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Red River General Hospital to join ETMC System

hospital's board of directors, announced today that a lease agreement has been signed regarding the Clarksville affiliation with the East Texas Medical Center Regional Healthcare System. The announcement of this lease signing comes following a vote by the Red River General Hospital board on January 10th culminated its search for a private organization to lease and operate the hospital.

"Our intent was to find an appropriate partner to provide the resources and financial ability needed for Red River General to thrive, especially in light of new federal government requirements and the growth of managed care. We believe we have found that partner in the ETMC system." said Mr. Wood.

"With our high percentage of Medicare patients, it is to the advantage of Clarksville and surrounding communities for our hospital to affiliate with a larger organization.

Elmer G. Ellis, president/CEO of the East Texas Medical Center Regional Healthcare System, noted that the addition of Red River General would reflect the Tyler-based System's mission of providing quality Healthcare services in home comcensed for 52 beds, will become East Texas Medical Center, Clarksville under this contract that will begin April 1st, 1996. The hospital's board of directors would consist of representatives of the system and local community leaders.

Other nospital within the East Texas Medical Center Regional Healthcare System include ETMC Tyler, ETMC Athens, ETMC Crockett, ETMC Mt. Vernon, ETMC Pittsburg and ETMC Rusk, as well as the ETMC Rehabilitation Center and the ETMC Speciality Hospital.

Mr. Wood cited the ETMC System's proven track record is managing rural hospitals as the primary reason that the System emerged as the leading candidate in the search process. Other factors include the comprehensive services offered through the System, including it's special care facilities in Tyler and it's strength in emergency services through a network of trauma centers, the Air I emergency helicopters and East Texas Medical Center EMS.

In addition, ETMC has served as a regional leader in managed care as one of the founding hospitals of Healthcare Partners of East Texas. the region's largest managed care organization that includes a network of

36 hospitals and 900 physicians. Red River General Hospital signed a participating agreement with Healthcare

Red River General Hospital employs 127 people and has a medical staff of seven, representing the specialties of family practice, internal medicine, general surgery and cardiology. The hospital provides general acute care and diagnostic services, laboratory programs an intensive/ coronary care unit, physical therapy, emergency care and home health services in nursing and respiratory care. In addition, it operates two rural health clinics set in Bogata and DeKalb.

The East Texas Medical Center Regional Healthcare System serves as the region's largest healthcare delivery system, employing 3,500 people and providing care to more than 280,000 East Texans each year. In addition to the ETMC operated hospitals, member affiliates are Wood County Central Hospital in Tyler. The ETMC System outreach continues through 18 rural health clinics, the region's largest hospital based. Home Care program and East Texas Medical Center Emergency Medical Service (EMS), which provides emergency medical care to nearly 10,000 square miles of east and central Texas.



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



Spread frosting(mix ingredients by order and beat until fluffy) over cooled brownies and sprinkle with chocolate mint chips for garnish. Refrigerate about one hour or until frosting is firm. Lift foil by the ends onto a cutting board. Cut into squares. Yields 16.

Crunchy Chicken 2-1/2 pounds of chicken pieces salt and pepper to taste juice of one lemon

3/4 cup oil 2 cups crushed corn flakes

pepper. Add lemon juice to oil; roll chicken in oil and then corn flakes. Place in casserole dish. Sprinkle 2 tablespoons remaining oil mixture over chicken(discard remaining oil mixture) and bake at 450 degrees for 20 minutes. Reduce heat to 325 degrees for 30 minutes or until chicken is tender.
