Toll-Free Ballots Are Here, It's Time To Vote!

The ballots from Public Utility Commission and GTE have been mailed and Bogata Telephone Customers are receiving them. These ballots are for the chance to obtain Expanded Toll Free Two Way Calling to eleven other exchanges.

There are several things that customers need to be aware of, whether they are for or against this ballot.

One of the most important things is that your vote will not be counted without filling in your telephone number and signing your name in the space provided on the ballot.

Be sure to notice that Birthwright, Clarksville and Cooper are listed below your name and address while the other towns are to the right.

Remember that the cost of this service will be no higher if all exchanges are passed than if only a few of them are passed. In other

words, if the majority of voters only voted in favor of Clarksville and Deport (for example) and voted against the other exchanges it would still cost as much as if all were approved.

It is important to keep in mind that your ballot MUST be postmarked no later than September 13, 1994. That is less than two weeks, so don't delay voting.

One question that has been asked is if the measure passes would it be long distance for people in these other exchanges to call TO Bogata but not when Bogata people called them. The answer is that it would no longer be long distance whether calling to Bogata or from Bogata.

To have vote counted, mark your ballot, sign it, add your phone number and mail immediately!

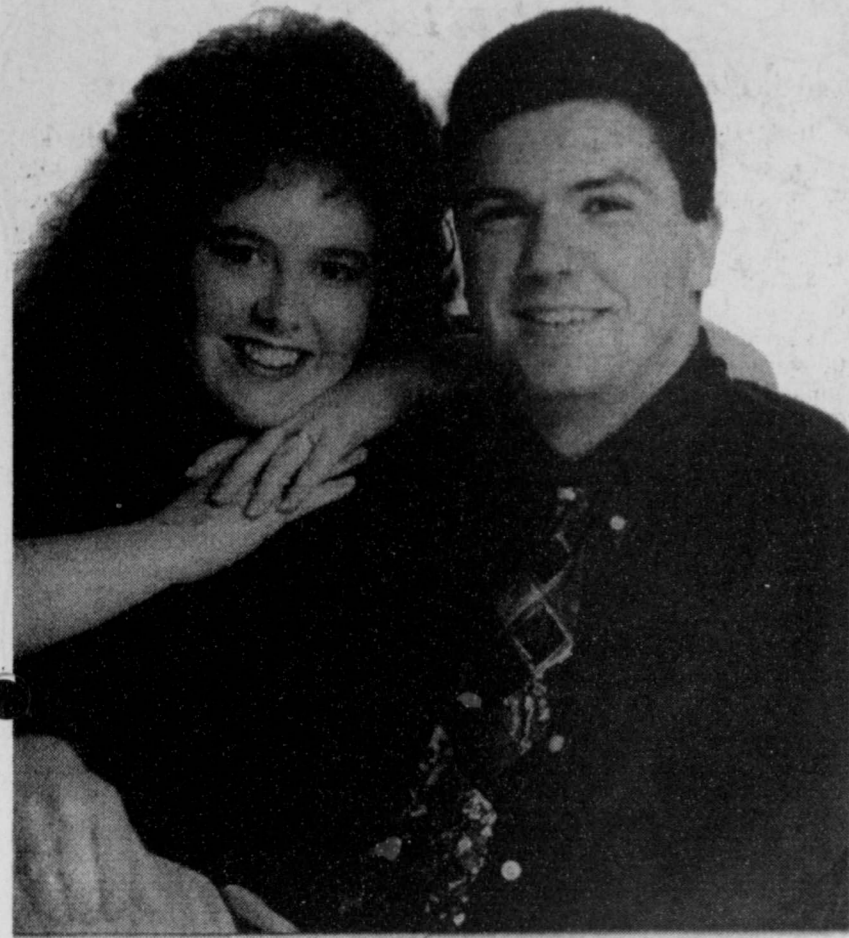
The monthly Community Prayer breakfast is held the first Tuesday of each month at the Bogata Community Center at 7 A.M.

Dear Bogata Telephone Customer:

It is important that you return your ballot that came from Public Utility Commissions and GTE. If you are in favor of obtaining Expanded Toll Free 2 Way Local Calling to the following exchanges, please darken the circle labeled "YES" next to each and every exchange. The exchanges listed on this ballot are Birthright, Clarksville, Cooper, Deport, Detroit, Mt. Pleasant, Mt. Vernon, Paris, Sulphur Springs, Talco, Winfield, Winnsboro. Remember, voting for ALL the above exchanges will allow you to call and be called by persons in these exchanges for \$3.50 per month for residences or \$7 for a business. If you vote for only a few and only a few are approved it will cost the same amount as if ALL are approved. If this measure passes you can call as often as you wish and talk as long as you wish for no additional charge.

There were 330 people who signed the petition in order to bring about this ballot vote. Many more have told us they would have signed it if they had been contacted, but only 71 signatures were needed to be able to present the petition to PUC and therefore many people were not contacted.

After marking your ballot, sign your name and return it to Public Utility Commission of Texas in the enclosed, self-addressed envelope. Be sure when marking your ballot to notice that Birthright, Clarksville and Cooper are directly under your name and address while the other towns are listed to the right.

Check your ballot very closely and return with a postmark no later than 9-13-94. Remember, that's less than two weeks!

Your vote will not be counted without your signature and telephone number in the top left hand corner of the ballot.

We are concerned about the people with fixed or low incomes, that may not make long distance calls, but we are also concerned about all those in the same position that MUST make long distance calls and have to let something else go in order to make their necessary calls for doctors, hospitals or other business reasons or to family. We feel that many people who currently don't feel they would call these exchanges much would use them a lot more if they didn't have to pay for the calls.

We feel that with two way calling families can call their loved ones as often as they wish, to check on them, to visit and simply to share things between them. We feel that this would make Bogata a more attractive place for people to live and would be a boon to existing or future businesses. In another words, we strongly believe that the passage of this ballot would be an asset to Bogata, not a liability.
