





This is the time of year that fresh fruit is usually on hand and is ready for the picking. Because of the inclement weather that we had during the winter, the early fruit and most of the rest was lost. We have to rely on crops that are shipped in from California, Florida or the Rio Grande Valley. A lot of these areas also lost most of their crops due to the cold weather and a lot of flooding, not only bringing on a shortage of crops but the usual. . . . high prices. But what little fruit that was grown, there is no better way to prepare it than a fresh, hot, fruit cobbler.

I can remember sitting in front of a very large(at the time it seemed to be gigantic) metal washtub, filled to the brim with water and fresh, mouth watering peaches, waiting to be peeled. I preferred mine half-green with a lot of salt and ate as many as I peeled. Apples were also abundant and we peeled, sliced, diced, cooked, preserved and froze many, many bushels. I ate a lot of these too, but peaches were my favorite.

Blackberry Cobbler is also an all time favorite, if you can get past the thorns. Nowadays, they have the thornless berries, but they just don't taste the same. There are several varieties of the Peach Cobbler. One is for a Sugarless for folks that are trying to cut back! Also included are two crust recipes. I use the Never-

Fail recipe. I can't count the times

that my crust has ended in the gar-

bage and it took me several years to perfect" my pie crust. There is also a all-purpose recipe for using different varieties of fruit.

Included is a recipe for an Old-Fashioned Vinegar Cobbler. A variation for this is to add 4 tablespoons of margarine. This recipe was used before the Civicl War and was used much when fruit and berries were not available while traveling by covered wagon and riverboat, when supplies were limited. Also used in the Depression days, when money was scarce, making do with what was on

There is also a Bread Pudding recipe that several folks have asked for and we will see you in the

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NOTICE OF RATE CHANGE REQUEST

For Texas-New Mexico Power Company customers within the State of Texas, the Company announces that it has filed, on May 2, 1996, an Application for Approval and Statement of Intent for Transition Plan in accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The effective date of such change is June 10, 1996. All classes of customers receiving service from Texas-New Mexico Power Company will be affected by said proposed rates. TNP serves approximately 1/0,000 customers in Texas. The proposed rates, for all of TNP's Texas operations, will not increase gross revenues to the Company over adjusted test year revenues.

The purpose of this filing is to obtain approval for TNP's transition plan, known as Community Choice, which will address potential stranded costs and increasing competition in the electric utility industry. Community Choice is comprised of the following three major elements:

(1) Effective Aggregation of Small Electric Loads. Community Choice aggregates electric service customers at the community level for the purpose of purchasing bulk electric energy. This approach to aggregating customers will provide residential and small commercial customers some of the same buying power that large commercial and industrial customers likely will enjoy in a competitive environment.

(2) An Opportunity to Recover Stranded Costs. During a five-year transition period (1997 - 2001), in which TNP will implement Community Choice, TNP will have the opportunity to reduce the so-called "stranded costs" associated with TNP One, TNP's generating plant. TNP's stranded costs are the difference between what it costs TNP to produce electric energy and what a customer is willing to pay for electric energy in a competitive environment. Rates, including charges associated with fuel and purchased power, will remain constant during this five-year period at 1995 levels. TNP will use normal depreciation, depreciation shifting, and any fuel or purchased power savings to reduce the capital cost of TNP One. In addition, Community Choice will include a mechanism for using some earnings above a specified level to reduce the capital cost of TNP One.

(3) A Commitment to Provide Customer Choice. Beginning on January 1, 2002, TNP's customers will have the opportunity to choose their suppliers of bulk electric energy and energy-related services. Customers will be able to choose which company provides these services to them, while TNP will continue to provide transmission and distribution services.

A complete copy of the requested rate filing package is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas. You may inspect a copy of the filing during normal business hours at the business office of Texas-New Mexico Power Company in your area.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. A request to intervene or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas 78757. Further information may also be obtained by calling the Public Utility Commission's Consumer Affairs Office at (512) 458-0256, or (512) 458-0221 for text telephone. The deadline for intervention in the proceeding is 45 days after the date the application was filed with the commission.

An afternoon and evening in Galway is a good way to spend time.

One of the neatest things we did was wander through an antiques and jumble sale around the old city walls of Galway. Here people had everything from furniture to penknives for sale. It's probably for the best we couldn't ship most of the things we wanted back.....it kept us in line!

A live band entertained the crowd, and we adjourned from that after a little while for a walk along the beach to pick up a few sea shells.

Our bed and breakfast that night was on Threadneedle Street, a lovely two story home called Clare Villa.

Tea and biscuits (what we would call cookies), a hot bath and a pleasant, sunny room refreshed us. Slowly, jet lag was wearing off. That night we dressed up and went for a special meal at The Malt House. How pleasant to set at linen covered tables with fresh flower arrangements and attention service. Deep fried camembert cheese, garlic butter crab claws, scallops, shrimp, olive bread...oh my! It was an evening to "wonder what the pore folks were doing"

From Galway we traveled through beautiful country in Connemara. Many of you will remember a John Wayne/Maureen O'Hara movie called "The Quiet Man". That movie was filmed in the area, and in the town of Cong. The lovely mountains, chattering streams sharing secrets as they joined together, and stone bridge seen several times in the movie made it'easy to understand why it was chosen as a movie location.

• We had not seen the movie until returning home, and it was delightful to find that I had taken a picture of the vicarage that matched the scenes in the movie, as well as several others. We had a stop in the pub used in the movie, also interesting and pleasant.

We took a walk to Ashford Castle, which is magnificent. It's another one of those castles turned hotels with rates too high for the likes of us. The grounds are just beautiful, and the tulips, long gone here, were still in full bloom.

ful wild swans regally drifting down rivers and on lakes.

Sandwiches and chips (what we call fries) in Handley's Pub took care of lunch and we reached the Northwest of the Republic of Ireland. I think our guide wondered why we wanted to return to Sligo and the Drumcliffe area, and I was at a loss except to tell him that I felt drawn back to the area by the quality of light. Later, settled into our B&B at the end of a series of long, winding roads, the light on Benbulben mountain and the bay far, far belong began to prove my point. My cousin, Medora sat in breathless excitement as a rain storm swept across the bay, and the light changed from pinks to purples to deepest blues and night settled in. It's hard to explain why I love that country so much, but I thoroughly enjoyed our return.

Earlier, the three of us wandered down the lanes, watching lambs cavort around their mamas, and enjoying the scenery

Inside our B&B we chatted with some Australians who were staying their also, then went down to Drumcliffe to Yeats House to eat. It was across from the churchyard where the poet, W.B. Yeats, is buried.

It occurs that not all readers may be familiar with a" B&B". This means, obviously, bed and breakfast, and that's exactly what one gets. The rooms are attached to a private home, and the family lives in another part of the house. Ours all had ensuite bathrooms. There is a central sitting room where tv, books and radio are available. At Benbulben Farm we visited with Mrs. Cummins and learned that the family has six girls and one boy. The boy had minigitis at age 9, and is almost completely deaf.

"I fear we indulge him too much' she said. As well behaved and friendly as the children we met were....no

We asked if there was an orphan lamb Medora could feed, since she had never done that. In short order "Bobby" came around behind the three youngest girls, who were so sweet and attractive. Medora giggled and giggled as the lamb took the

East Texan is the number of beauti- bottle, and one of the girls brought her rabbit for us to pet too. Being animal lovers we all enjoyed that immensely.

> The next morning Robert came to collect us and we were off for the Belleek factory in Northern Ireland.


We talked about the troubles between the Republic and the north with Robert. He says that the media refers to it as a Catholic/Protestant problem, but that it is really more of an English/Irish problem". Sadly, it seems that millions of pounds are poured into Northern Ireland to station the military there, and that there are many who don't want true peace because of the economic benefits of the problem!

At the Belleek factory we toured to see how the fragile, almost transparent pariah pottery is made, then (naturally) Medora and I had to buy some. From there we traveled on into Northern Ireland, including Inniskellig, where there was a terrible bombing some years ago during a parade.

At a park in Inniskellig we stopped on the spur of the moment to see swans and fishermen. The fishermen were sitting in chairs on the riverside, with long poles, bobbers and a reel. They would use a bean flipper or throw out by hand dry fish tood and small larvae around the hook to attract the fish. My cousin, the fisherperson extraordinaire, was fas-

We drove through land that was much less rocky and very lush. Of course, by this time my cousin was thinking I was quite nuts...I had told her it rained nearly every day and to bring her raincoat and umbrella. We had about two 15 minute showers the whole trip! Well, I could only judge by our first time, I didn't know it would be dry!

Back into the Republic of Ireland we made our way towards Dublin, and stopped off for the highlight of the trip for me, at least. Newgrange is an ancient burial tomb, known as a passage tomb. It was constructed 500 year before the pyramids, making it 5000 years old. We'll cover more of that next time...and our "brush" with the Druids! Now that was interest-

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

Texas traffic deaths increased in 95

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Traffic deaths increased by 1 percent in Texas in 1995 compared with the year before, but the number of fatalities per 100 million miles driven dropped to the lowest level in the state's history, Department of Public Safety statistics show.

The record-low death rate of 1.7 means that the chance of being killed in a traffic accident in Texas was the lowest it has ever been.

There is concern that the actual number of deaths was up slightly, but considering our large population, rapid growth and the amount of driving we do in Texas, the situation certainly could have been much

Statistics compiled by the DPS show 3,172 persons died in traffic crashes in 1995, up 1 percent from 1994, when 3,142 fatalities were re-

Another encouraging sign seen is that alcohol and drug related traffic fatalities were down in 1995. Accidents involving intoxicated drivers were down 2.7 percent. Still, intoxicated drives accounted for 1,138 deaths; 35.9 percent of all fatalities.

Though the speed limit on some Texas highways increased beginning Dec. 8 last year, it is too early to tell what effect this will have on traffic safety in the state. Even so, motorists need to keep in mind that exceeding the speed limit is dangerous.

Traffic fatality reports for 1995 showed a slight increase in the number of motorcycle fatalities and an increase in pedestrian traffic deaths.

No traffic fatalities were reported in Texas on Feb.28,1995, the only day during the year no traffic deaths occurred. Twice during 1995, single accidents claimed six or more victims. Texans are encouraged to obey speed limits, wear safety belts and avoid alcohol when they plan to drive. Keeping traffic safety in mind can save lives during 1996.

Emergency farm loan applications being accepted

loans for damages and losses caused by excessive high temperatures, drought conditions, unseasonably cool temperatures, and an early freeze, which occurred August 1 through December 31, 1995 in Oklahoma, also contiguous counties of Bowie and REd River are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Mt. Pleasant, Sheila L. Osbourne said today.

Bowie and Red River Counties are included in 20 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture, Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from damages and losses caused by excessive high temperatures, drought conditions, unseasonably cool temperatures, and early freeze conditions which occureed August 1 through December 31, 1995.

Ms. Osbourne said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual production losses resulting from damages and losses caused by excessive high tempratures drought conditions, unseasonably cool temperatures, and early freeze conditions which occurred August 1 through December 31, 1995.

Ms. Osbourne said farmers may be eligible for loan of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loans needed to cintue in business or

Applications for emergency farm \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commerical lenders the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a genral rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent oss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Ms. Osbourne said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program wil have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until January 6, 1997 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Ms. Osbourne said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers hwo work at and rely on famring for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers hwo are U.S. Citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S> citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Mt. Pleasant is open from 8:00 to 5:30 Monday through Friday.
