children ages 6-12. Children under 6





Refrigerate dough from 1 to 24 hours depending on your schedule. Let dough soften again before rolling out. Roll one half of dough on lightly floured board to 1/4 inch thick. If it is sticky, put some flour on your hands. Cut with 3 to 5 inch dinosaur cookie cutter. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Add chocolate chips, laying them sideways around the back and down the tail of cookie and one for the eye. Repeat with remaining dough. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven for 12 to 18 minutes or until golden brown. Cool slightly before removing to wire racks to cool completely

2 to 3 kiwifruit, peeled and sliced 2 bananas, sliced

2 cups seedless grapes, halved

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract



Johntown MBC Hosts Youth Meet


The Red River District Youth meeting was held at the Johntown Missionary Baptist Church this month. A program was presented by the Johntown church on "Plant'n Tators".


The meal was prepared by the ladies of the church, baked tators and all the fixings. A total of 108 were in attendance.


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Rivercrest High School Welcomes First Exchange Student

Rivercrest High School there is an exchange student in attendance. Bradley Paul "Outback" Walker is his name, and as you've probably guessed, he is from Australia. He lives in a suburb of Vermont, Australia with his parents, Gary and Mary Ann Walker and his brother and sister, Aaron 19, and Debra who is 20. Outback, 17, attends Vermont Secondary College, where he is an 11th grade student.

Brad's host family in Bogata is The George Marshall Jr. Family (George and Robbie Marshall, and T. Green). His family at home had hosted an exchange student, a girl from Alabama, a while ago. This is where he got the idea to come to America. He told his parents that he was going to check into the program, and not taking him very seriously, they said it would be okay. They didn't realize he really meant business until the papers which said he might get to come to America arrived and he had to have \$50.00 for an official application fee and \$500.00 for a paperwork deposit. Bradley found out in October that he

was coming to Texas. He arrived on January 13, and will return to Australia on November 30. He will start back to school in Australia on January 12, and the time he has spent in America will have to be made up in his school work. He will not be given any credit for the time or the classes he has taken. He says the school

For the first time in the history of work is more difficult in Texas, but there is not as much homework. It seems that in Australia he has a minimum of 2 hours of homework each day. He carries a C average at home and is maintaining a B average here. Students in Vermont Secondary College wear uniforms to school

Their uniform consists of a white shirt, gray slacks, black shoes or boots (no sneakers) and a blue pullover with the school logo printed on it. He has no problem with uniforms, since it is all he has ever known as far as school dress is concerned. Classes in Australia are scheduled differently than in the United States. It is more or less a rotation system, along the lines of college schedules in The United

"Outback" tried out bull riding. He wasn't able to stay on, but he intends

to try again before he goes home.

He says that T has gotten him interested in guns, but he doesn't want to kill a deer. He has no qualms about hunting squirrels, though, and plans to do so before returning to Australia. He likes fishing and horseback riding. He rides horses in Australia, also. Brad isn't really excited about our food, except for the Hawaiian Pizza at Pizza Inn. At School he is participating in Track, Tennis, and Baseball, and will play in regional competition at Tyler this week in

Before Brad returns to Australia in November, he and all the exchange

The young man was sentenced to 4 months in jail, a fine of \$2200.00, and being struck with a cane 6 times. The punishment may or may not fit the crime, but it is the punishment which their courts have set for that particular crime. His crime was vandalizing cars. These cars didn't happen to belong to him. They didn't belong to his parents. They belonged to someone he probably didn't even know. I would not appreciate anyone vandalizing my car, and I do not know anyone else who would appreciate it. I think the young man in question would be furious if someone vandalized his or his parents' car. So why would he think that he should not be penalized for what he has done? This would have taken years and unbelievable amounts of money for everyone concerned. While the Singapore Justice System may not be exactly to our liking, they at least have laws that people know to obey or suffer the consequences. I do not want our courts to sentence young people to be caned for vandalizing cars, but whatever sentence is handed down, I would like to see it carried out speedily. As long as people in the United States know that they can break laws and get out of being punished because of all the red tape and loopholes, we can never hope for things to improve.
