"I'm not batman and this isn't Gotham city." I've been known to say to someone wanting me to campaign diligently for what they are convinced is the right thing. But, in my experience it is a rare instance when "right" is completely clearcut.

The song says "I wish it were that simple for me". I believe most of us feel that way.

Most of us are faced not with those life and death situations requiring fast action, but a long string of choices which we must make the best decision we can on. Perhaps we are actually the real heroes of real life...not super-heroes...but ordinary people doing the best they can...and perhaps that is what really counts!

Bake Sales and Suppers...In Jeopardy?

It never ceases to amaze me when I hear about what some government official has found important enough to interfere in. It seems that the Texas Department of Health has decided that the Stew cook offs and chili cook offs and pie auctions are "no nos". Some church events will also be effected. Bake sales are also supposed to be on the way out. There is a problem with cooking outside, as well as bringing pies from home to be auctioned or sold. What do you think will happen to picnics in the park? Will children be stopped from bringing their lunches to school? What about concession stands at ballgames and most public events?

I'm sure that the poor guy who has to come out and enforce these addepleted laws is not the person who makes them but he has a job to do like everyone else.

According to the Texas Department of Health, Chapter 437 of the Texas Health & Safety Code as amended by the 73rd Legislature has a number of rules. For instance: Handwashing facilities must have warm running water, soap and disposable towels. Dishwashing facilities must include at least a one minute bath in warm clean water containing 1 TBL. of bleach per gallon of water. I don't have a real problem with that, nor that the public should should use single-use utensils.

But on to the REALLY great rules: To quote "no foods may be sold which were prepared in uninspected private kitchens. This includes home canned fruits and vegetables. No food may be prepared on the site which involves extensive preparation.

Also "The complete operation including storage, preparation and service must be ENCLOSED in a way that prevents the entrance of insects, vermin and filth. That puts an end to open air, or outdoor cooking. There are numerous other minimum standards for temporary food service operations, but these two are the real doozies!

When people enter chili and stew cook offs, they must do all of their cooking and serving in the public eye. This is unlike the restaurants in which we eat all the time. They are allowed to cook food in the kitchen where nobody can see them and serve it to customers who are unaware of the conditions under which it was cooked.

Stew and chili cook offs, pie auctions and bake sales are the best way many worthwhile organizations have of raising money. Most of these events are run by people who are trying to help the children in a community by giving them something to do with their time so they won't end up on the streets. Cook offs buy fire trucks for volunteer fire departments. PTOs buy playground equipment for the schools with this money. The underprivileged children and adults might not have Christmas gifts if it were not for pie auctions and bake sales. Admittedly these groups could probably go to well heeled citizens and ask for donations and raise money for these projects, but by having cook offs and auctions and well as other money making events, everyone in the community gets to be a part of helping their community. Some of them are only able to donate their time because that is all they have to donate, but time is a very valuable gift when you are trying to raise money. Another factor is that these suppers and auctions are a very important part of community life-a way for us to come together and celebrate being part of "our town". It is a time for laughter and a time to see people not seen every day. It is a time to "break bread together", a time honored tradition with plenty of Biblical references.

Non-profit organizations are exempt from these rules...that helps quite a few events. But how many groups like cheerleaders, booster clubs, small county fairs, etc. can deal with the paperwork to become a non-profit organization that the state recognizes? Since children grow and change, the parents involved change frequently too...making it a "whole new ballgame" pretty often.

Mr. Dan Sowards of the Texas Department of Health spoke with Nanalee Nichols, my boss, and says that if a church has a family night supper...fine, but if they advertise and put up posters inviting the community and charge for the meal, well, they should have a permit and inspection...and once again, none of those home cooked goodies! He also says that the state isn't out to "get" bake sales and small community affairs, but wants to regulate regular food sales vendors...still, he admits that these bake sales and small community meals DO come under these laws and are technically illegal.

Petitions against this ridiculous situation were suggested but the only people who can do anything about this is the State Legislature, so it has been suggested that citizens bombard their legislators with tons of mail telling them what they think.

Mr. Dan Sowards suggested to Mrs. Nichols that people should write to Mr. Dennis E. Baker, Deputy Bureau Chief, Food and Drug Safety, Texas Department of Health, 1100 West 49th St. in Austin, Texas 78756 with specific reasons that it would be difficult for various organizations to be non-profit organizations, or why a group or organization should be exempt. That way, a "package" could be put together so that exemptions could be made. (The legislature would have to vote on this, remember)

Since writing this article, I was visited by Mr. H. Joel Sprould, R.S., a very nice seeming, public spirited, sympathetic man, from the Health Department. He understood the animosity we felt for this type of regulation, and, like Mr. Sowards, assured me that they weren't in a hurry to come out and close down our cook offs. He said that they are more interested in larger operations. He also said that his group would probably work with communities to show them the proper way to set up a cook off in a building, but each contestant would need to buy a \$25.00 permit, or the food which is cooked by the contestants could not be eaten by the public. There could, however, be a pot cooked in an approved place on the premises of which the public could partake. Not so with bake sales. They would still be no nos.

There is still hope, though, because there are not enough inspectors to check out the places unless they get a complaint. There will not be enough inspectors until they start getting enough money from permits to start paying additional inspectors.

We are not trying to blow something all out of proportion, but it can happen, it did happen a few weeks ago in Red River County. Before they can have another stew cook off the group holding it will have to comply or gain non-profit organization status.

If you feel that bake sales and fund raising suppers are a basic, healthy part of community life...do something...write to the above address and your elected officials and try to get some exemptions made!

This lady is as much at home standing before a group of people as she is in the kitchen. She is very adept at giving speeches and speaking before a group. Our cook for this week is Missy Merritt of Pattonville. Missy is from Lake Charles and has several recipes this week for shell fish and shrimp. She came to mind this week as I stood in my kitchen boiling shrimp. This was my first endeavor with shrimp. Usually if we have it, it will be deep-fried, not boiled. I have never had any desire for anything that you have to dig out of a shell to eat. If it does not have four legs and moos or baas, we don't eat it. You know these Texas people. Anyway, back to Missy. She is married to Mike Merritt and they live out on Highway 271 with their son Jake, who is a 3rd grader. Missy did work at the Blossom School, but retired from that to go back to school to get her teacher's certification and Educational Administration Mid-

Management Certification. As I stated before, Missy is a very good speaker and she is a member of the Grassroots Democrats of Lamar County and is very active in the Pattonville Community, working very hard for the community center and volunteer fire department. She is a member of the New Hope Baptist Church and a PTO member and volunteer. Her hobbies include volleyball, watersports, shopping and working with children and the elderly. Missy also sings some with the band that her husband Mike plays in, Wade White and the Plain Label Band. They travel all around the area doing benefits and concerts. Her recipes for this week include Blend of the Bayou Seafood Casserole with crabmeat and Crabmeat AuGratin. Spaghetti using shrimp and a sweet treat called Beignets. We hope that you enjoy these recipes and we will see you next week!

September 29, 1994

Blend of the Bayou Casserole
 1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese
 1 stick of margarine
 1 pound of shrimp-peeled
 1 bell pepper-chopped
 1 large onion-chopped
 2 ribs of chopped celery
 2 tablespoons margarine
 1 can cream of mushroom soup
 1 can drained mushrooms
 1 tablespoon garlic salt
 1/2 teaspoon tabasco sauce
 1/2 teaspoon red pepper
 1 pint white crabmeat
 1 cup cooked rice
 sharp cheese grated and cracker crumbs
 Melt cream cheese and oleo. Saute shrimp, onion, pepper and celery in 2 tablespoons oleo. Add to first mixture and add soup, mushrooms, seasonings, crabmeat and rice. Mix well. Place in 2 quart casserole. Top with cheese and cracker crumbs. Bake at 350 degrees for about 20-30 minutes or until bubbly.

Crabmeat AuGratin
 2 stalks celery
 1 cup chopped onion
 1/4 pound butter
 less than 1/4 cup flour
 1 can evaporated milk
 1 egg
 1 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon red pepper
 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
 1 pound crabmeat
 1/2 pound grated cheese
 Saute onion and celery in onion until melted. Blend in flour well. Pour in milk and stir constantly. Add egg, salt and pepper. Cook for 5 minutes. Put crabmeat on to boil. Pour sauce over crabmeat. Add water to desired con-

sistency. Blend well; pour into a casserole dish or individual dishes. Top with grated cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 10-15 minutes or until cheese melts.

Shrimp Cheese Spaghetti
 4 ribs celery
 8 pods garlic
 1 white onion
 1 can Ro-tel tomatoes
 1 small can tomato sauce
 1 stick butter
 1/2 cup vegetable oil
 8 ounces velveeta cheese
 2 pounds shrimp
 1/4 cup green onion tops
 16 ounces spaghetti
 Cook spaghetti and set aside. Saute celery and onion in oil. Add butter and garlic. Cook 5 minutes and add Ro-tel and tomato sauce. Cook 30 minutes on low. Add shrimp and cook 8010 minutes longer. Turn off fire and add chopped velveeta, spaghetti and onion tops. Serves 10-12.

Beignets
 1 cup water
 1 cup milk
 1 egg beaten
 3 cups flour
 2 tablespoons baking powder
 1 teaspoon salt
 2 teaspoon sugar
 oil for frying
 confectioner's sugar
 Mix water, milk and eggs. Add flour, baking powder, salt and 2 teaspoons of sugar; mix until smooth. Drop by spoonfuls into 2 inches of hot oil at 375 degrees; drain on paper towels and sprinkle with confectioner's sugar. Yields about 2 dozen.

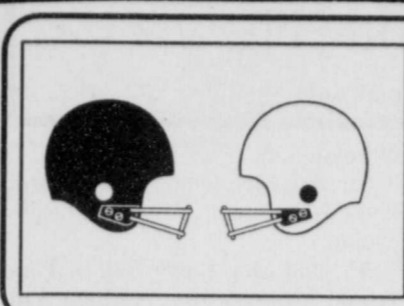

Not too long ago I heard a preacher say that when you live in a small town, people never forget your past. He said that it doesn't matter how well or how badly you do through the years, there will always be someone who will say, "Yes, but I remember them when they....."

I agree with the minister, but I have also learned that things never change in small towns in another way. We moved away from home and lived in another town for twenty one years. When we came home, we were dealing with another generation of people, but things were still the same.

Remember when you went to school and there were the different groups of people? There were people who looked down on other people, and there were people who looked up to other people (sometimes for the right reason and sometimes for the wrong reason), and there were people who could look you in the eye. There were the very poor, hard working people, and the very poor non working people, and there were the just regular people who weren't considered wealthy but seemed to be able to pay their bills and have reasonably comfortable lives. Then there were the folks who obviously had plenty of money but didn't make a big deal about it, and there were the people who didn't have the proverbial "pot", but tried to live as though they did. This last group of people were very impressed with the people who were well off and did everything they could just to be considered as a part of that group.

During the years we were gone, employment opportunities opened up for the people who wanted to work. The very poor people who had done every thing they could possibly do just to keep a roof over their heads took those opportunities and worked to better their lot in life. Most of them were grateful for the opportunity. Some were bitter because they had to

work. Possibly they were grateful for the jobs but couldn't help feeling sorry for themselves. They were probably bitter when they were penniless also. For the most part they are still not the "leaders" of the community, but they are respected people who contribute to the community in many ways. The ones who didn't work back then still don't and still want someone to give them something for nothing. The folks who had plenty of money are still not making a big thing out of it, but those who have always been their "shadows" still maintain that position and make sure that everyone knows that they are friends of Mr. and Mrs. Well to do. I'm sure that Mr. and Mrs. Well to do would much rather be liked for themselves than for their possessions.

I never did know what group our family fell in. I know that Mama and Daddy always worked hard. I didn't get everything I asked for, but I had everything I needed. My husband and I have always worked, but we couldn't be called rich and famous. We don't have a large following, but we don't do any following, either. I am pleased to say that we are on good terms with some of the people from every group. We're not great visitors, but we do love to have company. We could be called homebodies I guess, but that suits us. As far as I know there are no doors which are closed to us, and our doors wouldn't be closed to other people and we, along with most people in our town would do anything we could to help anyone who needed it.

While the minister was right about everyone knowing about the things people did in their past, unless they are very judgemental folks, they are also cheering for the guy who overcomes his past and becomes an upright citizen. It's comforting to have known the ancestors and families of the people you associate with. This is possible in a small town.

New Test Detects Dangerous "Minor" Heart Attacks Other Tests Often Miss

(NAPS)—Despite recent advances in treatment, heart disease remains America's leading killer. Now, an advanced diagnostic test makes it possible for doctors to save more lives by identifying even very small heart attacks other tests miss.

Chest pain sends about four million Americans to the hospital for medical attention every year. For 900,000 of those people, their chest pain is caused by a condition called angina. Partial blockages in the blood vessels leading to their heart cause chest pain or even "micro" heart attacks so small, they can't be detected by conventional medical tests.

It's important to identify patients suffering these very small but medically significant heart attacks because studies show these patients have about the same chance of a fatal heart problem in the future as patients suffering larger, but not fatal, heart attacks.

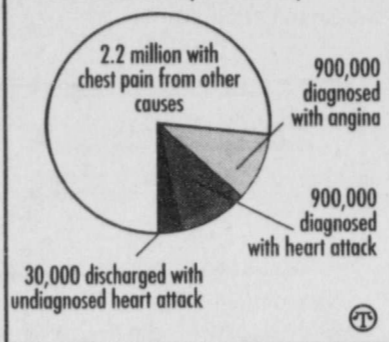
Now, a new test from Boehringer Mannheim Corporation, the CARDIAC T[™] immunoassay for heart damage, provides conclusive proof of minor heart damage that previously went undetected. This is the only diagnostic test for heart attack that measures a truly cardiac-specific protein: cardiac troponin T, which is released only when heart damage occurs.

By identifying these previously undetectable heart attacks, the CARDIAC T assay gives doctors the information needed to begin treatments aimed at reducing the risk of future heart damage or death.

Since the protein detected by

the CARDIAC T assay is found only in the heart, the test also enables physicians to diagnose heart attack even if other muscle tissue has been injured. Damage to non-cardiac muscle tissue during heart surgery often causes abnormal readings in other diagnostic tests for heart attack currently in use, making it difficult to tell if a patient has suffered a heart attack.

The CARDIAC T assay also can diagnose heart attack in patients who have waited several days to seek treatment. Cardiac troponin T appears in the blood as soon as one hour after heart damage occurs and remains elevated for 14 days or more. Other cardiac markers, such as CK-MB, return to normal after two to three days.

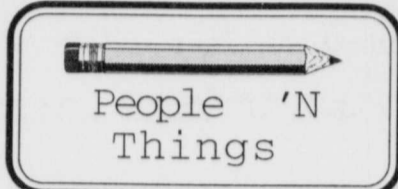
