A friend was remembering when her young son became ill and had to be put into the hospital with pneumonia.

After spending the day with him she said "now sweet heart, I'm going to go home for a little while. I need to see about your sister and daddy, and the nurses will be right here for you".

She noticed that his face became terror stricken, pale and his eyes filled with tears.

"What's the matter honey?" she asked.

"Mommy, I want you to be here when I die" he quavered.

"Why would you think you're going to die, you're goning to be just fine" she replied.

The terrified little boy looked his mother in the face and said in all seriousness "But mommy, you're always telling me if I don't put on my coat when I go out inthe cold I'm going to die of pneumonia!".

In a flash she realized that she was always telling him that..and that he would catch his death of pneumonia running around on cold floors in bare feet. It took a while to convince the poor child that he wasn't going to die.

In another instance a friend was telling about a little girl who listened to adult conversation whena neighbor died.

Fondly, someone shook their head and said "Poorthing, I guess she just talked herself to death".

It took days before they began noticing the child wasn't talking except to answer direct questions. Finally, they asked her why and she said

"I'm gonna save my words...I don't want to die"

I know a young man who was became distressed whenever he heard the Alabama song "There's an old flame burning in your eye" because he thought it was describing someone whose eye was literally being consumed by

The stories amusing...but the terror these children went through is very real to them.

So around little ones we should take the extra time it takes to explain and help them understand the real meaning of something...it may save them much anguish.



Try sitting in your nice home and just for a moment think about fox holes in freezing weather, and mutilated bodies coming home in bags, and if you can remember, go out and find yourself a veteran and give him an "attaboy."
