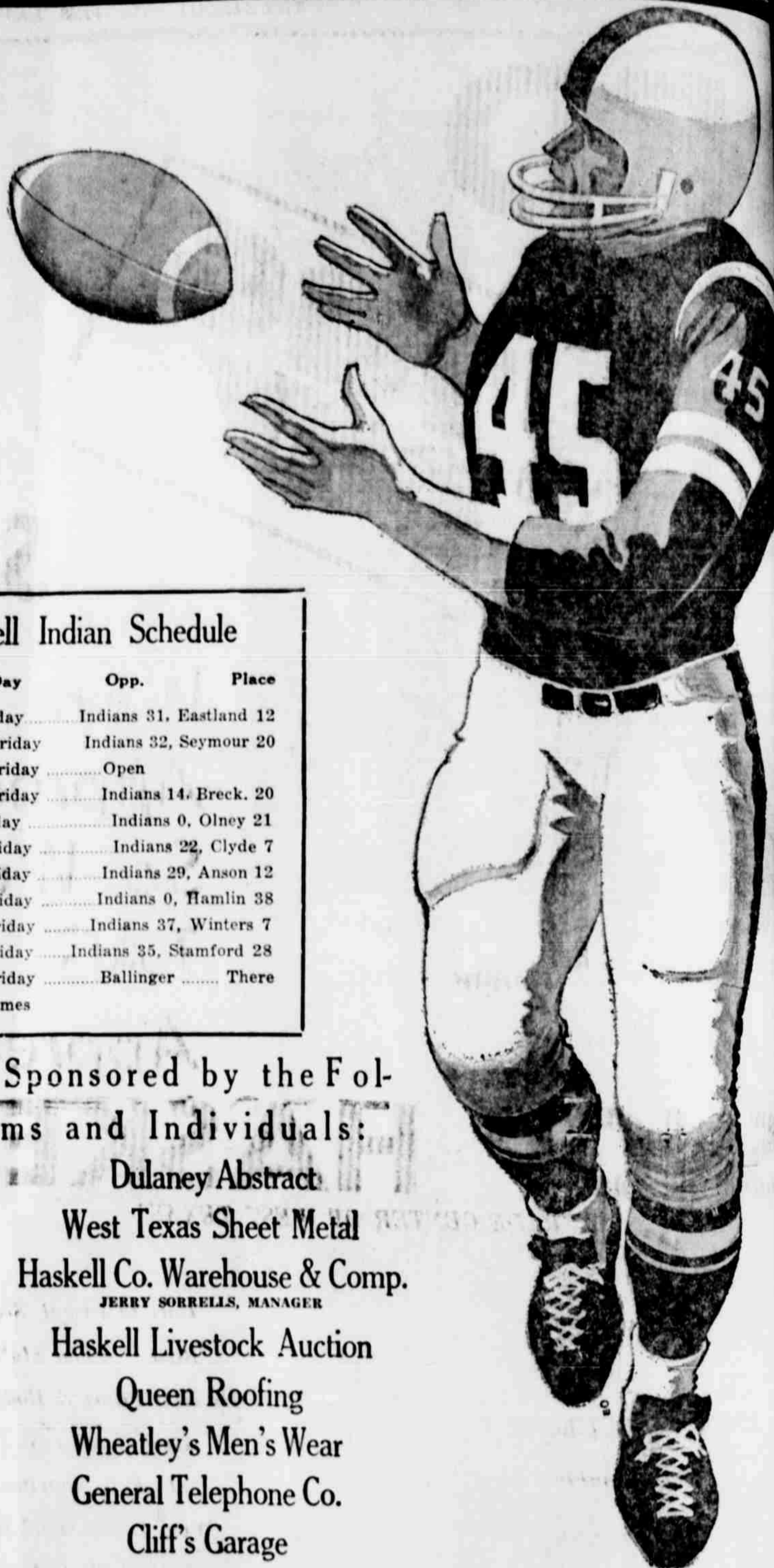
