## Thumbprints combat counterfeit checks

chances are you'll be asked to leave something more than he check: your bprint.
check counterfeiters, more than 90 banks across Texas have begun to require theirtellers tothumbprint noncustomers before they will cash a check written on another bank. Using due, tellers are asking for a right thumbprint on the face of the check between the memo line and signature line. The banks won't maintain a ecord of the thumbprints, but if fraud
is discovered, the returned check complete with thumbprint will be turned over to law enforcement officials for prosecution. "We are hoping it will
