The Methodist Church was organized in 1887 in Bogata with twelve charter members. Reverend I.N. Woodard, who was then pastor of the Rosalie Methodist, came over and organized it as the Methodist Episcopal Church South. Over the years the church has grown and the name has changed several times. The present name being Bogata United Methodist Church. The twelve charter members were Mr. and Mrs. W.M. Cofield, two of their daughters, Eleanor and Louise, Mrs. Amanda Barnett, Mrs. Drew Ladell, Mrs. John McClinton, Mrs. Mary Humphrey, Mr. and Mrs. John Monroe and their two children, John and Kate. 

In 1887, and for awhile after the church was organized, the members used the small building in the park area. They later met in a larger building which had been built on North Main Street by the Presbyterians. This building was used by all congrega-

In the year 1899, after Brother Henderson Brown held his revival meeting, so many wanted to join the Methodist church the members decided it was time to make plans to build a church of their own. So plans were made and money collected from time to time to build. It was in the fall of 1900 before plans came to fruition and the building was started. Lumber had to be hauled from the sawmill at Bagwell, a two day trip. Eventually enough lumber was hauled to start construction. Mr. John Barnett was the general contractor. He only charged for every other day he worked. Volunteers did the other work. The lumber was hauled by L. Guinn, Sam Ferguson, Dan Thomas and Ben Bryson, among others. The church was built on a small wooded lot on North Howison Street. The large oak trees on this lot made a beautiful setting for the little white church. The new church was a small

had passed on. We have had many fine pastors over the years who have contributed something of themselves to the church. We have a fine modern parsonage which was built in 1978. Our pastor, David Griffin, his wife, Bridgett and their children, Wesley and Rachel, were the first church family to reside there.

Thompson, Larry Meredith, Herbert Grodigier, John McLean, Gene Shoemaker, Robert Phelps, John Hawkins, John Streun, Clay Yeager, James Walker, David Griffin, Carroll Cadell and David Rucker. Brother J.L. Sullivan was pastor 1920-23. After his retirement, he and Mrs. Sullivan came back to

Pastors of United Methodist Church after Randy Newkirk were Johnny Johnson, Doug Hoke and our present pastor, Bob Bush.

Reverend J.L. Sullivan, pastor from 1920-1923 invited W.M. Bowden of Fort Worth to hold revival January 30- February 13 (not sure which year 1921,22, or 23). The following information taken from a Texas Christian Advocate publication about the revival: The enthusiasm and interest last service, with from three to eight services being held each day. Every available space was seated, and yet people were constantly turned away. All business houses closed from 10 until 11 a.m. each day during the meeting ..... More than a score reclaimed 111 conversions; 32 additions to our church .... erected seven family altars ..... class of twenty young men and ladies being added.

The revival of the membership of our church was of the Old Methodist type. Personal work, altar work, testimony and shouting. The spiritual pulse of all denominations of the town was quickened. All Sunday Schools increased in attendance, and all churches receiving members.... not putting it too strong to say the whole town and community were moved.


### Jason Reed is deployed to Persian Gulf
