The teenager is a competitor in showing his livestock projects. He won first place in the Hog division and second place in the Market Lamb division last year at the Red River Valley Fair.

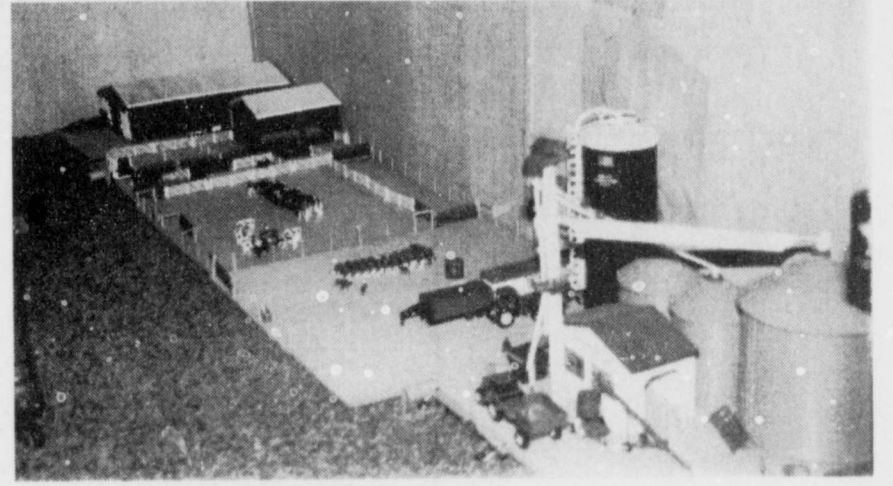
Chaffin also played football last season on the Rivercrest High School JV squad. Academically, The freshman usually is on the A-B Honor Roll at school.

Expanded Calling To Be Available

According to the petition filed April 24, 1994 by the Public Utility Commission of Texas for expanded local calling service from the Bogata exchange to the Winnsboro, Winfield, Clarksville, Mt. Vernon, Talco

exchanges, interim approval of the proposed fees and implementation plan will be granted February 5, 1996.

On September 25, 1995, an interim order of the Commission became effective. The interim order found that a community of interest exists between the exchanges and directed GTE and SWB to seek a waiver from Judge Greene. On November 22, 1995, Judge Greene issued an order that permits GTE and Contel to carry traffic between the exchanges. Judge Greene has not yet ruled on SWB's request.

Beginning January 10, 1996, local calling for customers in the Mt. Vernon telephone exchange area to

Mt. Pleasant, Talco, Winfield and Winnsboro will be implemented. Under the plan, according to GTE, all calls from Mt. Vernon to those communities will be local calls effective that date. Customers in those communities will also be able to call Mt. Vernon without long distance charges.

Under the expanded local calling plan, the basic monthly rate for all Mt. Vernon residential customers will increase by \$3.50 per line. The monthly rate for all business customers will increase by \$7.00 per line.

Also according to GTE, expanded toll free calling to Bogata, Paris, Sulphur Springs and Weaver may be added at a later date, pending appropriate legal approval.

Customers with questions about the ELC service should call 1-800-483-4400 for residential customers or 1-800-483-5400 for business customers.

An ordinance establishing rates of speed on State Highway 37 was approved.

The meeting adjourned at 6:05 p.m. with the next meeting scheduled for February 12 at 5:00 p.m.

1 (3 ounce package) strawberry gelatin
1 (3 ounce package) raspberry gelatin
2 cups boiling water
1 cup (10 ounce package) frozen, sweetened, sliced strawberries
1/2 cup cold water
1 cup (8-1/2 ounce) crushed pineapple (not drained)
1/3 cup flaked coconut
2/3 cup undiluted evaporated milk
Dissolve gelatins in boiling water. Place frozen strawberries in dissolved gelatin; stir to break up. Stir in cold water and pineapple. Chill until slightly thickened. Add coconut and evaporated milk; mix well. Pour into a 5 cup mold or bowl and chill at least 4 hours.

1-9 inch unbaked pie shell
1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar
4 eggs
2 cups milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Beat eggs and sugar together. Add milk and vanilla. Pour into the pie shell. Bake at 375 degrees until pie is set.

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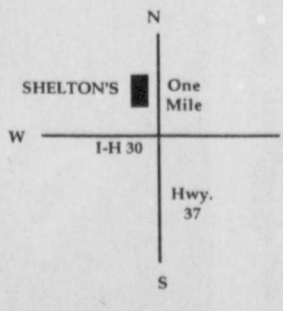
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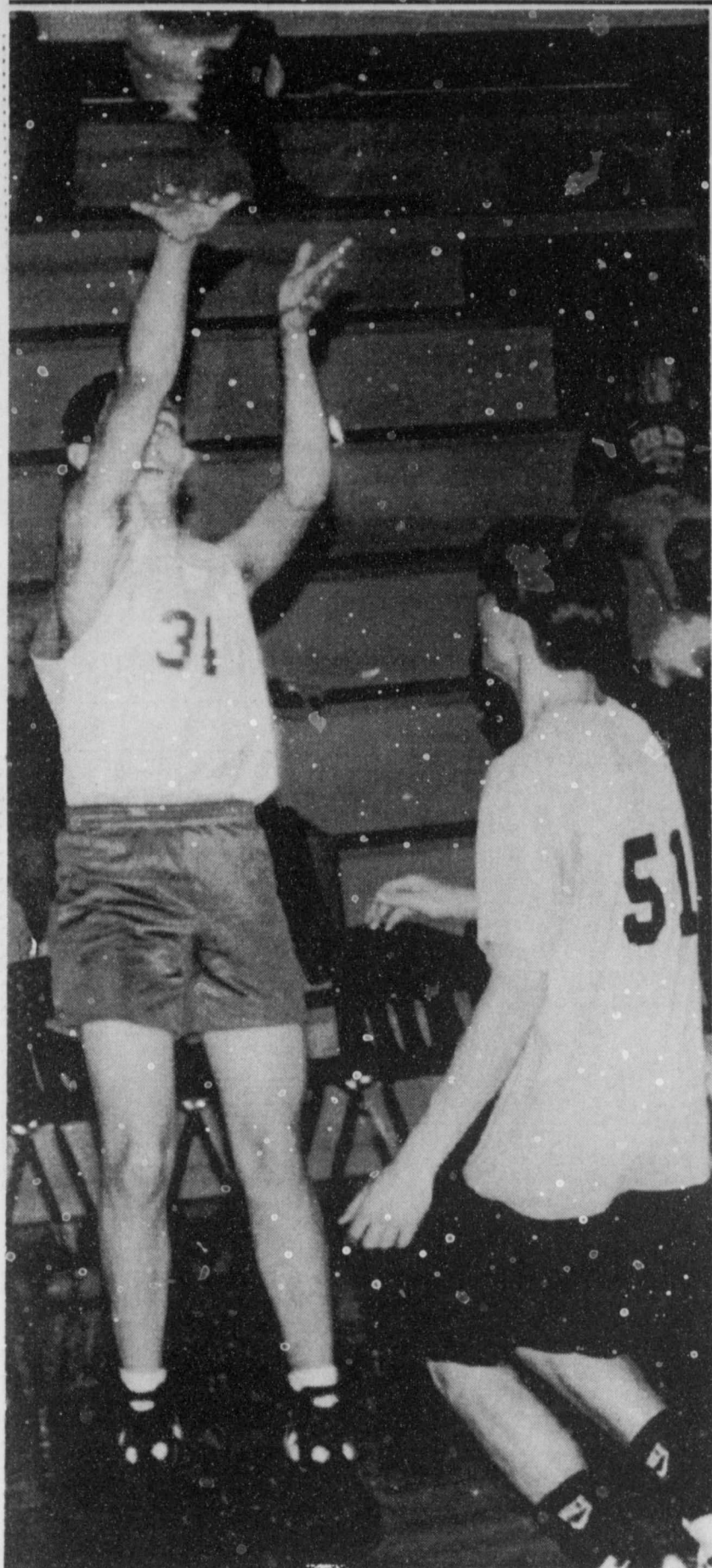
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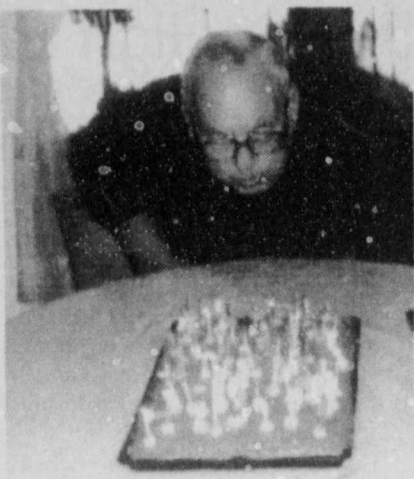


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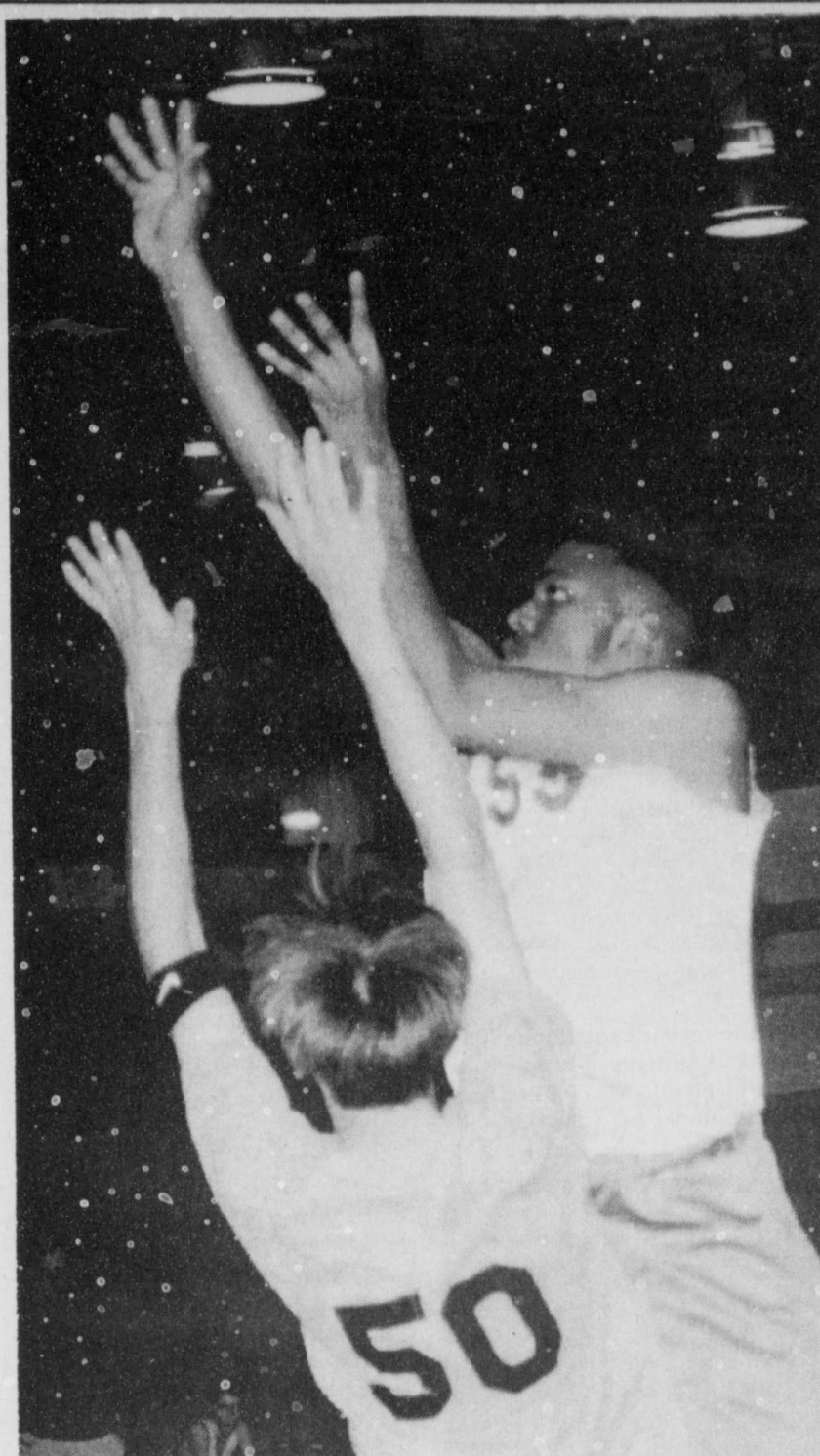


SHOOTING THE JUMPER-Freshman Rebel Corey Tucker finds the net with a short jump shot vs Paris Christian Acad-

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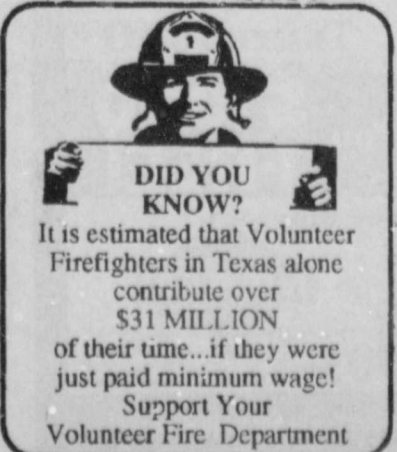
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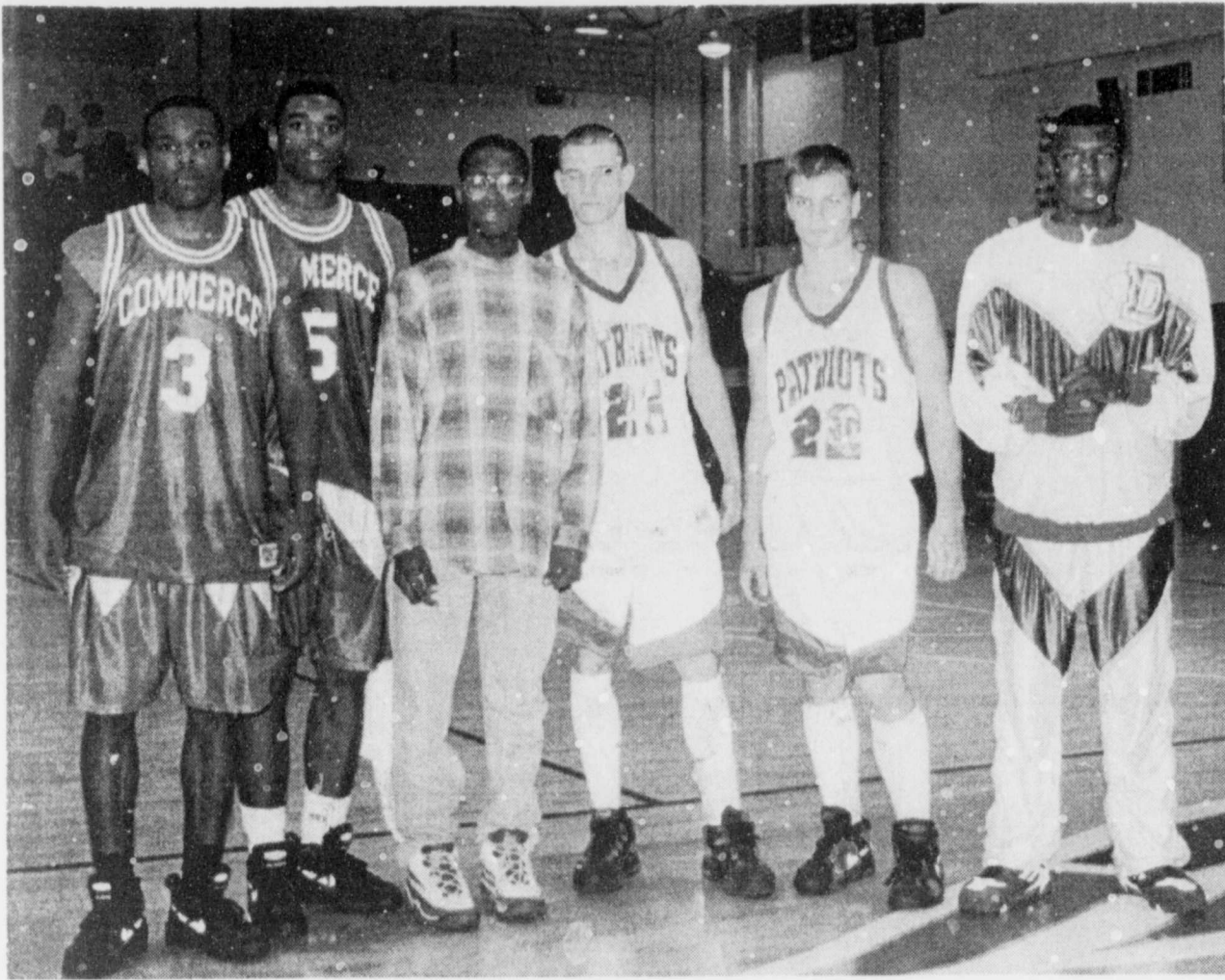

The Cooper Lady Bulldogs stood head and shoulders above the Lady

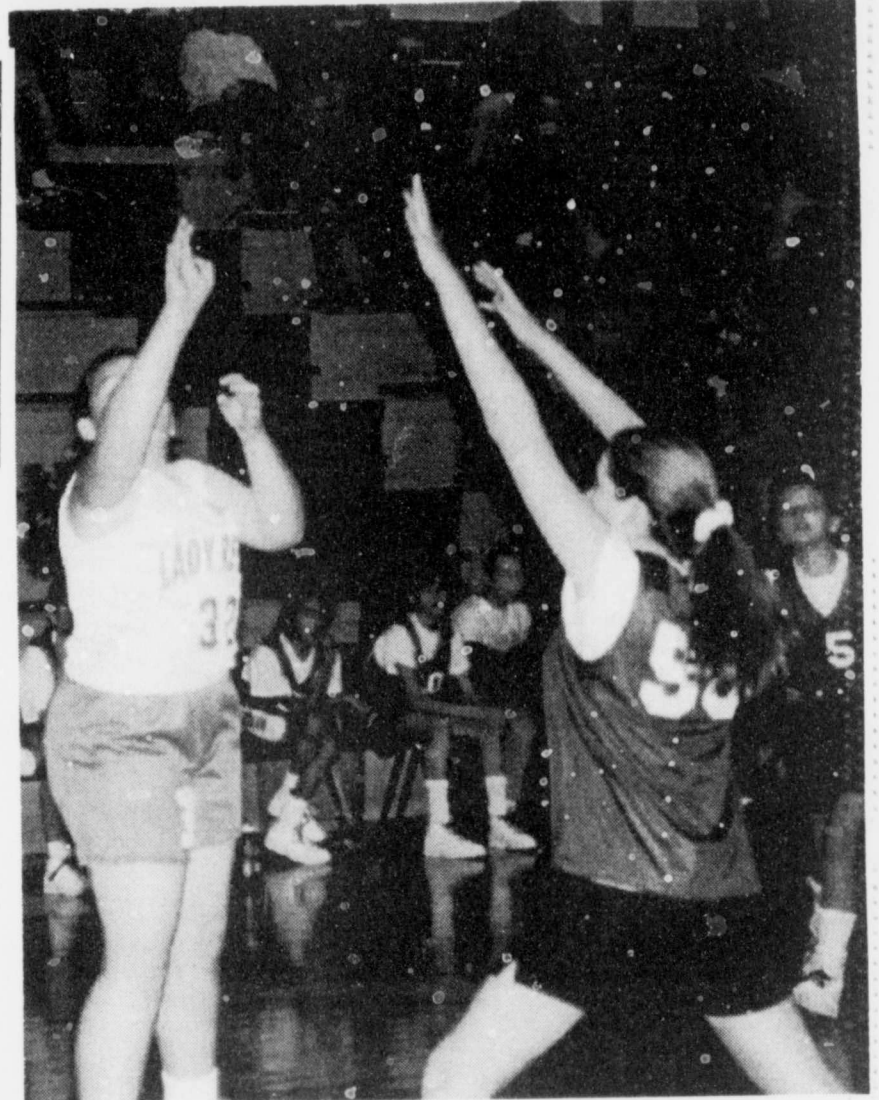

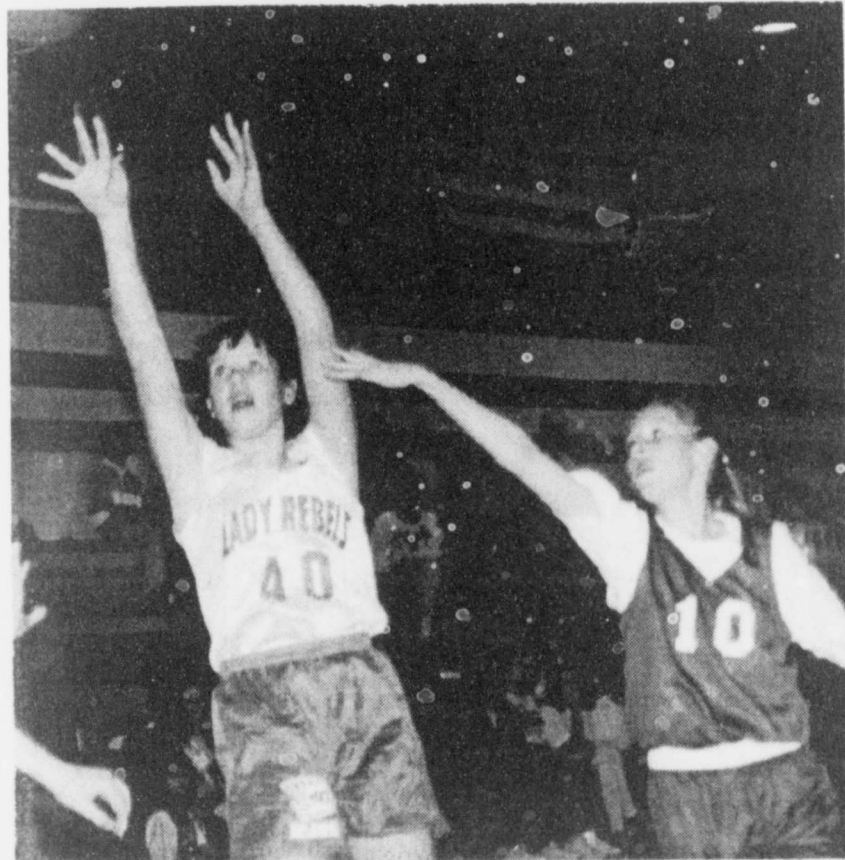
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TWO HANDED SHOT-Eighth grade Lady Rebel, Wendy Gentry adds points as the team tried

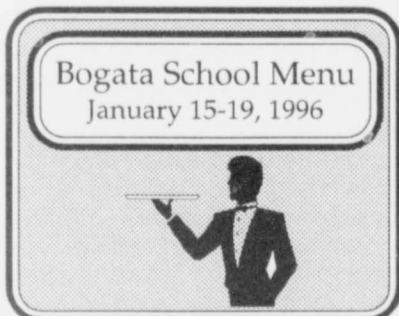
