The Deport Times won third and Bogata News won fourth place in Sports coverage.

Second place in photography went to the Deport Times. Third placement to the Bogata News and fourth place went to the Talco Times in photography.

Third place in feature articles was commented on that they would have second or first if there had been more personal quotes.

Third and fourth place to the Deport Times and Bogata news was awarded for design. "Ample photographs on front page encourages reader to continue reading. Eye catching and helpful" they commented.

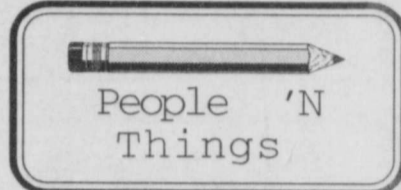
Jerry works for Exxon and he and his wife, a teacher at Rivercrest High School, have two children, Greg and Jerilyn.

children ages 6-12. Children under 6 eat free.

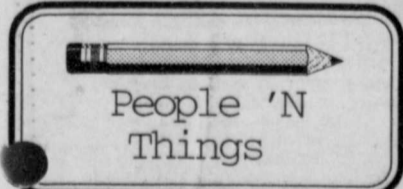

Lowfat Busy Day Cake
by Leah Carrell
1 pkg. white cake mix
1 1/4 cups pure apple juice
1/3 cup natural applesauce (No sugar added)
3 egg whites, beaten to blend
Mix all together. Bake at 350 degrees in 2 layers or oblong pan until done to the touch.
Top with choice of frosting - Powdered sugar or glaze.

Dinosaur Cookies
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup butter, softened
1/2 cup peanut butter
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 egg
1 cup all purpose flour
1/2 cup whole wheat flour
3/4 tsp baking powder
1/4 tsp salt
1/2 cup chocolate chips
In a large mixing bowl, beat sugars and butter until light and fluffy. Add peanut butter, vanilla and egg; mix until smooth. combine flours, baking powder and salt in small bowl. Gradually add flour mixture to sugar mixture until well blended.

Fresh Fruit Salad
4 cups fresh strawberries, halved
2 cups fresh blueberries
2 to 3 kiwifruit, peeled and sliced
2 bananas, sliced
2 cups seedless grapes, halved
1 carton (8 oz) plain or vanilla yogurt
2 teaspoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
In a large salad bowl, combine strawberries, blueberries, kiwi, bananas, and grapes. In a small bowl, combine yogurt, lemon juice, sugar and vanilla; mix well. Serve with fruit. Yield 8 - 10 servings.

The meal was prepared by the ladies of the church, baked tators and all the fixings. A total of 108 were in attendance.

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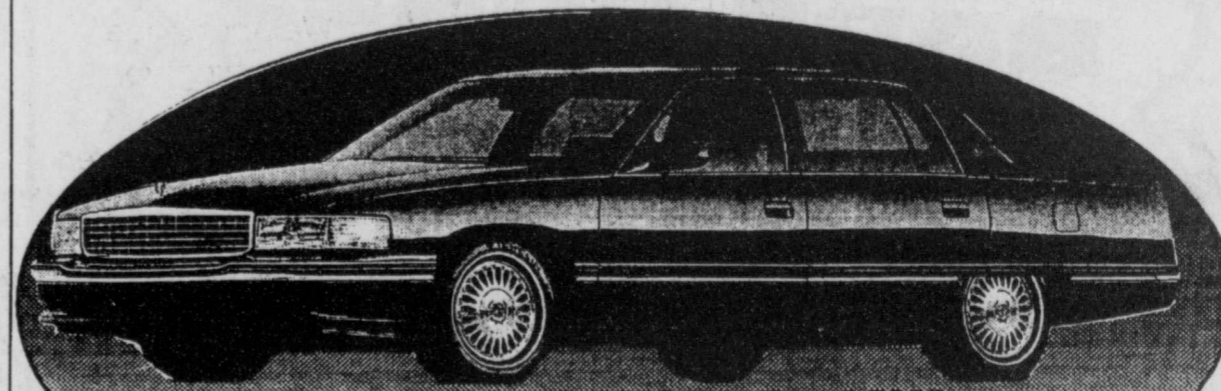
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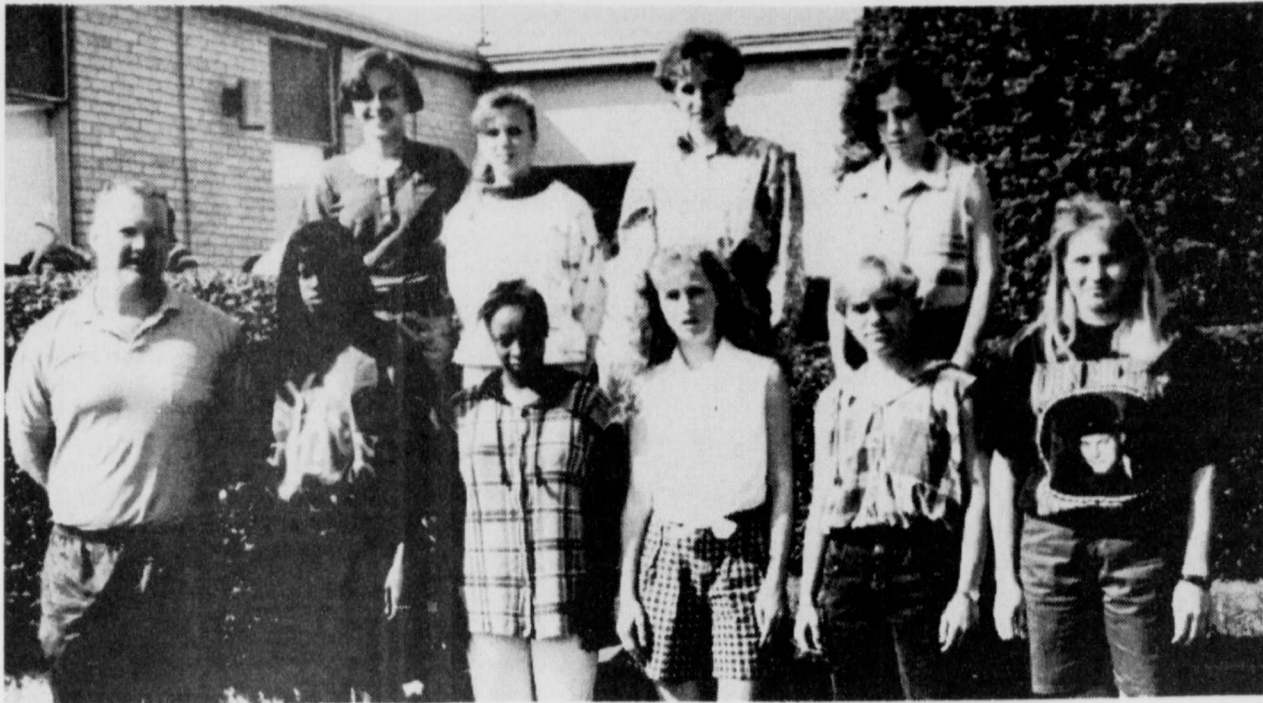

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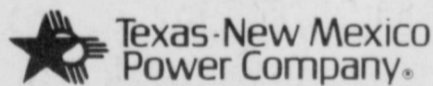
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Statement of Intent to Change Rates

The deadline for intervention in the proceeding is 45 days after the date the application was filed with the commission.

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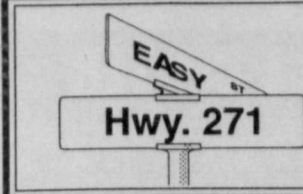

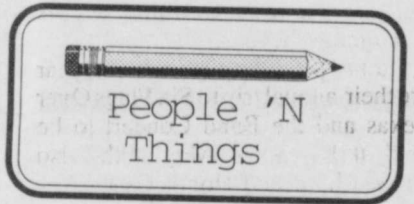
Bogata First Baptist Ladies Study Missions
