

This week we will study sugar. Everyone knows what sugar is. There ae two types of sugar, monosaccharides, and disaccharides. pure form, both are white crystals.



These old ways are all well and good, and I'm not criticizing anyone, in fact I can identify with the second group. My husband and I always worked (he more than I). Our children weren't demanding. But there were many years that we had to choose between paying the utility bills and buying nicer presents for our kids. We had family that would have helped us if we had asked, but for us to have asked for help would have made us feel as though we had failed. Consequently, when we shopped for Christmas, there were no lavish gifts, and I knew that the kids didn't always get as much under the tree as many of their friends, but there was a tree, and there was love, and we made it through. I can think of no way that you can help someone who won't ask for help and yet it would really be nice if I knew how without them knowing where the help came from. I once heard a lady tell in a group about this lady co worker who was having so many financial problems at Christmas time one year that she thought she would be kind and try to help her. She took an envelope and put a \$100, 00 bill in it and wrote" Have a Merry Christmas" on the front of the envelope and place d the envelope in the seat of her friend's car, discreetly so as to remain anonymous. She was so proud of herself though, that she went around and told everyone what she had done for her friend. She realized too late that she had failed in the spirit of giving unselfishly.

Perhaps ministers, teachers, and some of the people who come in contact with the elderly and the young families woud be good sources of information. Maybe not, but I wish there was a way to help someone so that they wouldn't have to choose between paying the bills and getting their kids a special gift.




