This country is founded on the principal of immigration. Except for Native Americans, every single one of us is descended from some nationality (or most likely multiple nationalities)that came to this country from another country. Some of our forebears came escaping religious or political persecution. Some came simply looking for a better life, or as an adventure. Some came as indentured servants, a condition similar to slavery. Others came as slaves. Still others (though not nearly so many as in Australia) came over as criminals.

After the United States had gained it's independence and steam ships hastened that long ocean journey, a huge flood of immigrants began to seek a better life upon these shores.

A few of these immigrants came with money enough to establish themselves comfortablymost of them didn't.

No, many of our ancestors came over with absolutely nothing except the desire to work hard and achieve a better life for themselves and their families.

I have no problem with anyone from anywhere in the world immigrating here, BUT, there is one simple fact I think we have overlooked somewhere along the way.

Our constitution mentions life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness as basic rights. Notice the word "pursuit"... that doesn't mean that things will be handed out-but

that they must be sought Somehow it has come to pass that immigrants must be granted food, shelter and medical care without having to work for it.

That I disagree with. I'm not saying they don't need some care when they first arrive, but they don't need to swell our already huge welfare rolls any further. I knew a man from Mexico who came to Texas and worked hard to become an American citizen, raise and educate his children and achieve a good lifestyle. He was disgusted by immigrants who came, took from this nation and did not, to quote him "learn to speak this country's language, become an American citizen and work hard"

If I moved to another, I would expect to have to learn the language, work hard and learn to follow the laws of that nation....why should it be any diferent here?

We are supposed to PURSUE the American dream...it isn't supposed to be delivered to us! Brand me as old-fashioned, bigoted or un-understanding....but I've had my say and am unsaddling my high horse now.



Folks, let's get serious about this and put an end to senseless vandalism in Bogata.

Council Approves Tax Rate, Trash Pickup Increase

The Bogata City Council met on TCDP program application. It was Monday, September 12 at 5:00 p.m. with Mayor Eudy, members Harbison, O'Donnell, Ramsey, Anita Couch, Secretary, Burress, and citizens Jerry and Gerlyn Gray and Dr. E.E. Brooks.

Mr. Harbison opened the meeting with the invocation.

The first item of business was reading the public hearing notice on the John and Mikel Haynes property. The proposed 1994-95 budget was

then heard by the Council. Minutes of the previous meeting and all current bills were presented

and approved. The Council will conduct a public hearing to discuss the TCDP pro-

gram application. A sewer line with an easement across Jerry and Gerlyn Gray's property was discussed. Gray's concern was if the easement would damage the property since the line would run near the house, boat shed and trees. The Council stated that no damage

would be caused to the property. Dr. Brooks addressed the Council on the possibility of a nurse practitioner at the Bogata Clinic. Medicare will pay for a portion of the fees. It was noted that a doctor would be available November 1, with Red River General Hospital paying the salary. Dr. Brooks is to bring a resolution to

the next council meeting. The second public hearing order on the Haynes property was discussed and will be approved at the next Council meeting.

The Council considered a resolution authorizing submission of a

approved unanimously. The Council also gave consideration to Gary Traylor and Associations as the firm to handle the TCDP grant.

The budget for the year ending September, 1995 was approved.

The tax rate was unanimously set at .44469 per \$100.00 valuation. The Council discussed a decision

on the GTE proposal, to receiveexpanded toll free calls. They decided not to send their ballots in. A street light was discussed at 6th SW Street. No action was taken.

The Council approved the purchase of an air compressor

It was discussed who is to buy the toilet tissue and paper for the City Park restrooms. The Council will contact the Bogata Lions Club and ask them to share the cost with them.

The Texas Municipal Retirement tax rate was discussed, phasing in the rate increase over a three year period or paying the increase all at one time. The aproved rate is 4.52.

The Council discussed dump

In the last item of business, the Council voted to increase the garbage pickup service charge as follows: business, from \$10.78 to \$12.04; residential, from \$8.39 to \$9.04. The rate increase will become effective October 1. This rate increase was made effective due to the rate increase that was passed on to the City by Waste Management Com-

With no further business, the Council adjourned.
