## **New Parcel Delivery** Options Are Available

When it comes to delivering packages, today's Postal Service is listening to customers and providing more options for parcel delivery than ever

Among the latest changes for better parcel service is the revised yellow delivery notice customers receive when a parcel or letter can't be delivered because it is too large for the mailbox or requires a signature.

The new delivery notice gives the Postal Service more ways to deliver these important letters and packages. All customers have to do is sign the form as indicated for re-delivery. They can choose the day they want the package or letter re-delivered. If they specify where, they can have their letter carrier leave the package at their house, or the carrier can deliver the package to a neighbor. Of course, they still have the option of

taking the notice to the post office and picking up the article.


Customers may also call the phone number at the bottom of the form to request re-delivery or to ask questions about the form.

The back of the delivery notice specifies what kind of mail the item is and whether it requires a signature for proof of delivery. Mail that is Insured, Certified, or Registered requires a signature.

For personal convenience, the receiving party may elect to use the "Carrier Release" option. This arrangement allows carriers to leave non-insured, non-registered or noncertified parcels in a designated place at an address instead of leaving

## Easy Way To Buy Stamps

snowing outside, you can't get your car out of the driveway and your mortgage will be late if you don't mail soon. What do you do?

It's easy. Today's Postal Service has made it more convenient than ever to buy stamps. Through the "Easy Stamp" program, customers may order postage by phone, mail or FAX or from Automatic Teller Machines(ATMs) and at supermarkets and other retail outlets in Lamar and Red River counties.

Using "Stamps By Mail" customers may order stamps through the mail and have them on hand no later than two working says after ordering them. The stampsare sold at post office prices with no handling charges and are available in rolls of 100 and 500, sheets of 50 and booklets of 20. Various stamp denominations, prestamped postal cards and pre-stamped envelopes also are available. Stamps by Mail order forms may be picked up at any post office or from any letter carrier.

Postal customers may order by phone with a major credit card by calling 1-800-Stamp24 any day of the week, 24 hours a day. There is a charge for this service depending on the number of stamps purchased.

Using a facsimile machine(FAX)

You don't have any stamps. It's is another convenient and quick way to order stamps. Orders received by the deadline are delivered the next day. To pay for the stamps, customers simply give their letter carrier a check or money order when they are delivered. Order forms are available from any letter carrier or post office.

Ordering stamps by mail, FAX or phone is a simple, fast and convenient way for customers to restock stamp supplies without ever having to leave their homes or offices.

For customer convenience, stamps also may be purchased at your local ATMs. Simply push the "order stamps" command on the touch-tone screen on the ATM and order up to three sheets of eighteen self-adhesive stamps per transaction. The cost per sheet, the regular price of stamps, is deducted from the customer's checking or savings account.

Don't forget, stamps can also be purchased at many supermarkets. Stamps are available at local supermarkets throughout Red River and Lamar counties and in other retail

## Farmers Home Administration Receives New Name

Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has a new name under the U. S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) reorganization; however, the same work continues, according to George Elllis, FmHA State Director.

Ellis is now named the Acting State Director for Rural Economic and Community Development


Congress passed a bill authorizing the reorganization late in September, and Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy issued orders making the changes on October 20, 1994.

"The entire USDA was reorganized in an effort to provide better service to the public while reducing the number of agencies required to do the same work," Ellis said. "Over the next five years, savings to the taxpayers will total \$3.6 billion through the elimination of 14 separate USDA agencies and staff reductions of up to 11,000 nationwide.'

Ellis said the FmHA and the Rural Development Administration (RDA) have been abolished. Most of the loan and grant programs of these two agencies are being taken over under the RECD title.

The farm lending, rural housing, water and waste disposal, community facility, and business and industry programs formerly administered by FmHA or RDA will still be available at the newly named RECD offices. The farm loan programs will eventually become part of the new Consolidated Farm Service Agency, which was created under reorganization.

"For the time being, people wanting these important services should go to the local office that probably will still have a Farmers Home Administration sign out front," Ellis said. "As additional changes are made, we will be letting the communities know about them.'

## You Can Work And Collect Benefits At The Same Time

Want to "keep on truckin" and collect Social Security benefits at the same time? You may be able to do it! If you're over 62, it's possible that you could collect partial Social Security retirement benefits while continuing to work full-time.

Partial benefits may be payable when you're employed and eligible for retirement benefits (the earliest age is 62) or widow(ers) benefits (at age 60 or older.) If you're under age 70, you'll be subject to an annual earnings limit. If your earnings exceed the limit, part of your benefits will be withheld. In 1994, the earnings limit is \$8,040 if you're under age 65, \$1 is withheld for every \$2 you earn over that amount. If you're over 65 but not yet 70, \$1 will be withheld for every \$3 of earnings that exceed\$11,160. If you're 70 or older, you can collect full benefits no matter how much you earn.


Here's an example of how this could work for you. Let's say, you are 63 and eligible to receive \$800 a month in Social Security benefits -that's \$9,600 a year. You have a job that pays you \$20,160, which is \$12,000 over the 1994 earnings limit of \$8,040. Because you earn \$12,000 over the earnings limit, we would withhold \$1 from your Social Secu-

rity benefit for every \$2 you earn over the limit. In your case, we would withhold \$6,000 of your benefits. However, you would receive \$3,600 from Social Security while earning \$20,040 on your job. Your total income from work and Social Security for the year would be

Next year, if you were still working, you could be getting even more money. The annual earnings limit rises each year. Therefore, a smaller amount of your earnings would be withheld if you exceed the limit. And, because Social Security refigures benefits each year to consider additional earnings, you could get a higher

If you're at least 62 and want to find out if you can work and collect Social Security benefits at the same time, call this toll-free number: 1-800-772-1213 (between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.) to make an appointment to talk with a Social Security representative. You can call that number at anytime to have a Request for Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement form sent to you. You'll receive your statement about four weeks after you complete the form and send it to the Social Security address on the back.

## Pesticide Applicator Recertification Course Offered

A recertification course for licensed private, non-commercial, and commercial pesticide applicators will be held at the Red River County Library, Tuesday, December 20. The course will feature a satellite conference which was initially broadcast statewide in early December. Participants will receive 5 CEU's including one hour in Integrated Pest Management and 2 hours in Laws and Regulations.

Topics for the course will include laws and regulations, integrated pest management, environmental concerns, as well as topics on endangered species, East Texas water quality and use, reading and comprehension of pesticide labels and protecting your home from insects.

The course will begin at 9:00 a.m. and end at approximately 4:00 p.m. There will be a \$6.00 registration fee. If you would like to attend, please contact the County Extension Office at 427-3867 prior to the meetAnswers to Common Applicator **Questions:** 

Q: How many CEUs do I already

A: CEUs are tracked by the Texas Department of Agriculture. Write TDA, Attention: "Applicator Recertification Credits," at P.O. Box 12847, Austin, TX 78711, or call 1-800-TELL-TDA (1-800-835-5832). County Extension Agents are not required to keep permanent records of your attendance at Extension recertification courses, although some agents do this as a courtesy. However, their records would not reflect credits you received in other counties or from other trainers. Only TDA has a complete record of your continuing education credits.

Q: How many CEUs must I have,

and by when?

A: Private Applicators: If your certificate number is 158,532 or less, you have until December 31, 1995 to choose between two courses of action: either 1) ob-

tain 15 CEUs to maintain your certificate, or 2) retrain and retest to obtain a private applicator license (and pay license fee).

If your certificate number falls from 158,533 through 166,865, you must retrain and retest for a private applicator license by December 31, 1994 regardless of your CEU his-

If you already have a private applicator license, you must obtain 15 CEUs every 5 years (by December 31 of the year preceding your license expiration date.) These must include 2 credits in laws and regulations and 1 credit in integrated pest manage-

Commercial and Non-Commer-

cial Applicators: You must obtain 15 continuing education units every 3 years, at a rate of 5 CEUs per year. The 15 credits must include 2 credits in laws and regulations and 1 credit in integrated pest management.

employers has been drastically reduced by new legislation. "This new law means that many employers who previously were required to file quarterly reports with the IRS will no longer have to report employment taxes for their household employees", said Bobby E. Scott, Dallas District Director of the Internal Revenue Service. The quarterly filing

and payment requirements have been eliminated by the new law, and the \$50 per quarter threshold has been raised to \$1000 per year(an amount that will be indexed for inflation beginning in 1996.)

Household employers and their employees are eligible for refunds if they paid Social Security and Medicare taxes on 1994 employee wages of less tha \$1000. Employers can obtain their refunds with interest by filing Form 843, "Claim for Refund and Request Abatement." Alternatively, employers who file a fourth quarter Form 942, "Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees" can reduce their liability on that return by the amount of any overpaid household employment taxes. In December, the fourth quarter Form 942 package will be mailed to employers; this package will contain special instructions and a simphiled version of the Form 843 for

use in claiming refunds. Employees who are affected by

## IRS To Reduce Tax Laws For Employers

The tax law burden for household this change should request reimbursement from their employers for any Social Security and Medicare taxes withheld from their pay. However, employees who are unable to obtain refunds of these taxes from their employers can recieve them by filing the Form 843 and attaching a copy of their Form W-2, "Wage and Tax Statement." A simplified version of the Form 843 will be available after January 1 by calling 1-800-TAX-FORM. Also, Publication 926, Employment Taxes for Household Employers," and Publication 553, "Highlights of 1994 Tax Changes," will provide more details on how

employees can file for their refunds. Employees who receive refunds will nevertheless receive Social Security wage credits on their 1994 wages. To ensure proper posting of these credits, the new law requires employers, for 1994 only, to issue a Form W-2 to household employees who were paid more than \$50 in any quarter. The fourth-quarter Form 942 package and Publication will contain special instructions for preparing these W-2's.

Another provision of the law, beginning in 1995, exempts household employees under 18 from any Social Security and Medicare taxes, regardless of how much they earn, unless household employment is the worker's principal occupation.

For the 1995 tax year, household employers are no longer required to. file Form 942. Instead, they will use their 1040 income tax returns to report SS, Medicare and FUTA taxes along with any income taxes withheld from their household employ-

Even though the new law simplifies the reporting and payment of household FUTA tax by allowing it. to be reported on the employers 1995 Form 1040, it does not affect the wage threshold for FUTA liability. Mr. Scott warns: This new law does not directly affect any state \* unemployemnt tax filing requiremtns. Household employers may still besubject to quarterly filing requirements for their state tazes.

Finally, under the new law, household employers are not required to make household employee SS, Medicare and FUTA tax payments throughout the year until 1998. Mr. Scott encourages household employers to either increase their withholding or make estimated payments to avoid a large balance due on these taxes when they file their income tax returns. Beginning in 1998, withholding or estimated tax payments must be sufficient to cover these taxes. If not, these underpayments could be subject to estimated tax penalties.

## Fire Ants Can Be Controlled But Are Hard To Eradicate

Fire ants cannot be eradicated yet, but they can be controlled in lawns, especially if action is taken in the fall instead of waiting until next spring.

Entomologists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are now recommending a control program called the "Two-step Method" for lawns in the highly infested areas in the eastern half of Texas and the southeastern United States.

This program uses the annual or semi-annual broadcast application of one of the effective fire ant bait products like Amdro or Logic (also sold as Award. Ortho Fire Ant Bait or Hi-Yield Fire Ant Killer Containing

The second step is to use an individual fire ant mound treatment product -- a dust, drench, or granular infire ant insecticides, they are best have been achieved. applied in the fall to produce a fire ant-free spring.

Amdro, when applied at a rate of 1 to 1 1/2 pounds per acre, provides its maximum control 3 to 6 weeks after application. Products containing Logic act much more slowly, since these products do not kill worker ants but prevent the production of new

Ants in the mound at the time of treatment must die off naturally. Maximum effects from these "insect growth regulator" insecticides occur three to nine months later. All bait products are approved for use around the home, but none are registered for use in home gardens.

Bait-formulated products generally use processed corn grits. The active ingredients are dissolved in soybean oil which coats the grits. The product must be fresh; if the soybean oil is old or exposed to air, it becomes rancid and unattractive to foraging ants.

Baits are best applied using cranktype seeders or spreaders. Hand held or over-the-shoulder spreaders are

best for treating small areas. Apply baits in the fall to dry ground when no rain is expected for 24 to 48 hours. If possible, treat in the cool of the morning or evening. Bait products cannot be applied as mixtures with seeds or fertilizers since bait attractiveness to the ants will be lost.

If individual mound treatments are needed, wait two to seven days after broadcasting the bait before treating. "Nuisance" mounds are those around the mail box or by the gate which need to be eliminated right away.

"Escape" mounds are colonies that were not affected by the bait treatment. Ants in these mounds may have been feeding on another, more attractive source of food when the bait was applied. Colonies may also have migrated into the bait treated secticide -- to treat "nuisance" or area. Very few mounds will need to "escape" mounds. Because of the be treated individually once the efslow-acting nature of bait-formulated fects of a successful bait application

The "Two Step Method" is considered appropriate for most turf grass in heavily infested areas, but there are other approaches. In small areas with low fire ant mound numbers or when it's important to preserve native ant species, individual-mound treatments may be more appropriate. Also, slow-acting bait-formulated products may not be suitable for floodprone areas.

And finally, the use of baits and individual fire ant mound treatments will not prevent mounds from migrating into or colonizing treated areas. In those areas where absolutely no ants can be tolerated, surface treatments of contact insecticide containing Dursban, diazinon or others may

be necessary. Whatever fire ant control efforts are used, take care to follow use instructions provided on the product label. None of the methods of fire ant control available today will totally eliminate ants. Plan to re-apply treatments as needed for as long as control is desired.

## Texas Department Of Health To Offer Daily Immunizations

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 4 & 5 North office, announced plans today for offering immunization services for all children on a daily basis, Monday

Immunizations will not be offered anytime the nurse is absent from the

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, 1300 Highway 27 North, Clarksville.

Clinic hours will be from 8:30-II:30 a.m. and 1:00-4:00 p.m., Monday thru Friday. Contact your local Texas Department of Health clinic regarding additional clinic hours which may be available. Parents may call the clinic for an appointment for their child at (903)427-2851 or arrive on a walk-in basis. Walk-in patients may have to wait while appointment patients are seen at their scheduled appointment times.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and age children, beginning at two()months of age. Immunizations to be offered include Measles/ Mumps/Rubella(MMR), Oral Polio(OPV), Diphtheria/Tetanus/ Pertussis(DPT) and Tetanus/ diphtheria(Td). The Haemophilus Influenzae type b(Hib) vaccine is available to children under 12 months of age. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients. The Tetanus/diphtheria(Td) vaccine is available to adults.

All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization records, Social Security Number is available and Medicaid number, if applicable.
