New Bridge On U. S. 271 To Cross Tumco Haul Road

north of Mt. Pleasant will be rebuilt to construct an overpass across a Texas Utilities Mining Company

ECOTRIN

A one-mile section of U. S. 271 (TUMCO) haul road, according to plans approved by the Texas Department of Transportation in April.

The \$1.5 million project will be located about one-half mile north of where Business 271 intersects back with U.S. 271. It is being funded totally by TUMCO which owns property on each side of the highway.

In order to accommodate traffic during construction, the new roadway will be located about 180 feet to the northeast so vehicles will be able to use the present traffic lanes until the project is completed.

Interstate Contracting Corp. of Durant, Okla. was awarded the contract for the project.

Construction work should begin in June of this year and be completed by July 1995.
