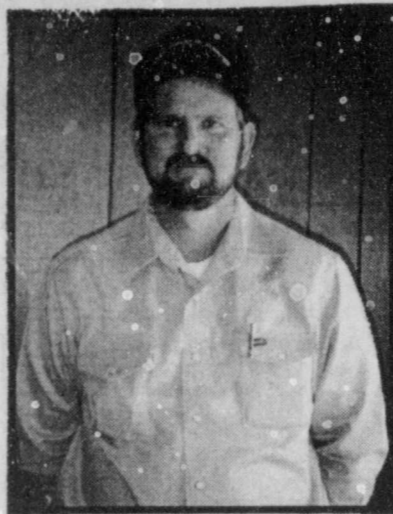
Mr. Shimpock continued, "I will continue to assist these departments when they need my help."

City Election date set, speed bumps discussed by council

The Bogata City Council met Monday, February 12 at 5:00 p.m. with all members present, except one. The Mayor called the meeting to order and said the invocation. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. More consideration was given to the speed bumps on Circle Drive and the council agreed to leave as is for the present, but when the street is paved (on the 1995 grant) they will not be replaced.

The pump on the 1969 fire truck will be repaired by Charles Smith for cost of parts only.

An amendment to contract with Gary R. Traylor and Associates for grant management services for the 1992 grant was approved.

The budget was amended to allow for cost of law enforcement.

Costs of municipal fines were approved, and Mayor ordered City Election to be held May 4. A Mayor and two City council men will be elected to fill the places of Buck Ramsey and Alfred Puckett, whose terms will expire.

The meeting adjourned at 6:15 p.m.

Bogata Lions Club to hold county wide political forum

"Why would a candidate for precinct three commissioner want to come to a forum in precinct one?" you might ask. Each commissioner is responsible for spending and investing our tax money wisely with the whole county in mind. The Lions Club feels that it is in the county's best interest and would make prudent business sense for there to be a working relationship between the commissioners in each precinct and residents of all precincts.

The forum will be relaxed with each prospective candidate receiving five minutes to state their platform and make any comments (that are

positive). There will be no form of derogatory statements or inferences permitted by any speaker concerning his or her opponents or predecessor. No straw polls will be taken. Candidates will be encouraged to meet as many of the residents as time will permit before and after the forum, pass out cards and even kiss babies if they choose.

The stew supper will start at 4:00 PM. with the proceeds helping fund the Eyeglass and Scholarship Programs. There will be no set price per bowl. This week's cook is a true sweetheart! Or shall I say a set of true sweethearts, because she and her husband will be married 66 years on June 7, 1996! They are Willie and Walker Devlin of the Minter community. It was a pleasure to meet this delightful pair!

They went to Hugo in 1930, married, came back and went back to work in the cotton fields the next day and have been working ever since. This was at the beginning of the Depression and they have seen many changes throughout the years. They were both born in Lamar County and have lived in their home since 1947. Mrs. Devlin was born and raised in and around the Minter community her entire life.

She gave me a tour of her home and it was spotless and decked out with antiques and many handstitched items both she and her daughter made. They lost their only child, Nancy last year and are still going through a healing process. They have two granddaughters, Katie who works in Austin and Sarah a student at Texas Tech in Lubbock. Their son-in-law is employed at the Capital in Austin.

She also showed me several of the bedspreads that she cross-stitched and they are both delectable and beautiful. She does these in the winter times when they are unable to get out and about.

Mrs. Devlin also has a bit of a green thumb. She enjoys growing

African Violets and had several of them near the window, all green and healthy looking. Surrounding them were many types of plants that she had started from either shoots or cuttings.

Although they are retired from full-time farming, Mr. Devlin gets out of the house and checks on his cows, does a little ranching and is getting the garden ready for the Spring planting.

Mrs. Devlin is an active member of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, D.A.R. and W.H.D., was named as Farm Woman of the Month by the Extension Service and both are members of the Deport First Methodist Church. She is a longtime member of the Eastern Star and enjoys genealogy and has traced her family back as far as the 1400's. She loves to sew, does all types of crafts and they enjoy going to the Elk's Lodge to eat and do a little "two-stepping". She says that Mr. Devlin is quite good at it, but she manages to keep up with him.

She is sharing her recipes for Frito Dressing, Cheese and Broccoli, Dilly Beans (this recipe was given to her by her mother in 1913), Clarksville Cake (this cake was sold for \$150 in Clarksville at a fund raiser once), Old Time Tea Cakes (this is also a recipe from her mother) and No-Bake Cookies.

We hope you enjoy this week's column and we will see you in the kitchen!

Frito Dressing

- 3 cups broken Fritos
- 1 cup finely chopped onion
- 2 cups chopped cooked chicken
- 1 cup broth

Place in a baking dish one layer of Fritos, a layer of onion and a layer of chicken. Top with crushed Fritos and grated cheese. Bake at 350 degrees or until cheese is melted for 15-20 minutes.

Cheese and Broccoli Bake

- 1 can celery soup
- 1 can potato soup
- 1 can mushroom soup
- 1 1/2 ounce can Pet milk
- 1 cup water
- 10 ounce package frozen broccoli
- 1 pound Velveeta cheese
- 1 can Rotel tomatoes

Mix the first five ingredients slowly and then add cheese and tomatoes. Season with celery salt and add broccoli. This dish freezes really well.

Dilly Beans

- 2 cups cider vinegar
- 2 cups water
- 1/4 cup salt
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 small section dill

Wash beans and pack standing in hot sterilized jars with stem attached. Add pepper, garlic and dill to beans. Heat vinegar, water and salt to boiling point and boil one minute. Pour over beans and seal.

Clarksville Cake

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup pecans
- 3 cups flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 1-1/4 cup oil
- 1 teaspoon soda

- 2 cups mashed bananas
- 1 small can pineapple
- 1 small can coconut
- 1 teaspoon vanilla flavoring

Mix all ingredients well and cook in a tube pan for 1 hour. Cool on rack. For icing combine 1 stick oleo, 8 ounces cream cheese, 2 cups powdered sugar and 1 cup chopped pecans. Allow oleo and cream cheese to reach room temperature and mix well with sugar and pecans. Spread on cooled cake.

Old Time Tea Cakes

- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2/3 cup margarine
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 tablespoon vanilla

Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Cream margarine, sugar, egg and flavoring and add to dry ingredients. Mix well. Form with a teaspoon into balls the size of a thimble. Put pecan on top of dough and bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Makes 6 dozen.

No Bake Cookies

- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/3 cup cocoa
- 1/4 cup oleo
- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup coconut
- 2 cups chopped pecans

Combine in large pan sugar, milk, cocoa and oleo. Boil for one minute. Add peanut butter, vanilla, coconut and pecans. Mix well and drop by teaspoonfuls on cookie sheet to cool.

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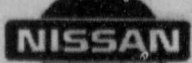

The latter years of my life have been the most pleasant ever. Gone are most of the tensions and struggles of life. The children are grown and the grandchildren are already spoiled. Isn't it amazing how such average children can have such beautiful, intelligent grandchildren? Gone are the peak hour freeway traffic tie ups. In Houston there was an old lady whose car had stalled at a red light. A middle aged man behind her was honking his horn for all it was worth. She tried and tried to start her car and the man behind honked and honked. Finally the old lady got out of her car. Went back to the man and said, "If you will please go up and start my car, I will stay back here and honk your horn for you." Gone are work deadlines and progress reports. Since retirement, life has been one long three day week end, in fact, I wouldn't never know what day it was if I didn't mark them on a calendar in my workshop. I now have the freedom to establish my own agenda and schedule in the pursuit of happiness. If you don't feel good, eyes watering, down in the dumps, grouchy, feel sorry for yourself, get up and go out and do something for someone else. The waitress said, "Yes, we give a 10% discount. Hoping for a greater discount I said to her, "But I'm real old," to which she replied, "You're real ugly too but 10% is all you're gonna get."

The Bogata First Methodist Church is a great place for seniors. We are a lot more concerned about living than we are about dying. We have occasional fellowship and refreshments, usually oat bran muffins and prune juice. The church honors us by allowing us to serve as Sunday School teachers and workers. We are honored and grateful that we have not been put out to pasture. Worship seems to be more enjoyable and meaningful as we get older. I never was allowed to sing in any choir, high school, etc. Upon retirement the nice choir at church allowed me to join. That was 6 years ago. The leader of the choir now tells me if I keep improving they will allow me to sing out loud next year.

By reputation old men offer unolicited and unheeded advice at every opportunity. Living up to reputation and perhaps expectations, I say "If you want to look younger and prettier, run around with people who are older and uglier."

As a Senior and Seasoned Citizen I appreciate my wife more, enjoy my children more and plan to move in with all the grandkids as soon as they enter High School. Love! Love is extremely important for all Seniors. Some seniors are nearly impossible to love, but "to love the unlovable is the greatest achievement of all".

Ask yourself each morning, "What kind of world would this world be if everyone in it were just like me?"

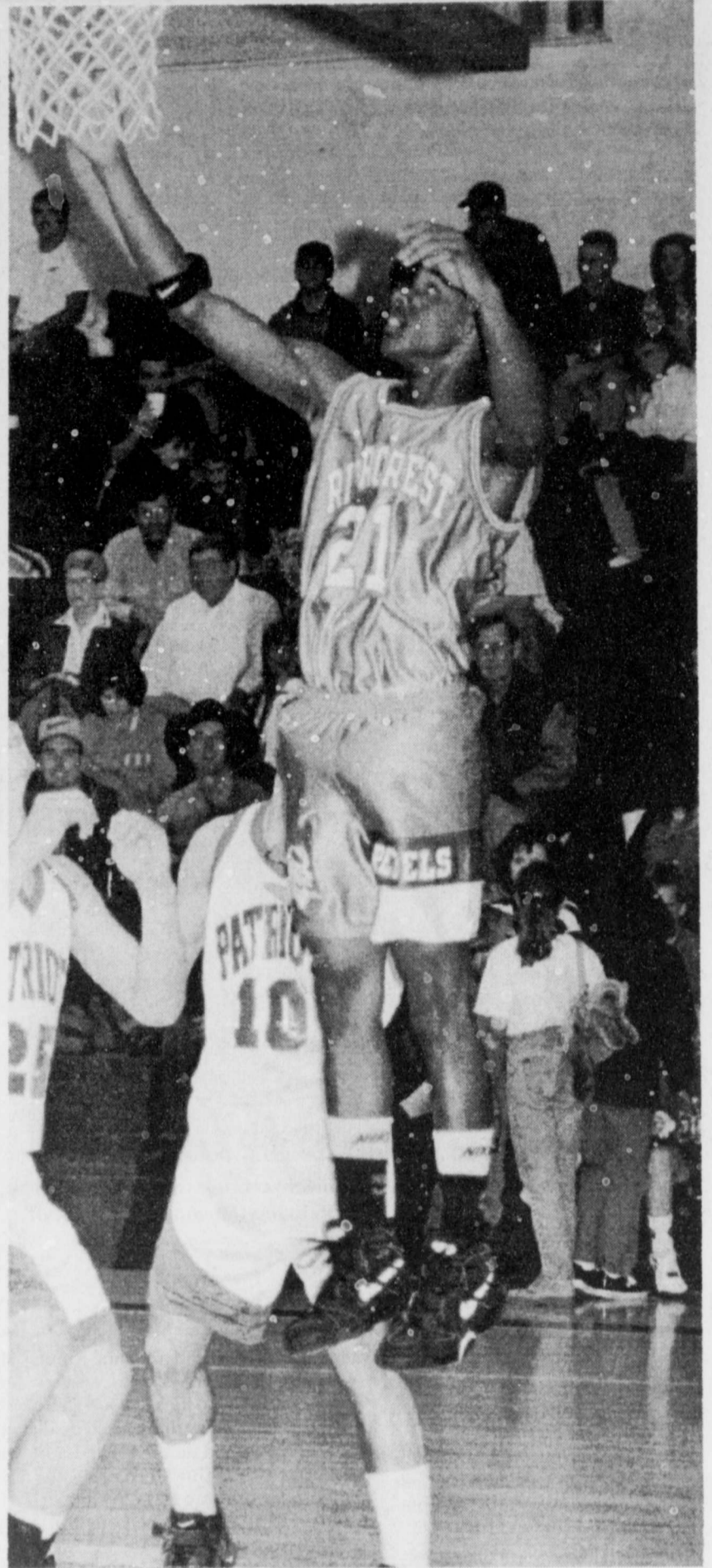
Rebels defeat Como-Pickton 69-35

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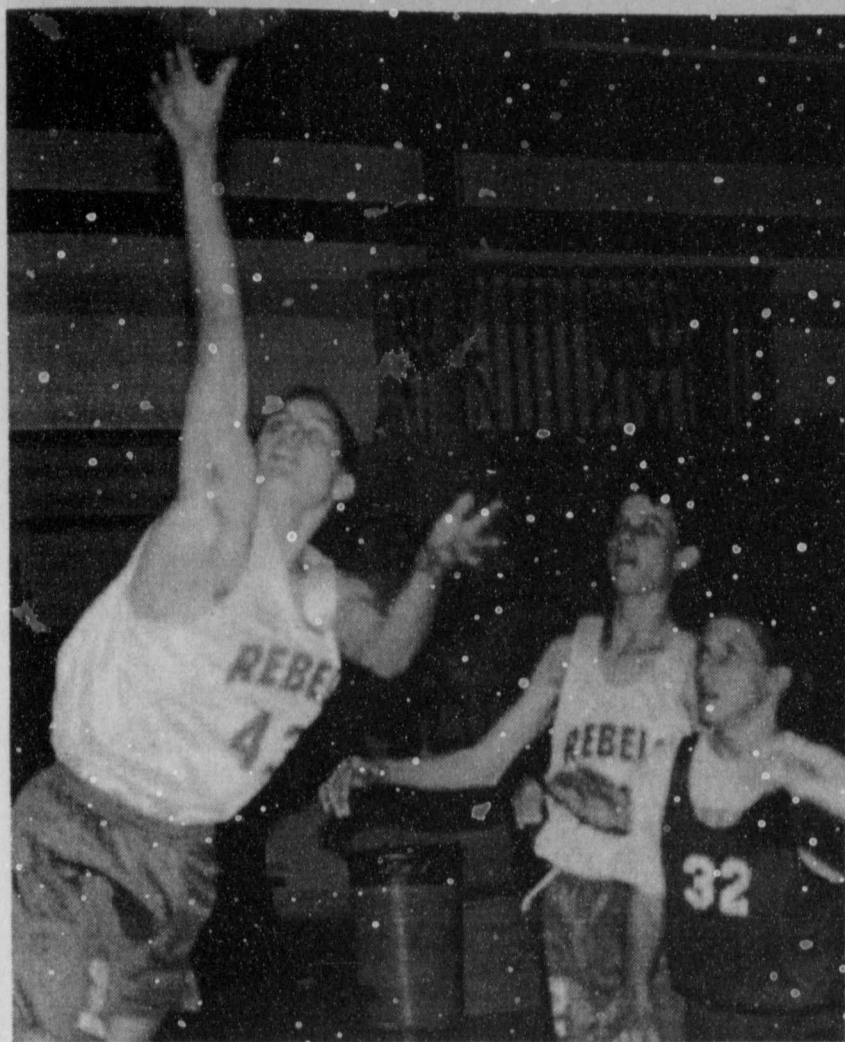
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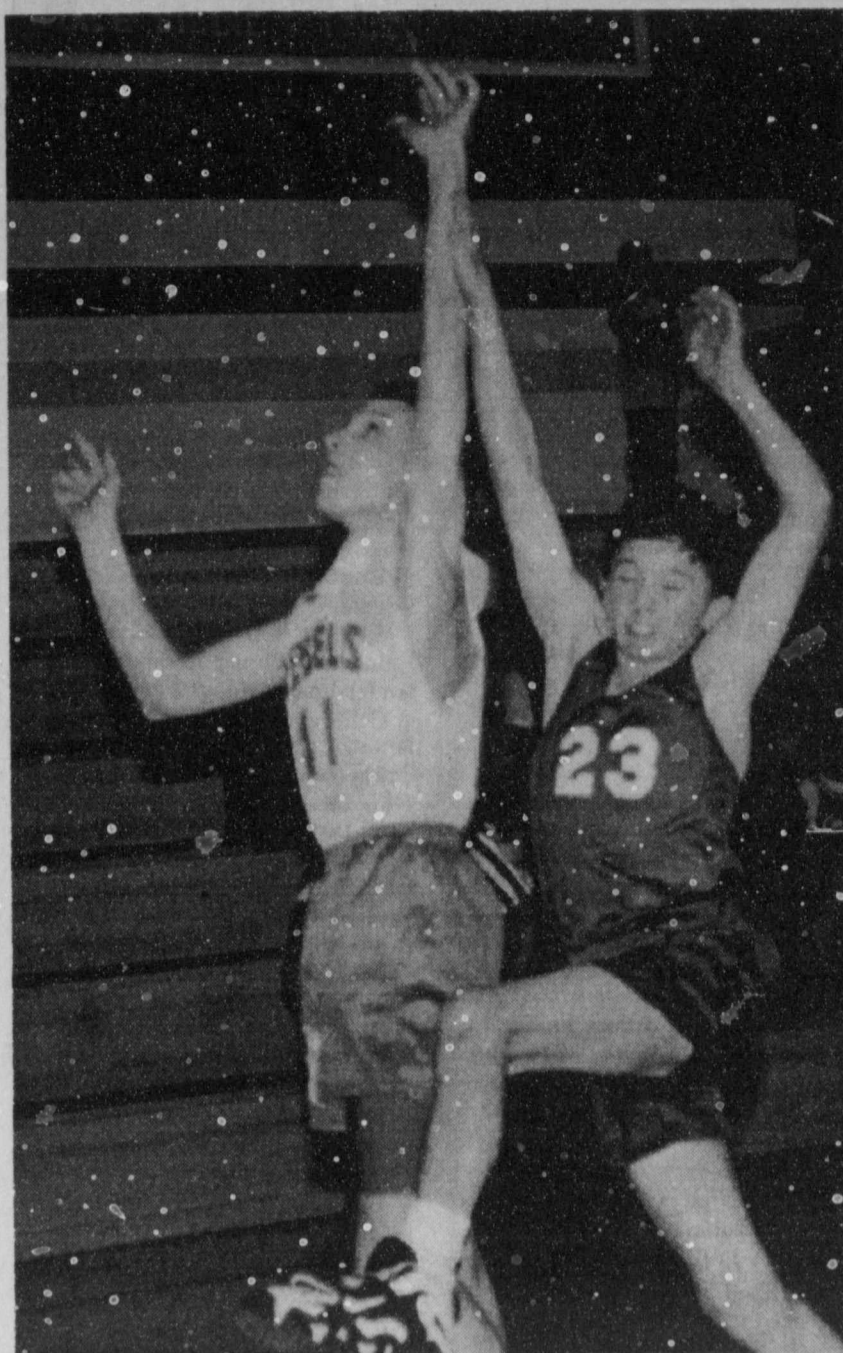

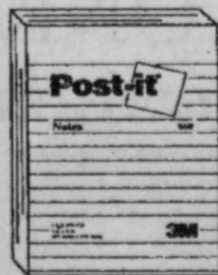
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Need to create results in custom-made boots

"If you can imagine it, I can make it", states thirty year old bootmaker Steve Adkins.

Adkins uses tools and machines more than twice his age to turn out western style work and dress boots to custom fit his customers.

Adkins owns and operates S.C. Adkins Custom Boots in Clarksville, Texas. For the past two years Adkins' business has been known as Steves Boot and Shoe Repairs.

He has spent most of his life in the boot and shoe repair business. When he was eight years old he started doing odd jobs in a repair shop in Tulia, Texas.

In 1979, Steve's Dad opened a boot and shoe repair shop in Paris, where Steve continued to work at learning this specialized trade.

In 1994, Steve opened his own shop in Clarksville, but the need to do more than just repair, the need to create burned away at the young craftsman.

Adkins took some time off last year to pursue his dream and attended a custom boot maker seminar in St. Jo, Texas.

Adkins found his creative desires were satisfied as he watched and listened to Carl Chappell of St. Jo explain how to build a pair of western style boots from "scratch".

A basic pair of custom made boots requires approximately thirty hours to complete, Steve says. "I start by

measuring my customer's feet and legs. Next I make the "lasts" and use No. 1 leather about 1/4 inch thick and start cutting the boots out of the material" he explains.

Adkins can create designs or use a customer's own design to create their person, one-of-a-kind footwear.

He has created boots with everything from inlaid initials to hearts and stars, using exotic leathers from lizard, ostrich, bulls and kangaroos.

He has designed boots for customers with handicaps and arch support problems. According to him, a custom fit boot will fit his customers, no matter what size or shape the foot is in.

Adkins' boots are unique in their designs and colors. Each pair is an original, but each pair carries a four row stitch with the very best of materials.

These custom made creations start at \$395 per pair, but he says "you just can't buy a pair of mass produced boots off of the shelf that will fit and wear as well as a pair of custom made".

Steve Adkins lives in Blossom with his wife, Donna and their two children. His boots are worn by the entire family.

"We just enjoy the perfect fit that provides comfort and durability" Adkins smiles. That his family wants nothing else may be the best testament to his work!
