The days of childhood secrets and adventures are long gone...but they are well worth looking back to. Try thinking of your own sometime...you might enjoy it.

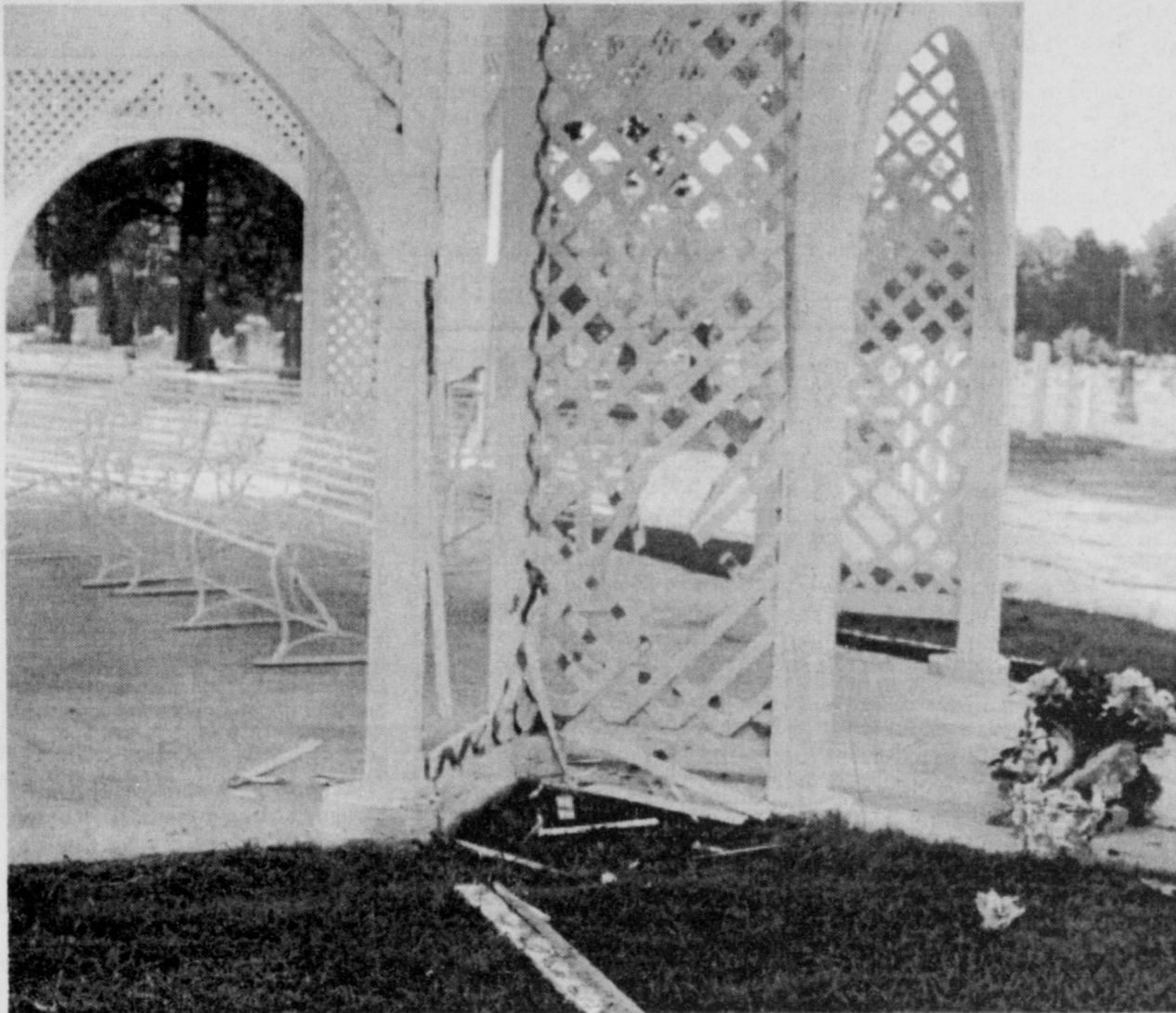
Deport VFD To Hear Special Speaker

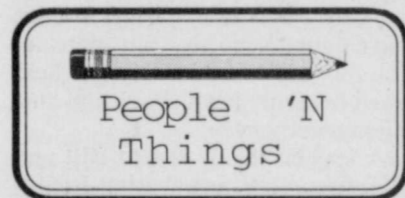

Rivercrest Rebels Get Magazine Review

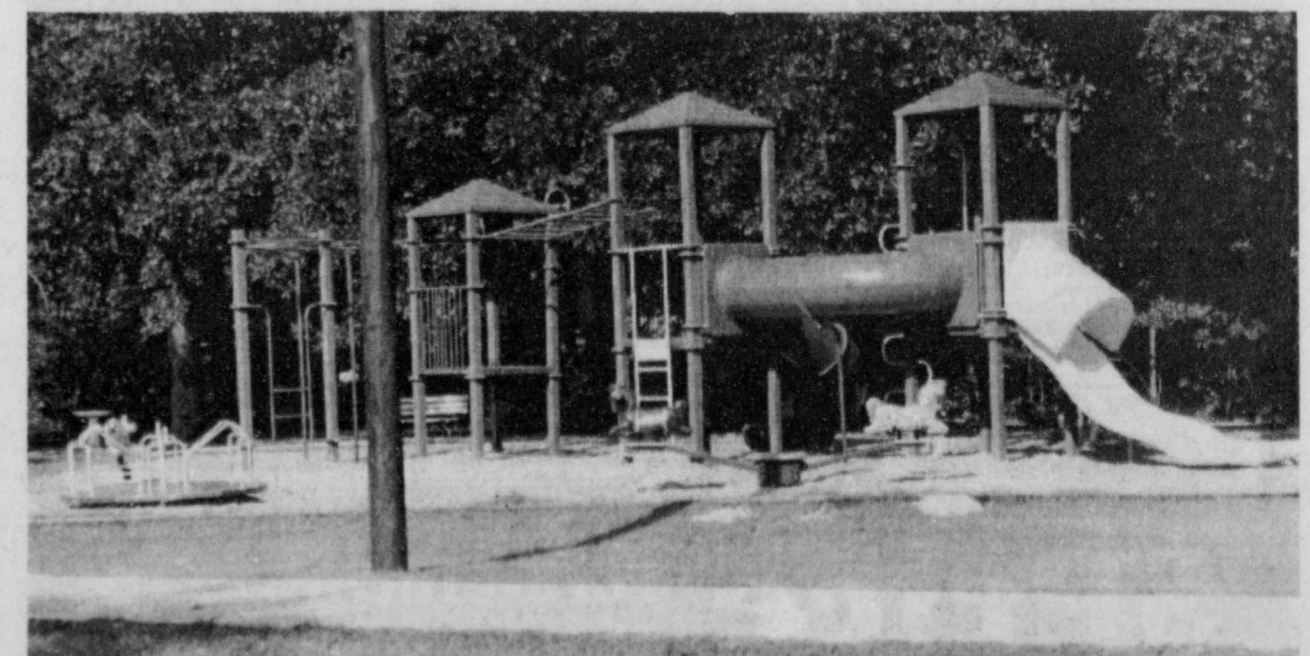
The Rivercrest Rebels received a review from Dave Campbell's 1994 Texas Football magazine, volume XXXV recently.

African Slush Punch
4 cups sugar
7 cups of water divided
4 bananas
1-12 ounce frozen orange juice
1-6 ounce frozen lemonade
1-32 ounce can unsweetened pineapple juice
3 quarts ginger ale
Boil sugar and 6 cups of water for three minutes and set aside to cool. Mash the bananas in a blender and in a large container mix bananas with all juices and 1 cup of water. Add the sugar water mixture and blend well. Freeze for 24 hours and 1 hour before serving remove from freezer and let mixture become slushy and add ginger ale before serving. Mix well and makes 5-6 quarts.

Cheddar Cheese Cookies
1 stick of margarine
4 ounces of sharp cheddar cheese
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon red pepper
1 cup sifted flour
1 cup Rice Krispies
pecan halves (optional)
Preheat oven to 350 degrees and cream margarine and grated cheese well. Add all other ingredients except Rice Krispies and mix well. Add Rice Krispies and mix by hand rolling in marble size balls, 2 inches apart on cookie sheet. Flatten, using a fork dipped in water. Bake for 15 minutes or until done and will make 48 cookies. This recipe is great for a snack and can be frozen for later use.

Coca-Cola Ham
1-6 pound ham
brown sugar
1-12 ounce can Coca-cola
Preheat oven to 325 degrees and score ham and place in oven just long enough to get hot. This will make the skin easy to remove and cut away. Pack the outside of the ham with

brown sugar until coated with 1/4 inch of brown sugar all around. Pour the coke in the bottom of the pan, not on top of the ham. Let the top of the ham cook dry and begin basting every 15 minutes. Continue to cook uncovered for 1 hour until done.

Royal Stuffed Rib-Eye Roast
1/4 cup butter
1 medium onion chopped
1/2 cup diced celery
1-4 ounce can mushrooms
2 cups soft bread crumbs
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon black pepper
1/2 teaspoon basil
1 teaspoon parsley
1-3 pound rib-eye roast (trimmed)
Melt butter over low heat and add onion, celery and mushrooms and saute. Add bread crumbs and seasonings. Set aside. Make a lengthwise-cut three-fourths of the way thru meat. Place the stuffing in the pocket and close with toothpicks. Place 4-5 strips of bacon diagonally across the roast and place in a glass dish or pan and bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 1 hour and 15 minutes for rare to medium roast. Will make 12 servings.

White Baked Beans
2 cans of northern white beans
8 strips of bacon -fried crisp
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon garlic
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1 large onion
2 tablespoons bacon drippings
Mix above ingredients, except sugar, paprika and enough bacon to top. Sprinkle top with sugar, paprika and bacon. Bake for 45 minutes at 350 degrees or until set. to cook slowly for five minutes. Remove from heat and add nuts and vanilla. Beat until thick and roll in a damp cloth until chilled and slice.

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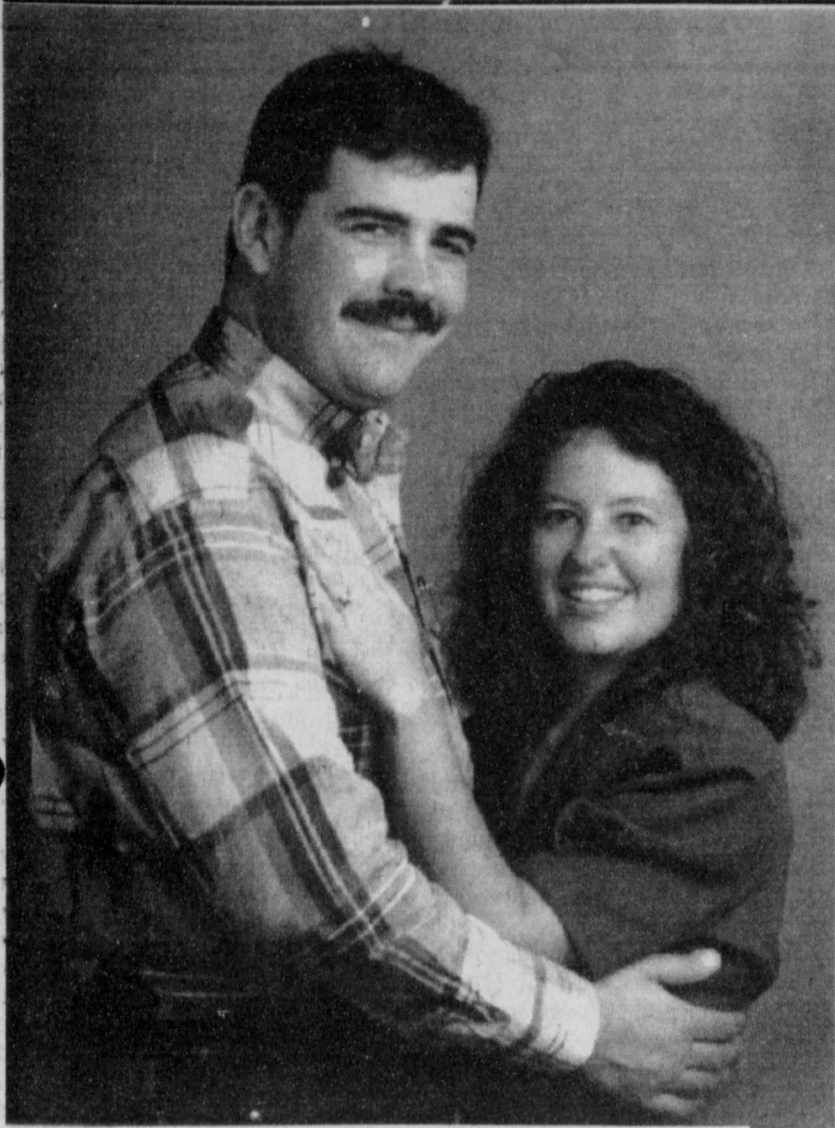

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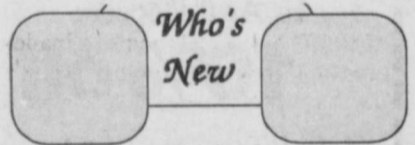

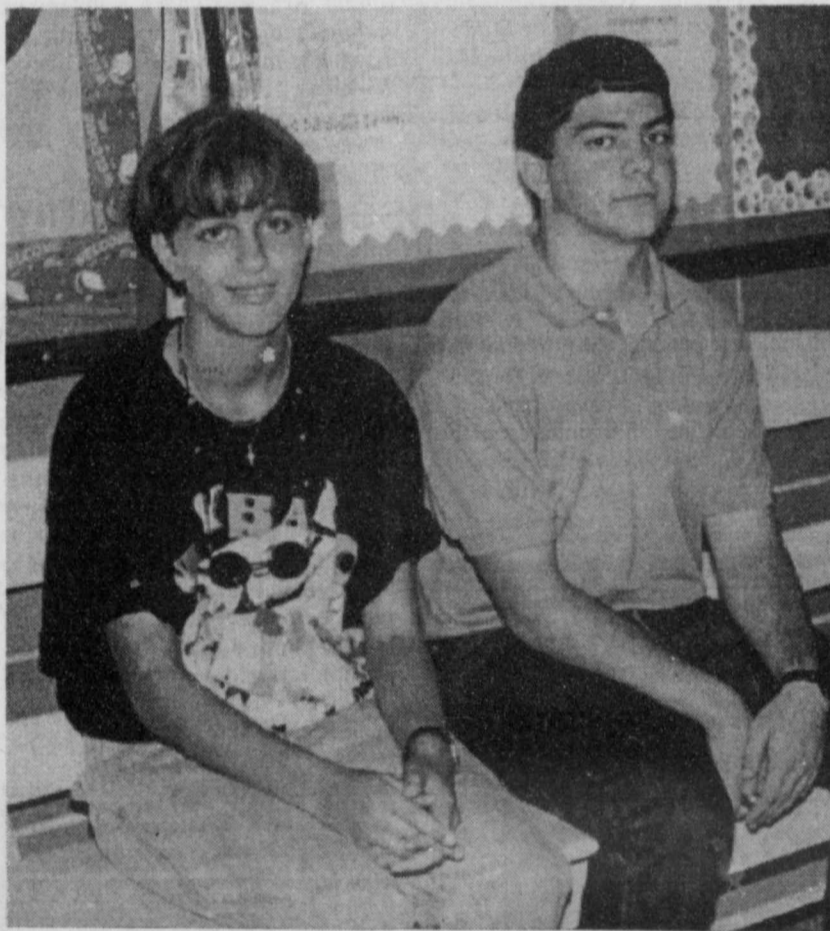
I would never have thought then that I would someday visit Russia and feel totally at ease roaming around one of her cities. Truly a wonderful experience!

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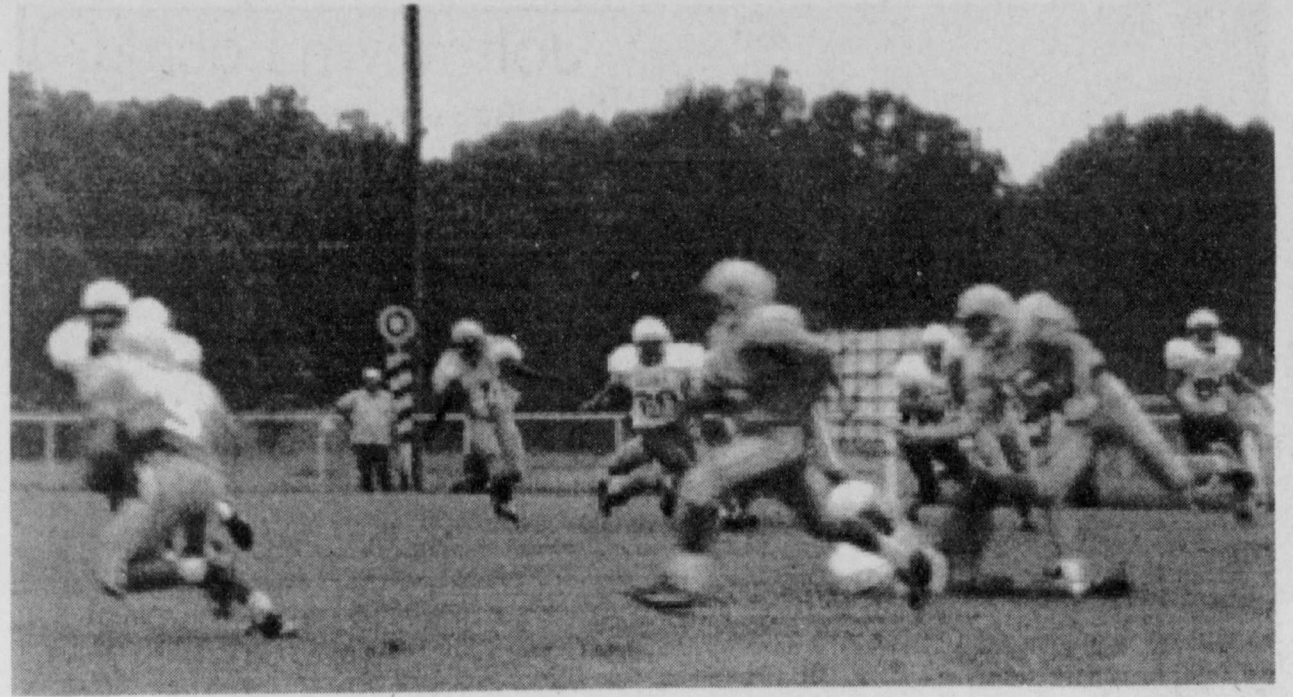

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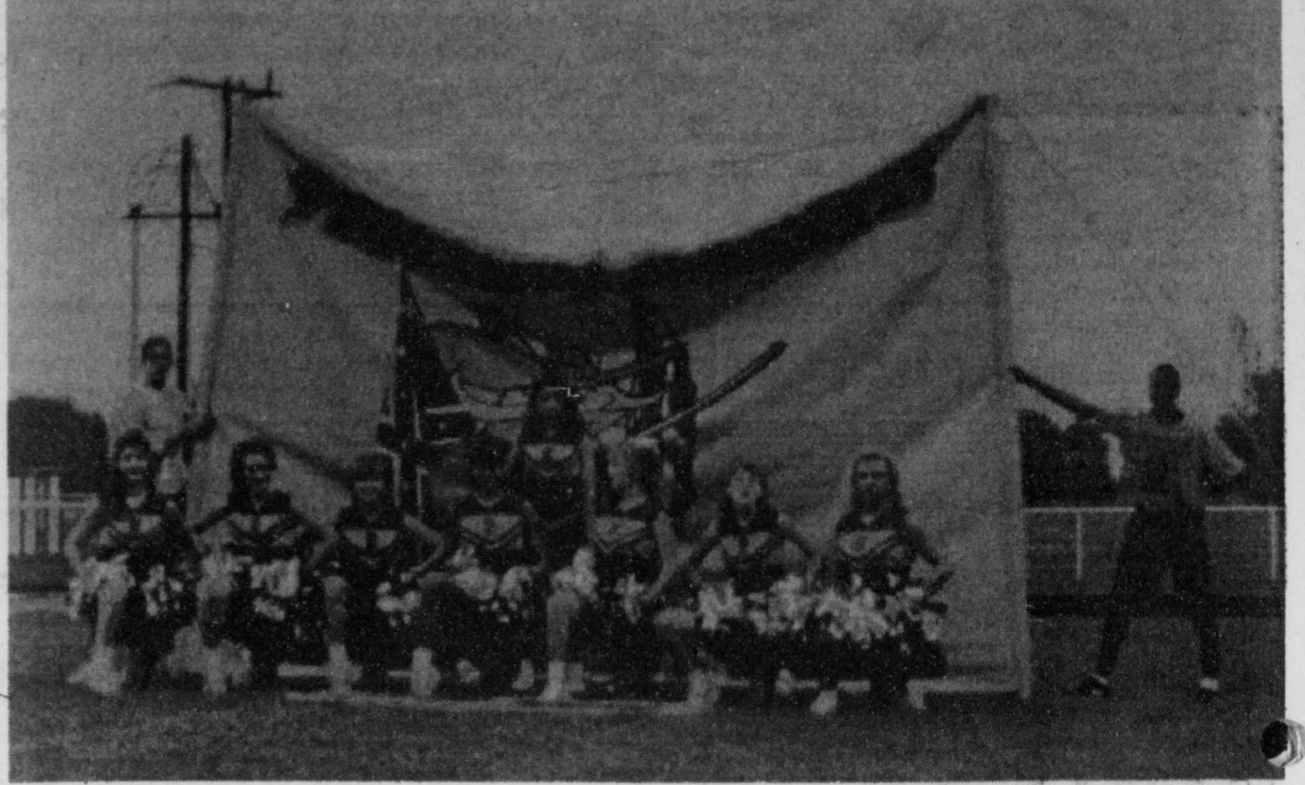

The National Newspaper Association has conducted a large, nationwide survey that shows that community newspapers such as this one enjoy excellent readership.

Among the study's findings: Eighty-three percent of community newspaper readers read every issue or almost every issue of their newspaper.

Fifty-two percent of community newspaper readers keep their newspaper for a week or long. That's very different from verbal media or even daily newspapers!

Sixty-five percent of community newspaper reader households state

that they always or frequently read retail store ads and eighty-six percent state they use ads in the community newspaper to find local bargains.

The average community newspaper reader picks up and reads the average issue 1.6 times.

Sixty-four percent of households where community newspapers distribute reported that newspapers are their primary source of local news.

The study, titled "Spotlight on the Reader: The National Newspaper Association's Study of Community Newspaper Readership" was conducted by Pulse Research of Portland, Ore.
