This past Sunday morning at 3 a.m., as security alarms were going off at a local business office and as different businessmen were removing trash dumpsters from the middle of Main Street, it became apparent to a number of us that vandalism and criminal mischief have once again interrupted the tranquility of our town of Bogata.

The matter is still under consideration and a ruling will be made. Mt. Pleasant was "severed" from Docket No. 13486 and will be processed as Project No. 15152. Because Mt. Pleasant is on Southwestern Bell instead of GTE a ruling will be made separately.

Group Cleans Hinson Cemetery

On Saturday January 9, nine members of the Rosalie Community Center organization met at Hinson Cemetery to repair and rework the bases and monuments as they should be. About 80% of the monuments were turned over. Most of this was due to the base giving way and turning over after about 100 years without any repairs. Those working were Eddy Denny, Gene Bowden, John Ragsdill, Steve Knowles, Jack Dodd, John Denison, Clay Dodd, Gary Guess and Raymond Franklin.

The workers repaired 16 monuments. Those 16 are now upright and have concrete under the bases. Should last another 100 years. There are 11 more to do on the next pretty Saturday. The concrete and the putty material to seal the base to the monument costs money. The names on the monuments are listed below. If you are related to any of these whose monuments have been repaired or if you want to contribute to a good cause, please send the Rosalie Community Center Organization a few dollars to help with the expense. The only money which has been donated for this project was \$20.00 which was donated by Mrs. Lucy Holder just before she passed away. The cost is not very much, but help will be appreciated. Clark's aim is to supplement the Sheriff's Department. He says Sheriff Edrington, the city council and the

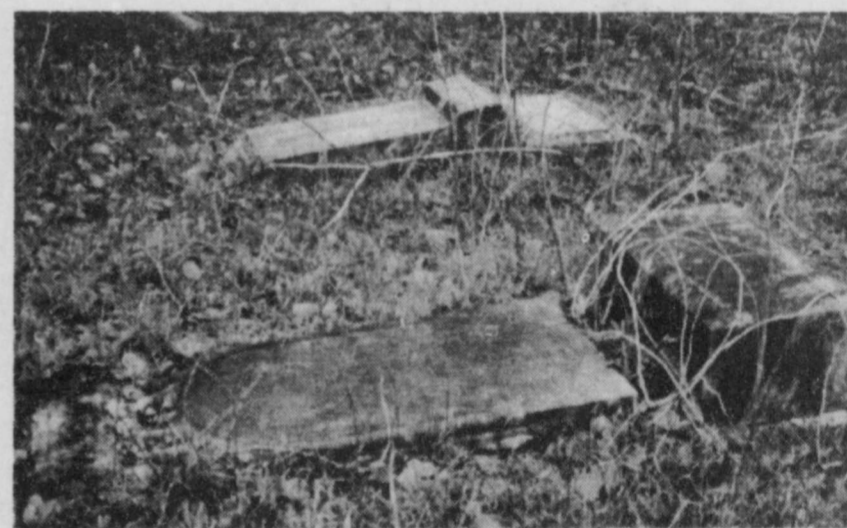
local businesses have been very supportive.

Potato and Corn Casserole
Slice potatoes crossways and thin-like you would for scalloped potatoes. Layer these in your casserole dish. Sprinkle with either dry onion flakes or freshly chopped onions. Add green chilis. Sprinkle a little salt and pepper to taste. Pour Cream Style corn on top. Dot with margarine and cover with foil and bake at 350 degrees until potatoes are tender when tested with a fork. Remove from oven and cover with shredded cheddar cheese. Replace foil and let set in oven (oven off) until you are ready to serve.

1(16 ounce) can refried beans
1/2(1.25 ounce) package taco seasoning
1(6 ounce) package avocado dip
1(8 ounce) carton sour cream
1(4-1/2 ounce) can chopped ripe olives
2 large chopped tomatoes
1 small chopped onion
1(4 ounce) can chopped green chilis
1-1/2 cup(6 ounce) shredded Monterey Jack cheese

Combine beans and seasoning mix; spread bean mixture in 12x8x2 inch dish. Layer remaining ingredients in order listed. Serve with corn chips. Yield about 8 cups.

2 sliced bananas(crossways)
1 small can well drained crushed pineapple
1 large box frozen strawberries
Add to jello, mix and let jell.
Topping:
4 ounces cream cheese

Mix and spread on top of the jello and fruit. Top with 1/2 cup chopped nuts.

New Ground In The Bottom

I stand at the foot of my father's grave. My mind races back through the pages of time trying to remember the first recollection of my dad. Dad was placed in his final resting place on Monday, December 18, 1995 at about 3:15 p.m. I remember a lot of things about my dad in the early years of my life. However, my brain cannot separate the very first time I remember him from the others. I think the first time must have been when I was five years old. I was at Mama Scoggins' house playing. Her home was located 600 yards south of our own home. Someone drove up to the house and I was told it was my aunt from Odessa. I did not know anything about her, as I remember. However, she was about to give me something that would change my life and I will remember her forever. She told me I could only keep it if my dad agreed it was okay. I held the tiny pup next to my chest as my heart beat at a wild pace. I reced away from my mama's house. I crossed the dam where I had fished and the small stream, that only ran with water when it rained. I ran faster and faster, on toward where my dad was working. I could not think of anything but the many times I had asked my dad for a dog. Each time I had asked my dad had refused. However, this time he agreed. It must have been the happiest time I had ever experienced. That evening I would name the best friend I ever had and the friendship would last for twelve years. Dad loved caramel popcorn and so did I. That night Dad popped a sack of it and the pup loved it too. From that time on the whole community knew Popcorn and called him by name.

Dad loved his mother and so did I. I spent many hours at her house. Mama raised nine kids and she cooked all the time. She was always giving me special treats. Dad could not turn loose of Sulphur Bottom, so we were always on poverty's door until my mother started teaching school. Mama ordered clothes and shoes from the Sears & Roebuck catalog for me along with her own order and never let Papa Scoggins know. She said, "If Papa found out he would kill us both." I believed everything she said so this is the first time I have told this story. But several times I would have been

without clothes and shoes if Beulah May Scoggins had not loved her grandchild. Years later we moved into the house that she left. I had fond memories of that house, but one night it burned to the ground, with almost nothing saved, my mom and dad had to start all over again.

I learned many things from my dad. One day Mr. Leroy Lewis came to visit Dad I remember as plain as day that afternoon as Dad and Mr. Leroy were talking. I interrupted and asked Mr. Leroy something. When I called him Leroy, my dad reached and took my left ear in his right hand and twisted it until I cried. Dad quietly told me that little boys did not interrupt men when they were talking. He said, "If you ever call a man older than you by his first name without putting Mr. in front of it, I will strip the hide right off your back." As he twisted my ear even more, he looked me straight in the eye and I knew he meant every word. To this day, I still say "Mister" to men that are older than I. It's a lesson I passed on to my own kids. Dad always told me there were three ways to do any job: First, the right way, Second, the wrong way and Third, his way. And as long as I was under his roof it was his way. The first job I took after Paris Jr. College, the boss told me the same thing. I said, "No problem, I have been doing it that way all my life." Of course as soon as he left I did it my way, just as I did with my father. In a few months, I was looking back at my old boss as I started my climb up the corporate ladder.

One day in town my dad introduced me to Mr. Rob Scott. Mr. Scott patted me on the head and said he was glad to see me again. I wondered what he meant. Each man had a twinkle in his eye as they talked about the hard work they had done in Sulphur Bottom. Later, my mother told me about how the Scott family had taken me to their home many times when I was a baby. That day on the way home I asked why Mr. Scott was black. My dad said, "Only God knows that, but the only difference in Rob Scott and me is the color of his skin. We have both worked hard trying to make a living for our families."

The Varsity Lady Rebels took the court for a tough game.

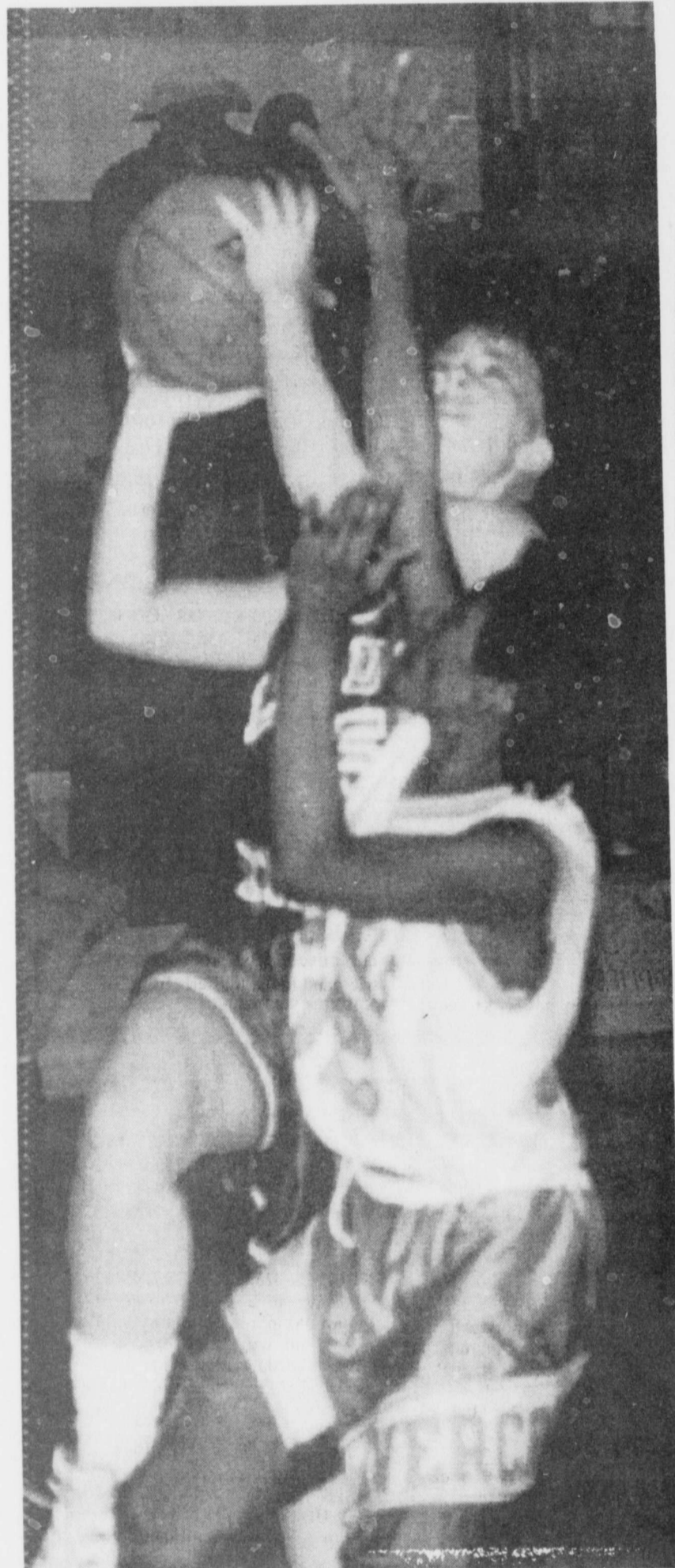

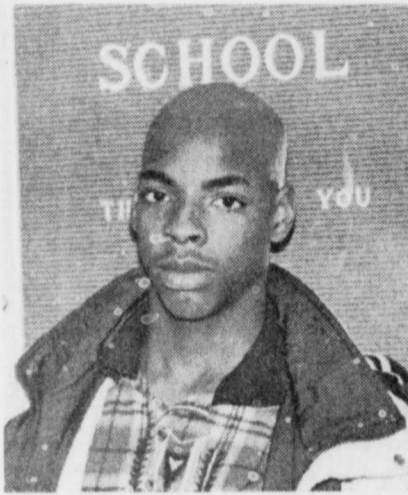

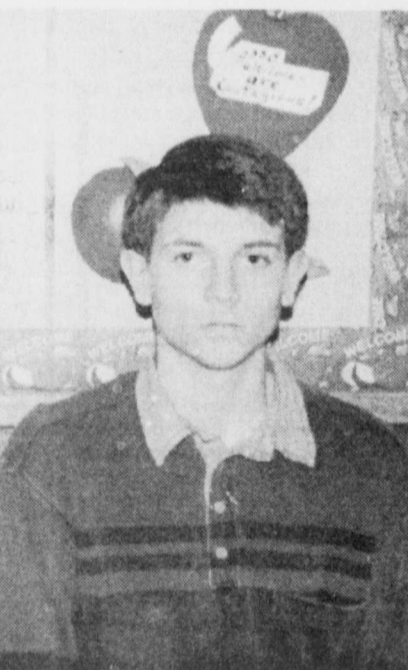
